While the schools have been broken somewhat by the prevailing epidemic of influenza, the attendance during the past year has been the best ever recorded by the pupils of the schools. It shows the wisdom of the plan offered last year in shortening the summer vacation and having the long vacation come during the winter months. This plan will undoubtedly be continued. During the fall and winter terms the visits of the supervisor of music have been irregular, owing to the Sullivan schools being closed, but the results obtained have been satisfactory, particularly in the High Head school, where Mrs. Lawrie has carried on the work.

The common school account shows an overdraft of \$133.45, or an expenditure of \$355.56 more than the receipts. In the appendix on my report you will find that I have tabulated the expenses of each school separately, and that the Cove school cost for the year \$349.50. This accounts for the overdraft, as at the special town meeting, when it was voted to continue the Cove school,

there was no article whereby money could be raised to support same.

In order to pay the overdraft and support the schools for the next year, also to hire trained and experienced teachers for the Cove school, I recommend the sum of \$800 for common schools.

The chief expense of the repairs account next year will be to paint the Cove schoolhouse. Of course there are always minor expenditures, but the sum of \$100 should be sufficient for that account.

COVE SCHOOL.

A vote of the town will be necessary in order to continue the Cove school, as the average attendance is less than eight pupils. It would seem to be wiser to continue this school, for it is not only cheaper for the town to continue the school than to convey the pupils to High Head, but is much more satisfactory to the parents, as conveyance offers many problems, and is seldom satisfactory.

The building has been newly shingled, the underpinning repaired, and a flag-staff erected, and after a coat of paint is applied during the coming year, it will be in excellent condition.

I heartily recommend that we continue the Cove school.

TEXT-BOOKS.

While the town is well supplied with text-books, the wear and tear on the books make it necessary to buy about the same amount each year.

With paper and supplies still high, I recommend the same amount for text-books and supplies as in the preceding year, the sum of \$60.

In closing this report, I wish to acknowledge the

hearty co-operation that I have received from teachers, who have labored hard to make this year's work a success.

To the school committee I desire to express my gratitude for their loyal support and assistance.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all who have aided the schools in any way during the past year.

To L. U. Bragdon, a Constable of the Town of Sorrento in said County:

GREETING.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Sorrento, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town hall in said town, on Monday, the third day of March, A. D. 1919, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1 To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To receive a report of all town officers and act upon the same.
- 4 To elect three selectmen.
- 5 To elect three assessors.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to elect a board of overseers of the poor for three year terms, one term to expire each year.
- 7 To see if the town will vote to create a special Municipal board of Mothers' aid, to consist of three members, at least one of whom shall be one of the board of overseers of the poor, and at least one of whom shall be a woman, to serve for three year terms, the term of one member to expire each year.
- 8 To elect a town treasurer, and fix the salary of same.
- 9 To elect a collector of taxes, and fix his compensation.
- 10 To elect a member of the school committee for three years.
- 11 To elect a town auditor.
- 12 To elect constables and truant officers.
- 13 To elect surveyors of lumber, wood and bark.
- 14 To elect a sealer of weights and measures.
- 15 To elect one or more fire wards.
- 16 To elect all other town officers.

- 17 To see what action the town will take in regard to the digging of clams.
- 18 To see what action the town will take in regard to vote, "yes" or "no," on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle to State-aid, as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 19 To see if the town will vote to continue Cove school.
- 20 To see if the town will vote to give M. T. Ober an abatement of fifty dollars on tax of 1918.
- 21 To see if the town will rescind vote taken at last annual town meeting, in regard to getting a special charter for the town to run its own electric light plant.
- 22 To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to hire money necessary to defray expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk from the post-office along Waukeag Ave., to the old hotel site.
- 24 To see how much money the town will vote for the following purposes, to wit: Overdrafts for 1918, current and contingent expenses, roads and bridges, sidewalks, State-aid road, common schools, text-books, superintendent, repair of school property, repair of town property, insurance, board of health, electric light plant, village improvement society, town wharf, poor, mothers' aid.
