School Report

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
To the School Committee and Citizens of Island Falls:

I have the pleasure of submitting my second annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Much that is not a direct responsibility of the town has been done during this past year for our children through the efforts of the selectmen and the State and Federal Emergency relief agencies.

Perhaps the greatest good to the greatest number of pupils has been accomplished through the Federal Government's granting our petition for aid in the matter of health. All our underweight and undernourished children in the schools have been given a glass of milk and a cookie during the morning recess periods. Careful weight charts kept by the teachers show the value of this step in the correction of a very common child ill. In addition to this, valuable aid has been given the children in furnishing all the needed supplies for hot noontime lunches. These hot lunches were furnished without cost to pupils unable to pay for them, through an additional grant from the Federal Relief agencies. These two items alone have caused the spending of upwards of \$250 in the town.

In addition, we were fortunate in having the first evening school in our section of the State approved by the Federal Government. Mrs. Christine Donham has been a highly capable teacher and her classes have varied from nine to fourteen throughout the winter. Studies undertaken varied from beginning reading to rather advanced arithmetic. Those in attendance at

the school showed fine spirit and have accomplished much. The school met three times weekly in the High School. The only expense to the town for this fine accomplishment was the little money needed for the extra lighting.

SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

Dr. C. I. Swett this year added to the much he accomplished last year in the matter of protecting and developing the health of the pupils in our schools.. It is a well established fact that it is worthless to have a highly developed brain within an ill body. In his position as school physician, Dr. Swett examined the 400 pupils in the schools; administered 350 treatments of toxoid as a preventative for Diphtheria; vaccinated 300 pupils against small-pox; attended to 75 pupils referred to him for attention by the teachers; gave about 25 free office consultations to parents following these references; gave special examinations to members of the athletic teams when such members were referred to him by the coaches, and was always ready and willing to assist the members of the teaching force with advice and aid in the matter of pupil health.

Outside of the school work itself, he also held the first pre-school clinic for the town ably assisted by Miss Evelyn Sutherland, the State Nurse. For this clinic the Chamber of Commerce furnished automobiles in which mothers and their children who are to enter school within the next two years were brought to the schoolhouse for physical examinations. The value of this pre-school work cannot be overemphasized. It is during this early formative period that defects can be best corrected and thus have the children in the best possible physical shape when they enter school. About

forty children attended this clinic and as each was accompanied by the mother, much of an educational nature was given those women.

During the Summer another Tonsil clinic was held and those pupils whose throats needed attention re-received operation. There is now in our schools over 100 pupils whose record cards show corrections of throats by operation.

DENTAL HEALTH

It is held that the cells in the human body renew themselves each seven years with the exception of those cells making up the teeth. Recognizing the importance of keeping our teeth healthy, the established practice of Dental Inspection and Correction has been and should be continued. Dr. Fayette Spratt has given generously of his time and ability in this important work. Through the assistance of the local women's clubs, money was also made available for the correcting of dental defects. Dr. Spratt is at present giving the second examination of teeth and through the help of the Federal Government more promises to be accomplished during the latter part of this year than has been previously done. Perhaps the most worthwhile result of these examinations, is that because of his manner with children, Dr. Spratt does away with the usual fear a child feels for a dentist and can, in most cases, be easily persuaded to "go to the dentist" for periodic examination in later life.

COMMON SCHOOLS

The most serious handicap of this department is the unusually heavy teaching-load of our individual teachers. We are indeed fortunate that we have working in Island Falls a group of six teaches who have such an

extent of personal interest and talent that they are able to successfully instruct nearly fifty school children each. The pressing need of the department is the re-establishment of the sub-primary grade so that the present enrollment would then gradually shift about and each teacher then would have the pupil load reduced one-sixth.

The text-book situation is gradually losing ground. We have curtailed in expenditures to such an extent that the textbooks are becoming more and more worn. It is regrettable that there is not now money available to replace the worn and out-dated textbooks while prices are yet low.

REPAIRS

Through the efforts of Mr. Daggett, in his position as first Selectman, the C. W. A. granted us the labor necessary for the re-painting and re-decorating of both the school buildings. This work is well underway and as this report is written three rooms in the grammar school building have been completed and both hallways are nearly done. As the weather becomes suitable the plan is to paint the outsides of the buildings.

In order for this project to be approved, it was necessary for the town to furnish the paint and Muresco. The order was placed after a comparison of prices and sufficient paint, plaster, muresco and varnish for both buildings was purchased for the sum of \$199.00. This amount bought sufficient materials for both buildings, inside and out and will necessitate an additional appropriation in the Repairs account.

During last summer the main part of the roof of the High School was covered with asbestos shingles. The contract for this complete job, including labor, was \$600.00 and there was but \$470 available in the

Repairs account. The contractor was told of the situation and he agreed to complete the shingling job and to carry the balance of the account of \$130 till this year. This sum also has not yet been appropriated.

