TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

County of York, ss:

To Dudley T. Forrest, a Constable of the Town of Alfred, said County.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Alfred, qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town on the Twelfth day of March, 1949 A. D. at Ten O'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioners, Town Clerk, and other Town Officers.

Article 3. To elect a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, one member Superintending School Committee for three years, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Tax Collector, Constable, two Directors Parsons Memorial Library for three years.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or Commissioners as per Section

- 20, Chapter 80 of the Revised Statutes of 1944, not exceeding three, and proceed to elect the same.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for maintenance of Alfred Fire Department.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Hydrant Rental and Town water service as per contract with the Alfred Water Company.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for care of Fountain and Park, and spray trees.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Discounts and Abatements.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Street Lights.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Maintenance of Highways and Bridges.
- Article 11.. To see if the Town will vote to raise money by tax assessment and appropriate for Construction of State Aid Roads in addition to the amounts regularly raised for Ways, Highways and Bridges under the provisions of Section 25 and 29, Chapter 20 R. S. 1944 as amended.
 - Article 12. To see what sum of money, if any, the

Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for maintaining and tarring Town Roads.

Article 13. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for repairing Stone's Road from Stone's House to Hay Brook.

Article 14. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate to repair and tar the cross road leading from the School to the County Jail.

Article 15. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Incidental Expenses.

Article 16. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Insurance on Town Property.

Article 17. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Maintenance of State Aid Highways.

Article 18. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Opening Roads in Winter.

Article 19. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Parsons Memorial Library.

Article 20. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate to equip the new fire truck.

Article 21. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Repairs, Equipment, Insurance, and Improvements on School Building.

Article 22. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Support of Elementary and Secondary Schools including Salary and Tuition.

Article 23. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for the services of a Public Health

Article 24. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for the services of a Public Health Officer.

Article 25. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Relief for the Poor.

Article 26. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for War Veterans' Aid Account.

Article 27. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate for Cutting Bushes.

Article 28. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions

of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes 1944.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$50.00 to pay for writing up new valuation book.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town, such loan or loans to be paid during the current year out of money raised during said current municipal year from taxes.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Collector of Taxes one per cent of the total collection of taxes.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount on all taxes paid within 30 days after commitment.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes unpaid on September 1st until paid and to fix the amount.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of property acquired by the Town by tax process and execute Quit-Claim Deeds in behalf of the Inhabitants of the Town of Alfred for such property.

Article 35. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate to paint the Town Hall white.

Article 36. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise by tax assessment and appropriate to care for Evergreen Cemetery.

Article 37. To see what action the Town will vote to take towards fulfilling a request from the Maine State Library, Augusta, Maine, for the Town reports for the years ending March 1867-86 inclusive; 1888; 1889 and 1897.

Article 38. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Saturday, March 12, 1949, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:00 o'clock A. M. until the polls are closed.

Polls will be open for voting at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

I herein submit a brief report of service rendered the Town of Alfred by the York County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the period beginning January 1, 1948, to December 31, 1948.

Some time has been spent on the control of tuberculosis and follow-up of the previous year's Tuberculosis Survey. Several home visits were made for investigations and follow-up on all contacts, suspicious and known cases of tuberculosis. Forty-six pupils were given Tuberculin Patch tests, one positive reactor found. Six people were given chest X-rays at State Diagnostic Clinics held in Portland and Biddeford.

Several special inspections given school children because of various skin diseases. Some children excluded and taken home from school because of these conditions. Two pupils had tonsilectomies in Sanford Hospital by Dr. Richards, and financed by the Woman's Auxiliary of the hospital. Seven pupils taken to Sanford dentist, the work completed and each received a dental certificate, this called for several visits to dentist from each pupil. One student taken to Sanford for eye examination and glasses fitted. These corrections were financed by local clubs in Alfred.

The finances given by the local clubs has been a tremendous help in making the much needed dental, throat and vision corrections.

The new look in school health is focused sharply on the problem of finding all children in need of medical and dental care and following them until such care is secured by whatever resources the parents and community can give. Each child deserves an opportunity to achieve optimal growth, good mental and physical development. In order to accomplish this, health education has proven the necessity of at least three medical examinations be given during the child's elementary school career, with a follow-up program to assist in getting all remedial defects corrected. May I suggest that we strive to start this program in 1949, with an addition to our dental clinics, to include Flourine treatments to help reduce dental caries.

I want to thank all the people, including Mr. Wright, Superintendent, Town Officers, Teachers, Seal Sale Chairman, the A.A.M. Club, Local Red Cross, Dr. Richards, and the American Legion Auxiliary for their interest and support of the service.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Alfred:

It is again my privilege to submit for your consideration the annual report of schools:

Elementary enrollment is 161, an increase of ten over last year. Classification by grades is as follows: Sub-Primary, 19; Grade one, 22; Grade two, 25; Grade three, 13; Grade four, 18; Grade five, 14; Grade six, 14; Grade seven, 21; Grade eight, 15. One elementary pupil attends school in Sanford. Sixteen secondary pupils are enrolled in Sanford High School. Twelve of this number are taking occupational courses and have their tuition paid by the Town of Alfred.

There have been two changes in the teaching personnel this year. Miss Helen L. MacDonald resigned her position in the sub-primary grade and the vacancy thus caused was filled by the election of Mrs. Harriet A. Randall of Springvale, a graduate of Gorham State Teachers' College. Mr. Daniel Boothby of Parsonsfield, who had previously taught in Wilton Academy was elected principal of the High School to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Malcolm W. Roberts who resigned at the end of the last school year. Thus far we have been unable to secure a music supervisor.

