# **AUDITOR'S REPORT**

Milbridge, Maine, February 21, 1946.

At your request, our office has completed an examination of the accounts of the Town of Sorrento for the fiscal year ended Febuary 16, 1946.

From the records available to us we have prepared exhibits and schedules as noted on the next following page, and, subject to any qualifications made, we believe them to be without material error.

In our opinion, based upon such examination, this report fairly presents the financial condition of your municipality as of February 16, 1946, and summarizes its fiscal transactions during the year then ended.

#### COMMENTS

#### Cash

As far as could be ascertained, all monies received were recorded and promptly deposited, and all expenditures, authorized by approved warrants, were paid by check.

The cash balance of \$3,869.50 at the close of the municipal year, reconciled with the statement of the First National Bank of Bar Harbor as per detail on Schedule 1.

#### Property and Poll Taxes

The 1945 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the records of the assessors. The total commitment was accounted for by cash paid to the treasurer and abatements, or still remained unpaid, according to the records of the collector, as summarized and detailed on Scedule 2.

There were no payments recorded as received during the year on tax liens; the liens remaining unpaid were found on file with the treasurer and are summarized and detailed on Schedule 3.

The cash collection of the current year's taxes was 95.9 per cent.; while all taxes collected during 1945, both current and prior, amounted to 100.2 per cent, as referred to the current commitment.

No mail verification was made of any of the unpaid tax accounts.

#### Excise Tax

#### **Trust Funds**

The savings pass books and investments covering the fund were examined and the detail is shown on Schedule 6. The income received appears to have been used for the purpose specified by the donor.

#### Notes Payable

During the year, \$1,000.00 was paid on notes by appropriation, leaving a balance of \$4,000.00, payable at the rate of \$1,000.00 annually.

#### **Net Surplus**

Reference to Exhibit A indicates that as of the close of the municipal year, there was a Net Surplus in the amount of \$2,347.73 as compared with a Net Surplus of \$1,515.99 shown the year previous. This represents a beneficial change of \$831.74, the analysis of which is found on Exhibit E of this report.

#### General

Without making a detailed audit of all transactions during the municipal year, we have examined or tested accounting records and other supporting evidence by methods and to the extent deemed appropriate.

The withholding taxes appeared to have been properly deducted and carried through the town books. Records covering individual withholdings are maintained by the treasurer.

with the exeception of cash, trust funds and notes payable, no external verification was made of your asset and liability accounts.

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# SCHOOL REPORT

To the Parents and Citizens of the Town of Sorrento:

The best opportunity we have as parents and interested neighbors to provide proper educational privileges for our boys and girls is to continue the present fine elementary program now functioning, and, to work towards the realization of a centralized high school to serve the adjoining towns of this section and our own which will adequately meet the needs of young people who are going to live in a new "era" of permanent peace and the resultant more highly geared competitive economy.

The prospects of some day having our children attend junior and senior high school in one central modern school building with attractive, well-lighted and ventilated classrooms quickens the pulse and stimulates the imagination. To know that it is within our power as parents and citizens to provide an educational pattern in our area on a par with any community, rural or urban, throughout the state offers a challenge that will not be denied much longer. To be sure, the present is not the time for such an undertaking. First of all, construction costs average 40 per cent to 45 per cent. higher than pre-war level with no relief yet in sight, and, secondly, building materials, supplies and equipment are still limited in quantity with an uncertain labor supply a factor, too. While at the same time the anticipated government program of subsidizing school building projects will not get underway for perhaps two or three years. However, we can and should begin now to condition our thinking in terms of a better tomorrow for our children. We must be ready when the time comes to lend our moral and financial support in favor of raising the necessary funds to match federal advances for the kind of school building all children deserve. To do so will indicate to Young America we have confidence in them and are willing to invest in their future.

It should not be difficult to visualize an improved school program with up-to-date plumbing, central heating and functional planned classrooms equipped with such accessories as phonograph, motion picture and slide projector and supplied with the latest text-books, workbooks and paper sup-

plies as are now available, and, the real advantage of a gymnasium, cafeteria, workshop, library, art and music rooms and a supervised athletic field equipped with a suitable apparatus for the building of sound bodies. Surely we all can appreciate the gain for pupils when conveyed daily in safe warm buses to an area school plant designed to meet the needs of today's youngsters with special emphasis upon such terminal courses as agriculture, general shop, home making and general business in addition to college preparation. Obviously, too, we all recognize the most urgent need of a better health program which would be centered in the school's health office and built around the part-time services of a regularly visiting nurse, dentist and doctor—and an inspection service available to each pupil every three months or at least once a term.

In the meantime your own local school operates in a wholly satisfactory manner. Without doubt we have one of the finest elementary school buildings in Maine. It is uniformly heated, well lighted and properly equipped. Your bus service has many good features, but, can be improved by housing the bus in a town-owned building on the school grounds. Each teacher is competent, and brings to your school the best kind of influence. All of the pupils attend regularly except for sickness; are courteous to teachers; friendly to classmates and work reasonably hard at their tasks. Yes, we are gaining ground in this struggle for true equal educational opportunity for our boys and girls, as well we might, in this day of a constantly widening horizon.

