# MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

---

Gentlemen of the City Council—The rapid flight of time has again brought us to the beginning of another municipal year. By the choice of our fellow citizens, the lot has fallen upon us today to assume the arduous duties of the administration of our municipal affairs. We do not enter upon the labor before us without a sense of the responsibility we have taken upon ourselves as we assume these duties which we are called to undertake. The success of this administration, and the record we leave behind, will depend upon the prudence, economy and financial ability with which we shall conduct the business affairs of the city, which have been intrusted to our care. Let us practice the same careful management as we would in our own private business transactions. As to the amount of appropriations to be made in the different departments, I have no suggestions to make. Your committees appointed to serve in the several departments will better understand what sums are needed to carry on the work successfully and judiciously. The heavy burden of debt with which the city is loaded will prompt you to exercise strict economy in all branches of the city government. Do not let appropriations in any case be overdrawn. The gradually increasing debt of the city will grow larger year by year if this system is not rigidly adhered to. I have confidence in you, gentlemen, that this will be your purpose.

## SCHOOLS.

One of the most important questions for your consideration is our public schools. The school system of New England has been the pride and glory of her people. Westbrook has never been behind other towns and cities in her schools. They are our pride and strength. We have always given a generous support for education and I know you will feel that money given for schools has brought, and always will bring, rich returns. I refer you to the report of the superintendent and committee for fuller information and wants in their judicious management of our public schools.

## ROADS AND SIDEWALKS.

How to make good roads is a question which is interesting the whole country and how to build them is being studied by able minds. A large part of your appropriation will be required to complete the unfinished work on Main street, necessitated by relaying of the railroad track and change of grade. This is our main thoroughfare and



must of necessity be finished. I trust our other roads may be improved in the spring and early summer as I consider one dollar expended in the early part of the season worth two in the fall.

### SEWERS.

On account of limited appropriation only a small proportion of the needed construction of sewers can be made each year. We recommend the completion of Rochester street sewer and call your attention to the pressing need of a sewer on Spring street.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Our fire department is worthy of our admiration, and whenever the department has been called upon, the members have rendered most efficient service. The city now owns the horses for the hose wagons and ladder truck. And now, gentlemen, I wish to extend my hearty co-operation in the fulfillment of the duties imposed upon us. Let us meet the responsibilities before us fearlessly. May we be ever ready to encourage new industries to come to our thriving city. Let our influence be to improve the social and moral condition of our people. With the remembrance of the vow made to God to the faithful discharge of our duties, may we hope for a prosperous and happy result for all our labors.



# REPORT OF

## Committee on Drains and Sewers.

---

*To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council:*

Your Committee on Drains and Sewers respectfully beg to report as follows.

Following the custom of the past several years, we have not recommended the expenditure of a large amount on sewers, but rather such a sum as after taking care of cleaning and repairs would permit of a gradual extension of the system.

In response to a petition from the property owners of Spring street, we recommended the appropriation of \$1,200, for the construction of a sewer from the Memorial Library to Hezelton's Pond. Unfortunately, the excavation discovered such soft and difficult soil that the money was exhausted after but little over half the distance was covered.

The work was very carefully done and, while we regret the heavy expenditure, it should be a source of gratification to the city that this dangerous section is completed. We have good reason to believe that the remaining distance will not prove excessively difficult.

A short section of 8-inch pipe was laid on Oak street. The soil here was also very soft and the expense greater than we anticipated.

We have realized the necessity for more work on Rochester street, but after careful investigation found that a great length of pipe would be required before any immediate improvement could be expected, and the money available would not permit of undertaking this construction.

All houses on this street are now provided for, but until farther provision is made for surface water, we have found it necessary to close the catch basins.

Some provision should also be made for surface water in front of the residence of John Newcomb, as the sewer has proved to be of insufficient size to take care of heavy rains.

Several catch basins have been constructed this year. It has been necessary to partially rebuild the outfall on Ash street. A large portion of the 24-inch pipe between Brown and River streets was found to be cracked and partially broken down. We have repaired such parts of this as seemed immediately necessary.

In response however, to several petitions, the city Council at a recent meeting authorized the Westbrook Light and Power Company to place additional lamps as follows: Three lamps on Park road; two lamps on Saco street; two lamps on Seavey street. These lamps will be added to the service early in the spring.

