## Superintendent of Schools

To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and the  
Citizens of the Town of Sorrento: —

I present herewith my fifth annual report of the condition,  
progress, and needs of the schools of the town of Sorrento.

## School Expenditure

It is probably safe to say that there are few, if any, towns in the entire State, in which such a small amount is expended for education, compared with valuation, as by the town of Sorrento. With a valuation of nearly \$200,000.00 this town has now but one school to support, a very small expense for high school tuition, and a matter of common school tuition which is insignificant. Many towns with a valuation little or no larger, find it necessary to support a dozen schools or more, on account of a large and scattered school population, and some even maintain a high school. The advantageous position of this town in this respect is very evident to any one at all familiar with the amount expended for education by the average town. Your attention is called to other towns in which you are familiar with school conditions. We call attention to this fact because we feel that the parents and citizens of Sorrento should realize their advantage and know that they are in a position to have a school at High Head second to none in the State, with comparatively little extra expense to anyone. Sorrento is already noted for good roads, which is most commendable. Why not be equally noted for good school privileges

which would be equally commendable? The young people now growing up in this town will form at least a part of its future citizenship, and every dollar wisely expended for their education will not only be a great personal benefit to them, but also an excellent investment for the future welfare of the whole town.

### Improvements

The High Head school is in excellent condition but it is hardly necessary to say that it can not be improved. The school can be improved in many ways, but the first improvement we would suggest is in the school room and equipment. One of the important factors for a good school is a well-constructed, properly arranged, and well equipped school building. Modern progress and science have already proved to the satisfaction of everyone—except the ignorant and selfish—that the good health of school children is directly dependent in no small degree, upon proper condition of heating, lighting, ventilation, and general sanitation of the schoolrooms in which they spend so many hours of their childhood, while it is generally agreed among school authorities that comfortable and attractive school surroundings have a most beneficial effect upon the morals of the school child.

The school building at High Head is an excellent one but the schoolroom needs many improvements to make it anything near a model room. A ventilating stove should be installed, window boards for ventilation should be provided, new adjustable curtains should be furnished, the seats should be rearranged, two closets should be built in the rear of the room, one for textbooks and the other for apparatus and other purposes, more blackboards should be put up, the ceiling should be whitened and the walls tinted, the woodwork needs varnishing in the near future, a sanitary drinking fountain is much needed, and among other things needed, are a sand table, more wall maps, and by no means least, a suitable number of pictures appropriate for schoolroom decoration. With these and other small improvements, this schoolroom could be made one of the best arranged and most comfortable and attractive schoolrooms in this vicinity. The whole expense need not exceed \$250 00. For several years we have advocated these improvements and appropriations have been made, but for various reasons the improvements are not worth mentioning. We hope to see another appropriation made this year and made in such a manner that there can be no misunderstanding as to its purpose or expenditure.

### **School Music**

After the vote by the town, music was taught for several terms with good success, but, as is probably well known, a majority of the members of the school board have been opposed to giving the pupils of Sorrento the benefit of this subject, and because of the absence of any vote on this matter music has not been taught this fall or winter. We feel that we have become somewhat acquainted with the pupils of Sorrento during the past five years and fail to see why the children attending High Head School are not just as deserving and just as talented as other children, and it seems a pity that they can not have this instruction which could be so easily given them. We would like to know the real sentiment of the voters in this matter, and believe their wishes should prevail, whether for or against it.

### **State Certification of Teachers**

The law passed by the last legislature, and now in force regarding the State certification of teachers, is a matter of general interest. By the provisions of this law all public school teachers, with a few exceptions, must have State certificates. State examinations are given twice each year at stated places, and candidates for a common school certificate must be at least seventeen years of age and a graduate of a standard high school or academy. This law will undoubtedly prove a great benefit to the schools of Maine in requiring a much higher standard for teachers than formerly, when the taking of the State examination was optional with teachers. We have made a practice of placing statistics of teachers in every school report for the double purpose of encouraging teachers to improve themselves, and of giving the public an opportunity of knowing just what the qualifications of their teachers were. An examination of these reports will show that the local teachers have usually been well qualified for their work.