# **NURSE'S REPORT**

I herein submit a brief report of the services rendered the Town of Sorrento by the Flanders Bay Nursing Service for the period beginning January 1, 1945, to December 31, 1945:

In January, the winter weighing of 29 pupils was completed. At this time, conference with teachers and pupils were held regarding corrections necessary to receive the Seven-Point award offered each year by the school health service of the Maine Public Health Association to pupils who qualify. The nurse offered help with transportation to secure corrections.

The Patch test for tuberculosis, to be followed by chest X-ray of reactors, was offered to the entering class at school and new pupils moving into town. Tested, 11—all ngeative. In 1944 tuberculin testing was offered all pupils and given to pupils where permission was given by parents.

Mothers were invited to attend the pre-school clinic at Sullivan in June with Dr. Crowe from Ellsworth in attendance.

The opening week of school skin inspection was completed, also playground equipment checked. Routine school room visits have been made, also special classroom inspections and help with health problems given the teachers whenever needed.

Routine vaccination against smallpox and diphtheria immunization was offered the incoming class. Four were vaccinated against smallpox, five inoculated against diphtheria and thirteen received the Schick test. The school had fourteen pupils qualify for the Seven-Point awards. One room was 50 per cent, seven-point. Field day was omitted this year, after a week of rain.

School inspection was completed during October. Notices of defects were sent to parents or a home visit made. A complete report was left both teachers.

Pupils inspected, 29; defective vision, 2; defective glands, 5; defective throats, 11; defective teeth, 16; defective speech, 2; underweight, 1.

Corrections made—Vision, 2; teeth, 3; throats, 3; under-weight, 1.

The hearing of pupils above the fourth grade will be done by the nurse the first of the year with the new audiometer from the office of the Maine Public Health Association.

During the year 159 home visits of instruction and investigations have been made to pre-natal patients, babies, pre-school children and adults to give nursing care or treatments as ordered by the doctor.

Transportation has been furnished for three adults, one school child and two pre-school to doctor's office, oculist and clinic.

In closing, I extend thanks to all who have helped in the many ways with the success of the nursing service and for the cooperation of selectmen, members of the school board, superintendent of schools, teachers and parents.

# THE WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE.

To C. W. Sargent, a Constable of the Town of Sorrento, in the County of Hancock, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Sorrento, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Community House, in said town, on Monday the fourth day of March, A. D. 1946, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year, and fix salary for same.
- 3 To elect a first selectman; a second selectmen; a third selectman.
- 4 To elect three assessors and three overseers of the poor.
- 5 To elect a town treasurer and fix salary for same.
- 6 To elect a collector of taxes and fix salary for same.
- 7 To elect one member of the school committee, for a term of three years.
- 8 To elect two constables.
- 9 To elect a road commissioner and fix wages for same.
- 10 To see if the town will vote to revoke all existing clam licenses and issue 35 new clam licenses for inhabitants at 25 cents each.

- 11 To see if the town will elect one or more clam wardens and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.
- 12 To see if the town will vote to prohibit non-residents from digging clams within the limits of the town.
- 13 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the propagation of clams within the limits of the town to be worked out in conjunction with the Commissioner of Sea and Shore Fisheries.
- 14 To see if the town will vote to prohibit non-inhabitants from digging mussels within the limits of the town and issue 35 mussel licenses for the inhabitants of the town at 25 cents each.
- 15 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to loam, seed and maintain the Village Green.
- 16 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a town owned garage on the school-house property to house the school bus; construction to be under the authority of the superintending school committee.
- 17 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Doan's Point road.
- 18 To see if the town will vote to discontinue the following sidewalks: Beech Street, Grove Street, Mt. Desert Street, Preble Street, from Oak Street along Waukeag Avenue to intersection of Bayview Avenue; Main street by Waukeag Avenue to intersection of Sorrento Avenue, according to the plan of Frenchman's Bay and Water Co, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for removal of same.
- 19 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for maintenance of improved sections of third-class roads.
- 20 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the town's quota for the American Red Cross.

21 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the following purposes:

Administration, town pier, fire department, nursing service, roads and bridges, snow removal and sanding, poor account, cutting bushes, patrol maintenance, interest, board of health, insurance, town note, sidewalks, common schools, high school tuition, text-books and supplies, repairs of school property, superintendent of schools.

- 22 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lights.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1 of the current year, and fix the rate of interest.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and dispose of all lands held by town liens or other deeds, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute deeds for such property.
- 25 To see if the town will authorize the tax collector to sell all property at sheriff's sale, or place a mortgage lien on all property subject to the judgment of the selectmen, where taxes are in default after February 15, and before one year has expired from the date of commitment.
- 26 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to buy or lease suitable land for a town dump.
- 27 To see if the town will vote to pay the State basic wage rate on town roads, snow removal and sanding.
- 29 To act on any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Community House in Sorrento, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, on Monday, March 4, 1946, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