# Report of City Solicitor.

---

WESTBROOK, MAINE, FEBRUARY 25, 1901.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Westbrook:*

I submit herewith my official report for the municipal year just ending:

At the last May Term (1900) of the Supreme Court sitting at Alfred, in the County of York, suit was entered against the City, by the town of Hollis, for pauper supplies, amounting to \$69.96, furnished by the plaintiff town, in 1898, to the supposed wife of Silas M. Hall and her daughter. This suit having been continued over the intervening terms because of the illness of counsel on the respective sides, will be in order for trial at the next May term.

Suit was brought against the City by Mrs. Nellie B. Farnsworth, returnable at the January Term, 1901, of the Supreme Court for Cumberland County, for personal injuries sustained by the plaintiff, by reason of the alleged defective condition of the street near the southerly end of the bridge at Cumberland Mills. This suit will be in order for trial at the April Term next ensuing.

The suit of the City against the Westbrook Manufacturing Company, to enforce a lien upon real estate for non-payment of taxes, was settled by the payment to the City of one thousand dollars. This settlement was made with the full understanding and approval of the City Council, and although the amount received was much less than had been claimed in the suit, its acceptance was regarded as for the best interests of the City. It should, perhaps, be added that the actual payment was not made by the defendant company, but by other parties whose obligation, legal or equitable, to make the same, was by no means apparent.

# REPORT OF THE Chief Engineer of the Fire Department.

---

*To his Honor the Mayor and the Members of the City Government:*

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit the annual report of the Fire Department for the year ending March 31, 1901. It contains a list of the officers and members, the number of fires and the causes thereof, the loss and insurance, the condition of the apparatus, and such recommendations as I think will increase the efficiency of the Department.

## SIZE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The size of the Department is the same as last year, the working force of the Department consists of one chief, two assistant engineers, three foremen, three assistant foremen, three clerks, three drivers, thirty-six hosemen and laddermen, making a total of fifty-one men in the City Fire Department.

## FIRES AND ALARMS.

From March 1, 1900, to March 1, 1901, there have been twelve fires, nine bell alarms and three still alarms.

The number of alarms for each month was as follows: March 0, April 2, May 0, June 3, July 1, August 0, September 3, October 3, November 0, December 0, January 0, February 0.

### APPARATUS.

The apparatus of the Department at the present time consists of two hose wagons and one ladder truck. There are also two one horse pungs for winter use, and a one horse dump cart for street use.

### CONDITION OF APPARATUS.

#### HOSE 1.

This hose wagon will require some repairs the coming year, and I would recommend heavier running gear placed under it.

The hose pung is in good condition, the one horse tip cart will need painting and varnishing.

#### HOSE 2.

This hose wagon also will need some repairs the coming year, and I would recommend heavier running gear for this wagon too.

This hose pung is in good order.

#### LADDER 1.

This truck is in good condition, and I would recommend that a 24 foot roof ladder be placed on it and that hub runners be placed under it.

The hub runners are needed very much under this truck in case of heavy snow, etc.

### HORSES.

There are three horses used in the Department.

### HARNESSES.

The harnesses in the Department are in good condition.

### HOSE.

Our total supply of hose consists of 5,150 feet of rubber lined cotton hose. Of this 4,200 feet is first class, 600 feet second class, and 350 feet of hose badly worn. There has been 800 feet of cotton, rubber lined hose purchased during the past year.



## FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The fire alarm system gives perfect satisfaction. There have been no delays in receiving alarms. The 8-inch steam gong, for the past five years located on the Haskell Silk Co's. Plant has been supplied with steam by that Corporation without expense to the City, and the thanks of all citizens are due them. On Dec. 25th., 1900 the 8-inch steam gong and tower was removed from the Haskell Silk Co's. Plant and placed on The Dana Warp mill and steam furnished by them free of cost to the City. Thanks are also due Mr. Dana from all interested.

## HYDRANTS.

There have been no new hydrants set during the past year. The hydrant at the corner of Spring and Main streets, and the one in front of the Baptist Church on Main street should be replaced by three way posts, as there is much valuable property in that vicinity.

