School Report

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOL'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens
of Island Falls:

I herewith submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools, enclosing with it the report made by the Principal and by the School Physician.

These are stringent times and the school department is fully aware of the seriousness of the present tax situation. This coupled with the greatly decreased price realized from farm and lumber products has brought us to the pass where the breaking point is not far removed. The innocent victim of this vicious situation is today's school child.

The connecting link between this child and the source of his education—the tax payer—is the superintendent. The head of your school system recognizes the double duty that falls upon his position. Duty to the child, and duty to the taxpayer.

COMMON SCHOOLS

Island Falls educates its children in the common schools for the remarkably low cost of 14 cents per day. The yearly cost of education in the United States last year was over \$90 per pupil. Maine's average was \$65.29. Island Falls educates its pupils for \$35.65. This low cost is brought about by the large pupil-load carried by each teacher and the consolidation of all our pupils to the one central school plant.

In spite of the heavy teaching load,—each teacher handling fifty pupils—these teachers have found the time and energy to keep up fine work of serving hot noon-day lunches. The sincere thanks of this department is expressed to the Katahdin and the Pine Needle clubs which have furnished the financial support without which these lunches could not have been offered.

HIGH SCHOOL

Little needs be said by the Superintendent about this department as the following report from Principal Abbott covers the school in careful detail. The imperative need of an additional teacher in the school must be again emphasized, however. This additional teacher would necessitate an increased appropriation of but \$700 for the high school. No human group of four teachers can carry on a full secondary school program where they have to handle nearly 200 pupils.

FINANCES

The finances of this department are in good shape. We came through this year without any overdrafts and had \$1100 to apply on the \$2500 overdraft of the past year. In addition nothing that was necessary to the education of the pupils was neglected. This record could not have been reported without the whole-hearted support of the teachers. They are, one and all, loyal and capable and I feel that we are fortunate in being able to keep the force as it is with the lowered wages we are now paying and the heavy teaching load the teachers must control.

Island Falls is a fine town in which to work and live. Speaking for the entire school group, I wish to express our sincerest appreciation of the co-operation rendered us by the School Board, Town Officials and Parents.

DENTAL INSPECTION

Dr. Fayette Spratt this year continued the fine work he has done in the past in educating the children of our schools on the value of regular care of the teeth and the importance of a regular inspection of the teeth by a dentist.

Each child in the schools was given a free dental inspection. Dr. Spratt emphasized the importance of the daily use of the tooth brush. Pupils whose teeth needed care were told how the neglect of such care would lead to the loss of the teeth; pupils whose mouths were in good condition were complimented on the pride they took in this important matter. The continued practice of this annual inspection by a dentist is bound to result in lasting good to the pupils.

It is recommended that the town appropriate some amount from the general government account to reimburse the Doctor for his efforts in this work. He has bought the necessary materials for these inspections from his own money and as far as can be learned from office records, has never received back any of this money from the town.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:—

The following report of your six-year high school for the year 1932-1933 is respectfully submitted:

School opened on September 26 with the largest enrollment in the history of the town. During the year, 182 students have been registered with the enrollment by classes as follows:

With the faculty reduced from seven members to four this year it was necessary to revise the courses of study. We were able to provide the College, the Latin-Scientific, and the General Courses. We have maintained our class "A" rating, though our teacher-pupil ratio has been about 1 to 45 as compared with the state-wide average of 1 to 21 and the maximum of 1 to 30 as recommended by the State Department of Education. We were also able to provide commercial instruction for the eight seniors, who had previously started the commercial course, as a result of the generous offer of free instruction made by Miss Glennie Greene.

A new demerit system was inaugurated at the beginning of the year as a means of maintaining satisfactory discipline with our small staff of instructors. It has proved entirely successful and is generally regarded by pupils as fundamentally fair and practical. It has helped to reduce the need of faculty supervision during study periods and that in turn has enabled instructors to do more effective teaching. Monitors have been appointed to assume certain responsibilities which were formerly carried by instructors and the results of this have been most favorable.

Considerable time has been devoted to our extra-curricular program. Public speaking and debating have received much attention. Many assembly programs have been arranged and carried out by pupils. The reading of worthwhile literature has been encouraged and the use of material on the reading tables, for recreation as well as reference, has been very gratifying.

An attempt has been made to increase the social life and training of the pupils, and, while time for supervising such activities has been limited, considerable progress has been made and pupils have responded with enthusiasm. Much more progress in this direction could be made if the present teaching-load of instructors could be reduced.

A physical education program is being carried out which not only promises to prepare good material for future interscholastic competition but also provides vital training in sportsmanship and in the wise use of leisure time, to a large percentage of our student body.

The outstanding need in the high school at the present time is, at least, one more instructor. This year four instructors in Island Falls high school have been offering to 182 pupils the very same courses that have been offered by eight instructors in one of our neighboring schools which has an enrollment of only 160. A further comparison of figures covering all of the other 260 Maine secondary schools indicates that our teacher-pupil ratio this year has been larger than that of any other school. Most of our classes are much too large for best results and, consequently, individual help is not always available when needed. This has probably been more of a disadvantage to pupils in the 7th and 8th year classes than to those in the upper classes but it can only be overcome by increasing the teaching staff.

