

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF WESTBROOK:

We herewith submit, for your consideration, a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Town, for the year ending February 14, 1884.

STATEMENT.

As it will be noticed the amount of orders drawn is very large, quite up to the full assessment, state and county included. It should be borne in mind that large expenditures by the town, authorized to be paid by loan, have in consequence of so many bills, necessarily come into order account which serve to swell the amount of figures larger than in any former years.

Although the expenditures have been unusually large, we have endeavored to do what in our judgment was for the best interests of the town, with an eye to the safety and welfare of its citizens, not forgetting the comfort and happiness of those so unfortunate to need its aid. We have purchased 500 feet of hose, put in one hydrant, on Main street, employed police when most needed, blasted a well at Rocky Hill, for the double benefit of school and crusher work, which we are satisfied will be equal to all future needs. We have leased a lot near the school-house for three years, at \$20 per year, for the crusher, and also a lot on Main street, at \$30 per year, for the hose carriage house, and an office in Odd Fellows block, with use of hall for meetings and caucuses, for five years, at \$125 per year; purchased a Morris & Ireland safe, a Pennock road machine, and manure and ashes for the farm. We have made exchange of farm lands, cleared pasture land of bushes, and done what we hope will prove good and substantial work on roads and buildings.

REPORT OF OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

OUT-DOOR POOR.

Expense of out-door poor has been largely due to the transportation of foreigners to their homes, which seemed the cheapest and best way to dispose of them. Also the burial of an unusual large number. Esther Kennard remains at the Insane Hospital, Willie Jameson at Joseph Barbour's, W. H. Brown at F. A. Bettis', at about the same cost as last year. Mrs. Dillingham has been sick for several months, requiring constant care, which we have furnished in addition to ordinary expenses. Lewis Wallace, A. Goosey, Mrs. Wood, and others have had help, which has tended to swell the account with the poor, for which see report of Overseers of Poor.

The large number and helpless condition of the inmates, together with tramps and prisoners lodged and fed, also the purchase of double harness for team, sewing machine, household furniture, and a thorough repair of the house, has made the expenses very large.

We have also made a very much needed improvement in the almshouse, by the addition of an ell 50 feet long by 25 feet wide, containing eight comfortable sleeping rooms on the ground floor, suitably heated by furnace. This work was done in a substantial and thorough manner, which necessitated a cost of more than the appropriation, for which see expenditures for new ell of almshouse.

We have accommodated 50 tramps, at an average of three meals a piece, and 14 prisoners, at an average of nine meals, making in all 276 meals. Number of inmates at present, eight, one male and seven females. By frequent examination, we are satisfied that the inmates are well cared for. Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Sawyer have charge of the institution.

It will be seen by comparing the number of scholars in town and attending school with the corresponding numbers in last year's report, that the number has largely increased. Many of the schools have been crowded to an extent incompatible with successful work, especially Maine street primary, Saco street and Cumberland Mills primary and grammar schools. The new school-house at Cumberland Mills was not finished until late in the winter term, and we deemed it advisible not to open school then until the spring term, both on account of the confusion attendant on a division of the schools in the middle of a term, and also because of the limited amount of money at that time at our disposal. At the beginning of the spring term it was found necessary to open a fourth school in the Bridge street building, in order to relieve the grammar school. At the same time, owing to the crowded state of the grammar school at Cumberland Mills, a class room was fitted up and an assistant teacher installed in that school. These arrangements have been kept up during the whole year. The irregular attendance at school of pupils still continues to a great extent, as will be seen from the foregoing tables. This is one of the most formidable difficulties a teacher has to encounter, and it is to be hoped that parents and guardians will more fully recognize the wisdom of keeping their children regular-

ly at school.

We have given considerable attention to different series of school books, and after a careful comparison of those now in use in our schools with others, would strongly recommend that the town give the school officers permission to make several changes. We are convinced that much more satisfactory work would be done with different text books, especially readers and grammars. Another matter to which we would respectfully call your attention is the fact that the appropriations for the purchase of text books have been entirely insufficient. We have bought none but what have been absolutely necessary during the year, and find that the amount appropriated falls far short of supplying the needs of our schools. The school at Spruce street was kept open only during the spring and winter terms, the small number of scholars in attendance being in our opinion a sufficient reason for not opening a fall term there.