## BUILDINGS.

Presumpscot Hose House No. 1, is very much in need of painting inside and out, and should be attended to in the Spring.

Valentine Hose House No. 2, also needs painting inside and out. I believe a basement should be put under this house as the water stands there in the Spring and Fall of the year and is very injurious to the building and apparatus, and this building should be connected with the sewer.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

Besides the recommendations already mentioned, I would still further recommend that eight more fire alarm boxes be installed, as our present boxes are quite a distance apart, and there are none on the cross streets.

At the Pennell fire the price of a box might have been saved had there been one where it ought to have been. After the boxes are once installed the cost is very slight. I would also recommend the purchase of three eight inch combined gongs and indicators.

The hydrants, in some parts of the city where the grade of streets has been lowered have been left so far out of the ground that they are liable to freeze, and in other places, where the grade has been raised they are nearly covered up. These hydrants should be raised or lowered to suit the grade.

In regard to the water supply of the city in case of fire, I wish to call your attention to the fact that a pipe should be laid on Cumberland street across the river to take the place of one washed away at the time of the freshet. Should there be a break in the Bridge street pipe the whole north westerly side of the river would be without water and in case of fire much valuable property might be destroyed.

If the pipe was laid across the river on Cumberland street in case of a break to Bridge street pipe the water supply could come by the way of Cumberland street, and if both pipes were all right in case of fire we would get much better service. Should there be a break, or repairs to be made to the Main street pipe east of Stroudwater street, the whole east end of the city would be without any water supply, whereas if it came across the river at Cumberland street the pipes could be repaired without the water supply being shut off from the whole of east end. I believe this pipe should be laid as early as possible the coming year.

I would recommend letting the Street Department have five hundred feet of old hose for flushing out sewers, as they have had to borrow of the Fire Department several times the past year, and replacing it with new.

I think it would be well for the City to buy a tip cart for two horses and arranged for summer or winter use instead of hiring or borrowing as we have been obliged to do in the past.

In concluding my report, I wish to extend my thanks to his Honor the Mayor for the many favors granted me during the year. I also desire to thank Assistant Engineers Smith and Spear and all members of the Fire Department for their willing and able support at all time during the year.

To give an alarm, open the door, pull the hook to the bottom of the slot once and let go.

After giving an alarm, remain, or leave some one at the box, to direct the firemen to the fire, and to see that no one interferes with the box. Do not pull the hook a second time or allow any one but an officer to do so.

Never pull an alarm when you hear the bell ring inside the box.

The locks are "trap locks" and you cannot take out your key until the arrival of a Fire Engineer with a master key.

After giving an alarm always close the outside door.

# Report of the Board of Health.

---

WESTBROOK, February 14, 1901.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Council.*

The following is respectfully submitted.

Whole number of deaths reported during the municipal year is 122.

Whole number of cases of contagious diseases 58 as follows:

Diphtheria,	33
Measles,	7
Typhoid,	10
Scarlet fever,	8
Deaths from diphtheria	10.

The year previous no death occurred from the above disease.

Early in the fall diphtheria made its appearance and for a time was very threatening, twenty-five (25) cases in quick succession and ten deaths was the result.

Seven nuisances were reported the last year and have received attention although the mortality during the winter has been large, the average for the year has been about the same as for years past.

There seems to be no way to get rid of the nuisance on Spring street (that is so much complained of), but by continuing the sewer on that street and draining as much as possible the stagnant water from the pond in that locality and which is now the receptacle of considerable house drainage. The board was notified late in the season last year of the practice of some parties of depositing waste from stores and other garbage at the head of Central street in the



old canal. We hope to see that practice discontinued as it is a violation of the law.

A bill is now before the legislature asking for a provision to establish a state laboratory where bacteriological examinations can be made and water from drinking sources analyzed. If it passes it will prove a great help in determining the presence of a contagious disease and definitely fixing the time when danger from infection has passed, thus shortening the period of quarantine in many cases.

Much attention has been directed of late years to the source and treatment of consumption; an extract from a circular from the state board is inserted in this report.

