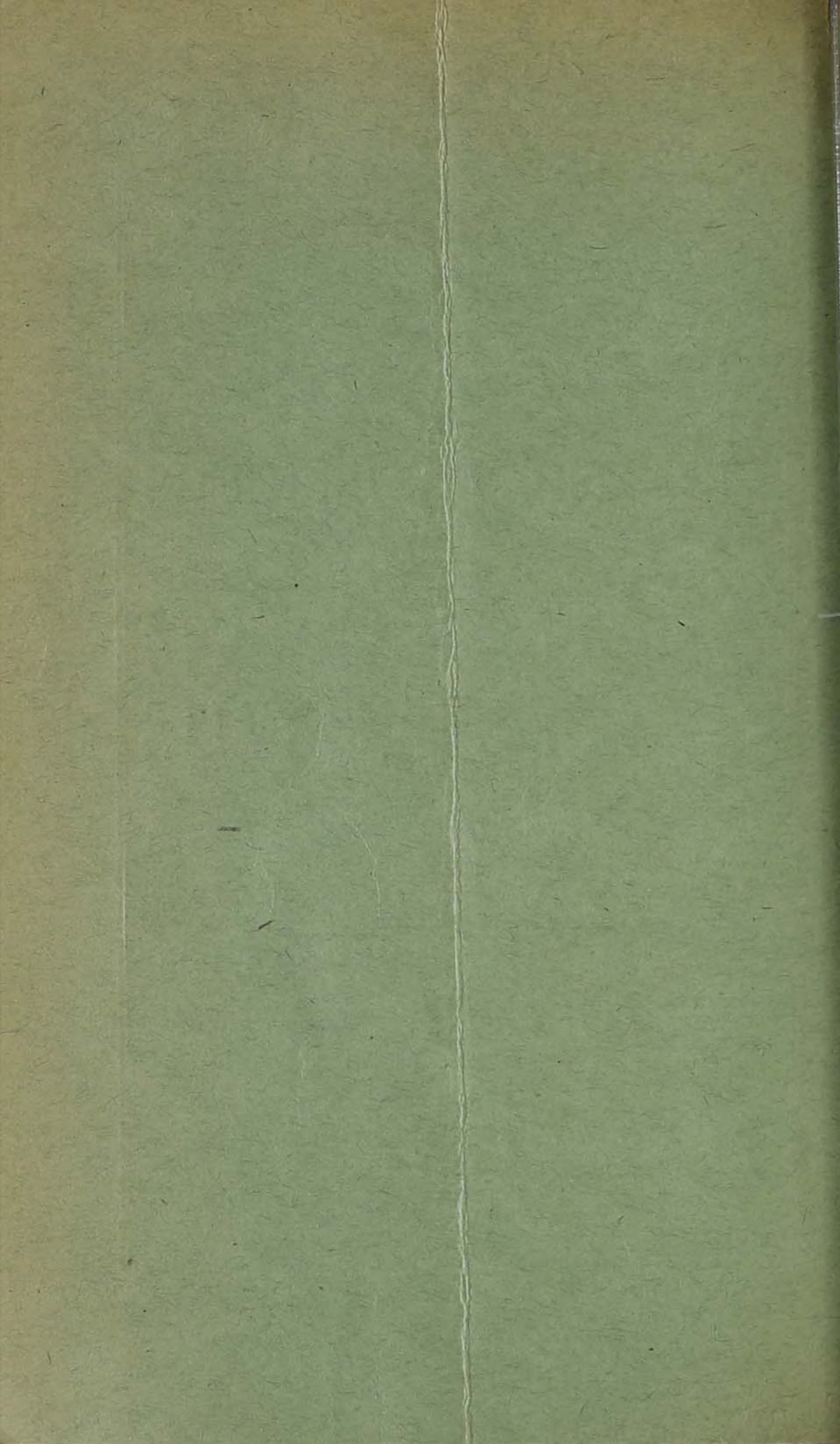

School Report

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens
of the Town of Island Falls:

HIGH SCHOOLS

We have three new teachers on the high school faculty this year. Mr. John W. Abbott, the new principal, is a graduate of Bates College and has had four years of successful experience as a principal before coming here. Miss Lyndell Smith, teacher of English and French, is a graduate of the University and has taught one year. Miss Mabel Prince, Commercial teacher, graduated from the Maine School of Commerce last spring. All of these teachers are doing excellent work in the high school as are those teachers who remained with us from last year. I believe that we have the strongest high school faculty that we have had since I have been connected with the schools of the town.

The six-year plan, which was put into effect with the opening of the fall term, is working out fully as well as was expected. The school has an enrollment of one hundred and seventy-two, which is an increase of twenty over last year. We expect that nearly two hundred will be enrolled next year. If all special teachers are dropped, the work of the remaining teachers will be more difficult as all special teachers have taken

study periods and done some work in the outside activities of the school. Those who have taken the subjects given by these special teachers must be given other subjects to take the place of those dropped. Four teachers will have to do, on account of the larger enrollment, the greater part of the work that seven are now doing.

The School Committee feel that it will be necessary to discontinue the Commercial Course in order to cut down expenses.

