Auditor's Report

The auditor of town accounts for the Town of York, herewith submits the following report for the year ending Feb. 12, 1910.

The financial condition of the town is shown in the reports of the several town officers.

The books and accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioners and Superintendent of Schools, were carefully examined and were found to have been kept by the officials of the several departments, in good order, the accounts were correctly cast and proper vouchers were presented.

The same Superintendent and Matron have had charge of the New Home as last year, and it is wholly unnecessary for me to state that their services are satisfactory and their interest and care for the inmates are appreciated by the town and by those who are obliged to be cared for, from the very fact that their long continued retention in that capacity is conclusive evidence that they have performed their duties faithfully and well. Your Auditor visited and examined the several rooms in the house, all of which were neat, clean and in order.

Two deaths have occurred at the institution during the past year, viz: Mrs. Jane Austin Abbott, aged 79, and John Welch, aged 24.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of the Town of York.

Gentlemen:—I herewith present through you to the citizens of York my report as Superintendent of schools for the greater part of the fiscal year of 1909-1910.

Having been unexpectedly called upon to assume the duties of superintendent of schools, as the successor of Arthur E. Sewall, Esq., I entered upon the regular duties of superintendent, April 26, 1909. It was gratifying to find that the schools were, for the most part, in excellent condition, and in the care of competent teachers.

At the close of the school year in June it was found necessary for various reasons to make a number of changes in the force of teachers. At the Village Primary school the resignation of Miss Rebecca Parsons, after several years of efficient service led to the appointment of Miss Geneva Pike a recent graduate of the Gorham Normal school as the successor of Miss Parsons.

Miss Georgie Mozart resumed her place as the assistant in this school after a brief absence as teacher of the Clay Hill school. The other teachers of the Village schools have remained the same as during the preceding year, and excellent work has been done by them in spite of the interruptions occasioned by sickness.

The Sub-Grammar school has been too crowded during the Fall and Winter terms, making the work very taxing for the teachers.

At York Beach the resignation of Mrs. Snell was regretfully received and Miss Josephine McIntire was

advanced from the Primary room to take charge of the Grammar school at the beginning of the Fall term. The school board was fortunate in securing the services of Miss Daisy M. Shaw, a graduate of Gorham Normal school, to take charge of the York Beach Primary room. This room has been over-crowded, in fact, it was necessary to change the rooms about at the beginning of the Fall term, putting the scholars of the Grammar grades into what had been the Primary room, and vice versa.

There were so many scholars in the Primary room that it became necessary during the Fall term to secure Miss Sylvia Weare as an assistant.

There is an imperative need that more room be provided for the pupils of the York Beach schools. In the opinion of the superintendent another room should be added to the building, but recognizing the difficulty of making a *satisfactory* addition to the present building, it would seem to me that York Beach needs, and deserves a school building of modern construction, where it would be possible to provide room also for the pupils now attending Pine Hill school, and perhaps the pupils in the 7th and 8th grades of the Cape Neddick school.

At the beginning of the Fall term Miss Gertrude Paul was succeeded by Miss Bertha Ramsdell at the Pine Hill school. Miss Paul being transferred to the Beech Ridge school.

At the beginning of the Winter term Mrs. F. S. Bell was succeeded by Miss Ada Hutchins at the North Village school, and Miss Ethel M. Cheney took charge of the Cape Neddick school.

In accordance with the vote of the town at the last town meeting, the Clay Hill school was reopened at the beginning of the Spring term and Mrs. Frances Thompson is in charge. Miss Winnifred Dixon, a graduate of the Gorham Normal school, succeeded Miss Blaney at the Scituate school.

There have been no changes among the teachers of Agamenticus, Lincoln, Brixham and South Side schools. The Lincoln school has the largest enrollment—38 scholars—of any of the ungraded schools, taxing the teachers' resources. It is the opinion of the superintendent that there should be a uniform course of study in the ungraded schools, and I trust that my successor will be able to bring this about.