Consumption (Pulmonary Tuberculosis.) The investigations of the last few years make it certain that this is an infectious disease, and also make it likely that the only serious source of danger is the sputum, or expectoration. While the sputum is moist it is practically harmless; after it is dried, pulverized and floated in the atmosphere, so that it may be inhaled, it is dangerous. Avoid, therefore, spitting upon floors, in handkerchiefs, or upon other things within doors, where the infectious sputum will be dried and pulverized. Use a spit-cup. Tuberculous or consumptive children should not be allowed to attend school, and persons with this disease should not teach. (See Circular No. 54, Prevention of Consumption.)

# Report of the Overseers of the Poor.

---

WESTBROOK, MAINE, FEBRUARY 25, 1901.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Westbrook:*

GENTLEMEN:—We herewith submit the report of the Overseers of the Poor for the year ending February 28th, 1901.

Unfortunately for us we were an entire new board and it required some work to acquaint ourselves with our duties; which duties we have tried to perform in such a manner as to protect the city's interests and at the same time render such aid and assistance to the deserving poor that no reasonable person need complain that we had dealt harshly or unjustly with them.

At the commencement of the year we were unable to retain the valuable services of Mr. Wm. Morrill and wife as master and matron of the almshouse and farm, and found it difficult to select from the different applicants a man and his wife who were in all ways fitted to fill that responsible position, but at last we chose Mr. Freedom Newcomb and wife of Scarboro and hired them at a salary of \$400.00 per year, and have since found we made no mistake, as they have proven themselves fully capable, and their management of affairs has been satisfactory in all respects; they having attended to the wants of all the inmates and have kept them in a neat, orderly and comfortable condition, having assigned to all who are able to work their daily tasks, and have seen that they were properly performed. Mr. Newcomb has proven himself to be a good farmer, and has improved the condition of the farm and got it into good shape for another year. There has during the past year been added to the stock 3 cows and 6 heifers. There has been a cow shed built in the Chapman pasture, and there is now about 20 acres of land plowed and ready to plant in the spring.



### Sickness.

There has been some sickness among the inmates during the year, which has been carefully cared for, and all have received medical attendance from the city physician, Dr. Burroughs, who had manifested constant care and interest in their recovery, and for him we have only words of praise.

At the commencement of the year we had 12 inmates:

There has been added during the year 6 who have been there part of the time; a Mrs. William Casey with 4 children were admitted in January, 1901, since which time 2 of the children have had pneumonia, both having recovered and are now about the house. Robert Davis, age 65 years, a one-legged pedler, became sick and was admitted in July, and remained about 2 months and on his recovery was clothed up and a ticket bought for him and he was sent to Buffalo, N. Y. to his friends. Now at the close of the year we have a family of 16, all in good health.

There has been one death during the year; Mrs. Eliza Wallace (more familiarly known as Granny Wallace) who after a short sickness died February 10th, and was buried in the family burying lot in the cemetery. Though poor and unfortunate she was always kind and had a good heart; always ready to lend a helping hand and will be long remembered by all who knew her.

### Outside Poor.

There has been the usual amount of what is termed outside poor, as there always will be until such time as the city sees fit to make more room at the almshouse, which is now full, and the overseers are obliged to pay rent in the thickly-settled part of the



city, furnish coal and wood and provisions at a much greater expense than could be furnished at the Almshouse. During the year 38 families have been helped, numbering in all 141 persons, the larger part of which are mothers with their children, the head of the family being sick and unable to work, or have left their families to be cared for by the city or starve, and in many cases they don't seem to care which. The 6 children of Frank Maxwell have been boarded at the city's expense the larger part of the time for the past year, but recently have been sent to their father, whose care they are now under.

### Soldiers.

There have been 10 soldiers, some of whom have families, helped during the year, at an expense of \$932.68.

One man during the year, being without money or friends and sick with typhoid fever, was sent to the Maine General Hospital at an expense to the city of \$72.00.

Isa Bailey and Annie Webber are at the Insane Asylum. Dennis Mayberry and Narcissa Guimond are at the Reform School, and Julia Gothro is still at the Industrial school.

# Report of the School Committee.

---

## *To the Citizens of Westbrook:*

In conformity with law and custom we present this annual report.

It has been our earnest endeavor to work for the best interests of the schools under our charge. We feel that the teachers have co-operated heartily and the work has been of a high grade of excellence.

It behooves us as citizens to present and uphold good schools because good citizens are dependent on education, and our city to show progressive intelligence must not lack in any essential toward attaining this.

