### SCHOOL REPORT

The annual school report this year will be consolidated elementary and secondary, since there are timely problems common to progress of both systems.

Once again opportunity is present for another significant step forward in School Union #96. Sumner Memorial High School has proved its worth and confirmed your earlier judgment that self-improvement could come through your own joint efforts. This fall Sumner High School will house approximately 300 students, staffed by a competent faculty of 16 instructors. But time marches on! Already the high school is overcrowded, understaffed, and has not yet attained accreditation status. Your elementary schools in most instances are also feeling the lack of space and the pinch of limited facilities with programs geared to another day instead of the future. What, then, is the answer?

Obviously, progress must continue; but outside assistance is needed, if new school construction is to materialize and higher operating costs are to be met. Fortunately, the way is opening up for just such a situation, through additional state subsidy aid. The Uniform Local Tax Effort Principle, if adopted by the 1965 legislature will provide new monies for operating expenses, especially in the poorer sections. Construction funds will also become available from state sources under certain conditions.

To take care of anticipated expansion needs, a special bill (legislative document No. 432) requesting school construction subsidy funds for the Flanders Bay Community School District is being presented to the state legislature, at this session, by Representative Byron Young of Gouldsboro. Should this approach fail, one other avenue of financial help might be considered; namely, conversion from a Community School District organization to that of a School Administrative District (S. A. D.) as other places have done.

This then becomes an important key decision — will you,

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the parents and citizens of this coastal community, accept a new kind of school organization, once it is thoroughly explored, if it proves to be a sensible proposal? Right now the Flanders Bay Community School District, comprising the towns of Franklin, Sullivan, Sorrento, Gouldsboro, Winter Harbor and Steuben, own and operate Sumner Regional High School with supervisory authority delegated to 18 School committee members and 18 board of trustees members. In the same manner these towns also comprise School Union #96 which separately operates the local grammar schools under the control of 3 school committee members from each of the six participating towns If both of these governing units were combined into a unified School Administrative District, its single Board of Directors would handle both elementary and secondary responsibilities under one authority. This consolidation of management would be itself an improvement. However, the greater gain would come from subsidy income on all future school construction costs. At today's rates this would amount to 48.33% state aid; or nearly one-half.

A consideration of what your future school building requirements might be calls for yet another basic decision. Would you expand the present high school plant sufficiently to meet current and later demand, and, at the same time, add extra rooms to the local grammar schools, to take care of growing school population in most of the towns Or would you give serious thought to a new educational pattern for the year ahead? For example, the development of a Junior High School Plan?

An area Junior High School would house grades 7-8-9. Sumner High School would become a Senior High School with grades 10-11-12. Each town would provide a local elementary program, grades SF-6.

The Junior High School concept has much to offer. Many of the better school systems which are emerging around Maine are already organized along these lines. In most cases they stress the gains from ability grouping, departmental teaching, extra-curricular advantages in the fields of sports, music and public speaking which become possible through additional gym and auditorium space, as well as the instructional improvements from a science laboratory, home economics and shop facilities during these important formative years. One other improvement resulting from this reorganization will develop on the primary level. Each town would have its own Sub-primary grade. At present only Sullivan and Sorrento have this advantage. Most of you realize that not every 6 year old school beginner is ready for the formal training offered and expected in grade I. So many need the preliminary readiness experiences of a Pre-Primary nature. Probably the day is not too far distant when Kindergarten and Nursery school training will become a regular part of a really strong educational set-up such as is in the making here.

Hand in hand with this concept of a top-notch school system must come a determined effort to lift the economy of the area by its own bootstraps. Somehow, ways and means must be found to provide more community income and adequate family wages, if there is to be a better tomorrow for your children and their children. Surely, plus the happiness and security stemming from a prosperous environment is a goal worthy of conquest. Anyway, let's begin — first step — an area junior high school . . . target date . . . September, 1967.

# NURSING SERVICE REPORT

I herewith submit a brief report of the service rendered the town of Sorrento by the Flanders Bay Health and T. B. Association for the period beginning January 1, 1964, and ending December 31, 1964.

A complete school health program, consisting of routine school inspection of grade pupils and immunization clinics for both school and pre-school children to protect them against polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, and smallpox, was held. The mothers proved very faithful in seeing that the shots are completed once started.

Oral Polio Vaccine was used this year at all clinics.

The Union now has a new audiometer (for testing hearing) on order, and it should be in use by the first of the year.

The school personnel received a chest x-ray (due every two years) at the State T. B. Clinic in Ellsworth; all results were negative.

Routine classroom visits have been made, and help given teachers whenever needed.

