HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY

Recommended Appropriation \$75.00 A special appropriation for the repair and painting of the Hamlin school building is recommended.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

During the school year which closed June 30th 1929 there were one hundred thirty-eight pupils enrolled in the various schools in town, with an average daily attendance of 112.5. The per cent of attendance was 88.6. The highest per cent of attendance recorded was in the Tabbutt School, with

an attendance of 94.4. Of the total number of pupils enrolled nine were credited with perfect attendance. Their names are: Eleanor Grant, Delmont Rockwell, Hughine Drisko, Wesley Worcester, Hubert Worcester, Philip Sinclaire, Avis Worcester, Joseph Drisko and Minnie Oliver. Six of the pupils whose names are mentioned were enrolled in the Tabbutt School, two in the Longfellow Grammar and one in the Hamlin Intermediate. These pupils all have just cause to be proud of their records.

The epidemic of colds, which invades our schools nearly every winter, coupled with the disinterested atmosphere fostered in many of the homes tends to keep the attendance down to an unsatisfactory mark, a condition which hampers the work of the schools.

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The school census of April 1st. 1929 gave the number of persons between the ages of five and twenty-one as two hundred and thirteen, an increase of seven over the previous year.

TEACHERS

The general success and efficiency of a school system is in a very large measure dependent upon the personnel of its teaching staff. Professional fitness through training in our normal schools or colleges coupled with successful teaching experience make up an essential foundation. Unless there is

at least some degree of permanency in the teaching staff the maximum of efficiency can not be obtained .In the selection of teachers your superintending school committee and superintendent have recognized and applied these principals as far as conditions made it possible to do so.

Of the six teachers employed in the grades four are normal graduates, three having had several years successful experience. Because of the increased enrollment and the addition of an extra grade in the Central school your superintending school committee found it advisable to put an extra teacher in this school. At the opening of schools in Sept. this school had an enrollment of twenty eight with eight grades.

From the standpoint of training and experience our teaching force is composed of a very efficient group.

In order to encourage the reading habit each school has been provided with a small library containing selected books from authors of some of the best children's books. It is impossible to over-emphasize the importance of the development of the reading habit when properly supervised, as an aid to a better comprehension of what the pupils may study in their texts at school. The grammar school has recently purchased a set of reference books from funds raised by the school. The intermediate school has purchased from its own funds a new sectional book case and has added a number of new books to the library. New primary chairs and a

reading table have been provided for the primary school and a number of new books are now ready for distribution among other schools.

Stamford Achievement Tests were given the pupils of the grammar school during the fall term and will be followed with a similiar test during the spring term. This test takes into account and covers all the subjects offered in the elementary schools. The result of this survey of the pupils of the grammar school was very satisfactory as it enabled us to make a check upon the weaknesses of the pupils in the different subjects studied, as well as to draw comparisons of the work done in the schools of this town and other towns where these tests have been used.

HIGH SCHOOL

During the past year there were twenty-four resident and eleven non resident students enrolled. Of this number six were graduated. The fall term opened Sept. 16th with Mr. Allston Smith, Principal and Mrs Ethel Page, Assistant. Mr. Smith came to us with both normal and college training as well as several years successful experience as teacher of English in the Machias High school. In addition to her college training, Mrs. Page has had a wide range of experience in other high schools of the State.

From the standpoint of professional fitness by means of normal and college training together with successful teaching experience our teachers rank high. We have been able by co-operating with the Normal School at Machias to secure the services of four training students of their third year junior high school course, with no expense to the town, each of the four students teaching nine weeks. This plan has worked out admirably as it has relieved much of the pressure of our limited teaching force, especially the principal, and made it possible for him to give real supervision in his school. We feel honored by having this high school

selected as one of the schools in which these students are to receive their training, as in choosing the school the general standard of the school and the efficiency of the principal were the chief principles considered.

There are at present thirty-one resident and eight nonresident students enrolled. Of the eight non-resident students, seven are from Columbia and one from Centerville. The enrollment by classes is as follows: Seniors 8, Juniors 11, Sophomores 9 and Freshmen 11.

Our school still enjoys the Certificate Privilege: i. e., the privilege of placing graduates without examination in certain New England colleges. This privilege is based upon the records of students previously made and will be continued only so long as students from this school continue with satisfactory records.

Three sets of reference books have been added to the school library and the library classified according to the Dewey Decimal System of classification and a student librarian kept in charge at all times.

Mr. Smith the principal, has rendered a very compehensive and interesting report of the work of the school since the beginning of the year in September, but for want of space printing is with-held. One of the things stressed by him in his report is the need of closer co-operation of the home in promoting more efficient and effective home study, the primary essential to satisfactory work. It goes without saying, that no high school can alone fit for college, normal school or any other immediate worthy occupation. High school preparation for these fields of the pupil's future is a threefold undertaking, involving the closest kind of hearty co-operation of pupil, home and teacher. Parental jurisdiction commanding at least two hours of home study before a school day is much to be desired, and essential to the succers of the student.

For want of space it is impossible to give a detailed account of all the work which the school is doing.

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REPAIRS ON SCHOOL BUILDINGS

But little repairing or painting has been done during the past year. The chief items of expense in the repairs account were for painting the Central School building. The grammar and high school rooms need painting. The exterior of this building has reached a stage where it will deteriorate very rapidly if it is not painted and some other necessary repairs made. The building in the Tabbutt district needs painting throughout. For your citizens to think of saving money by postponing making provisions for repairing and painting your school buildings is but false economy, as such a policy is bound to lead to some very expensive outlays in the end.

It was thought advisable by your superintending committee to seek a special appropriation for repairing the Hamlin building. As the condition of this building has been under discussion by the citizens for some years and as the matter has been presented to the citizens in previous reports it will not be necessary to enter into a detailed discussion of it at this time.

Plans are under way to have the Longfellow building lighted thoughout with electric lights. Work has already been started and will be completed as soon as the fixtures arrive. This work was authorized by the superintending school committee in accordance with the recommendation made by Mr. Lyceth the state agent for secondary school education. The cost of installing and maintaining the lights will be borne by the two schools, they having raised the funds through entertainments.

FINANCES

Though the common school and high school account shows a substantial balance unexpended, the recommended appropriation for 1930—31 is in excess of that of last year. This increase is occasioned by the necessity of financing two

weeks more of school in the elementary schools during the approaching year than last, to a falling off in tuition and because an extra teacher has been added to the teaching force.

The repairs account shows a balance which might have been expended, but it was felt that much of the work to be done called for such extensive outlay it was best to wait until sufficient funds are available to make it possible to do the work thoroughly.

CONCLUSION

In concluding this brief report I wish to say that my work with you has been exceedingly pleasant during the past year, made so by your help and co-operation for which I offer my sincere thanks and appreciation. I desire, also to thank the teachers and pupils for their many courtesies and assistance..
