To J. H. Lurvey, Esq., one of the constables of the town of Island Falls.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby notified to warn the inhabitants of said town of Island Falls qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Pettengill's Hall in said Island Falls on Monday, the twenty-fifth day of March, A. D. 1918, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to elect three selectmen and overseers of the poor, to act one for one year, one for two years and one for three years, the members thereafter to be elected for three year terms.
 - Art. 4. To choose all
- Art. 5. To see what a repairs of roads and brid

aise for

- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in

addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, high-ways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money and how much, to be expended on the "Hurrican" road, so called.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow roads.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of light road machine and drag.
- * Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building a bridge across Fish Stream; and how same shall be raised.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the, town will vote to raise for town expenses.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town debt.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for payment of interest.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for abatements and discounts.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to elect a special Municipal Board of "Mothers' Aid" to consist of the overseers of the poor, exofficio, and two women members, one to be elected for two years and one for three years, and thereafter for three year terms.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemetery.

- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for hydrant rental.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to clear the balance of cemetery lot and dispose of the lumber and wood.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire department.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable. And will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent. Also fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.
- Art. 24. To see what sum the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the same.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars to be expended by the board of health for the suppression and prevention of tuberculosis.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will require the collector of taxes to settle in full with the town and fix the date therefor and to fix his compensation.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the town.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for common schools.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of school houses.

- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for insurance, apparatus and supplies.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for text books.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Free High School.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music in the schools.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for manual training, one-third of which shall be raised by taxation.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for domestic science, one-third of which shall be raised by taxation.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the old pest house: Also to authorize the selectmen to sell the Wing school house.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to pay the members of the school board for time actually expended in the performance of their duties.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to ratify the doings of the selectmen whereby they abated the taxes published in town report of March, 1918.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as published by the selectmen, March, 1918.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to lay out a road near the B. & A. Station for benefit of Albert McNally and others; and if so to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for said road.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Pettengill's Hall, in said town, on the 25th day of March, 1918, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

To the Citizens of Island Falls:

Since our last annual town meeting our nation has been called upon to bear its part in the struggle of the greatest world war in all history. The call has come to every citizen of Island Falls and to every boy and girl in the schools to help and the spirit of good citizenship and loyalty has been splendid in all of the schools and especially in the grades. The scholars have responded to the call of the government in the work of the Junior Red Cross and the purchase of Thrift and War Stamps. They have at least made a splendid beginning but we earnestly urge that the work be continued unceasingly for the remainder of the year. The aid given by a part of the teachers in this work is especially commendable.

It has been a year of unforeseen difficulties and increased expenditure of money. Material, supplies, wood, everything we needed has been bought on a high market. Owing to the unprecedented cold weather our wood supply for the year was nearly exhausted by the first of February. Our janitor who has served us faithfully on half time for so many years tendered his resignation near the opening of the fall term and we were obliged to hire another on full time, thus making an increased expenditure. We also paid slightly higher wages for teachers.

We have met these conditions, kept our schools in session, maintained the usual number of weeks, employed an exceptionally strong teaching force, had a good school attendance, furnished all necessary supplies and equipment, and kept up the standard of the schools and we are glad to report that they are going unusually smooth and satisfactory with a splendid spirit of study and close application to work.

The outlook for the coming year is not altogether promising. All school expenditures must be materially increased. Teachers wages will be higher owing largely to the scarcity of teachers as so many young ladies are going into government work or in offices, and in many other desirable positions opened to them. The State Department reports a shortage of from five to six hundred in the State for the coming year. Glen W. Starkey, former State Superintendent of Schools, says, that towns should not question the appropriations asked

for this year by the committees, which shows that the conditions confronting us are the same as in other places. Every effort is being made to increase the teaching force in the State.

In these strenuous times and under abnormal conditions we believe the citizens of Island Falls will be willing to meet the situation and make whatever sacrifices necessary to keep up the present high standard of our schools and give the boys and girls the one thing of greatest value to them, an educational training.

We wish to express our thanks for the many kindnesses shown the schools during the past year and especially to those who have given their money freely to help in the various activities and associations of the schools.

Meeting of joint board for consideration of petition of municipal officers of Island Falls for State and County aid in the re-construction of Fish Stream Bridge.

Frank A. Peabody read the petition, notice of hearing and stated that the appearances were a sufficient guarantee of the receipt of notice.

On motion of Mr. Deering, seconded by Mr. Thurlough, Frank A. Peabody was unanimously elected Chairman of the Joint Board.

On motion of Mr. Ayer, seconded by Mr. Deering, Paul D. Sargent was unanimously elected Secretary of the Joint Board.

It was unanimously voted that this bridge is on a main thoroughfare.

It was unanimously voted that public necessity and convenience require the rebuilding of this bridge.

The type of bridge was next discussed. Engineer Jones reported that an eighty-five foot span with twenty-foot roadway, concrete

floor, steel truss on two concrete abutements, with pile foundations, would cost thirteen thousand three hundred and forty-one dollars and the two concrete spans forty-two feet six inches each, with a twenty-foot roadway, on concrete abutments and piers on pile foundation, would cost thirteen thousand five hundred thirty-one dollars.

The selectmen were not prepared at this time to enter into definite arrangements for the construction of either one of these structures. It appears to be advisable to let this matter rest until the selectmen can put the question before the town at the next annual town meeting.

On motion of Mr. Ayer, seconded by Mr. Thurlough, it was voted to adjourn subject to the call of the State Highway Commission.

Adjourned at ten forty-five A. M.