#### SUMNER HIGH REPORT

All of the entering class, as well as all pupils going out for sports, received a physical examination by Dr. Stadler from the West Gouldsboro Medical Center. Eighty students were tested. Vaccination for smallpox was offered this year; 100 were vaccinated.

The Tine Test for T. B. was offered the entering class and seniors; 45 were tested with all results negative.

Vision at Summer High is tested by the nurse. Of 221 students tested, 21 were found to have a defect.

During the year, 10,473 miles have been traveled by the nurse in connection with clinics, home visits for the five-town union served, visits to give medication and treatment as ordered by the doctor, and visits to patients once cared for by the nurse who are now at Maplecrest Nursing Home and the Urann Home.

Welfare and special social service are part of the program. I wish to extend thanks to all who have helped with the program, with special mention of the fine co-operation of the Selectmen, members of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Committee members, Teachers and Parents.

An audit has been completed of the financial records maintained by the the officials of the Town of Sorrento for the fiscal year ended February 1, 1965.

#### ASSETS

The cash balance at the end of the year was reconciled with the statement of the First National Bank of Bar Harbor as of January 30, 1965 and count of cash on hand. Transactions affecting taxes receivable, tax liens and tax acquired property were reviewed and unpaid individual accounts at the end of the year were checked and reconciled with the balances in the ledger. Accounts receivable consisted of reimbursable items and appeared to be correctly stated.

#### LIABILITIES

Withholding taxes deducted from payrolls after January 1, 1965 were carried as a liability pending the proper settlement date.

#### RESERVES AND SURPLUS

Revenue derived from 1965 excise taxes prior to February 1, 1965 has been carried forward to the ensuing year.

A total of \$3,021.12 was carried forward for the departmental accounts.

At February 1, 1965, the town had an unappropriated surplus of \$10,445.53 as compared with \$7,647.48 at the close of the preceding year. The excise taxes and overlay were the principal items effecting the increase.

#### DEBT FUND

The long term obligation of the Town appear as a separate fund on the balance sheet. The annual payment of \$1,000.00 was made on the classroom note, reducing the balance to \$5,000.00.

#### GENERAL

The 1964 commitment of taxes to the Collector was examined and reconciled with the assessment. Excise tax collections were verified with the copies of the receipts retained by the Collector. All funds recorded as received by the treasurer had been deposited in the bank and all disbursements had been made by check and authorized by warrants drawn by the Selectmen. Vouchers and payrolls were examined for a selected period and appeared to be proper charges to the accounts involved.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet, together with supporting exhibits and schedules, fairly presents the financial position of the Town at February 1, 1965.

# **GREETINGS**:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of town of Sorrento, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the school house in said town, on Monday, the 1st day of March A. D. 1965 at 7 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles namely:

Article:

- 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year and fix salary for same.
- 3 To choose three Selectmen and fix salary for same.
- 4 To choose three Assessors and fix salary for same.
- 5 To choose three Overseers of the poor.

- 6 To choose a Town Treasurer and fix salary for same.
- 7 To choose a Tax Collector and fix salary for same.
- 8 To choose one or more Constables and fix their compensation.
- 9 To choose a Civil Defense Director and fix Compensation.
- 10 To choose one member to serve one year as trustee of the Flanders Bay Community School District.
- 11 To choose one member to serve three years as trustee of the Flanders Bay Community School District.
- 12 To choose one member of School Committee to serve three years and fix compensation.
- 13 To choose a Road Commissioner and fix compensation.
- 14 To choose a Fire Chief and fix compensation.
- 15 To see if the Town will fix a date when taxes shall be due and payable and to see if the Town will vote to fix a rate of interest to be charged on said taxes unpaid after the said date.

- 16 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans not exceeding the aggregate sum of, \$5,000.00, in anticipation of and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year of 1965.
- 17 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of all property held by Tax Liens on such terms as they deem advisable and execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- 18 To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the new classroom note of which \$1,000.00 is due for 1965.
- 19 To see what sum of money if any the Town will raise for the Frenchman's Bay Library.
- 20 To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges).
- 21 To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for the following accounts, namely:

Administration Town Pier Village Green Town Dump

Street Lights Fire Department Insurance Board of Health Nursing Service **Repairs of Town Property** Town Roads Snow Removal Cutting Bushes **Civil** Defense Surplus Food Supplemental Aid Interest School Maintenance School Repairs Note Retirement Social Security Aid to Dependent Children Shellfish Conservation

- 22 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000, for a sinking fund, to be used such time as the Town may vote to purchase a new school bus.
- 23 To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to build a gravelled

launching strip at Sorrento Harbor. Recommended, \$250.00.

