Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Norridgewock:

I hereby present my third annual report of the condition and progress of the schools of this town. In these pages we have attempted to give a complete, though brief, outline of all school activities, both financial and scholastic. We respectfully commend to your attention, also, the report of the principal of the high school, which includes a summary of the work of the various departments of the secondary grades.

The following tabulation will serve to explain, on a comparative basis, the expenditures of the school dollar.

The consolidated financial statement, listing all receipts and expenditures, is worthy of your consideration. Total receipts for the closing year were approximately five hundred dollars greater than for the previous year, although the town appropriation was increased by a thousand dollars. Tuition receipts, decreased by five hundred and fifty dollars, account for this difference. The number of tuition students, from present indications, should be somewhat increased during the ensuing year, with a partial restoration, at least, of previous tuition receipts. The total of all school expenditures was approximately one hun-

dred and fifty dollars greater than during the previous year.

The closing of three rural schools, and the addition of only two teachers to the consolidated school effected a saving sufficient to nearly cover the added cost of conveyance facilities. It may also be interesting to note that during the past two years, two conveyance busses have been purchased and completely paid for, the saving on one route in one year almost covering the cost of one machine. Although the busses are not new, they have proved a decidedly economical investment, and are reducing conveyance costs. In accordance with State law, the citizens of the town must vote at the annual town meeting, this year, on the question of reopening or permanently closing the three rural schools temporarily closed last fall. The policy of consolidation, was begun some years ago when expenditures on the rural schools became necessary. In the intervening years the more distant schools have all been closed by town vote. The three schools over which the issue now arises are not in distant sections of the town. If they are to be reopened, it will be necessary to spend a considerable amount on the buildings to meet the requirements of the State Department of Health. Standard toilet facilities must be provided, and there are a number of other repairs that should be attended to if the buildings are to be made comfortable and sanitary.

The new building provides ample room for the number of pupils now enrolled. The fifth and sixth grade room is at present crowded, but within a short time this condition can be greatly improved, and we believe that better educational facilities can be provided here than in the eight grade school. Reopening the rural schools will also require the addition of three teachers, plus added fuel and janitor expense. These items should be given some consideration in deciding the issue.

As previously stated, the new building has made possible the introduction of a system which we believe to be proving its superiority. Each of the first four grades occupies one room, the fifth and sixth are together, and the junior high grades are provided for under the high school arrangement. The elementary teaching load, in all except the combined grades, is nearly standard. As a further improvement, made possible by the additional teachers and adequate room, a system of departmentalized teaching has been introduced, with instruction in art and music in every grade, at no appreciably increased expense. These are real advantages to every pupil, we believe, providing opportunities for the enrichment not only of school life, but of life in the years to follow.

While much has been accomplished during the past year, and through the generous cooperation of the citizens many decided improvements have been possible, there are yet some matters that need consideration. The upper elementary grades should have one additional teacher. This teacher could be provided on a basis whereby the State would pay a portion of the salary, thereby lessening the cost to the town. The service of such a teacher would add greatly to the efficiency of the upper grades, and would permit, at the same time, a more complete curriculum.

The school well, from which has been taken all the water used in the building, has recently been condemned by the Health authorities. Drinking water is at present being carried from a distance at considerable expense. After warm weather arrives, this arrangement will prove most unsatisfactory, and it would seem advisable, both for economy and convenience, to provide a permanent and satisfactory source of clean water.

The new building has not been painted, either inside or outside. One coat of paint, at least, should be put on as a protective measure.

In closing this report we would take the opportunity to thank the citizens of Norridgewock for their interest in the schools, and for the loyal manner in which they have supported the school program. The schools are for the benefit of the boys and girls, and investments in education are, in the final analysis, a direct investment in the citizenship of the community. We would extend our thanks to the teachers, who, by their unanimously loyal support have made possible the success of the past year. To the janitors, conveyance drivers, and all connected with the schools, we feel that much credit is due. We also express our appreciation of the loyal support of the school committee who, without hesitation, have given much to the schools in time and effort during the past year.

HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit the annual report of the principal of Norridgewock high school.

At the opening of school, September 9, the enrollment of one hundred forty-seven, compared with an enrollment of one hundred twenty-six on the opening date of the preceding year.

BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

The alterations made on the school building during the past summer have done much toward improving the physical conditions of the school plant. All basement class rooms have been eliminated and the present class rooms are well lighted, ventilated, and heated. The new laboratory has greatly facilitated instruction in science classes and also serves as a recitation room. The coat room is conveniently located on the first floor near all the class rooms and provides adequate rack space for the use of the high school students. The new heating unit with which the building has been provided appears to be one of the out-

standing features in the remodeled building. All of the rooms in the building have been supplied with sufficient heat, even on the coldest winter mornings and the assembly hall, one of the most difficult rooms in the plant to heat, has been very comfortable. This greatly increases the opportunities of the pupils for self-expression in dramatics, speaking, and particularly assembly exercises which take place twice a week during the first hour of school.