The pupils have shown a marked degree of progress, especially those who have been constant in attendance. Of course there is much needed absence but there is evidently much absence that is not necessary. If many parents only realized to any great extent that those who lose time in school have the less opportunity to do satisfactory work, those parents would try to keep their children in school more regular.

The work of teachers has been interrupted by sickness, caused mostly by contagious diseases (scarlet fever and diphtheria being most prevalent) and several deaths are recorded. We wish to express our sorrow and sympathy to those bereaved parents. Through our work, carefulness on the part of teachers, and assistance from the Board of Health, much sickness has been averted during the past year.

Miss Thirsa Davis, a faithful and efficient teacher in the Forest street school, being sick much of the time during the year 1899, was obliged to resign in June 1900. Her place was filled by Miss Cora Clay, who had previously taught in the lowest grade in this school,

the vacancy caused by Miss Clay's promotion being supplied by Miss Jennie Bickford.

The other teachers in the common schools remain the same. During the fall term, Principal Wentworth of Bridge street school was offered a more lucrative position in Boston, but the committee deemed it best to retain him if possible, therefore, after due consideration he was prevailed upon to withdraw his resignation.

The teachers in the High school remain the same with the exception of Miss Edwards who was elected to one of the Portland High schools, and Oliver O. Stover, a graduate of the University of Maine, was elected to take her place in the science department. The Westbrook High school ranks well in its work as it fits for all the principal colleges of New England, many of them admitting students on certificate from this school.

The committee has seen fit to change the plan of graduation. Instead of all graduates of a class taking part as has been the custom in the past, the number having class parts is limited to seven.

We think, after much consideration of this matter, that this plan will produce more general satisfaction than the old one.

The committee outlined some much needed repairs in the spring of 1900 and in addition to these there were many others which also had to be done, hence a larger expenditure of money than was expected. Brown street schoolhouse was painted inside and outside, Bridge street schoolhouse was painted inside, Valentine street schoolhouse was painted outside, and Rocky Hill schoolhouse was plastered and painted inside. The boilers in the school buildings were tested and put in thorough repair.

During the next year Forest street and Bridge street Grammar schoolhouses must be painted on the outside in order to keep them in decent repair. There should be done considerable work on the inside of the schoolhouses at Highland Lake and Prides Corner.

The committee seeing the need of more room for High school work, changed the superintendent and committee's room to the Warren schoolhouse, thus making one additional room for High school use.

There is need of fitting up a room in Forest street schoolhouse for Grade V. to relieve the congested condition of the first five grades which are located in three rooms.

We will recommend the placing of new closets in the basement of Brown street schoolhouse and connecting with the sewer. By

doing this, which ought not to be very expensive, the sanitary conditions will be greatly improved.

By joint action with the City Council we disposed of the old and unsightly North schoolhouse, so called, reserving the lot, thus making provision, should the growth of that part of the city make it necessary to build additional school accommodations.

In March 1900 Miss Legrow, special teacher of music, resigned and Miss Bertha Babb, a resident of our city, has very acceptably conducted the work since. The work of penmanship is still conducted by Mr. Wilson who is doing the work in a very creditable manner. The Manual Training school still retains for principal, Mr. Berry, who has so successfully taught in this department for two years. In addition to the three upper grades of the Grammar schools attending this school, several parents from Prides Corner and Highland Lake have requested that their boys be admitted and so far as possible these requests have been granted.

The ladies' clubs of our city, who through earnest efforts have procured many beautiful pictures for the schoolrooms, should receive a liberal share of the praise for making the surroundings of such helpful character. We wish to express our appreciation of the interest manifested by the citizens in the vicinity of Saco street school, who so kindly donated a flag and staff for that building.

We might speak of the schools more in detail, giving more particulars of the individual work of the teachers, but instead we invite you to visit them more for, by so doing, much will be found to commend the schools of this city.

For statistics relating to the school attendance in the different schools we refer you to the tabular report on another page.

For a report of receipts and expenditures of school money we refer you to the auditor's report.

In closing we wish to thank the City Council for its hearty support and assistance in the appropriations during the year just past and we will suggest that the new council grant the following appropriations for the next year.

