The visit to the New Home was made February 13, in company with the Overseers of the Poor and knowing that the present superintendent and matron had previously managed the Home, it being also the eleventh year which they have been employed to care for and manage this institution and look after the comforts and welfare of those who are placed under their charge, and the fact of their long service gives ample assurance that they have been mindful of their duties and responsibilities, therefore any comment by your auditor is unnecessary.

One death has occurred at the institution during the past year, Mrs. Mary Adams.

The highest number of inmates during the year as reported by the superintendent being sixteen, lowest number ten, average ten, present number eleven. Number of tramps one hundred, meals furnished to same two hundred five, number of prisoners thirty-five, meals furnished to same ninety-six.

The following inventory was taken, viz:— five cows, two yearlings, three horses, two hogs, two bbls. pork, one-half bbl. corn beef, eight tons hay, and about forty cords of wood prepared for the stove.

The financial condition of the town is shown in the reports of the several town officers.

By a careful examination of the books and accounts of the Selectmen, Overseers of Poor, Road Commission-

ers, Agents for Repairing Roads, Superintendent of Schools and Treasurer, the same were found to have been kept by the officials of the several departments, in good order, the accounts were correctly cast and proper vouchers were presented for all moneys paid or expended.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board, Town of York.

Gentlemen:—I herewith present through you to the Inhabitants of the Town of York a report of the condition of the schools of this town at the close of the fiscal year of 1908, together with a few suggestions relative to the ensuing year.

Truancy

At the beginning of this my second annual report, I feel that I should say something in regard to the attendance of the children in the public schools.

Truancy seems to be prevalent to a greater or less degree throughout the whole town, and oftentimes it is very hard to understand why the children are allowed by their parents to absent themselves from school, thereby lessening in a very high degree their standing in their various classes. I have endeavored to lessen the truancy as much as possible, but it is a very difficult task to do unless the hearty cooperation of every parent can be obtained.

It is not the desire of the School Board nor of myself, to invoke the law as it reads upon our statute to our aid in this matter, but if the truancy continues as it has, it is both my duty and that of your School Board to enforce the law in its every detail.

As we wish to see our children and schools advance, we must use every effort to obtain a regular attendance among the children. I believe today that the York schools have, as a rule, as good teachers if not better than any of the towns in our state. York has been, and is, most liberal in its appropriation for the schools, and there appears no sufficiently good reason why we should not obtain the best results; but in order that everything may run smoothly and that we may obtain the best results, it is absolutely necessary that there be perfect attendance at all the regular school sessions. I quote below the law in regard to truancy, not as a threat but simply that every parent may understand the state's requirement in regard to this matter, and understand further that it is my duty to enforce the law in every particular.

CHAPTER XV, Section 52 of the Revised Statute of 1903, provides as follows: "If a child without sufficient excuse shall be absent from school at six or more consecutive sessions during any term, he shall be deemed a habitual truant and the Superintending School Committee shall notify him and any person under whose control he may be that unless he conforms to Section 49 the provisions of the two following sections will be enforced against him, and if thereafter such child continues irregular in attendance the truant officers or any of them shall, when so directed by the School Committee or Superintendent, in writing enforce said provisions by complaint."

The referred to reads as follows: "Every child between the seventh and fifteenth anniversaries of his birth shall attend some public day school during the time such school is in session, provided that necessary absence may be excused by the Superintending School Committee or Superintendent of Schools or teachers acting by direction

of either; provided also that such attendance shall not be required if the child obtain equivalent instructions for a like period of time in an approved private school or in any other approved by the Superintending School Committee; provided further that children shall not be credited with attendance at a private school until a certificate showing their names, residence and attendance at such school, signed by the person or persons having such schools in charge, shall be filed with the School Officials of the town in which said children reside; and provided further that the Superintending School Committee may exclude from the public schools any child whose physical or mental condition makes it inexpedient for him to attend. All persons having children under control shall cause them to attend school as provided in this section, and for every neglect of such duty shall forfeit a sum not exceeding \$25 to the Treasurer of the City of Town, or shall be imprisoned not exceeding thirty days.

It is further provided that any person having control of a child who is a habitual truant as defined in the foregoing section and being in any way responsible for such truancy and any person who induces a child to absent himself from school or harbors or conceals such child when he is absent, shall forfeit not exceeding \$20, for the use of the public schools of the city or town in which such child resides, to be recovered by the Truant Officer on complaint or shall be imprisoned not exceeding thirty days. It is further provided that on complaint of the truant officer a habitual truant, if a boy, may be committed to the State Reform School, and if a girl to the State Industrial School for Girls or to any truant school that may hereafter be established."

It will be seen from the reading of the above provisions of the statute that it is as compulsory upon the Superintendent and the School Board to see that the law is en-

forced as it is upon the parents of children to see that their children comply with the law.

I hope that the people of York will take this statement as it is meant, not as a threat but simply as a statement of the law as it exists, for the good of the children and the schools.

