SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the
Town of Sorrento:

The effects of a global war are far reaching and tremendous in scope. Then the pinch of necessity knows no barrier; it is everywhere. Sorrento, as elsewhere, has felt its impact and carries on in stride with the times. Its young people share the burden of defending Democracy along with their fathers and mothers.

A school of thirty-six pupils a year ago now numbers only sixteen. Former classmates are scattered in distant cities with parents whose mission is to assist in the war effort. Graduates of a few years back are in far-away places over the horizon engaged in a struggle of survival.

In the past, teachers have given communities cause to feel justifiable pride in the operations of the schools. Today, teachers are giving communities additional cause for pride in the operation of new community services through the schools by the furtherance of necessary wartime measures, effective under rationing and price control.

Yes, Sorrento school carries on, reduced in teaching personnel and pupil enrollment, but in a spirit not one whit abated. Value is still placed on the development of moral character. Questions asked are: Is he industrious, honest, clean? It is felt that habits are the most important factor toward later success; that attitude toward school may go further in determining fitness for high school and college than high marks.

Progress has been satisfactory and no additional retrenchment is planned. The recommended budget for 1943-1944 indicates a decrease of \$1,100.00 under that appropriated last year for school purposes. It is quite likely, however, that a new means of heating the schoolhouse must be found if oil rationing continues in force. An alternate plan would be to house the pupils in the community house for the duration.

Recognition is herewith directed to the able and interested service, as a school committee member, rendered by Mrs. George Bartlett for a number of years, who is now doing her

bit in the front ranks of war time industry, far removed from the serenity of Sorrento village. Her resignation at the end of this fiscal year will be accepted with regret.

NURSE'S REPORT

To the Citizens and Town Officers of Sorrento:

I submit my report of the Nursing Service given from January 1, 1942, to December 31, 1942.

The winter weighing of thirty-six pupils was completed in January and the Seven-Point children checked with teachers; classroom discussions held and pupils told what corrections they must have to become Seven-Point pupils.

Owing to transportation, field day was not held, but pictures of Seven-Point pupils were taken by the nurse, enlarged, framed, and presented to each room. There were twenty-five Seven-Point children, and both rooms were 50 per cent. Seven-Point.

Cancer and Early Diagnosis Campaign months were observed during March and April. Posters were exhibited and a set of the Early Diagnosis Campaign pamphlets sent to each home represented at school.

Vaccination, diphtheria immunization and Schick-testing

were offered free as a part of the school program (the town caring for the expense). Number vaccinated, 6 (most pupils have been vaccinated), diphtheria immunizations, 24; Schick tests, 2.

Routine school room visits have been made and help given whenever needed. The annual inspection was completed in September. Only one room was opened this fall as so many have moved away.

Notices were sent to parents or a home visit made. A complete report left with the teacher and superintendent of schools.

During the year, 195 home visits of instruction and investigation have been made to babies, pre-school children, school children, pre-natal patients, and other adults for treatment as ordered by doctor. Two deliveries were attended, after-care being given mother and baby in both cases.

In closing I extend thanks to all who have helped with the success of the Nursing Service, and for the splendid cooperation of selectmen, members of the school board, superintendents of schools, teachers and parents.

To C. W. Sargent, a Constable of the Town of Sorrento, in
the County of Hancock,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Sorrento, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Community House, in said town, on Monday, the first day of March, A. D. 1943, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

- Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year, and fix salary for same.
 - 3 To receive the report of all town officers and act upon the same.
 - 4 To elect three assessors.
 - 5 To elect three selectmen.
 - 6 To elect three overseers of the poor.
 - 7 To elect a town treasurer and fix salary for same.
 - 8 To elect a collector of taxes, and fix salary for same.
 - 9 To elect two members of the school committee, one for a term of one year, and the other for a term of three years.
 - 10 To elect two constables.
 - 11 To elect a road commissioner.
 - 12 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for maintenance of improved sections of third-class roads.
 - 13 To see if the town will vote to dispense with the street lights for the duration of the war.
 - 14 To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes: Administration, town pier, fire department, nursing service, calcium chloride, roads and bridges, snow removal, cutting bushes, poor account, village green, patrol maintenance, interest, board of health, insurance, town note, sidewalks, street lights, common schools, high school tuition, text-books and supplies, school repairs, superintendence.
 - 15 To see if the town will authorize, by vote, the selectmen and treasurer to make temporary loan or loans, not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$4,000, in anticipation of and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year 1943.

- 16 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1 of the current year, and fix the rate of interest.
- 17 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and dispose of all land held by town by liens or other deeds, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute deeds for such property.
- 18 To see if the town will authorize the tax collector to sell all property at sheriff's sale, or place a mortgage lien on all property, subject to the judgment of the selectmen, where taxes are in default after February 15, and before one year has expired from the date of commitment.
- 19 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the town's quota for the American Red Cross.
- 20 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for civilian defense.
- 21 To act on any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Community House in Sorrento, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, on Monday, March 1, 1943, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