CONCLUSION

There remains but a word of commendation for the faithfulness and thoroughness with which Mr. Gradie has performed his duties as janitor. A comparison of past repairs account expenditures with those of the time during which he has been the Janitor will convince the most skeptical of his ability and worth.

Herewith is enclosed the report of the High School Principal followed by a detailed statement of finances.

ANNUAL REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following report of the enrollment, courses offered and activities carried on during the year 1933-1934 in Island Falls High School is respectfully submitted:

To date there have been 190 pupils enrolled, which represents an increase of 8 over the enrollment last year. The actual enrollment by classes is as follows:

The school has continued to offer all subjects offered during previous years in the General Course, the Classical Course and the Latin-Scientific Course. In addition, this year, we have been able to give courses in Business Training, Economics, Music Appreciation, Spelling and Penmanship. These new courses are in keeping with the modern trend in education and have definitely proved to be most valuable and practical in preparing pupils for problems, they will face after their high school days are over.

While it may not be possible to add more subjects to the curriculum this year, I feel that I should pass along to you the result of a recent questionnaire. It clearly establishes the fact that there is a sincere desire on the part of pupils in the four upper classes, that the Commercial Course be added to those now offered when conditions permit. The actual figures were: 70% favoring the Commercial Course, 11% favoring the Agricultural Course, 10% favoring Home Economics and 9% favoring Manual Training. With five instructors providing the instruction for 190 pupils our pupil-teacher ratio is still very high as compared with other schools of Class A standing.

The usual number of extra-curricula activities are being carried on this year with a large proportion of the total enrollment receiving the benefit of instruction, during periods outside of the regular school hours, in dramatics, public speaking, athletics and school socials. With the aid of a small fund provided by the federal government it has been possible for the school to serve hot dishes each noon during the winter months to more than 60 pupils who would otherwise have occasion to eat cold lunches.

I am pleased to call to your attention the spirit of cooperation which exists among teachers and pupils.

Both groups are helping to solve the problems in our school created by the depression and I, therefore, want to commend the other members of the faculty, the student body and our janitor, Mr. Gradie, for their sincere effort given to make our school as efficient as possible. Your spirit of helpfulness and leadership as superintendent, Mr. Lewin, has likewise been appreciated.

STATE OF MAINE

To H. E. A. Dunphy one of the Constables of the Town of Island Falls in said County and State.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Island Falls, qualified by law, to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, in said Town, on Monday the 19th day of March, A. D. 1934, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to Wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose a board of three Selectmen, and all other necessary Town Officers.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will elect a Road Commissioner, or leave his appointment to the Selectmen.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of Common Schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor service and conveyance.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for free High School.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Text Books, Insurance, Lights, Apparatus and Supplies.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for General Government, as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, School Superintendent, School Physician, Health Officer and all miscellaneous expenses.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Street Lighting, 2nd. Hydrant Rental, Third Fire Equipment.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Anti-Tuberculosis Society.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 19 Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of Maine as amended.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of roads, Highways and Bridges upon the provision of Sec. 18 Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter 258 of Public Laws of 1917.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Patrolling State Highways and State Aid Highways, under the provisions of sections 8 and 17 of Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Roads and Bridges, including snow removal.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$92.00 for the Maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway Construction, in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Support of Poor.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Maintenance of Poor Farm.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for principal of town debt.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Interest on Town Debt.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money for and in behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, and renew notes given for money borrowed heretofore, and borrow money for any other legal purpose, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$18,000.00. Also to see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to sign notes or any necessary evidence of said indebtedness, and deliver the same for and in behalf of the Town for the purpose aforesaid.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm as debt of the Town, the sum of \$8,000.00 in notes now held by the Katahdin Trust Company, and \$2,000.00 now held by G. W. York, and to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to execute in the name and behalf of the Town any renewal of said notes.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Abatements and Discounts.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery of the possession of such parcels of real estate as has been conveyed to the inhabitants of said Town for non-payment of taxes, and the time of redemption having expired.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen for such sums as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefor, to sell and convey all the rights, title and interest, in and to such parcels of real-estate bid in at tax sales of liens as the Town has acquired under said tax deeds or liens, and said Treasurer is hereby authorized to execute and deliver said deeds and liens thereof.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day and appoint a committee to expend the same.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to fix a time when property taxes are due and payable, and will vote to make any discount on taxes paid at such time or times, as it may determine, and if so, what percent. Also to fix the rate of interest to be added upon taxes unpaid.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to have its tax collector settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection, and to fix a time therefor.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to have its tax collector accept Town Orders in payment of taxes.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$144.00 interest on School Fund.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to petition the State Highway Commission for a snow route, for the ensuing year.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to elect, and elect, a lady member on the board of Mothers' Aid.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Fire Commission to consist of three men, whose duties shall be, to see that all equipment shall be in good order, at all times.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated certain taxes as appeared in Town reports.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of school buildings.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Grange Hall March 19th at Nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters and hearing applications for those claiming a right to vote.