The committee would call the attention of our citizens to the need of some efficient laws to correct the evils of truancy. Some of our schools have suffered from this vice this year. It is within the province of the town to pass such by-laws as will afford a remedy.

Several of our best teachers have quitted the profession during the year, but those now in charge of the schools are generally doing good work.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

MARCH 3, 1884.

To John F. Bean, a Constable of the town of Westbrook, in the County of Cumberland, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Westbrook, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Odd Fellows Hall, in Saccarrappa Village, in said town, on the third day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing

year.

ART. 3. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of Schools, and the Poor and repair of Roads and Bridges, and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen and

Treasurer.

ART. 5. To see if the town will agree to make a discount of six per cent on all taxes voluntarily paid on or before the first day of August or otherwise.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all

taxes unpaid January first or otherwise.

ART. 7. To see what action the town will take in regard to the

pay of Municipal Officers.

ART. 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase material for the highways.

ART. 9. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to

make such abatements as they think reasonable.

ART. 10. To see what the town will allow per hour for the labor of men and oxen or horses on the highway.

ART. 11. To see if the town will erect pounds, or authorize

pound-keepers to furnish the same.

ART. 12. To see what time in March the town will hold their annual Town Meeting, and how they will notify the same.

ART. 13. To see what action the town will take in relation to

the debt maturing the present year.

ART. 14. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money temporarily in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 15. To see if the town will choose a board of health for the ensuing year.

ART. 16. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to give the road from Kimball Eastman's store to C. P. Maxwell's house a light coat of crushed stone or some other suitable material—and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to give the road from John Cloudman's through to N. Weston & Co.'s mill a light coat of crushed stone or some other suitable material—and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to lay out and construct a sewer on Main street, from near John Cloudman's house to the large culvert near Edwin Moses' house, and to see if the town will

vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to lay out and construct a sewer on Main street, from Haskell street to connect with the sewer at Brown's Hall,—and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 20. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to improve the northerly end of the Methodist road (so called), and to

see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Mechanic street, from Valentine street to the Portland and Rochester Railroad,—and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 22. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer to assign the Tax Deed of the Peter G. Winslow property to E. F. Cobb.

ART. 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to employing police, and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to tax dogs.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer on Brackett street to the foot of the hill—near Ivory Hezelton's house, and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 26. To see what action the town will take in regard to the

outfall of the Bacon street sewer.

ART. 27. To see what action the town will take in relation to keeping the snow shoveled from the sidewalk between Saccarappa and Cumberland Mills.

ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to lay out and construct a sewer on Rochester street from the Pelham house (so called), to Main street, and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to place a watering trough at Cumberland Mills, and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to widen the bridge between George Hadlock's and David Pride's, and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

ART. 31. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of

money for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 32. To see if the town will vote to extend the Brackett street sewer from Cross street to the Canal on Brackett street, and to see if the town will vote to raise money for the same.

Arr. 83. To see if the town will make by-laws concerning habitual truants and children not attending school as authorized by sec-

tion twenty-one, chapter eleven of the Revised Statutes.

ART. 84. To see if the town will appoint one or more persons who alone shall make complaints for the violation of said by-laws, and shall execute the judgments of the magistrate under the same.

ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the whole

or a part of its work house as a town house of correction.

ART. 36. To see if the town will accept Valentine street from Mrs. Livingstone's house to Spring street, as requested by I. F. Quinby, E. J. Pennell and John W. Small.

ART. 37. To see if the town will authorize the S. S. Committee to make such changes as are deemed necessary in the text books now

in use in the public schools.

ART. 38. To see if the town will vote an appropriation of five hundred dollars for the new school-house at Cumberland Mills, to complete the heating arrangement, and grading of lot, and fencing the same.

ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to accept Cottage street from Seavy street to Lamb street, as dedicated by Wm. W. Lamb.

ART. 40. To see if the town will vote to accept Gray street, from Seavy street to Lamb street, as dedicated by Wm. W. Lamb.

ART. 41. To see what action the town will take in regard to depositing ashes and other waste matter in the public streets.

ART. 42. To see if the town will vote to enlarge the culvert on

Main street, near Amasa Winslow's houses.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office on Saturday, the 1st day of March, from 10 to 12 A.M., and from 3 to 5 P.M., and on the day of election from 9 A.M., until the election of officers required by law to be elected by ballot, shall have been completed, to receive applications of persons claiming the right to vote, and for revising and correcting the voting list.
