It is my pleasure to submit for your consideration the annual report of the schools of Alfred.

At the beginning of the present school year the upper elementary grades were made a part of a six year unified high school. This arrangement allows a certain degree of departmental work and tends to bridge the gap between the elementary and secondary school courses. This organization has been very satisfactory thus far although we are hampered by the lack of necessary room. No high school can be considered up to standard which has no room for assembly purposes. Since the town is financially unable to finish the new assembly room immediately, it would seem feasible to expend a little each year until it is completed.

We are notified by the State Department of Education that the required annual expenditure of seventy-

five dollars for laboratory equipment and the same amount for library material must be met in the future. Failure to meet this requirement means the loss of "A Grade" rating.

There have been three changes in the teaching personnel this year. Mr. Milton W. Weymouth and Miss Marion Freeman were elected to fill the vacancies in the high school caused by the resignations of Mr. Hildon M. Brawn and Mrs. Dorothy L. Marshall. Mr. Foster L. Mitchell was secured for the junior high school position, Mrs. Josephine D. Gould transferring to grades 5-6.

Instruction in music is still being carried on every other week. Interest in this worth while subject would be much increased by restoring it to an every week basis.

May I express to the members of the school committee, to the teachers, and to the citizens of Alfred my appreciation of the kindness and consideration shown me during the past year.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools and Superintending School Committee, Alfred, Maine.

School opened with sixty-two pupils in Senior High School, an increase of eleven over last year and thirtyfour in the Junior High School.

We have been unable to meet for assembly, having no room for that purpose, the unfinished room could be used to good advantage in many ways if the finishing could be accomplished.

The standard of the school has been kept to its high scholastic level this year. Our curriculum has been augmented by athletics, school plays, and the formation of a school orchestra, which has played at many public functions.

If the subjects of chemistry and physics are to be taught in the high school, a suitable place should be provided for experiments, at present the flat desk, without water or sink of any kind is very unsatisfactory and seriously handicaps pupils taking those subjects.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the friendly cooperation which I have received during this my first year in Alfred, from the Superintending School Committee, Superintendent M. E. Wright and the citizens of Alfred.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools and Board of Education, Alfred, Maine.

I am pleased to submit the following report on school music for the year ending February, 1936.

The usual drills in time, tone and theory of music have been carried on in all the grades to the Junior High, following as far as practicable the Teachers' Manuals accompanying the text books.

A rhythm band in grades 1 and 2 gives opportunity for bodily expression of the child's rhythmic sense which will prove an important factor in future musical experiences, as well as affording them pleasure.

The tone quality is very good in grades 3 and 4, 5 and 6; they also seem to have an understanding grasp of the mechanical problems. We hope to have harmonica groups started in these two rooms before the term closes.

The junior high note book work has been on music form; American music and instruments of the orchestra. There will be a good vocal class to enter high school next fall. Mr. Mitchell has been very helpful in music appreciation work.

Mr. Weymouth, principal of the high school, is much interested in music and has organized a fine orchestra. Such cooperation is highly valued.

The high school appreciation notes have covered some biography and study of opera and oratorio forms. The Victrola Book of the Opera has recently been added to the music library. This gives stories of the operas in brief, indicating principal arias, etc. Quite a number of the students listen to the grand opera broadcasts from New York on Saturdays and we talk over the opera, singers, etc., at our next lesson. It is a wonder-

ful opportunity for them to hear the finest artists of the world without expense.

The Junior Schubert music club was very creditably represented at the state convention of the Federation of Music clubs held at Portland last June, by Lucia Wright and Eleanor Gould, who won 2nd and 3rd places in the piano playing contest with a good number of entrants in their class. Miss Freeman is counselor of the club.

The victrola record "Toreador Song" from the opera Carmen sung by Lawrence Tibbett has just been purchased for the school but we are obliged to borrow Mr. Weymouth's victrola for all record playing. Do you suppose any one would loan us a victrola that was not in use, for the rest of the season?

Our chorus work but once in two weeks cannot of course be as well done as with weekly rehearsals, but the interest seems still keen.

I deeply appreciate the cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, members of the Board, High School faculty and grade teachers, which has made the year pleasant and profitable.

Gentlemen:

I submit the following as the thirty-first annual report of Parsons Memorial Library.

The work of the library for the past year has on the whole, been fairly satisfactory although we feel that many more of the townspeople should avail themselves of its privileges. There are 365 card holders at the present time, nearly half as many as there are inhabitants in the town, showing perhaps that many like to feel they have the right to use the library at any time even if they do not do so very often.

We have added one hundred and fifty-two books during the year and at present are taking fifteen magazines.

The New Century Club gave us ten dollars to be used for magazines and a group of townspeople put on a play from which we received fifteen dollars for both of which we are most grateful.

Miss Grace Came has given the library six chairs and they are proving a very useful addition to the reading room. The floors were refinished last summer which has added much to the appearance of the rooms.

We have received from the local American Legion a year's subscription to their magazine "The Legion" and Mrs. Julian Thomson still contributes "Time" and Miss Elizabeth Perkins "The Literary Digest."

The library is now able to offer further help to those looking for any information on a subject as the Maine State Library issues a monthly bulletin which is sent to the library containing a list of the latest books purchased and these can be obtained by any one on paying postage.

To all who take an interest in the work of the library and try to help by their gifts and patronage we extend our thanks and trust they may find help and entertainment through its use.
