## REPORT OF THE HEALTH NURSE

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To the Citizens of the Town of Alfred, I hereby submit my annual report of the York County Health Service for the year beginning January 1, 1942 and ending December 31, 1942.

In April tuberculin patch testing was done to twenty-three high school pupils, and no reactors were found. Through the kindness of Principal Webster, a tuberculosis film was shown on the school projector to the pupils of all grades. The projector and a high school pupil experienced in its operation was loaned to the nurse for use in other high schools throughout the county.

During the summer months conferences were held with Dr. Richards and the teachers, and many home visits were made to contact children eligible to free tonsil and adenoids operations at the Goodall Hospital in Sanford. Three children were operated upon by Dr. Rich-

ards and calls were made to the homes following their return from the hospital. Other home visits were made on school children to aid or advise regarding needed correction of defects found at health inspections.

In November a Health Council, composed of women representing the various organizations and activities of the town, was formed and the first meeting held at the Court House. Officers were elected and plans made for an immunization clinic to be held at the schoolhouse in January.

Guarding our health is a contribution to the War effort. To correct existing physical defects and to make available preventative measures against communicable diseases is a civic duty.

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**REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Alfred, I submit the annual report of schools:

According to the school census of 1942, Alfred has 126 boys and 116 girls between the ages of five and twenty-one. Of this number 131 are registered in the elementary grades. They are classified as follows: Sub-Primary, 18; Grade 1, 7; Grade 2, 20; Grade 3, 12; Grade 4, 10; Grade 5, 18; Grade 6, 16; Grade 7, 14; Grade 8, 16. For the registration of high school pupils I refer you to the report of the principal.

At the last annual town meeting the sum of \$2,500 was appropriated for the introduction of a course in Home Economics. This sum is still unexpended. We were faced with a definite lack of available, trained and experienced teachers in the subject and with the difficulty of securing proper equipment. After carefully considering the matter, it was decided to postpone the introduction of this project until a later date.

The work of the year has progressed efficiently and satisfactorily considering severe winter weather and war time demands upon the schedule.

Alfred is especially fortunate in thus far being able to retain the services of trained and experienced teachers. There has been considerable difficulty in securing a permanent high school assistant, but for the most part we have not felt, as yet, the teacher shortage.

This shortage became apparent more than a year ago, and the indications are that the situation will continue to grow worse. Maine has suffered more than many other sections of the country in this respect, because of the generally low salary schedule.

During the last year more than 1,000 Maine teachers left for military service or for better paying positions elsewhere. A recent bulletin of the Maine Teachers' Association makes the following statement regarding salaries of Maine teachers: "During the past year over one-fourth of the teachers in the state received less than \$750 a year or less than \$15 a week for the 52 weeks the teacher eats. Remember, too, that a teacher spends from two to four years in preparation, and must rather frequently attend summer school. Many business establishments pay more and require less."

The present legislature is now considering a bill to establish a minimum salary of \$720. This bill would give the towns \$190 per teaching position instead of the present \$100 in the apportionment of the State School Fund.

In regard to Maine's ability to support education, statistics show that in wealth Maine stands 23rd among the states, in appropriations for education, 39th. Moreover, state funds are declining. The years 1932-1942 show a decline of \$463,000. In other words the "per census pupil" state school aid has dropped from \$3.00 to \$1.51. To make matters worse, running expenses are unavoidably higher. This condition explains, in part, the necessity in recent years of asking for increased appropriations from the town.

Fully as serious as the teacher shortage is the matter of transportation of pupils. We are faced with the fact that transportation equipment now in use must last "for the duration." Tires and gas do not present the only difficulty. It is, as every one knows, becoming increasingly difficult to secure repair parts. Concerning new buses it is alarmingly interesting to note that since July 1, 1942, 27 new buses have been released. The State of Maine received **one** of these.

In view of these facts, the Office of Defense Transportation has made it mandatory that all possible curtailment of school bus mileage be put into effect. It thus becomes necessary for some pupils to walk part or whole of the distance to school. We have endeavored to meet these conditions with a minimum of hardship for the children involved.

During the year the schools have been required to assume many new duties imposed by the war. The matter of rationing is but one of these. I should be neglecting an obligation, if I did not before closing, express my keen appreciation, not only to the teachers and the School Board, but to the citizens who have given of their time and effort in this and other matters.

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### **REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC**

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To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and  
Citizens of Alfred:

I herewith submit my annual report of music in the schools:

Grades 1 and 2 are showing excellent progress in correct tone production, and the beginning of reading music by syllables.

Grades 3 to 6 have just passed very satisfactory "True or False" tests in time and theory, the upper grades doing more advanced study of sharp and flat Chromatics, and marks of expression.

The Junior High group are working now on two part music with special stress on interpretation and tone placing.

Mr. Webster, though unable by reason of changed schedules, to devote as much time as formerly to the high school chorus, maintains his interest in it, and has purchased an electrical reproduction attachment to the motion picture machine, which gives very fine renditions of symphony and opera recordings. It fills a long felt want and is greatly enjoyed in regular music appreciation study, and occasional concerts in assembly for both grades and high school.

The High School is taking up the story of the opera "Carmen," but we have only the record of the "Toreador's Song" at present, as many of the opera recordings are unavailable "for the duration."

We were glad to receive a visit from Mrs. Frances B. Settle, music representative of the Silver Burdett Pub. Co., last fall, who complimented teachers and pupils on their fine work, stressing the excellent tone quality.

During these chaotic war mad days, music is needed more than ever as a stabilizer, and morale builder, and as one music educator says, "The names of Bach, Mozart, Beethoven and Brahms will be remembered long after those of Hitler, Mussolini and Hirohito are forgotten."

May I here express my sincere appreciation to you all and to all the teaching force for splendid cooperation during the entire year's work.

**REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL**

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To the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools and the citizens of the Town of Alfred, I submit the following report:

School opened on Monday, September 28, with an enrollment of 6 freshmen, 8 sophomores, 8 juniors, and 10 seniors. Three new subjects have been added this year: Economic Geography, to give the student a broader outlook on the rapidly changing world, Physical Fitness, to prepare both boys and girls for the strenuous life of the next few years and Civilian Defense, in preparation for home front emergencies.

The government demand for pre-induction training in high school has resulted in several drastic changes in our method of procedure. Great emphasis has been placed upon mathematics and science. With this end in view we have added several internal combustion and electric motors to our laboratory equipment. These have been cleaned and assembled by the pupils in the various science courses. A friend of the school has loaned us a splendid work bench containing a jig saw, a power grinder, and a wood turning lathe, driven by electric motor. With money obtained from the scrap drive we have purchased a standard typewriter with a large carriage, for mimeograph work, an electric turntable, and seventy-five dollars worth of hand tools for carpenter work. The students have turned enthusiastically to the task of providing themselves with a practical education. This commendable attitude should stir a responsive chord in the hearts of the citizens who are really interested in the welfare of young people.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the school officials and citizens who have responded so patiently and generously to my many calls for more equipment and donations of time and effort and to the teachers for their hearty cooperation during these critical times when they are called upon to perform many additional duties.