- 24 To see whether the Town will authorize the municipal officers to sell the Community House property, so-called, being Lots 6, 8, 10 and 12 in Section Z, Division 1, for \$2,000.00 and to convey the same to a purchaser by quit-claim deed with covenant against the claims of persons claiming by, through or under the Town.
- 25 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply proceeds of the sale of the Community House to the new classroom notes.
- 26 To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance:

# Ordinance For Shellfish Digging License

Section 1. Municipal Shellfish license required. It is unlawful for any person to dig or take shellfish from the shores, flats or coastal waters of this municipality without having a current license issued by the clerk of this municipality as provided in ordinance.

1. Definitions. The following words as used in this ordinance have the meaning indicated after each, unless a different meaning is clearly intended by the context:

A. Shellfish. The word "shellfish" means soft-shell clams, quahogs and mussels.

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**B.** Municipality. The word "municipality" means the Town (City) of Sorrento, Maine.

**C.** Resident. The word "resident" when it applies to this municipality means a person who has resided in the State of Maine for at least 6 month next prior to the time his claim of such residence is made, and who has resided in this municipality for at least 3 months next prior to the time his claim of such residence is made.

2. License designation, scope; licensee must sign. The license, designated as a Municipal Shellfish license for the Town of Sorrento, entitles the holder to dig and take any amount of shellfish from the shores, flats and waters of this municipality when and where is is otherwise lawful to do so.

A. License must be signed. The licensee must sign his license in order to make it valid.

3. Qualifications application, fees. Any resident of this municipality may apply to the selectmen for the license required by this ordinance on forms provided by the municipal officers. No other person may apply for, nor be issued the license provided in this ordinance. The Selectmen may require the applicant to produce evidence of his qualification before issuing the license.

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A. Contents of application. The application must contain the applicant's name, current address, birth date, height, weight, signature, and whatever other information, if any, the municipal officers may from time to time decide.

**B.** Records. The Selectmen shall note on the application the date the license requested was issued, sign it, and file the application with his records.

**C. Fees.** The fee for the license is \$1.00 which the applicant shall pay with his application. The Selectman shall pay all fees received to the municipal treasurer. The funds so received by this municipality may be used for whatever purpose this municipality may from time to time decide.

4. License expiration date. Each license issued under authority of this ordinance expires at midnight on December 31st of the year issued.

5. Penalty. Whoever violates any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$10.00 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.

6. Former ordinance repealed. The ordinance entitled Shellfish Conservation, in the Town of Sorrento, County of Hancock, enacted at the special town meeting is hereby repealed.

7. Effective date. This ordinance becomes effective immediately after its adoption by this municipality.

27 Ordinance pertaining to size of soft shell Clams. Section 1, Minimum size for soft shell clams.

It is unlawful for any person to take soft shell clams from the shores, flats or coastal waters of the Town of Sorrento, Maine which are less than 2 inches in the longest diameter to the amount of more than 10% of any lot. It is also unlawful to possess soft shell clams on the shores, flats or coastal waters of the , Town of Sorrento, Maine, which are less then 2 inches in the longest diameter to the amount of 10% of any lot.

- 28 To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the digging of clams for commercial purposes from June 1st to October 1st.
- 29 To see if the Town will vote to apply the clam license fees to the clam program.

- 30 To see if the Town will vote to limit the amount of clams taken between June 1st. and
  October 1st for own consumption.
- 31 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to build a new float wing.
- 32 To act on any other business that may properly came before the meeting.

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#### SCHOOL REPORT

The annual school report this year will be consolidated – elementary and secondary, since there are timely problems common to the progress of both systems.

Once again opportunity is present for another significant step forward in School Union No. 96 Sumner Memorial High School has proved its worth and confirmed your earlier judgment that self-improvement could come through your own joint efforts This fall the high school will house approximately 300 students staffed by a competent faculty of 16 instructors, But times marches on! Already it is overcrowded, understaffed, and has not yet attained accreditation status. Your elementary schools in most instances are also feeling the lack of space and the pinch of limited facilities, with programs geared to another day instead of the future. What then is the answer?

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Obviously, momentum must continue; but outside assistance is needed, if new school construction is to materialize and higher operating costs are to be met. Fortunately, the way is opening up for just such a situation, through possible additional state subsidy aid. The "Uniform Local Tax Effort Principle", if adopted by the 1965 legislature, will provide new money for operating expenses, especially in the poorer sections. Construction funds will also become available from state sources under certain conditions.

To take care of anticipated expansion needs at the high school a special bill (Legislative Document No. 432) requesting school construction subsidy funds for the Flanders Bay Community School District is being presented to the state legislature, at this session, by Representative Byron Young of Gouldsboro. Should this approach fail, one other avenue of financial help might be considered; namely, conversion from a Community School District organization to that of a School Administrative District (S.A.D) as many other places have done.