In his last report my predecessor called attention to the truancy in some of the schools. There have been a few trying cases during the past year where recourse to the truant officer has been necessary. Usually it appears in such cases that the parents are more responsible than the children. But on the other hand, it should be said that the majority of the parents of children in the York school cooperate heartily with teachers and school officials in looking after the attendance of the children.

Turning from a consideration of the common schools to the York High school, it is gratifying to note the excellent work being done there under an efficient body of teachers.

Mr. Woodbury, the principal, has sought to raise the standard of the school, and in this effort has had the hearty cooperation of the assistant teachers. At the beginning of the year in September, Miss Varney and Miss Briggs having retired, they were succeeded by Miss Edith L. Smith as First assistant and Miss Florence B. Ladd as Third assistant, Miss Christie M. Donnell being promoted to the position of Second assistant as the successor of Miss Briggs.

York has reason to be proud of the fact that its High school has the privilege of receiving college certificates for its graduates but in order that this privilege may be retained, much will depend upon the students themselves.

We have hard working and devoted teachers in both the High and Common schools and they deserve the sym-

pathy and cooperation of parents and all citizens in their effort to secure the best results from each school year.

Cost of the Schools

The support of the common schools has cost \$7489.49. The unexpended balance is somewhat larger than last year, but it should be noted that \$1100.83 will be needed to balance accounts with the teachers at the end of the present term. There has been a slight increase in the pay of some of the teachers of ungraded schools and in view of the present advance in prices and cost of living such an increase is justifiable; our teachers are not over-paid as a whole.

The appropriation for the High school was \$1750.00, the same as the year previous; \$250.00 was received from the state, and \$709.50 from the Clark fund. The unexpended balance of \$509.70 being more apparent than real, as \$458.35 will be due the teachers at the close of the Winter term. The total amount expended was \$2729.87 for salaries.

The appropriation for text books and supplies has been over drawn; the unexpended balance of last year was \$12.27, but while \$1000.00 was voted for their expenditures in 1908, but \$700.00 was appropriated in 1909, so that the fact this appropriation was overdrawn by \$108.75 is not so surprising.

The average cost per pupil is after all surprisingly small for a year's supply of books and stationery. But our school rooms are not all supplied as they should be with common helps. Some of them lack maps. All above the first four grades certainly should have access to a good reference dictionary, and it would be well if more small dictionaries could be furnished for the use of pupils.

The amount expended for chemicals and physical apparatus the past year at the High school was \$73.25. The appropriation was \$150.00, the amount overdrawn last year having been \$58.25, leaving a balance of \$91.75 for this year, of which \$18.50 remains unexpended. The board recommends an appropriation of not less than \$75.00 for this purpose this year.

A special appropriation of \$50.00 for a hood for the chemical laboratory was made last year; the amount expended was \$43.95, leaving a balance of \$6.05. It is recommended that this amount be also available for laboratory expenses.

There has been a change in the State laws respecting the support of the schools, which goes into effect during the coming year. So that while in January, 1910, the town received from the state the sum of \$2472.46, in January, 1911, the town will receive approximately \$6090.54. This means of course that the state tax will be higher, but on account of this change the board recommends an appropriation of \$1500.00 instead of the \$5500.00 hitherto appropriated.

In the same way the High school will receive from the state funds \$500.00 instead of the \$250.00 received before. The board therefore recommends that the appropriation for the High school be \$1500.00 instead of \$1750.00 as before.

The board recommends also that not less than \$800.00 be appropriated for text books, which will leave a little less than \$700.00, after meeting the amount overdrawn.

Considering the unexpended balance in the amount appropriated for fuel and janitor service at the High school, the board regards \$400.00 as a sufficient appropriation for this purpose this year instead of \$450.00, the amount appropriated last year.

