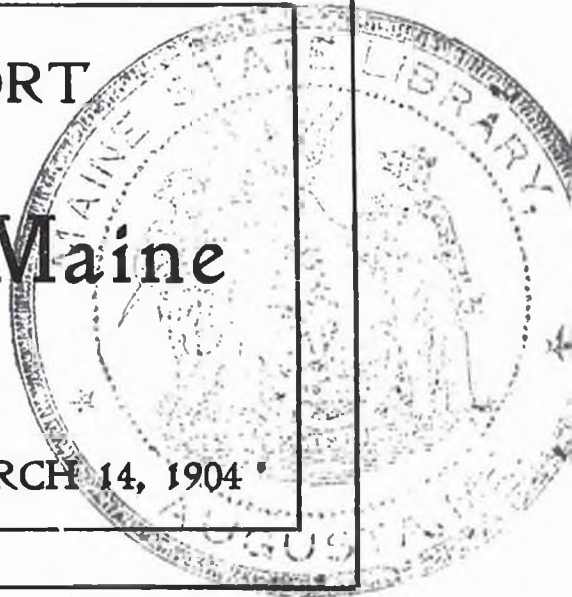

## Remarks by School Committee.

---

Fellow citizens: In submitting these remarks on the schools, we have departed from the custom of former years in two respects. First, as the selectmen have given the financial standing of the schools in their report, we do not consider it necessary to repeat it. Second, it does not seem to us to be for the best interest of the schools that the success or failure of each teacher should be commented on, as it can be of no benefit to schools and it could work the teacher's injury. The schools for the past year have in our opinion been successful, one school could have done better work had better order prevailed. It is useless to expect the best work of a school in which the order is not of the best. On account of having to run one extra school this year we were unable to give more than twenty-eight weeks in each school, which was two weeks less for each school than last year. Our schools have been well supplied with suitable text books, the teachers and the majority of the pupils doing their best to care for the same.

The Free High School is improving each year, our course of study has been approved by the State Superintendent. When the spring term is completed we will have given thirty-two and one-fifth weeks for the year. The school-houses are in need of considerable outlay of money, the out-buildings also need to be repaired. Appropriations for the schools and for repairs are recommended in the Selectmen's report.

## Report of Board of Health.

---

To the voters of the town of Bridgewater :

We, your Board of Health, beg to submit the following report for the year 1904. We had the misfortune in the summer, to have Scarlet Fever break out, first in the home E. C. Barrett with one case, F. J. Estabrook with one case, and E. E. Milliken with two cases. all about the same time.

After consultation with Dr. White who was in attendance at all the above cases, it was deemed safest to close the schools in the village for a short time for fear of a spreading of the disease. When it was fully apparent that there was no more danger, schools were reopened.

All of these places were properly quarantined, and thoroughly disinfected after the different patients were well.

Had a case of diphtheria at the home of Wm. McNinch with Dr. Schriver in attendance; place was promptly quarantined, and after a run of the disease which was light, the house was disinfected.

During the month of Feb. we had a breaking out of diphtheria at the Boundary Line, several cases at the home of H. McMullin, where there was one death, and at the home of John Stewart.

The home of H. McMullin being part on the New Brunswick side of the Line, I immediately notified the Board of



Health from that side, and we placed the house under quarantine, and we met there after they were well, and thoroughly disinfected the premises. The house being so large it was a very arduous task, and right here let me say that the Board of Health must be provided with something better for disinfecting purposes than we have at present. The home of John Stewart was also thoroughly disinfected. All the cases were under the skillful treatment of Dr. W. W. White, and no further cases have been reported.

Other than the cases reported the town has been in a very healthful condition as far as contagious diseases are concerned.
