NURSING REPORT

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FLANDER'S BAY NURSING SERVICE FOR THE YEAR 1936

To the Citizens of Sorrento:

I hereby submit the eleventh annual report of the service from January 1, 1936, to January 1, 1937.

The personnel of the committee remains the same as in the past—Mr. Fletcher Wood as chairman, Mr. Charles Small as treasurer, Mrs. Rubie Tracy as secretary and Mrs. Theresa R. Anderson, R. N., as supervising nurse.

“Life,” says Longfellow, “without health is a burden; with health, is a joy and gladness.”

Those who have been interested in the service, and have watched the public health program, will probably have noticed that this program is not due mainly to philanthropic impulses but continues to go on from year to year because it meets a definite community need. It has devoted itself to

all health problems, successively and continuously, to the prevention of contagious diseases, the health of school children, the prevention of infant and maternal mortality, by visits of instruction, investigation in general, pre-school, infant and pre-natal programs.

The success of the program is due to a great extent to the affiliation with the Maine Public Health Association of Augusta, through its advisory supervision and to the many opportunities offered the nurse through this affiliation in keeping abreast modern methods, by lectures, institutes, conferences and opportunities to meet with other nurses, in discussions and round table talks. The nurse working alone in a rural section in a service connected with no other organization works at a disadvantage.

General

In all, 195 visits have been made. These visits include nursing, investigation, instruction in general, pre-school, infant and pre-natal, also social service cases. Some of the mothers and babies attended the midsummer clinic in Winter Harbor. The children were also given an opportunity to attend the summer carnival for a free afternoon. Transportation was offered, and some took advantage of this offer. Thirty miscellaneous visits were made, and layettes, blankets and clothing were given to social service cases.

Tuberculosis

The early diagnosis campaign, with talks and literature, was held with room talks, literature, and tuberculosis follow-up. A chronic case was visited several times. Films on tuberculosis with a health talk were given in the town hall. This coming spring another early diagnosis campaign will be conducted, with literature, posters, exhibits and educational films, also radio talks being given over several stations. Citizens of Sorrento and readers of this report are requested to watch for this coming program. It has been estimated that for every death recorded from tuberculosis, that there are from eight to ten afflicted with the disease. That these cases are not hopeless if taken in time constitutes a very good reason for the early diagnosis campaign which takes place in April of each year throughout the United States.

School Health Service

Reading, writing and arithmetic have always been considered as the essentials in every educational program, but are of secondary importance as they are of little use if the individual is incapacitated through ill health from using them. Since health is believed to be the foundation of skills and other virtues that belong to good citizenship, it should be the first aim of the school to teach right attitudes toward health. Forty-eight visits were made to the two schoolrooms, which have an enrollment of 27. Several of these visits were special visits for special purposes, such as impetigo and investigating social service for children, four were excluded from school for impetigo and pediculosis, and three were isolated from school due to scarlet fever and one for mumps. Twelve defects were found on full inspection in the spring; 15 were seven-pointers, eligible to march in the Field Day seven-point circle; 10 have been taken to the dentist.

Judging by the interest shown by the teachers, parents and the children themselves, more will be added to the seven-point list next year. All defects were referred to dentist or physician and notices sent to parents. Health and educational films were shown by the superintendent of schools, these films being pictures taken on field day, also safety and western pictures taken on a trip last summer. These were of educational value, as they brought home the rugged Rocky Mountain scenery as well as the great Boulder Dam project and other items of educational value. Health talks were given by the nurse at this time.

In closing, I wish to thank the teachers, parents and all others who by their cooperation and help have made the program a success. I appeal for their continued interest and cooperation that in the past have contributed to the success of the health service.

To C. W. Sargent, a Constable of the Town of Sorrento, in
said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Sorrento, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town hall in said town, on Monday, the first day of March, A. D. 1937, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article: No. 1 To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year, and fix the salary of same.
 - 3 To receive the report of all town officers, and act upon same.
 - 4 To elect three selectmen.
 - 5 To elect three assessors.
 - 6 To elect three overseers of the poor.
 - 7 To elect a town treasurer and fix salary of same.
 - 8 To elect a member of the school committee for a term of three years.
 - 9 To elect a collector of taxes, and fix salary of same.
 - 10 To elect a town auditor.
 - 11 To elect two or more constables.
 - 12 To elect a surveyor of wood, lumber and bark.
 - 13 To elect a road commissioner.
 - 14 To elect all other necessary town officers.

- 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes to wit: Current and contingent, common schools, text-books and supplies, secondary school tuition, superintendent of schools, repair of school property, roads and bridges, repair of town property, town wharf, sidewalks, street lights, board of health, public health nurse, Village Improvement Association, fire department, support of poor, overdrafts, town notes.
- 16 To see if the town will appropriate and raise money for the improvement of the section of State-aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of section 10, chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 175, P. L. of 1933.
- 17 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid, as provided in section 20, chapter 26, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 18 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of chapter 271, P. L. of 1931.
- 19 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$130.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third-class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third-class roads.
- 20 To see if the town will vote to give a discount on 1937 taxes paid before July first, and fix the rate of discount.
- 21 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1, 1937, and fix the rate of interest.
- 22 To see what action the town will take in regard to disposal of property held by liens or deeds.

- 23 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make a temporary loan, or loans, not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$3,000.00, in anticipation of and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year of 1937.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds in a sum not exceeding \$4,000.00 for the purpose of refunding or paying certain indebtedness of the town due now or to become due during the year of 1937, to wit: First National Bank of Bar Harbor, \$1,500, due March 15, 1937. Liberty National Bank of Ellsworth, \$1,500. Fred A. Brinton, \$1,000.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of white pine blister rust within the confines of the town. The State will add 50 per cent. to any amount appropriated for the work.
- 26 To see what action the town will take in regards to safeguarding the town's interest against accidents to the public's using the town wharf.
- 27 To see what action the town would take in regards to settling the 1936 tax against the estate of Merritt T. Ober.
- 28 To see what action the town would take in regards to discontinuing Elm street.
- 29 To act upon any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the town hall, in Sorrento, at 9:30 a. m., March 1, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