Repairs Account

A consideration of what has been accomplished under this head will show that the money used has been wisely spent. Aside from the minor repairs always necessary, the school houses at Brixham, Beech Ridge, Cape Neddick, Scituate and the Lincoln school house were painted, some of them renovated in the interior. The interior of the High school building was partly painted. Several school houses will need painting and extensive repairs the coming year.

The Board regards the fire escape at the Village school house to be faulty in construction. It should be changed at an early day, the only objection to expense here is the general unsatisfactory condition of the Village school building but the safety of the children is of paramount importance.

The amount appropriated for repairs was \$900.00. The amount overdrawn last year was \$128.54, leaving \$771.46 for use this year. The amount expended was \$730.80 leaving a balance of \$40.66. The Board recommends that not less than \$800.00 be appropriated for repairs for the coming year.

In conclusion I would add a few personal words. Having undertaken the duties of the superintendent's office with considerable hesitation I would say, that while I have found the work exceedingly taxing in the amount of labor and time it required, yet there has been much satisfaction in it. The cordial cooperation of the superintending school committee has been very helpful. The superintendent would bear special testimony to the service which the Chairman of the Committee, Mr. George A. Donnell, has rendered, being always ready to give his time freely for the advantage of the schools in which he has had the deepest interest. Personally I would thank

the citizens of York for many evidences of good will.

If it were possible for me to continue in the work of superintendent, I should hope to render a better service. I congratulate the town in the choice of Rev. Arthur J. Price as my successor and I can only ask for him the same cordial support which you have given me.

Warrant for Town Meeting

MARCH 14, 1910

STATE OF MAINE

To Bradford S. Woodward, *Constable of the Town of York:*

In the name of the State of Maine you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of York, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble in the Town House, in said town on Monday the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1910, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second—To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Assessors of Taxes and Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of taxes and Constable, Town Agent, one School committeeman, one or more Road Commissioners, one Auditor of Accounts, and all other officers necessary for the ensuing year.

Third—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

Fourth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of a Free High school for the ensuing year.

Fifth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purchase of text books and school supplies for the ensuing year.

Sixth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repairs of school houses for the ensuing year.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote to defray the incidental expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

Eighth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purpose of removing snow from the highway.

Tenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay interest on and for the reduction of the debt of the town for the ensuing year.

Eleventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

Twelfth—To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the Treasurer to hire money on credit of the town to meet pressing liabilities when so directed by the Selectmen.

Thirteenth—To fix the remuneration of the town officers for services the ensuing year.

Fourteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for water supply for the ensuing year.

Fifteenth—To see if the town will vote an appropriation for Memorial Day.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1910.

Seventeenth—To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of nine hundred dollars being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

Eighteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for chemical and physical supplies for the High School for the ensuing year.

Nineteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for fuel and janitor service for the High School for the ensuing year.

Twentieth—To see if the town will vote a sum of money for the care of walks, grounds and shrubbery around the Town House.

Twenty-First—To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the destruction of brown tail moths.

Twenty-Second—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the aid of the York Hospital for the ensuing year.

Twenty-Third—To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell that piece of land formerly used as a gravel pit at the intersection of the so-called Bartlett road and the new road, so-called, leading from Sewall's Bridge to the residence of George Main.

Twenty-Fourth—To see if the town will vote to raise money by loan to pay the expenses of the special appropriation made at this meeting.

Twenty-Fifth—To see if the Town will vote to grade York Street in York Harbor and lay a sidewalk between Clark's Lane and Starboard Lane and for the purposes aforesaid an appropriation of Four Thousand dollars be made and Bryan Lathrop be appointed a special agent to carry out the foregoing purposes, and that he be authorized accordingly, on petition of John E. Norwood and twenty-nine others.

Twenty-Sixth—To see if the town will vote to build the whole or a portion of a sidewalk from York Harbor to York Corner in accordance with the survey and plans made for the town by A. W. Gowen, and raise a sum of money therefor.

