SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee of the Town of Sorrento:

I welcome with pleasure this opportunity of submitting my second annual report as your superintendent of schools. It is most satisfying to be associated with a community so keenly interested in its schools and their affairs, and as cooperative in the manner of supplying adequate equipment, facilities, and good will toward its school department as is this one. A community interested in its schools and the welfare of the young citizens always commands the respect of men and women everywhere. It is most encouraging to the teachers to have the support of the different parents through their presence at school functions and their visits at school.

The current year of thirty-six weeks has operated within its maintenance budget comprised of funds received from local appropriations and State reimbursements. The common school expenses vary little from the average of the previous two years. The increase in the high school tuition account was occasioned chiefly by the increase in tuition rate of Sullivan high school. The operating cost of the high school last year was \$80.67 per pupil. Subsequent improvements, although expensive, have and will continue to be beneficial to Sorrento, since

nearly all of its grammar school graduates enter that institution. It should be our mutual aim to encourage each pupil coming up through the grades to enter high school. Every parent today realizes the competition for jobs grows keener each year as the educational level of the country rises.

The text-book and supply account increase over former years is justified and timely, in view of the fact that two new teachers took over with enthusiasm the task of further building up the school standards. Tools were needed; certain outdated and worn-out books had to be replaced; new reference materials were purchased; additional necessary supplies were obtained. There is still more to be done by way of replacing old text-books and furnishing new and up-to-date workbooks, materials and supplies. The \$200 recommended for text-books and supplies should adequately take care of these needs for next year. There is further recommended an additional \$300 with which to purchase modern seating equipment for both the primary room and the grammar room. The non-adjustable seats and desks now in use are in need of repair, and are not conducive to the development of correct posture and proper study habits.

The funds of the repair account were well spent. A complete, well-done inside paint job has materially improved schooling conditions and made more pleasant school surroundings The improvements of the school yard, with its playground equipment of new swings, teeterboards and flag pole, will be of immeasurable benefit to primary and grammar pupils alike. Supervised play periods are as important as study periods in the development of the whole child. Recreation is becoming a more important factor in education each year.

I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my satisfaction with the progress of the two schools during the past several months. Miss Pinkham, a graduate of Gorham normal school, and Miss Springer, a graduate of Farmington normal school, came here with records of successful teaching experience of several years standing. Each has lived up to expectations and is an expert in her own field of teaching. It is my hope that they remain with the community for some time to come.

The morale of the two schools is very high. Each pupil seems to be doing his best to accomplish his educational

objective. Although some have not yet attained their proper grade levels, each is treated as an individual pupil, and progresses at a rate consistent with his ability. It has been necessary in some cases to regroup certain pupils in reading classes of varying levels. This is done on the premise that the individual student does his best work on the level which he feels some measure of success. Once confidence is restored and an interest in reading and studying develops, he is apt to improve at such a rate to soon bring his reading ability up to his proper grade level. This procedure has the approval of leading educators everywhere, and is endorsed by the State Department of Education. It is also the recommendation of the Commissioner of Education that Sorrento adopt the subprimary plan on September next to conform with the other towns of the school union and the State course of study. A sub-primary providing for greater freedom, develops children through activities and interests, and defers actual instruction in the reading process until children show a readiness for reading. Requirements are much reduced and simplified and children are not hurried beyond their ability. No other grades will be affected by the reorganization.

There is much to be done in these schools by way of individual testing and guidance. Any realistic conception of such a program must recognize that many of the young people have always lived and for a great many years will continue to live in rural areas, and must therefore ask the question: What occupational opportunities does the home community offer youthful citizens. We must also be mindful of the fact that some will seek opportunities in localities more remote. It should become the responsibility of the school, in cooperation with the home, to encourage youthful ambition wherever it may be found and whatever its goal, however diversified and varied these interests might be.

We are, of course, aided in no small measure by the presence of many "permanent" summer residents who tend to serve as a source of inspiration to the youth of this town because of their own degree of success in various fields of endeavor. The desire to emulate one such successful citizen might well result in the development of an Edison, Lincoln, or Marie Curie.

NURSE'S REPORT

FLANDER'S BAY NURSING SERVICE

Annual Report of the Nursing Service:

To the Citizens and Town Officers of Sorrento:

I submit my report from January 1, 1939, and ending December 31, 1939.

