SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Sorrento:

I hereby make my third annual report of the condition and progress of our schools.

One hundred years ago Horace Mann laid the foundations of American education by establishing the public school. Looking back over the century we can see that more progress was made during this short period than during all the years before. The eyes of the public have been opened to the need of educating future citizens, and we now believe that the future of our country depends upon good schools. Today, in the midst of this rapidly changing world, the school must not only teach the fundamental skills, but since it carries such a burden of responsibility it must develop personality and build character as well. The school must teach health, industry, thrift, courtesy, sportsmanship and self-reliance as attributes of a type of citizenship which will insure a successful future. The fact that character has to be caught as well as taught places a grave and splendid responsibility upon our teachers. It offers a sort of challenge which I believe our teachers of this year and of recent years have met with spirit and true devotion.

As formerly, we are using the Stanford Achievement Test for the purpose of judging pupil progress and a more intelligent grade promotion. Even though all pupils cannot reach the requirements of their grade, progress on the whole is steady and satisfactory. In a good number of cases children are doing exceptionally well.

The rather intensive spelling program of last year is being continued, with higher weekly averages than ever. By this method pupils are able to learn words which they need in their respective grades, to increase their vocabularies and break the untidy habit of erasing and rewriting.

An effort has been made by teachers and superintendent to provide suitable library books with the hope that a greater interest in reading may be aroused. Our teachers make a real effort to use these books to good advantage and some pupils are getting a reading habit which they did not have before.

We have in our schools a well-balanced health and safety program carefully executed by teachers and nurse which has its culmination in the Annual Field Day, which includes the entire school district and serves not only as a day of fun for children but also promotes good health and is a strong motivating force behind the entire school program. As a crowning feature of the day the Seven-Point Circle tells in an impressive manner the progress which we are making in health. Seven-pointers increased 20 per cent. last year, from 52 per cent. to 72 per cent. of the entire enrollment. Nurses, teachers, and many parents and friends are trying to raise the standard still higher to the end that every child can be physically fit. We solicit your further cooperation and hope that you will find it convenient to attend our next Field Day.

NURSING REPORT

FLANDER'S BAY NURSING SERVICE

To the Citizens and Town Officers of Sorrento, I submit my report from January 1, to December 31, 1937:

In March and April, during the Cancer Prevention and Early Diagnosis Campaigns, many pamphlets on these subjects were placed in public places and homes. Posters were also exhibited.

The Sorrento school children joined with the other towns in Flanders Bay for the annual Field Day, and all seven-point children took part in the exercises.

In August a baby and pre-school clinic was held in Winter Harbor, to which all mothers were invited. Dr. Shorey, a summer doctor from the Point, was the examining physician. The mothers received a great deal of helpful advice.

The annual school inspection was completed in September, and notices of defects found were sent to the parents. A full report of findings from the inspection was left with each classroom teacher. Here are the results of the health inspections: Number of pupils inspected, 27; number with defective teeth, 17; number with defective throat, 3; number with skin infections, 4; number 10% or more underweight, 6; number with defective vision, 1. Since school opened in September, two corrections are reported—one for tonsil and adenoid operation and one for correction of vision.

Five special classroom inspections have been given for infection of the hair. Through good cooperation of parents, this condition was quickly cared for. Thirty-eight visits have been made to the school this year.

During the year, 178 instructive and investigative visits were made to babies, pre-school and school children, pre-natal patients, tuberculosis contacts. One delivery was attended by nurse and eight patients were taken to clinic, dentist and hospital.

In closing this brief report, thanks is extended to all the citizens for their help.

THE WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE.

To C. W. Sargent, a Constable of the Town of Sorrento, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Sorrento, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town hall in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1938, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article No. 1 To elect a moderator to preside over said meeting.

- 2 To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year, and to fix salary of same.
- 3 To receive the reports of all town officers, and act upon the same.
- 4 To elect three selectmen.
- 5 To elect three assessors.
- 6 To elect three overseers of the poor.
- 7 To elect a town treasurer, and fix salary of same.
- 8 To elect a member of the school committee for three years.
- 9 To elect a collector of taxes, and fix the salary of same,
- 10 To elect a town auditor.
- 11 To elect two constables.
- 12 To elect a surveyor of wood and lumber.
- 13 To elect a road commissioner.
- 14 To elect all other necessary town officers.
- 15 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate, by vote, for the following, to wit: Current and contingent, common schools, text-books and supplies, secondary school tuition, superintendent of schools, repair of school property, roads and bridges, repair of town property, town wharf, sidewalks, street and hall lights, board of health, public health nurse, Village Improvement Association, fire department, support of poor, overdrafts, town notes.

- 16 To see what sum the town will appropriate for State-aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- 17 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads, in excess of requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.
- 18 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$131.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third-class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third-class roads.
- 19 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1, 1938, and fix the rate of interest.
- 20 To see what action the town will take in regards to disposal of property held by liens and deeds.
- 21 To see if the town will authorize the tax collector to sell all property at sheriff's sale, or place a mortgage lien on property, according to the judgment of the selectmen, on all property where taxes are in default after February 1, and before one year has expired from date of commitment.
- 22 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to build and maintain a pier with suitable walk, floating stages, a covered seat, box for storage of oars, etc., and grade a part of Fish Point, so called, for a town landing.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to relinquish all claims to the steamboat property as per conditions set forth in a deed from the Long Pond Water Company, dated the sixteenth day of September, 1911. Recorded in Hancock County Registry of Deeds, in said County of Hancock, in Book No. 442, Page 264. If so voted, the town clerk shall notify the Long Pond Water Co. of its vote.
- 24 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a town office building on the town lot No. 1, Section N, Division 1, near the hose house, how large, what construction.

- 25 To see if the town will lease a piece of shore property on the easterly side of Fish Point and between Ocean Avenue and the tidewaters. If so, fix the description of lease, years to run, and amount to be paid.
- 26 To see if the town will authorize, by vote, the selectmen to make temporary loan, or loans, not to exceed in the aggregate, the sum of \$3,000.00, in anticipation of, and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year of 1938.
- 27 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Bangor Hydro-Electric Co. to install a street light on a pole nearest the Garbrick Cottage on Preble street.
- 28 To see what action the town will take in regards to letters and plans the school committee have, relating to the dissatisfaction of the State Department of Schools with the town's school heating plant, installed in 1937. To raise and appropriate a sum of money if necessary.
- 29 To see what the town wants to do with the tractor.
- 30 To see if the town will abate, by vote, the 1934 and 1935 unpaid taxes.
- 31 To act on any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall, in Sorrento, at 9 o'clock A. M., on March 7, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