GIFTS

The Village Improvement Society was the donor to the school of an electric bell schedule and master clock which any school system might well be proud to possess. Such a system was much needed to stimulate orderliness and punctuality, and it adds greatly to the businesslike atmosphere which is one of the objectives of the school room.

The alumni of the school, as for several years past, donated the two five dollar prizes awarded at the prize speaking contest.

These gifts are deeply appreciated and we feel that many have the welfare of the school at heart.

The school has received a gift of twenty-five fiction books from the Bangor Public Library.

We wish to express thanks to those citizens who have so kindly contributed magazines and periodicals to the school.

DEPARTMENTS AND COURSES

Students in the upper four grades have received instruction in music one period per week and those in grades seven and eight two periods per week during the present school year. The objectives in teaching music are two-fold: First, to stimulate the understanding and enjoyment of the real values in music through every variety of contact with the art; second, to provide opportunities for training in actual performance.

Seventh and eighth grade pupils receive one period of instruction per week in art. Students in the upper four classes may elect art by joining the Art Club. All of the school posters are being made by the members of the Art Club, this year, as a club project.

Two courses of study, the General Course and the College Preparatory Course, are being offered to students in the upper four grades. All pupils in the seventh and eighth grades have the prescribed State course of study.

If the subjects now taught in the six grades are to be more efficiently administered and the alternation and rotation of subjects discarded, one more teacher would be needed to care for the extra classes.

The school has been granted the privilege of certifying students for admission to college without examination, and placed upon the list of accredited schools by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board.

HOME ECONOMICS

We have followed the usual curriculum of Home Economics, with only a few new features added. A class in Home Economics for boys was newly introduced in the fall. At the end of the unit on cooking, the boys served a dinner to their fathers.

The unit followed in child study has been a little different, in that, we have cooperated with the first grade teacher in actually observing and telling stories to the children.

The Junior-Senior girls have been sewing on woolen suits and bathrobes, and other groups on problems suited to their ages.

Our greatest disadvantage is that two of the classes are really too large for the room space.

MANUAL TRAINING

Manual Training has been offered to girls, this year, for the first time. Although there are only eight girls enrolled and these students spend only two periods a week in the shop, they are doing excellent work.

Much interest has been created this year in the making of toboggans. Six have been completed and their cost averages \$1.50. Another very good project is the oak study table which many boys are making. This project teaches the fundamentals of cabinet making and makes a very good addition to the home at a reasonable cost.

The expense of manual training per boy for the six years is very low but varies greatly with the size of the projects made in high school.

It is interesting to note that of the 82 boys enrolled in the six upper grades 80 are studying manual training.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Extra-curricular activities have given the students an opportunity to meet in such parliamentary groups as the Student Gov-

ernment Association, the Student Council, and in class meetings. Other activities include the Art Club, the Public Speaking Club, the Science Club, Class Assembly Groups, Dramatics, Debating, Orchestra, Tennis and Basketball.

Last spring three students represented the school at the State of Maine Speaking and Reading Contests held at the University of Maine. One student was sent to the Montgomery Prize Speaking Contest at Colby College and a fifth student spoke in the Spear Prize Speaking Contest held at Gardiner.

During the spring of 1935 the Student Council made a very careful survey of the point system as applied to extra-curricular activities in secondary schools. A plan which embodied the best features of the point system was adopted by the Student Government Association and the first awards were made at the close of the school year, 1935.

This year the Student Government Association has instituted the Norridgewock High School Honor Society, which is patterned largely after the National Honor Society. Students may be elected to the honor society from the senior class, at or near the close of the school year, by a joint vote of the faculty and Student Government Association. Students may be elected to the honor society if they have shown outstanding qualifications in character, scholarship, leadership, and service during their four years of high school.

WHAT REMAINS TO BE DONE

This report has mentioned several ways in which the school has been improved by renovations and alterations during the past summer; there still exists however many conditions which call for correction if the school is to be brought up to the comparative standards of the average American secondary school. First and foremost is the urgent need for library books; so that the students may acquire the fundamental habits of self education. It may be mentioned here that the traveling libraries put out by the State Library at Augusta have been used during the past year, with only partial success.

Equipment for the science laboratory is another item which calls for careful consideration when we pause to reflect that we are educating boys and girls to step forth to wrest a living from a world which is passing through a scientific age. A small amount of equipment has been purchased during the past two years but only a beginning has been made.

Other needs include a supply of suitable drinking water; fur-

niture for the laboratory and the remodeled class rooms; a piano for music instruction, and playground equipment for the lower grades.

I sincerely hope that in this coming year more citizens may visit the school, become better acquainted with the teachers and learn of the work and problems of the school.

The accomplishments of the school reflect credit not only upon the faculty and students, but also, in no less degree, upon our school officials and upon the citizens of our community. It is the united efforts of all that make possible our progress.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

To C. E. BOONE, Constable for the Town of Norridgewock, in
the County of Somerset. GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Norridgewock, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet in the Town Hall in said town on Monday, the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1936, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to elect all town officers and to transact all other town business as herein enumerated in the articles of the town warrant. For the election of officers the polls will be open immediately after the election of a moderator and remain open until three o'clock in the afternoon. The transaction of other town business will begin at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

Art. 1—To choose a moderator.