# High School Report.

---

WESTBROOK, February 20, 1901.

*To the Superintending School Committee:*

GENTLEMEN:—Another year of school has passed and it is with pleasure that I report the progress in the Westbrook High, by giving a short synopsis of the work accomplished.

The work in the sciences, we believe, has been such as to awaken more interest on the part of the students. During the winter term the student in botany is taught largely by observation the various parts of plants; so that by the beginning of the spring season, the pupil is fully prepared to collect, analyze, press and mount, with a carefully written description of each, fifty flowers. Fifty specimens, properly labelled, are also required in zoology. In the other sciences, individual work along similar lines has been demanded.

A part of the work in the history course has consisted of outside reading. This enables the student to obtain a broader scope of the same subject.

In the other English branches research has been required.

The usual amount of work in the various languages according to the curriculum have been covered.

The mathematical course has claimed its due share of attention.

A beginning has been made along the line of schoolroom decoration.

Gifts of busts and pictures have been received for which we wish to make due acknowledgement.

I trust you will believe with me that this has been a year of profit and advancement.

# Report of Street Commissioner's Work.

---

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Westbrook:*

In compliance with the requirements of the City Charter, we respectfully submit the following report, as taken from the journal of our late Street Commissioner, Charles R. Goodell, as follows: After the general repairs in the early spring, such as removing snow from the sidewalks and streets, and opening gutters and cesspools and repairing wash-outs, his attention was called to the following permanent work, viz.

## Streets.

The work on lower Main street was begun by lowering the sides, using same material for first coating. By order of the City Council a new stone-crusher (which arrived June 14th) was purchased, and started up June 21st with the following results:

Amount of crushed rock used from Wm. Holston's to City Lot was six hundred and ninety-nine (699) loads, at an average of three thousand two hundred and ninety (3290) lbs. per load, making a total of eleven hundred and fifty (1150) tons required to complete the unfinished part of said street. Also a steam road roller was leased for use on said street, which proved very satisfactory. 628 feet of curbing was set at a cost of 33 1-3 cents per foot, and banks turfed in front of Messrs. Manning, Boothby, Woodman, Newcomb, Forest school lot and Mace's, with proper steps leading to walks.

## Culverts.

The repairing and building over of culverts on Brown street, River street, Gorham Road, Saccarappa and Pride's Corner were given special attention.

## **Drains and Sewers.**

There has been layed on High street, (200) feet of (8) inch pipe with proper tees. On Ash street, the out fall was rebuilt, and an extension to Main street sewer from Walker Memorial Library to Spring street, and up Spring street two hundred (200) feet of twenty-four (24) inch pipe, at a depth of fourteen (14) feet.

A wooden sewer was built in the rear of Main and Day streets.

Sewers cleaned out and repaired on State street, Brown street, (under Knight's stable) and one on Warren avenue.

Also a drain was dug in Frank Graffam's lot on Haskell street.

## **Sidewalks.**

A new cross walk was built across Main street, near Lyman Guphill's store.

Plank walk repaired on Pleasant street, and graveled walk on lower Main street, in front of Wm. Lamb's.

## **Cesspools.**

The cesspool at Warren block was moved to conform with the street grade.

New cesspools were built at Porter's store, on Brown street, near Dodge street, Tolman street, Forest street, Elwell street, Main street, near City Lot, and in front of Edward's store, and one on Mason street.

## **Bridges.**

The bridge at Cumberland Mills was replanked, and Saco street, Spring street, and Pride's Corner bridges were repaired.

## **Guide-Boards.**

Guide-boards have been placed on the several street corners as required by law, making a total of about twenty-six (26) new ones.

Your committee would recommend in closing, that the bridges on Saco street, and Spring street, be put in thorough repair this

coming year; also the bridge at Pride's Corner, and Culvert near Willow spring have special attention.

That a special appropriation be made for same.

That the street be brought to grade from M. C. R. R. on Main street, to the intersection of Warren street, (by request of the abutters) this coming year.

That the tool house be moved to the city lot on Main street, so as to avoid the rental of land for the present location.

By the report of the librarian it will be seen that the library is increasing in the number of volumes, and it is the aim and desire of those having it in charge that it may increase in usefulness to all our people.

