I hereby submit my first annual report of the condition, progress and needs of your schools.

In these days of disturbed world conditions, we are in great need of good schools with useful activities which are teaching good government. A good school offers an opportunity for children to acquire knowledge, to observe accurately, to study questions from all sides, to learn the difference between right and wrong, and to choose the right; also to have respect for the rights of others. The school should teach individuals to think, and by its uplifting influence make good citizens. It therefore behooves each one of us to do his best, and upon the teacher rests a great responsibility.

In a small school like ours the teacher is able to study the personality of each pupil, know his home life and other environments, to diagnose difficulties and to administer proper corrective measures. I believe our teachers are putting forth their best efforts to attain these ends.

Our school equipment is good and indicates the foresight and interest of a progressive community. Unfortunately the school work has been somewhat interrupted, but it is hoped that the present school year so well begun may be carried on to a satisfactory close. A standard achievement test was given in December which ought to serve as a means of a better understanding of the attainment of pupils, certain remedial work and more intelligent grading.

I appreciate the friendly spirit of cooperation which I have felt in such contacts as I have made, and endeavor to reciprocate.

## NURSING REPORT

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### Annual Report of the Flander's Bay Nursing Service For the Past Year of 1935.

To the Citizens of Winter Harbor, Sorrento and Gouldsboro:

I hereby submit the following condensed statistical report of the activities of the past year of 1935. The service is an affiliation of the Maine Public Health Association, and is under its direct supervision. The personnel remains the same as in the past years, with Fletcher Wood as chairman, Charles Small as treasurer and Rubie Tracy as secretary.

1142 visits were made during this time. These visits include everything—bedside, instructive, social service, investigation and follow up.

Sixty-nine visits were made to the eleven school buildings; 48 full inspection, and ninety, for special reasons, were given. The special inspections were for detection of communicable diseases, mainly whooping cough and measles.

Sixteen children were excluded and referred to physician.

134 examinations were made by physicians and oculists. As a result of these inspections and examinations, 318 were found with defects that can be corrected, teeth taking the lead. Thirty-two were found to be 10 per cent. underweight and twenty-two were found to be 20 per cent overweight. One hundred and forty corrections were made since the last inspection by the nurse. Eighty-three children were personally taken to the dentist, four were taken to the physician, fourteen adults and children were taken to the hospital, five were taken to the oculist and two to the sanatorium.

The child who is deaf frequently does not realize his condition. He does not hear the same words spoken by the teacher that are heard by his classmates, consequently he misunderstands what is said. He is criticised for something he cannot help and becomes sensitive to reminders of his failings, with the result that he stops trying and becomes inattentive. The removal of such a handicap often entirely makes over a boy or a girl, both in progress and attitude. Through the Woodman Audiometer—a hearing device loaned by the Maine Public Health Association—217 hearing tests were made, and those found defective were referred to the physician.

Five well-baby and pre-school conferences and two baby and pre-school clinics were held. The regular conferences were omitted by order of the board of health, due to an epidemic of whooping cough, measles and an active case of infantile paralysis.

Two T. B. clinics were held by the Maine Public Health Association in Bar Harbor. The tests and X-rays were given by the clinic nurse and the chest examinations by the physician from Fairfield sanatorium. As a result, one child was taken to Hebron, two were referred to their physician for further observation and one child was advised to attend only one session of school, the afternoon to be spent in a rest period.

Fifty-five individuals were given clothing and blankets. This was made possible through the social service section of the Maine Seacoast Mission and an interested summer resident.

Assistance was given with forty-one inoculations for whooping cough and typhoid fever.

In closing, I wish to thank all who have helped to make the program a success—the Maine Public Health for its advice and cooperation and help in educational possibilities, as well as health and welfare, the Maine Seacoast Mission, the teachers, parents and physicians, and all others who by their cooperation have contributed to the success of the service. I appeal for the continued interest and support that has made the past years successful.

# THE WARRANT

To C. W. Sargent, a Constable of the Town of Sorrento, in  
said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Sorrento, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town hall in said town, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1936, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1 To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year, and fix the salary of same.
- 3 To receive the report of all town officers, and act upon the same.
- 4 To elect three selectmen.
- 5 To elect three assessors.
- 6 To elect three overseers of the poor.
- 7 To elect a town treasurer and fix salary for same.
- 8 To elect a member of the school committee for a term of three years.
- 9 To elect a collector of taxes, and fix salary of same.
- 10 To elect a town auditor.
- 11 To elect two or more constables.
- 12 To elect a surveyor of wood, lumber and bark.
- 13 To elect a road commissioner.
- 14 To elect all other necessary town officers.
- 15 To fix wages of road commissioner, men, trucks and teams working for the town.
- 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes to wit: Current and contingent, common schools, text-books and supplies, secondary school tuition, superintendent of schools, repair of school property, roads and bridges, repair of town property, town wharf, sidewalks, street lights, board of health, public health nurse, insurance, Village Improvement Association, fire department, support of poor, overdrafts, town notes.

- 17 To see if the town will appropriate and raise money for the improvement of the section of State-aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of section 10, chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 175, P. L. of 1933.
- 18 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in section 20, chapter 26, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 19 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of chapter 271, P. L. of 1931.
- 20 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$108.00, for the maintenance of improved sections of third-class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third-class roads.
- 21 To see if the town will vote to purchase a snow plow that may be attached to a truck, for highway use, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 22 To see if the town will vote to give a discount on 1936 taxes paid before July first, and fix the rate of discount.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1, 1936, and fix the rate of interest.
- 24 To see what action the town will take in regard to property that the town holds by sheriff sale deeds, and raise a sum of money for the same.
- 25 To see what action the town will take in regard to property held by liens.
- 26 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make a temporary loan, or loans, not

exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$3,000.00, in anticipation of and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year of 1936.

- 27 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds in a sum not exceeding \$6,000, for the purpose of refunding, renewing, or paying certain indebtedness of the town due now or to become due during the year 1936, to wit: First National Bank of Bar Harbor, \$2,500; Liberty National Bank of Ellsworth, \$1,500; First National Bank of Bar Harbor, \$1,000, and Mr. Fred A. Brinton, \$1,000, all due on March 15, 1936.
- 28 To see what action the town will take in regards to making a one-way street of that part of Bay View Avenue and Ocean Avenue, between the intersection of Mt. Desert Street with Bay View Avenue and the intersection of Beech Street with Ocean Avenue. Entrance to be made by Ocean Avenue going east.
- 29 To see what action the town will take in regards to closing that part of Beech Street between the intersection of Waukeag Avenue and Bay View Avenue.
- 30 To see what action the town will take in regard to selling the town lot and building known as "The Connors' Place". Also wood, stove and mattresses.
- 31 To act upon any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the town hall, in Sorrento, at 9:30 a. m., March 2, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
