The budget which is authorized by the superintending school committee and contained elsewhere in this report, provides for a reduction of twenty-five percent in teachers' salaries, janitors, and fuel for the year 1933-'34.

Following is a list showing the present salaries of teachers and the esalaries under the proposed reduction:

The reduction proposed in the salaries of elementary teachers when added to the reduction of two years ago amounts to 36% and the reduction in the high school principal's salary when added to the reduction of \$200 made last year amounts to 35.7% while the reduction in the high school assistant's salary over a period of two years amounts to 41%.

This year with the opening of schools in September all teachers have returned 5% of their salaries to the town treasurer to be applied on the poor account.

Because of the reduction in the valuation of the State and of legislation now pending, causing a heavy loss to the State in its revenue for the support of schools, every town in the State stands to lose 20% in State funds the coming year. This is in accordance with advice furnished by the commissioner of Education. Accordingly, in making up the estimated amount of State funds available for next year this 20% reduction is made.

The recommended appropriation for high and common school support for the coming year is 47.7% less than the amount appropriated last year. It is quite probable, that with such a drastic reduction in appropriations the town will not share in the distribution of the equalization fund another year.

ENROLLMENT

TEACHERS -

Your teachers are well qualified by reason of their professional training and previous teaching experience. All elementary teachers are graduates of the Washington State Normal School. Of the seven elementary teachers employed, five have had previous teaching experience. All teachers have displayed a splendid professional attitude and spirit of cooperation. In their schools they have been industrious and efficient. The work accomplished has been of high order and when considered as a whole, has been an improvement over previous years.

We invite you to visit the schools frequently that you may become better acquainted with the quality of work being done. Come and give the teachers an opportunity to get better acquainted and to discuss school problems with you in a friendly and cooperative way. By so doing many misunderstandings may be settled with profit to both teachers and parents.

HEALTH WORK

The work of health education is being carried on again this year in cooperation with the Maine Public Health Association under the Modern Health Crusade Plan. Under this plan a short time is devoted each day to checking evidence of good or poor health habits and in emphasizing the good health habits and in developing them. The health inspection includes cleanliness of hands, face, nails, handkerchiefs and shoes; the neatness of hair, clothing, desk material and the careful and neat handling of books. Parents have shown a ready inclination to cooperate in all matters leading to improving and maintaining the health of the pupils. Dr. White has again favored us with his services in examining the pupils for throat troubles. Dr. Leighton of Harrington has also given his services in making examinations of the teeth.

Through the generosity of Dr. Miner of the Calais Hospital, surgical treatment of throat and adenoid troubles has been furnished seven pupils at a cost of only \$5.00 to the parents for each operation. When the parent has been unable to pay, the expense has been borne through some other source. The chief setback in this work, at present, toward seven-point achievement is the need of dental work. Wherever it has been possible parents have had the necessary dental corrections made.

HIGH SCHOOL

In the high school, work has gone forward in a creditable manner. Following his annual inspection of the high schools, Mr. Lyseth, State Agent for Secondary Education, spoke highly of the work being done.

Of the fifty-three students enrolled, eight are tuition students, one coming from Centerville and seven from Columbia.

With but a few exceptions regular promotions were made in nearly all subjects at the close of the year.

REPAIRS

Expenditures for repairs as indicated elsewhere in this report were \$97.08, which is \$46.75 in excess of the resources.

It became necessary to repair and move the wood shed at the high school building, which was done at an approximate cost of \$50.00 for lumber and labor.

By order of the state insurance inspector the chimney in the Central building was rebuilt and other repairs made to safeguard the building from fire. The cost of labor and material was approximately \$22.00.

Practically the only need contemplated in repairs last year was that of resetting the glass and painting the sashes in the high school building. Since it was deemed advisable and more important to make the repairs above mentioned this need is being carried over. Another need at present is that of whitening the walls and ceiling of the Central building.

CONCLUSION

It has been my aim in presenting this report to point out as clearly as possible the condition and actual needs of your schools and to give a detailed account of all receipts and expenditures.

In closing I wish to thank the citizens of Columbia Falls for the courteous treatment accorded me during the past year, and to express my appreciation of the support and cooperation of the superintending school committee and teachers. Cooperation is the backbone of the school. The best school is found in the community where the taxpayer, the parent, the teacher and school officials all work together harmoniously and effectively to accomplish the aims for which the school is working. On the other hand, the poorest school any community can have is found where there is the least cooperation among these classes. One of the greatest problems of the school organization is to secure the hearty and efficient cooperation of all the classes represented in the school. Without this end accomplished our children will never receive the kind of education they so richly deserve.