A visit was made to schools in January, and thirty pupils were weighed and the seven-point children were checked over to see who would qualify for seven-points pins.

During the Cancer Prevention and Early Diagnosis Campaign in March and April, many pamphlets on both subjects were placed in public places, posters were also exhibited, and a set of Early Diagnosis pamphlets was sent to each home.

Vaccination against smallpox was offered in the school again this year. Four children were vaccinated. Eight school children received the Schick test at the same time. All were negative. This is a test given in connection with inoculation aganist diphtheria.

The school joined the other towns in the Flander's Bay territory for the annual school field day on May 18. Nine seven-point children took part in the exercises and one room qualified as 50 per cent seven-point.

All mothers were invited to attend the baby and pre-school clinic at Winter Harbor in August. Dr. Strong, summer resident at the Point, was the examining physician. Miss Waters, nutritionist from the State Department at Augusta, was present to assist mothers with feeding problems.

Annual school inspection was completed in September, and notices of defects were sent to the parents. A full report of findings was left with both teachers and the superintendent of schools. Routine school room visits have been made periodically for the purpose of helping the teachers with health problems.

Number of pupils inspected, 30. Number with defective vision, 1; defective teeth, 18; defective throats, 6; 10 per cent. underweight, 3. Corrections secured: Teeth, 4; throats, 1.

During the year 151 instructive and investigative visits have been made to babies, pre-school, school children and pre-natal patients. A school child was taken to Machias to the chippled children's clinic, and later to Bangor to have shoes fitted as ordered by the clinic doctor. Arrangements were made for a chest X-ray for a tuberculosis contact.

In closing this brief report, thanks are extended to all who have helped with the success of the nursing service, and for the splendid cooperation of selectmen, members of the school board and the superintendent of schools.

- 2 To hear and act on the report of the selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor, treasurer, collector, superintendent of schools, road commissioner, clerk and other town officers.
- 3 To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year, namely, town clerk, three selectmen, three overseers of the poor, three assessors, treasurer, tax collector, member of the school committee for a term of three years, two constables, road commissioner, surveyor of lumber and wood.
- 4 To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the collector.
- 5 To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the treasurer.
- 6 To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the town clerk.

- 7 To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes, namely: Current and contingent, elementary schools, text-books and supplies, secondary school tuition, superintendence of schools, repair of school property, maintenence of roads and bridges, cutting bushes, snow removal, fifty-fifty fund, sidewalks, repair of town property, upkeep of the town poor and float, electric lights, health and sanitation, public health nurse, Village Improvement Association, fire department, support of poor, overdrafts.
- 8 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State-aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, of the revised statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 29, Public Laws of 1937.
- 9 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account, for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads, in excess of requirements of section 2, chapter 132 Public Laws of 1935.
- 10 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$143.00 for maintenance of improved sections of third-class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third-class roads.
- 11 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1st., of the current year, and fix the rate of interest.
- 12 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell and dispose of all tax titles, and other deeds, held by the town on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute deeds for such property.
- 13 To see if the town will authorize the tax collector to sell all property at sheriff's sale, or place a mortgage lien on the property, according to the judgment of the selectmen, on all property where taxes are in default after February 1, and before one year has expired from the date of commitment.

- 14 To see if the town will approve the selectmen's actions in trading the defaulted 1938 Ober Estate tax for a strip of land from in front of Whipples to the shore. Valuation, \$1,000, tax, \$673.00.
- 15 To see if the town will vote to pay men working on Stateaid and Third-class roads, 9 cents per hour until otherwise voted, and raise a sum of money for same.
- 16 To see if the town will vote to pay the sum of .50 cents per hour for labor, sanding roads until otherwise voted.
- 17 To see if the town will vote to buy four water tanks for fire department and raise a sum of money for same.
- 18 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell to Charles G. Small Inc., the north east corner of lot No. 1, Section N., Division 1 for garage lot.
- 18A To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to try and procure a PWA project, and raise a sum of money for same.
- 19 To act on any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the town hall in Sorrento, at 9:30 o'clock in the foremoon, on Monday, March 4, 1940, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
