REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Alfred:

The annual report of the Alfred Schools is hereby submitted for your consideration.

Pupils are registered and classified by grades at the present time as follows:

Number of persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years according to last school census: Boys, 148; Girls, 123. Total, 271.

At the present time the elementary schools are too crowded to permit the carrying on of work in the most satisfactory manner or with the best results. This condition is detrimental both to proper instruction and discipline. It is a recognized fact that for best results a school should have a registration of about thirty pupils. A glance at the foregoing registration statistics will show that if we had five teachers in the elementary grades there would still be an average of 34 pupils in each room.

Little work was done this year toward finishing the assembly hall since the repair of the boiler exhausted and overdrew the amount appropriated for repairs and equipment. More work on this room is anticipated during the coming year.

A new system of reading is being used in Grade 1 this year with very satisfactory results. This system will be used in the succeeding primary and intermediate grades.

I wish to urge once more that parents and citizens visit the schools more frequently, talk over with teachers matters of mutual interest and acquaint themselves at first hand with those things which the schools are endeavoring to accomplish.

In conclusion, I wish to express to the committee, to the teachers, and to the citizens of Alfred, my appreciation of the kindness and consideration shown me during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools and Board of Education of Alfred:

I herewith submit the following report of music in the schools for the past year:

The regular outlines for the Music Hour Series of text books are followed as far in as practical through the first six grades.

Grades 1 and 2 are quite thrilled with the piano in their room, which was a greatly appreciated gift from the Congregational Church. These children are getting unusually sweet headtones in their singing this year.

The third and fourth grades are studying intervals, sequential drills, sharp and flat chromatics, etc. These seem to facilitate their sight reading, and their tones are very true to pitch.

Part singing begins in the fifth and sixth grades; also study of the minor keys. The voices here show more maturity yet maintain excellent tone quality. Biographical sketches of famous composers are studied with much interest.

The Junior High group have been keeping note books on music appreciation. They have just completed a study of the Peer Gynt Suite, taking up the life of Eduard Grieg and descriptive analyses of the numbers as heard in the Victrola recordings.

This class has about thirty-five boys and nine girls with some extremely good voices.

In the High School we have a fine girls' chorus.

A large group from the High School sang in the All-County Chorus at the York County Teachers' convention in Sanford last fall.

I wish to thank you, our Superintendent, School Board, High School faculty, grade teachers and citizens of the town for your loyal support and cooperation throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

To the Citizens of the Town of Alfred, I hereby submit my report as Public Health Nurse for the period from January 1, 1937 to December 31, 1937:

During the year many follow-up visits were made to the homes of school children regarding necessary corrective work. On information received from a teacher, an investigation was made into the home life and environment of a number of children in one family, all attending school with either improper or no daily lunch, and with unsuitable clothing. The case was brought to the attention of proper authorities and the case eventually disposed of satisfactorily. Several calls were made to the home of a school child chronically ill. Arrangements were made for two children with defective vision to have an examination by an oculist and corrections made. In response to a request from an interested citizen in Alfred, assistance was given on several occasions in transporting a school child and her mother to a dentist in Sanford for corrective work.

In May, assistance was given at a Farm Bureau preschool clinic held at the Chapel, at which five children and mothers were present.

During the months of March and April all rooms of the Alfred School were visited and inspection of teeth, throat, posture and skin given. In November they were again visited and the children weighed and measured for average weight for height and age, and the skin and hair were inspected. REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF PARSONS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Legal Residents of the Town of Alfred:

As we enter upon the thirty-fifth year of service to the residents of Alfred and the vicinity, the Directors of the Parsons Memorial Library are pleased with the record of steady growth and the continued appreciation of the facilities afforded the public by our institution as evinced by the constantly increasing patronage.

The finances of the Library are in a very satisfactory condition although the General Reserve Fund has been lowered during the past few years by banking conditions. The building has been kept in good condition and during the past year, some emergency repairs were made to the roof at a considerable expense.

We are asking the Town for the usual sum of \$250.00 and this amount, with the vested income, should be sufficient to pay all expenses during the ensuing year.