The teacher shortage is very acute throughout the State. This is particularly true in rural areas. The town that has and can hold a full corps of teachers is indeed fortunate. Authorities estimate that in Maine

next year 1,600 teachers will be needed to fill vacancies. To meet this need teacher training colleges are graduating only about 125 teachers. The situation seems serious. In spite of somewhat increased salary schedules young people throughout the country are showing a definite lack of interest in becoming teachers.

General repairs and upkeep have been attended to during the year. Last fall to relieve an overcrowded condition part of the pupils of grade one was assigned to the sub-primary room. For the accommodation of these pupils new desks and chairs were ordered. After considerable delay in shipment these were received and installed. Recently the room occupied by the third and fourth grades has been partially equipped with fluorescent lights. Those who attended the Patrons' Supper given by the Senior Class of the High School at the school building know how much of an improvement has been made by the installation of this system. We wish to continue this lighting program during the coming year, and will do so insofar as appropriation will allow. At the present time the assembly room is inadequately ventilated. The only way this can be done is by opening windows. Something should be done to improve this condition. The room should also be painted in the near future.

May I in closing express my sincere apprepriation to the teachers, the school committee, and the citizens of Alfred for their help and consideration during the past year.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Committee, Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Alfred, I respectfully submit the following report:

School opened on September 7, 1948 with an enrollment of 28 students. One student left during the year and one enrolled, leaving the same number. They are divided by classes as follows: Seniors, 9; Juniors, 8; Sophomores, 7; Freshmen, 4.

The College Preparatory Course and the General Course have been offered this year. Eleven students are taking the College Preparatory Course; the remaining students are taking the General Course.

This year we have had periodic assemblies with members of the clergy speaking on a wide range of social problems. We had two other guest speakers: Mr. Alfred Center of Brunswick, Maine, who spoke on the town manager form of government, and Ralph Gould of Madison, Maine, who spoke on his trip through the Caribbean Sea.

The students have participated in all of the extracurricular activities of the Central York County League and have made a creditable showing in all events. They have taken part in the following events: Horseshoes, spelling, and basketball. They will also take part in baseball, public speaking, and checkers this spring.

We have added maps of Europe and the United States to the Social Studies Department, and plan to add new equipment to the laboratory before the end of the year.

We have been handicapped in music because of no music supervisor. The students miss this very much, and it is an important part of their education.

The audio-visual aid program has been handicapped by the failure of our projector. We have, however, shown several educational films on a borrowed projector. A few films have been returned without being shown, because we were unable to borrow a projector.

I want to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the Superintendent of Schools, School Board, Selectmen, teachers and townspeople for their cooperation during the past year.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Town appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying Comments.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report present the result of the financial operations of the Town for the period designated.

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts—Town of Alfred February 9, 1947 to February 6, 1948

An examination has been made of the financial transactions of the Town of Alfred for the Municipal year ended February 6, 1948. This examination consisted of a thorough check of all cash received and disbused and such test checks of other operations as seemed advisable.

All asset and liability accounts were reviewed and verifications made to the extent deemed necessary.

Cash

The cash balance at the close of the municipal year amounted to \$2,500.92, which was reconciled with the records of the Treasurer and the bank statement of the Sanford Trust Company. The total amount was available for current operations.

Accounts Receivable

This account is represented by an amount due from the State of Maine for expenditures made by the Town on unimproved roads. Payment was received after the books closed.

Taxes Receivable

The 1947 valuation book of the Assessors and the related commitment of taxes were examined. Collections were reviewed, abatements found authorized and the individual uncollected taxes were listed.

Many prior years' taxes were abated, and those remaining for the years 1935, 1936 and 1937 are of doubt-

ful value. A reserve of 100% has been set up against the taxes for these three years.

Tax Liens

Payments received and adjustments made on tax liens were checked and verified with the records. All liens were found on file and were examined.

Tax Acquired Property

A number of tax liens not redeemed within the eighteen months expiration period have been transferred to this account as tax acquired property now owned by the town. Schedule A-5 lists in detail these properties and the amount of unpaid taxes.

Investments

In December 1944, the Town purchased one \$500.00 U. S. Savings Bond which matures in 1956. The bond which was held at the home of the Treasurer was examined.

Special Funds

The records of two special funds, known as the Old Cemetery Fund and the Parsons Memorial Library Fund, were examined. Expenditures were found properly authorized and cash balances fully accounted for.

Accounts Payable

In 1946 an overpayment of \$12.04 was made by Joseph Fournier on his tax account. He has not been reimbursed for this amount. Other amounts owed by the Town represented withholding taxes and teachers' retirement contributions.

Net Deficit

The net deficit represents the excess of liabilities over assets. The complete analysis of the changes in this account is shown on Exhibit E of this report.

Revenue and Expenditures

On Exhibit F is presented a statement of the sources from which the current year's revenue were derived and the expenditures applicable to this revenue.

While this Exhibit shows a net gain from operations of \$1,441.54, this was accomplished by bringing forward by vote of the town departmental balances of \$666.25 that had been lapsed in the 1946 year and the transfer of \$1,356.66 from the net deficit account to be used in computing tax requirements.

General

Corporate surety bonds covering the Treasurer and Tax Collector were found on file and appeared to be in order.

With the payment of the \$600.00 note for work done on the so-called Nutter Road, the Town became practically free of debt.

The records of the Town Clerk were reviewed for appropriations and salaries of officers.

Excise tax-receipts were verified by examination of the copies of the receipts retained by the Collector.

The books and records of the Town were found readily available and efficiently maintained.