Twenty-seventh—To see if the town will vote to pay for the bridge and way across York River at York Harbor, as laid out by the County Commissioners and voted by the town. If so whether by assessment or by bonding the town, on petition of Edward C. Cook and seventeen others.

Twenty-eighth—To see if the town will vote to authorize and instruct the Selectmen of the town of York, Maine, to ascertain the full amount of James O. Bradbury's and George F. Haley's bills for service rendered

as attorneys for the Selectmen, in behalf of the town, in the York Harbor bridge cases, and report at a special town meeting to be holden not later than April 1st, A. D. 1910, on petition of R. B. H. Moulton and twenty-six others.

Twenty-ninth—We, the undersigned voters, request that the Assessors' books, with the valuation of the taxable property, be printed in the annual town report, and a sum of money be voted therefor, signed by Frank Maloney and eighty-nine others.

Thirtieth—To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer for York Village, east of the Congregational church, and vote a sum of money therefor, on petition of W. L. Hawkes and ten others.

Thirty-first—To see if the town will appropriate the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars for repairs on the road leading from Sewall's bridge to Seabury station, on petition of Fremont Varrell and seventeen others.

Thirty-second—To see if the town will vote to install four hydrants at York Harbor. One near the house of the late Sarah Varrell, one near the residence of Charles O. Philbrook, one near the Catholic church, and one near the house of George B. Dexter and appropriate a sum of money therefor not exceeding five hundred dollars, on petition of Edward E. Young and eleven others.

Thirty-third—To see if the town will vote to authorize the purchase of E. M. Buell of Orange, Mass., a plot of land approximately one acre in area, for the purpose of obtaining material for the repairing of the highways, said land being situated opposite the gravel pit of Andrew R. Webber and alongside of the road leading from "Tenney

Hill" to York Beach, on petition of Edward C. Moody and eleven others.

Thirty-Fourth—To see if the town will appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for the purpose of blasting out the ledge and grading the road opposite the house of Josiah Smart, late of York, deceased, on petition of George F. Preble and twenty-four others.

Thirty-Fifth—To see if the town will vote to take the initiative in the matter of general electric street lighting by installing lights on certain roads, to be designated by the legal voters of York at the town meeting held March 14, 1910, on petition of Frank Maloney and nine others.

Thirty-Sixth—To see if the town will vote to build a sewer on Broadway, to commence at the avenue near the residence of George Foster, running to and to connect with the town sewer, and to appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of C. L. Worthen and thirty others.

Thirty-Seventh—To see what action the town will take relative to the reopening of the Raynes Neck school at the spring term, on petition of Oren Marston and ten others.

Thirty-Eighth—To see if the town will appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, to grade and gravel the road from Cook's Bridge to Langley's Four Corners, thence to the foot of Mike's Hill, so called, on petition of J. A. Parsons and twenty-three others.

Thirty-Ninth—To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to replenish the scenery on the stage in the town hall, on petition of Walter R. Boody and ten others

Fortieth—To see if the town will vote to install electric lights in the Town Hall and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of W. L. Hawkes and twenty-five others.

Forty-first—To see if the town will vote to build a new and modern school house at York Beach and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of H. Grant Duff and thirty-eight others.

Forty-second—To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid on or before Sept. 15, 1910, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Forty-third—To see if the town will vote the sum of three hundred dollars for transportation of High school students, on petition of John E. Weare and ten others.

Forty-fourth—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the doings of the Selectmen in laying out a town way beginning at a point just southerly of the building now occupied by William N. Gough thence running in an easterly direction to the Atlantic Ocean, said point of beginning being in the old County road across Short Sands (so called) and at or near the penstock.

Forty-fifth—To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to make a complete survey of that portion of the town known as Long Beach for the purpose of locating a system of sewers and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Forty-sixth—To pass any other vote or votes that may be necessary and legal for the administration of the town for the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on Friday and Saturday, March 11th and 12th, from 1 to 4 o'clock p. m.
