Warrant for Town Meeting

To Ellis F. Blake, a constable in the town of Denmark, County of Oxford, and State of Maine, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Denmark, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1927, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3. To choose a board of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Auditor, and Treasurer for the year ensuing.
 - Art. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the year ensuing.
- Art. 5. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for a term of three years.
- Art. 6. To choose one or more Road Commissioners for the year ensuing.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or more Road Commissioners for the year ensuing.
 - Art. 8. To choose one or more Fire Wards for the year ensuing.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will elect or authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Cemetery Commission, consisting of one or more persons whose duties shall consist of caring for the cemeteries and burial lots, including the graves of old soldiers now in care of the town, for the year ensuing.
- Art. 10. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 11. To vote the compensation of the tax collector for the year ensuing.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of town charges for the year ensuing.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of street lights for the year ensuing.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of snow bills for the year ensuing.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$2,665.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 21, Chapter 25, Revised Statutes, amended by Chapter 258, Public Laws of 1917.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways for the year ensuing, under the provisions of Sections 9-18 of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the support of Common Schools for the year ensuing.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.
- · Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of school supplies and text books for the year ensuing.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of a free high school for the year ensuing.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the care of the soldiers' monument, for the year ensuing.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$10 for Memorial Day observances for the year ensuing.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote that poll taxes be due and payable May 1st, under the provisions of Chapter 163, of the Public Laws of 1917.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the control of the white pine blister rust.

- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to meet the demands on the Treasury when a deficiency occurs.
- Art. 31. To see if the town wishes to give a discount on taxes, if so, to fix the date and amount of discount on same.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to use the unexpended balance of Benton Bridge, amount of \$624.19 for cutting bushes for the year ensuing, on town roads.
- Art. 33. To see what action the town will take in regard to an adequate water supply at the High School building and to see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for that purpose.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154, Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157 of the Public Laws of 1919, for the construction of a State Aid Highway, through the towns of Hiram, Denmark and Bridgton, beginning at Hiram Village at the Pequawket Trail and extending in a northerly direction over the present designated state aid road to the Denmark town line, thence in a northerly direction over Denmark state aid road No. 2, to Denmark Village, thence in an easterly direction over state aid designation No. 1 to the Bridgton town line; thence over Bridgton's designated state aid road to the state highway "B" in Bridgton Village.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the town house on Monday, the seventh day of March, 1927, at 9 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

During the past year we have received pauper notices from Naples in case of Lee Adams, and City of Hallowell in case of Jessie Blaisdell. We have denied their pauper residence as Denmark, and the pauper cases still exist under those conditions.

We have placed in Warrant Article 34, which is known as the 3 town act, if Denmark should raise \$2,665.00, the state would give us \$9,594. The same amount would be received by Hiram from the state. This gives Denmark and Hiram each \$12,259.00. Bridgeon Joint Fund (town and state) would be \$13,010.00.

These amounts would be expended on the road from Bridgton to Hiram bridge. Bridgton has about two miles to build, Hiram has two miles and Denmark has about 4 miles. The selectmen have a road resolve for \$1,500 before the legislature for road construction to be used with State aid road money on State aid road for the year 1927. There remains \$624.19 unexpended from Benton Bridge fund, which will be paid Treasurer, about Feb. 25, 1927.

Report of the

Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Denmark:

Herewith my fourth annual report of the progress, condition and needs of the Schools of the Town of Denmark.

Schools opened Sept. 7, 1926, with the following teachers:

East, Sadie L. Ingalls, Denmark.

Primary, Isabel Hughey, Lisbon Falls.

Grammar, Millicent Marsh, Lower Five Islands, N. S.

High, Principal, Walter K Lindsey, Jonesboro.

High, Assistant, Freeman Sanborn, Denmark, substituting.

The regularly engaged assistant came on the morning train and went home on the evening train of the same day. Mr. Sanborn toom the position temporarily. This attitude of Mr. Sanborn in being always ready and willing to assist us in tight places, is very much appreciated. After a short time we employed Miss Doris Hill of Brownfield. We feel that we should state that Mrs. Katherine Rolfe, our assistant for the last three years, had decided to accept the position for another year, but late in the summer, was compelled to enter the hospital and was unable to recover quickly enough to begin her work. Denmark High School will always remember Mrs. Rolfe with much love and gratitude. Although she is no longer its assistant teacher, yet her influence and her skill will be felt for years to come.

All of our teachers this year have shown a remarkable spirit of loyalty to their work, that is, each one of them is showing the true professional spirit, which in its best sense, means the spirit that instills in a teacher a live realization and an abiding love in her work and for her boys and girls

The Primary School was divided about as planned. We have Grades I, II, III and IV in the Primary School and V, VII and VIII in the Grammar School. There is no Grade VI at the Village this year. As we had hoped, this arrangement seems to have solved the difficulties with which we have been contending. Since it is yet new, we should reserve our final judgment, but thus far it has borne results a expected and we cannot too highly recommend its continuance.