Art. 2—To attend to the reports of the several town officers and take such action thereon as may be desired.

Art. 3—To see what action the town will take relative to determining the salaries to be paid to municipal officers and appointees, to wit: Selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor, road commissioner, town clerk, auditor, treasurer, member of the school board, fire chief, fire warden, and to raise a sum of money for same and pass all necessary votes.

Art. 4—To see if the town will vote to fix the date when each tax-payer's tax shall become due and the date when the collector shall settle with the town, and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for office help and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 6—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the remaining rural schoolhouses and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 7—To see what sum the town will appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sect. 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes 1930 or under the provisions of Sect. 3, Chap. 173, Public Laws 1935.

Art. 8—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for the maintenance of 50-50 highways.

Art. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Art. 10—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$809.00 for maintenance of improved sections of third class roads or to be used in conjunction with the state apportionment for the construction of third class roads.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will raise for building and repairing roads, bridges and culverts for the ensuing year.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing and building sidewalks and street drains.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray expenses of fire department for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the contingent fund.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the free public library and books for same.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the payment of bonded debt and interest thereon.

Art. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of street lights.

Art. 19—To see whether the town will vote to amend the vote passed under Article 3 of the warrant for the town meeting held by adjournment on Dec. 7, 1935, so to read as follows:

Voted: That the Town of Norridgewock purchase a new automobile fire engine and pump for the sum of Sixty-five hundred dollars (\$6500) and that the Selectmen be authorized and instructed to purchase said fire engine and pump for and in behalf of the town, and that said Selectmen be authorized and empowered to sign three promissory notes of the town therefor, payable to the vendor of said fire engine and pump, to secure the payment of said sum of Sixty-five hundred (6500) dollars, together with interest on the unpaid balance at the rate of six per-centum per annum, so that the whole amount of Sixty-five hundred (6500) dollars and interest thereon shall be paid off within two years from the date of delivery of said fire engine and pump; and further, as a part of the consideration for the said purchase of fire engine and pump, said Selectmen are authorized and empowered to receive from the vendor and hold under the terms of a written lease a fire engine and pumper to provide temporary fire protection, and to execute such a lease in behalf of the town to the vendor; and that all acts and contracts, toward the purchase of a fire engine and pump undertaken by the Selectmen in consequence of a vote taken under Art. 3 of the Town Warrant on Dec. 7th, 1935, as hereby ratified and approved.

Art. 20—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to gravel road from the Atkinson school house to Horace-Jones' residence.

Art. 21—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to improve upper Main street; from Peets Corner to top of Cemetery Hill.

Art. 22—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town. Such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 23—To see if the town will vote authorizing and instructing its Selectmen to issue its note or a series of notes, or its interest bearing town order or orders, for the purpose of paying or refunding in whole or in part the outstanding indebtedness of the town, which now has or may hereafter become due, and if so to determine the amount of said note or notes, order or orders, rate of interest and terms, and the manner of the execution of said note or notes, order or orders.

Art. 24—To see what sum the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 25—To see if the town will vote to appoint a sexton for the cemeteries.

Art. 26—To see if the town will raise the sum of \$500.00 to gravel road on Oak Hill from Fletcher's Corner to T. G. Abbott's.

Art. 27—To see if the sum of \$153.00, or more, will be raised for school nursing in the town of Norridgewock under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.

Art. 28—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to repair bridge on County road leading from Mercer Road to Wilder Hill road.

Art. 29—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay for gravel, culverts and dynamite on Sandy River road.

Art. 30—To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of free high school, common schools, text books, supplies, lights, compensation of the superintendent of schools, insurance on school buildings, repairs of schoolhouses, vocational education, compensation of the school physician, together with all incidental expenses not specifically mentioned in accordance with the provisions of Chap. 19, P.L. 1930.

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote to agree on the following abatements to be made to those who voluntarily pay their 1936 taxes, other than automobile and poll taxes, to the tax collector: three percent if paid on or before June 1, 1936; two percent if paid on or before August 1, 1936; one percent if paid on or before October 1, 1936.

Art. 32—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to gravel Beech hill road leading from Lombard's Corner to Withee schoolhouse, so-called.

Art. 33—To see what action the town will take in regard to raising a sum of money to take over mortgage of Fred Knight's farm and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 34—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to buy a road machine and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 35—To see if the town will vote that whenever the warrant for any town meeting contains an article under which an appropriation of money be made, such article shall be consid-

ered by the Committee of Ten and its recommendations reported to such meeting. Such committee of ten shall be appointed annually by the Selectmen within fourteen days after the annual town meeting and shall be subject to the call of the Selectmen for advisory purposes.

Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to gravel Wilder Hill road and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 37—To see if the town will vote to close three rural schools, namely, the Fredrick, Oak Hill and Atkinson, so-called.

Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build a ferry boat for Sandy River and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 39—To elect a tax collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 40—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,233.95 to pay on snow plow and tractor, and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 41—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,300.00 to pay on fire engine and pumper and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Selectmen's office, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on Saturday, Feb. 29th, 1936, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.