Consolidation

During the past year the schools at Clay Hill and that at Raynes Neck have been closed. In each instance the school was closed because there was not an average attendance of eight during the school term. It was therefore necessary for the School Board in compliance with the law to close the respective schools. At the Clay Hill school transportation was arranged, so that part of the children were carried to the Agamenticus School and part to the Cape Neddick School. At present there appears to be a considerable agitation toward reopening this school, and if the town shall so vote at its annual meeting the school will be reopened.

The School Board recommend the reopening of this school because of the fact that since its closing, several new pupils have entered the district so that in all probability an average attendance of eight can be easily obtained. If, however, the average attendance falls below eight, it will be the duty of the School Board to again close the school.

The School Board therefore suggests to each parent in this district that they use every effort to obtain perfect attendance so that the average attendance may be kept as high as possible.

The children in the Raynes Neck district have been transported by the Atlantic Shore Line to the Village school. Many of the children from this section attended the Village school even while the school at Raynes Neck was open. It therefore seemed advisable to transport all the children to the Village, thereby bringing about consolidation.

It is to be hoped that the time is not far distant when the people in the Pine Hill district will see the advantage of having their children transported to the York Beach school where it is possible to obtain better facilities in every way. There are other schools which might be consolidated in the same manner, but thus far no direct action has been taken.

Lincoln School

The school formerly known as the Cider Hill School will henceforth be called the Lincoln School. This change was brought about through a petition signed by all the children in that district and by the teacher, Miss Florence J. Ovens.

This petition was presented to the School Board and after due consideration it was deemed advisable to grant the petition and make the change in the name.

Condition of Schools

The condition of the schools is all that can be asked for. In every instance suitable teachers are at the head and are exerting every effort to raise the school to the highest level possible. Wherever changes in the teaching

force have been made by the School Board and Superintendent, they were made because it was deemed advisable for the welfare of the school, and not because—as some people have intimated—of any “political pull.”

In not one single instance has any motive other than the best interests of the school actuated any move by the school authorities.

Cost of the Schools

The cost of the common schools for the past year is practically the same as for last year. The total amount expended thus far is \$7537.94. The appropriation was \$5500. State Fund and Mill Tax, \$2659.50. Balance unexpended last year \$1275.36, making a sum total of \$9434.86 available for the common schools. This makes an unexpended balance at the close of the fiscal year of \$1896.92.

The teachers salaries for this year are practically the same as they were last year, some slight changes having been made.

The appropriation for the High school was \$1750. Received from the state, \$125; amount still due from the state, \$125. Balance from last year, \$615.71. Received from the Clark property \$587.91, making a total sum available of \$3203.62. The amount expended thus far is \$2673.55, leaving an unexpended balance of \$530.07.

The appropriation for text books has been nearly expended. The report shows a balance of \$12.27. This will be increased by about \$40, which is due from publishers on exchanges.

The amount expended for chemicals and physical apparatus for the High school the past year was \$106.44.

The appropriation was \$75. Overdrawn last year, \$26.81, making an available sum of \$48.19. Overdrawn this year \$58.25. Each year the needs of the High school for chemicals and physical apparatus will amount to approximately \$100. It is impossible to reduce this and still furnish the bare necessities for the chemical and physical rooms. The Board, therefore, recommends an appropriation of \$160, in order that for the next year there may be \$100 for this department.

The Board further recommends that the same amount be raised for the support of the common schools and for the support of the Free High school as last year, namely, \$5500 and \$1750 respectively. The Board further recommends an appropriation of \$700 for the purchase of text books and school supplies for the next year. The appropriation for High School fuel and janitor service of \$450 is sufficient, and the Board simply recommends an appropriation of a like amount for the ensuing year.

Repairs Account

It will appear from the Repairs Account that the amount appropriated was largely overdrawn, This is due to the fact that during the past year the High School and Village School have been painted, fire extinguishers have been purchased and also a considerable number of desks and seats. It will be necessary next year to paint several of the school buildings, also to fix up the interior of the same. The Board would therefore recommend an appropriation of \$900 for the purpose,

Health in the Schools

The health of the children in the various schools during the past year has been very good. In one or two instances contagious diseases have made it necessary to close the schools. It has been the endeavor of the school authorities to keep the sanitary condition of the schools in as perfect condition as possible. In all cases where it was deemed necessary for the School Board and Superintendent to take up matters of sanitary conditions they have acted as wisely as possible, and it is to be hoped that their action will be found to be wise in all cases.

Beach and Village Schoolhouses

At present the school buildings at York Beach and York Village are hardly adequate for the needs. That at the Village is overcrowded to such an extent that if any more children enter the school it will be absolutely necessary to increase the size of the building. The grounds around the building are entirely inadequate, as they are very small.

The Board would recommend to the people of the town of York that they take into consideration the advisability of either purchasing more land in the rear of the building or buying a lot of land elsewhere in order that when the time comes the present building can either be enlarged or sold, and a new building erected on a new lot.