The East School, under the motherly care and skillful instruction of Mrs Ingalls, continues to provide, in its excellent building, unusual rural school privileges. The support which that community lends to that school in all its various interests and public functions is most commendable. It is the most marked of any with which we have ever come in contact.

CONVEYANCE

It will be remembered that in our last report we mentioned some difficulties with conveyance matters. This year, thus far, we have had none.

GIFTS

The East, Primary and High Schools received the sum of \$25.00 each from Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Cobb. This very material expression of loyalty and interest from Mr. and Mrs. Cobb is entirely consistent with their attitude toward the boys and girls of Denmark and is very gratefully acknowledged, as is also a ten volume set of Compton's Illustrated Encyclopedia for the High School Library from Camp Walden.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

Dr. Hebb has not as yet made his inspection this year. While we do not know the reason for this situation, we hope that he will soon do so. His inspections are worth many times their cost, and if properly followed up, will result in much physical improvement and respect for the laws of good health.

MAINTENANCE

The most extensive item of improvement this year has been the grading of the Village school grounds. This work was done for the School Committee, under the direction of the Highway Department and an excellent job was accomplishel. The expense was kept within the appropriation for that purpose. The grounds were first graded and then covered with a course of clayey gravel. Over this was laid a course of fine gravel. When this has been packed down by use, we ought to have a clean and attractive school ground. The topping gravel was given to the town for this purpose by the late W. W. Berry and by Mr. Elwood Pingree. Galvanized iron conductors leading to an

underground pipe were hung on the front eaves of the Village School building and a short conductor was hung over the bulkhead doors at the East building. General maintenance repairs were made as required. An outdoor electric gong was installed at the Village building. This gong is connected with the service wires and there will be no expense for batteries.

Some of the trees on the school grounds, which were slightly injured by the fire, bear dead limbs. These limbs should be pruned away to improve the appearance of the trees and to obviate danger. Other trees badly damaged or killed have been removed.

The matter of a sufficient water supply is still before us. The well is not deep enough to insure a constant supply. Either the well should be made deeper or else a new source of supply should be located and made available. I am of the opinion that the well would furnish a sufficient quantity of water if made somewhat deeper and that this would be the less expensive solution. This matter is pressing and is earnestly brought to your attention for the second time.

Our schools are making definite progress. Our aim should be to continually increase the efficiency of our schools to the end that our pupils may attain an education which shall better prepare them for a useful, prosperous, happy and worthwhile citizenship. School efficiency, in these times, should mean moral, spiritual and material efficiency.

Report of the High School Principal

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Committee, and Citizens of the Town of Denmark:

I take this opportunity of presenting to you a general report of the activities of Denmark High School for the year 1926-1927, to date.

Denmark High School opened Monday, Sept. 7, 1926, with an enrollment of twenty-three students. Mr. Freeman Sanborn assisted during the first two weeks until Miss Doris Hill of Brownfield was secured as the regular assistant. Denmark people should feel fortunate in being able to secure Miss Hill. She is very much interested in her work and is well liked by the students.

The attendance for the fall term and first half of the winter term has been over 95 per cent., which I consider very good as most of the students have to walk long distances. The scholastic standing of the school is very good. Nearly one-third of the students are taking the College Preparatory Course while others are taking the regular English Course. Everyone is working to improve the standard of the school with the idea in mind that a diploma means hard, honest effort on their part.

The Senior Class was busy during the fall term in securing funds for graduation. They gave a dance and supper the first of the year and also several socials. With the help of the other members of the school, the play, "Valley Farm" was presented the last of the fall term. It was played at home and in several of the neighboring towns. The play was a financial success and the students gave a creditable performance.

The students enjoyed a ride to Hiram the second week of school. We have had several pleasant socials at the schoolhouse and Grange Hall. We wish to thank the members of the Grange for their help on our parent-student get-together social.

Basket Ball has been a popular sport this year. The boys and girls are each represented by a team. This has been a pleasant way by which to become acquainted with the students in the neighboring schools.

General conditions around the high school are favorable. We have a good supply of wood and there has been no trouble in keeping the building heated. The fall rains gave us a good supply of water for our well. However we were without water most of the fall. The town ought to take some action towards obtaining an all year supply of water for with our plumbing equipment a good water supply is essential.

The laboratory is well equipped for Chemistry and General Science classes. The laboratory, being small, has made it necessary to carry on group instead of individual experiments. However, I believe that better results are obtained by having a few students perform the experiment before the class with the others observing and entering the general discussion. Running water would be an essential addition to our laboratory and could be put in at ery small expense.

The school library has some very good reference books. A new set of Encyclopedias has been added this year. We also have a set of books from the traveling State library which have been very useful for additional reference work.

I wish to thank the Superintendent and School Committee for their interest and cooperation. They have been willing to offer encouragement and help at all times. I wish also to extend my thanks to the citizens of Denmark for their loyal support in all of our school affairs.
