



REPORT OF

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

COMMON SCHOOLS.

All of our schools have completed a year of successful work. It has been a pleasure to visit and examine these schools and to find that in all of them real progress was being made. It must be admitted that some of our pupils are not as far advanced as children of their age should be, but in most cases it has been found that the pupils take a lively interest in their schools and do faithful work.

On the whole the attendance for the year has been good. In some cases there has been far too much tardiness and in a few cases too great irregularity. Parents are reminded that in order to have the best schools, we must have regular and punctual attendance. At Liberty Corner the number enrolled has been too small for the best results.

The teachers have all done good work. They have been earnest, faithful and devoted to the progress and welfare of their pupils. I believe thoroughly in Normal training. We have been fortunate this year in securing Normal graduates for part of our teaching force. The town owes an expression of gratitude to our own Normal graduates who have taught for us during the year for less pay than they might have received elsewhere.

The school year has numbered twenty-seven weeks. This is not enough. It is to be hoped that twenty-nine or thirty weeks will be provided in the future. It must be borne in mind that as the number

of pupils in town decreases, the amount which we receive from the State also decreases. This year the State appropriation which we received was much smaller than last year's amount. This fact must be remembered when we make our own appropriation.

In the financial report of the schools, it will be noted that the school balance has been reduced. This is largely accounted for by the fact that two of our schools were in session when the report was made last year. We had to pay about \$150 on last year's account while at present we have outstanding bills to the amount of only about \$30.

The experiment of centralizing our schools has been tried on a larger scale than before, and with very gratifying results. The pupils of the districts, the Deering, the Fessenden and the East Denmark have all attended school at Jordan's Corner. Conveyance has been found cheaper than the maintenance of separate schools, and the marked success of the combined school ought to convince all that the policy of centralization may well be extended.

Schoolhouse repairs have been in charge of the School Committee. Much good work has been done, much more needs to be done. Our schoolhouses ought to be made both comfortable and attractive.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The attendance in the high school this year has so far been small, too small for the best results, but faithful and earnest work has been done by both teacher and pupils. It is to be regretted that a larger number of pupils have not availed themselves of the opportunities which this school offers.