The six-year system, now in operation for the second year, is an ideal arrangement under present conditions. To mention two of its advantages, it provides all pupils with departmental instruction and tends to reduce the cost of education to the town by a substantial amount.

In closing, I wish to commend the other members of the faculty who have made possible by their effort and co-operation whatever has been accomplished. I wish,

also, to thank the Superintendent, Members of the School Board, and all others who have contributed to the success of the school.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my report as School Physician for the fiscal year ending March 1.

Observation has shown that where there is health teaching in the school and community, and regular inspection of pupils, there is less chance for an epidemic of diseases to start—with the consequent waste of school money each year.

It is common knowledge that the ability of the child to make the most of his educational facilities is dependent upon the state of health of that child. If he is below par, he should immediately be put into condition to fit him into his class and so later not become a public ward but to make him of value to himself and to his community. In other words, safeguarding his health is safeguarding the future personal and community economy. He is in the process of fitting himself to become a useful citizen and take over the leadership of our civic affairs. It is up to us to give him his chance and poor health is an insurmountable obstacle to this goal.

It is practically impossible to measure the value of a health service in dollars and cents or by cold statistics, but the different phases of this work will give you some idea of what is done by this service for your growing child.

During the past year, a complete reorganization of the school health service has been done to bring it up to the standards of modern school health authorities.

The new school year will see this service well under way. Allow me to list some of the duties of this new school health service:

1. General school examination by the physician each year.
2. Physician to see every child who has been absent for at least 48 hours to detect the mild cases before admission. Certificate to be given each child.
3. Clinic for vaccination against Smallpox.
4. Examination of Diphtheria contacts for carriers.
5. When disease is present, daily examination of the room.
6. Insure proper lavatories and maintenance.
7. Inspection of light, heat and sanitation.
8. Control and correction of physical defects as soon as possible to develop the child to his most efficient working capacity.
9. Special examinations upon children that require closer observation.
10. Special examination to contestants in all athletic activities of the school.
11. Special attention to abnormal and subnormal children.

In the health program, 431 individual examinations were made and the results of these examinations are recorded on the Health Cards of the pupils. Of this number 107 were found to be in need of medical attention. Forty-two were underweight and corrective diets were suggested. One outstanding result as shown by the inspection of these cards is that of the pupils in our schools this year 99 have cards showing corrected defects, such as tonsil removal cases and similar corrections.

In addition to the health program carried on in the schools a baby clinic was held last fall. These clinics are fairly well attended even now, but more children of the pre-school age could be examined.

If space permitted many interesting cases of individual help and correction could be reported. This is not possible so in concluding this report I wish to thank the teachers and others who have given me their sincere co-operation in making this service of real benefit to the future citizens of Island Falls.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Island Falls, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Grange Hall in said town on Monday the 20th day of March A. D. 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose a board of three Selectmen and all other necessary Town Officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town elect a Road Commissioner or leave his appointment to the Selectmen.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of common schools including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor service and conveyance.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Free High School.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Text Books, Insurance, Lights, Apparatus and Supplies.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for General Government as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, School Superintendent, School Physician, Health Officer, and all other Miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the following: Street Lighting, 2nd, Hydrant Rental.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the Anti-Tuberculosis Society.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 19, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of Maine as amended. 1066

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of roads, highways and bridges upon the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter 258 public laws of 1917.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for patrolling State Highways, and State Aid Highways under the provisions of sections 8 and 17 of Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$92.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third class road.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town, for State Aid Highway construction, in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the following: First, Mothers' Aid, 2nd, for the Support of Poor.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the maintenance of the Poor Farm.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for principal of Town Debt.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Interest on Town Debt.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money for and in behalf of the town in anticipation of taxes, and renew notes given for money borrowed heretofore, and to borrow money for any other legal purpose not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$18,000.00, also to see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sign notes or any necessary evidence of said indebtedness, and deliver the same for and in behalf of the town, for the purpose aforesaid.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm as debt of the town the sum of \$8,000.00 in notes now held by the Katahdin Trust Co. and \$2,000.00 now held by G. W. York, and to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to execute in the name and behalf of the town any renewal of said notes.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Abatements and Discounts.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery of the possession of such parcels of real estate as has been conveyed to the inhabitants of said town for non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.

Art. 26. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen for such sums as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefore, to sell and convey all the rights, title and interest in and to such parcels of real estate bid in at tax sales as the town has acquired under said tax deeds.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the same.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to fix a time when property taxes are due and payable, and will vote to make any discount on taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what percent. Also to fix the rate of interest to be added upon taxes unpaid.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to have its tax collector settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection, and to fix a time therefore.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to have its tax collector accept town orders in payment of taxes.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$144.00 interest on School Fund.

✓ Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of School Houses.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to petition the State Highway Commission for a snow route for the ensuing year, and if so, to grant and raise money for same.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to elect, and elect a lady member on the board of Mothers' Aid.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to appoint a fire commission to consist of three men, whose duty shall be to see that all equipment shall be in good order, at all times. And vote to raise a sum of money for same.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated certain taxes as appeared in town report.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Grange Hall March 20th, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, and hearing applications for those claiming a right to vote.