This then becomes an important key decision - will you, the parents and citizens of this unified coastal community, accept a new kind of school organization, if it proves to be a sensible proposal? Right now the Flanders Bay Community School District, comprising the towns of Franklin, Sullivan, Sorrento, Gouldsboro Winter Harbor and Steuben own and operate Sumner Memorial High School with supervisory power delegated to 18 school committee members and 18 board of trustees members. In the same manner these towns also comprise School Union No. 96 which separately operates the local grammar schools under the control of 3 school committee members from each of the 6 participating towns. If both of these governing units were combined into one School Administrative District, its single Board of Directors would handle elementary and secondary responsibilities under one authority. This consolidation of management would by itself be an improvement. However, the greater gain would come from state subsidy income on all future school construction costs. At today's rates this would amount to about 50 percent.

A consideration of what your future school building requirements might be calls for yet another basic decision. Would you expand the present high school plant sufficiently to meet current future demands and, at the same time, add extra classrooms to the local grammar schools to take care of a growing school population in most of the towns? Or, would you give serious thought to a new educational pattern for the years ahead: development of a junior high school plan, at about the same price?

An area junior high school would accommodate grades 7-8-9. Sumner High School would become a senior high school with grades 10-11-12 Each town would maintain a local elementary program, grades SP-6

The Junior High School idea has much to offer. Most of the better school systems in Maine are already organized along these lines. In most cases they stress the gains from ability grouping, departmental teaching, extra-curricular advantages in the fields of physical education, music and public speaking which become possible through additional gym and auditorium space, as well as the instructional improvements from science, home economics and shop facilities during these most important formative years.

One other improvement resulting from this reorganization will develop on the primary level. Each town would have its own Sub-primary grade. At present, only Sullivan and Sorrento have this advantage Most of you realize that not every 6-year old school beginner is ready for the formal training offered and expected in grade I. Many need the preliminary readiness experiences of a pre-primary nature. Probably the day is not too far distant when Kindergarten and Nursery school training will also become a regular part of a truly strong educational set-up such as is slowly in the making here.

Hand in hand with this concept of a top-notch school system must come a determined effort to lift the economy of the area by its own bootstraps. Somehow, ways and means must be found to provide more community income and adequate family wages, if there is to be a better tomorrow for your children and their children. Surely, a good education for everyone, commensurate with individual ability, plus the happiness and security stemming from a prosperous environment is a goal worthy of conquest. Anyway, let's begin anew ...... first step ...... a consolidated Junior High School ..... target date ...... September, 1967.

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#### SUMNER HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

The year 1964 was an important one for Sumner High for both academic and physical reasons This report will not repeat the ancient plaintive cry that the school has grown again in size of the student body and in courses and services, and thus is dramatically too large for the physical plant A social organism such as a school has to learn to live with its environment or change it; most probably the former option will once again be exercised next year

Academic progress at Sumner took two curricular forms in 1964; the first, certain small refinements in course offerings at the Business and Vocational level; the second, the improvement of our science program for all levels by the addition of a fulltime biology teacher to our science staff This quite naturally made a more extensive offering of biology possible as well as permitting the odius physics and chemistry rotation to end. Sumner's basic course structure has reached a certain stability, and probably, save for minor additions and improvements in the Business and Vocational courses, this stability should remain for several years. One new project in curriculum improvement involves the addition of new subject materials in the junior and sophomore years of the Vocational Course. Another will be the replacement of our present uniform graduation requirement of sixteen Carnegie units to a more equitable graduated requirement of sixteen units for Vocational, seventeen for Business and eighteen for Academic students. Other nomal adjustments in, and expansion of, our curriculum are to be expected, but the basic course structure is complete for the present.

Another kind of academic progress and improvement has been even more important during the year 1964. Summer now stands possessed of the best balanced and, professionally, the most capable and forward-looking faculty the school has yet had. This is quite a tribute considering the fact that Summer lost, with retirement last June, Mr. Arthur Cole who had been a tower of professional and personal strength in the school for over a decade. Let us remember it is not buildings, not curricula, not services, not athletics and social functions that make a school — it is teachers — first, last and always.

I would be betraying my responsibility if I did not conclude

with a few words about the future. The school has reached a limit of growth dictated by the physical facilities — we can add no further courses — no further services — no further faculty because we have no further space. We have used up the attic, cellar, and shed. To get the space to satisfy the internal demands of the school and to satisfy the external demands such as accreditation we can do one of two things. We can add an eight room wing to the present building, or we can add a three year junior high school and convert Sumner into a three year senior high. From every academic point of view the junior high proposal without qualification is best.