On referring to the financial statement given at the close of this report it will be seen that the High School Account is overdrawn to the amount of \$376.17 not including the fuel purchased for the coming year. Of this amount \$176.01 was carried forward from last year and the remainder is due to a decrease in the amount of money allotted to this account from the State School Fund and to a decrease in tuition received.

COMMON SCHOOLS

We have no new teachers in the common schools of the town this year. All teachers have done very satisfactory work and all grades have made good progress in spite of the large enrollment per grade. The average number of pupils per teacher in the six lower grades and Sub-Primary is forty-four.

Miss Merriman, who has done noble service in the schools of this town for many years, has decided to retire at the close of the spring term. As a vacancy will therefore exist, in the interest of economy, the School Committee have decided to discontinue this grade beginning with the fall term.

The School Committee recommend again that the Barker Ridge School be closed and the pupils conveyed to the village schools. With the new conveyance promised by the State Department of Education this will mean a saving to the town of about six hundred and fifty dollars annually.

Due to reductions in the State School Funds and to an increase in the number of pupils who had to be conveyed the Common School Account is overdrawn approximately five hundred dollars more than at the close of last year. Were it not for reductions which will be made the town would have to raise for common schools at least eight hundred dollars more than a year ago. When voting for money for the coming year it should be remembered that whatever reductions are made will not take effect until the fall term. Also, that the town will probably not receive any Equalization Fund from the State. The amount of this fund was \$432.00 and is usually given for the purpose of giving increases in teachers' salaries and maintaining those increases already given.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION

The question of continuing the Industrial Education courses will, I understand, come up at Town Meeting. These courses have been carried on this year as successfully as in any year that the schools have been under my supervision. There are fifty-seven pupils enrolled in Manual Training and seventy in Domestic Science.

The cost to the town this year for these courses was approximately nine hundred dollars including the supplies used. About one hundred dollars was expended for supplies for each course. The amount received from the State for these courses was \$1,433.35. The teachers' salaries for the coming year at a reduction of ten per cent would amount to about \$725. If these courses are continued, \$350 must be raised for Manual Training and \$275 for Domestic Science to cover teachers' salaries. The subsidy which will probably be received from the State for these courses is \$1,500 divided as follows: \$833.33 for Manual Training and \$666.67 for Domestic Science.

In conclusion, may I state that good schools depend to a large extent on good teachers. A too drastic reduction in teachers' salaries can only result in less efficient teachers being employed and a lowering of the standards of our schools.

To C. M. Berry one of the Constables of the Town of
Island Falls in said county and State.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Island Falls qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said Town on Monday the 21st day of March A. D. 1932, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose a board of three Selectmen, and all other necessary Town Officers.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will elect a Road Commissioner, or leave his appointment to the Selectmen.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of common schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor service and conveyance.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Free High school.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Text Books, Insurance, Lights, Apparatus and Supplies.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to suspend the following courses in the public schools: First, Manual Training; second, Domestic Science.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the course of Manual Training.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the course of Domestic Science.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for General Government, as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Fire Inspector and also Miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the following: First, Street Lighting, second, Hydrant Rental.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for health and sanitation as follows: Health Officer, Anti-Tuberculosis Society, School Physician.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of Maine as amended.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of roads, highways and bridges, upon the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25

of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter 258, Public Laws of 1917.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for patrolling State highways and State Aid highways under the provisions of Sections 8 and 17 of Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the following: First, Mother's Aid; second, Support of Poor.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the maintenance of the Poor Farm.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for principal of Town Debt.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for interest on Town Debt.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money for and in behalf of the town in anticipation of taxes, and to renew notes given for money borrowed heretofore, and to borrow money for any other legal purpose not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$18,000.00. Also to see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sign notes or any necessary evidence of said indebtedness and deliver the same for and in behalf of the town for the purpose aforesaid.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm as debt of the town the sum of \$8,000.00 in notes now held by the Katahdin Trust Co., and \$2,000.00 now held by G. W. York, and to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to execute in the name and behalf of the town any renewal of said notes.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for abatements and discounts.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery of and possession of such parcels of real estate as has been conveyed to the inhabitants of said town for non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen for such sums as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefore, to sell and convey all the rights, title and interest in and to such parcels of real estate bid in at tax sales, as the town has acquired under said tax deeds.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the same.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to fix a time when property taxes are due and payable, and will vote to make any discount on taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what percent. Also to fix the rate of interest to be added upon taxes unpaid.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to have its tax collector settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection, and to fix a time therefor.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to have its Tax Collector accept town orders in payment of taxes.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Tax Collector to proceed to enforce the lien for unpaid taxes assessed the ensuing year, by suit at law rather than by taking tax deeds therefor.

Art. 33. To see what department of the town expenditures the excise tax on automobiles shall be applied to.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$144.00 interest on School Fund.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of school houses.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$92.00 for the maintenance of third class roads.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to co-operate with the adjoining towns in the removal of snow, during the season of 1932 and 1933, and to apply to the State for aid for such purposes, and are further authorized to use such money from the appropriation from roads and bridges as may be necessary to carry said snow removal in effect.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to elect a lady member on the board of Mothers' Aid.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen whereby they have abated certain taxes as appeared in town report.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Barker-Ridge school.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports as printed.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Grange Hall, March 21st, at Nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters and hearing applications for those claiming a right to vote.