By a comparison with previous reports it will be seen that there has been a gradual falling off in circulation. We are sorry to see this and would call upon all of our people to remember that a library is for use, and ask them to use it as much as possible.

The following report of the librarian will show the work done during the year.

## Report of the Librarian.

*To the Regents and Trustees of the Memorial Library of Westbrook:*

GENTLEMEN:—As required by Art. 5 of our Rules and Regulations, I submit herewith the Seventh Annual Report of the Library for the year ending Jan. 31st, 1901.



### Accessions.

Total number of volumes added 334, and 20 withdrawn, making a net gain of 314, and making the total number of volumes in the library February 1st, 1901, 7667. Of the 334 accessions, 275 were added by purchase, 51 by binding magazines and 8 by gift. 195 volumes of fiction have been added and 30 volumes of history and travel. Each of the other departments have received some additions. The bound periodicals now number 300. 54 reports have been received.

### Registration.

204 new cards have been issued, making a total registration of 3199.

### Circulation.

The total number of books delivered for home use was 23,234, making a daily average of 76 2-3. 87 per cent were fiction.

The largest number of books delivered in one day was 288 (March 10th.)

The smallest number was 7, (July 17th). This was due to the misleading sign "Closed" at the front entrance during the time that the Main street sewer was in process of construction.

182 mail notices and 4 messenger calls have been required to secure overdue books.

202 books have been rebound, including magazines.

14 books have been destroyed by the health officer.

### Reading Rooms.

800 books have been delivered for use in the reading room in addition to the periodicals which may always be used at the pleasure of the public. 5 magazines have been taken from the building and many have been badly mutilated. I would most heartily recommend the use of temporary binders as a means of preserving the magazines for binding. They would also add much to the appearance of the rooms.

## Catalogues.

A supplementary catalogue of books received from Jan. 1st, 1898, to Jan. 1st, 1900, was received from the printer in June and since that time \$7.70 has been derived from their sale.

# Report of Inspector of Buildings.

---

WESTBROOK, March 4, 1901.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Westbrook:*

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith present my report for the municipal year of 1900-1901.

I have as required by law, inspected all new buildings, also those that have been enlarged or repaired (as far as I can learn), and they are as follows: B. F. Andrews, No. 81 Main street, Cumberland Mills, changed from a store to dwelling house. Mrs. Minnie E. Lane, house moved from Main to Stevens street, and repaired and occupied as a dwelling house.

Mrs. Helen Noyes, south side of Burnham street; house enlarged and occupied as a dwelling. John W. Warren, No. 6 Pleasant street, dwelling house repaired. Mrs. A. W. Thorne, No. 81 Main street, dwelling house enlarged and repaired.

Building erected, corner of Main and Seavey streets, by Ansel Porter, occupied as a store and hall. Dwelling house built on south side of Lamb street by F. A. Bodge.

A boiler house erected on the west side of Bridge street, by the Dana Warp Mill.

Dwelling house repaired at 31 Spring street, by Stephen Dresser.

Dwelling house erected on the corner of Forest and Cottage streets, Cumberland Mills, by Neal Murray. A boiler house and office erected by the Haskell Silk Company on the northwesterly side of Bridge street.

House enlarged at 155 Main street, by Lemuel S. Lane.

Building erected, corner of Union and Spring streets, by Frank M. Pennell, used as a stable and office.

No buildings should hereafter be erected or enlarged in this city, unless the chimneys are built from the ground, (without a special permit) in a thorough and workmanlike manner, plastered on the inside. All the openings for stove pipes shall have sheet iron collars; one inserted in the chimney, one three inches larger (known as a slip collar) one end placed against the chimney, the other end flush with the plastering, fastened to the studding with straps of the same material; one inch space left between said chimney and the wood work.

All studding shall be blocked with joist the same width as studding, not less than two inches thick, on the upper side of all under floors, except the ground floor. All floor timbers (except the ground floor) shall rest upon girders placed upon the end of all the studding of the partition within the house. The floor-timbers to be blocked on top of all girders with boards the same width of floor timbers.

I would recommend that a copy of this or whatever ordinance you may pass, be printed on the back of your permit, with instructions for the person or persons having the permit to build, to notify your building inspector in time to see that your instructions are carried out.