The Beach school house is also overcrowded, and if the time comes when it should seem advisable to send the Pine Hill children to the Beach School it will be absolutely necessary to increase the size of the building. The Board

would therefore recommend the consideration of the advisability of either building a larger school house at York Beach or purchasing a new lot upon which a larger building can be erected.

They make this merely as a suggestion in order that the town may be prepared to meet the needs when they arise.

In Conclusion

I believe that York should be justly proud of her schools, and that every individual should lend his or her aid to make the schools the best that is possible in every way. We ask the hearty cooperation of all in this matter, and especially urge the parents to show their interest in the schools by visiting them and suggesting any improvements to the School Board or Superintendent that they may deem advisable. Such suggestions will receive due consideration in all cases.

I thank all of you who have cooperated with me in my work in the schools during the past year, and should I continue in office I hope to be able to perform my duty satisfactorily to all concerned.

Warrant for Town Meeting

MARCH 8, 1909

STATE OF MAINE

To Bradford S. Woodward, *Constable of the Town of York:*

In the name of the State of Maine you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of York, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble in the Town House, in said town on Monday the eighth day of March, A. D. 1909, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :

First—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second—To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Assessors of Taxes and Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and Constable, Town Agent, one School Committeeman, one or more Road Commissioners, one Auditor of accounts, and all other officers necessary for the ensuing year.

Third—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

Fourth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of a Free High school for the ensuing year.

Fifth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purchase of text books and school supplies the ensuing year.

Sixth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repairs of school houses the ensuing year.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote to defray the incidental expenses of the town the ensuing year.

Eighth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repairs of highways and bridges the ensuing year.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purpose of removing snow from the highway.

Tenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay interest on and for the reduction of the debt of the town the ensuing year.

Eleventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the poor the ensuing year.

Twelfth—To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the Treasurer to hire money on credit of the town to meet pressing liabilities when so directed by the Selectmen.

Thirteenth—To fix the remuneration of the town officers for services the ensuing year.

Fourteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for water supply the ensuing year.

Fifteenth—To see if the town will vote an appropriation for Memorial Day.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1909.

Seventeenth—To see if the town will raise appropriate and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways, within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112, Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, being the sum of \$343.00.

Eighteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for chemical and physical supplies for the High School.

Nineteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for fuel and janitor service for the High School.

Twentieth—To see if the town will vote a sum of money for the care of walks, grounds and shrubbery around the Town House.

Twenty-First—To see if the town will vote an appropriation for the erection of guide boards.

Twenty-Second—To see if the town will vote a sum of money for the purpose of conveying the waste water away from the drinking fountain at York Corner.

Twenty-Third—To see if the town will vote a sum of money to be used in addition to the amount appropriated last year for the construction of a bridge at Bass Cove, so called.

Twenty-Fourth—To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the destruction of brown-tail moths.

Twenty-Fifth—To see what action the town will take in regard to investing the proceeds received from sale of Clark and Emerson estates.

Twenty-Sixth—To see what action the town will take relative to the reopening of the Clay Hill school upon the recommendation of the School Board.

Twenty-Seventh—To see if the town will vote to instruct the school board to sell the outbuilding at the York Beach school and apply the proceeds therefrom toward building an outbuilding at the North Village School.

Twenty-Eighth—To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of fifty dollars to build a hood in the chemical laboratory at the High School for the purpose of carrying off the fumes.

Twenty-Ninth—To see if the town will vote to employ an engineer to make a survey, plans and estimate for building a sidewalk from York Corner to York Harbor, and raise a sum of money therefor.

Thirtieth—To see if the town will vote to have the state road sprinkled during the summer season, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Thirty-First—To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to make a complete survey of that portion of the town known as Concordville, for the purpose of locating a system of sewers and to instruct them to build so much of the system as may be necessary for the accommodation of the locality the ensuing summer, and to appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of C. L. Worthen and twenty-seven others.

Thirty-Second—To see if the town will vote to extend the present town sewer at York Beach and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Thirty-Third—To see if the town will vote the sum of three hundred dollars to the York Hospital.

Thirty-Fourth—To see if the town will vote the sum of five hundred dollars to pay the increase of land damage and the increased cost of building the road laid out by the selectmen from a point near the house of Peter Weare over lands of Daniel Weare and Mary O. Talpey to a point in the road leading from York Cliffs bridge to Passaconaway Inn, on petition of Geo. W. Currier and eleven others.

Thirty-Fifth—Inasmuch as public necessity and convenience of travel call for the reconstruction and repair of certain portions of the old post road highway from a point between the residence of George W. Webber leading to the intersection with the new post road approximately one and one-fourth mile distant, To wit: A ledge near "Tenny bridge," a ledge at the top of "Tenny Hill," a ledge opposite the barn in the I. P. Moody lot of land, two ledges between that point and the residence of Charles E. Nason, a ledge about thirty rods distant from the intersection. To see if the town will vote to make such reconstruction and repairs, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of Charles H. Bridges and seven others.

Thirty-Sixth—To pass any other vote or votes that may be necessary and legal for the administration of the town for the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on Friday and Saturday, March 5th and 6th from 1 to 4 o'clock p. m.