### **Teachers' Meetings**

A series of practical teachers' meetings each year is an excellent thing to improve the work and methods of teachers and thereby increase the efficiency of schools. A limited number of such meetings have been held each year for the teachers of this school district, and they have proven of much practical help. To prove of the greatest help, however, we should be able to have outside speakers at a part of the meetings who are experts along their special lines, such as special teachers of primary reading, arith-

metic, geography, penmanship, etc. We have been unable to do this except occasionally, on account of no funds for the purpose, and believe a small appropriation for this purpose would be of much benefit. The teachers from the State normal schools are authorized to attend such meetings for their actual expenses and other experts can be secured without great additional expense.

### Noon Hour

Arrangements have been made with the teacher at High Head to remain at noon, in accordance with the plan being carried out in most of the schools in this vicinity where pupils take their dinners. This has naturally resulted in a great improvement in the conditions which usually exist when pupils at this time are without proper supervision. The plan of the school lunch has been carried out the most successfully at High Head, of any school in the district. The teacher deserves much credit for the efficient manner in which she has carried out this plan, while the pupils and parents are to be commended for the fine spirit of co-operation which they have shown.

I take the opportunity in closing to thank all whose influence and support have assisted in promoting the cause of better education.

GREETING: —

You are hereby required in the name of the State of Maine to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Sorrento qualified by law to vote in the town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Sorrento, on Monday, the first day of March, A. ART. 9. To elect a Member of the School Committee for three years.

ART. 10. To elect a Town Auditor.

ART. 11. To elect Constables and Truant Officers.

ART. 12. To elect Surveyors of Lumber, Wood and Bark.

ART. 13. To elect a Wharf Commissioner for three years.

ART. 14. To elect one or more Fire Wards.

ART. 15. To elect a Member of the Board of Health for three years.

ART. 16. To elect a Sealer of Weights and Measures.

- ART. 17. To elect all other Town Officers.
- ART. 18. To see what time the Town will vote that Taxes shall be paid.
- ART. 19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Digging of Clams.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of Appropriating and Raising Money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid, as Provided in Sec. 20 of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will elect Two Tree Wardens, to have charge of cutting and trimming of trees by the road side, and have Road Commissioner with same.
- ART. 21½. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the following: —  
To allow Automobiles on Town Wharf only in Case of Business, and Blow Horn Before Going onto Wharf at a Speed Not to Exceed Five Miles an hour.
- ART. 22. To see if the Town will ratify the action of the Selectmen in vacating a certain proposed road on plans of Sorrento, as per petition and notices of Feb. 11th, 1915, on file in Town Clerk's office.
- ART. 23. To see if the Town will raise ten dollars (\$10) for Teachers' Meetings, said money to be expended under the direction of the Superintendent of Schools.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to buy bonds for the Tax Collector and Treasurer.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation land owned and leased by Swimming Pool Club.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to sell High Head School House, so-called.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to have Music in the School.
- ART. 28. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the money raised for Furnace and Cellar under Town Hall, now in the hands of the Treasurer.
- ART. 29. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to carry out the recommendation of Superintendent of Schools for School Room.

ART. 30. To see how much money the Town will vote for the following purposes, to wit: —

Overdrafts for 1914, Current and Contingent expenses, for Roads and Bridges, for Sidewalks, for State Aid Roads, for repair of State Aid Road, for Text Books, for Common Schoools, for School Superintendent, for Memorial Day, for Insurance, for Board of Health, for Destruction of Brown Tail Moths and other Pests, for repair of Town Property, for repair of Wharf, for Seals, Weights and Measures.

ART. 31. To see if the Town will accept the list of Jurors as follows: Frank L. Trundy, L. E. Wilber, and D. L. Perry.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall, in Sorrento, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon, on Monday, March 1, 1915, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
