

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens and the Superintending School Committee:

I have the honor to submit herewith my sixth annual report of the condition of Island Falls schools, together with a detailed statement of school finances and data relative to enrollment and employees.

This year has been a productive one for our schools. Due to the greatly increased amount of Equalization money made available by the State through the efforts of Commissioner Packard, we have been enabled to reestablish the commercial course in the high school, and to add one much needed teacher in the Junior High School. The salaries of these two new teachers and the equipment necessary for the commercial courses will be paid from the "new" state money and necessitates no additional appropriations from local sources.

During the year the high school pupils earned a Keystone motion picture machine through selling of magazine subscriptions. This machine will become a valuable tool in instruction as soon as the right sources of film rental are investigated and decided upon.

In the common school branch of our schools a problem has been the teaching of spelling and English. After considerable investigation on the part of the teachers and superintendent, workbooks were introduced in both English and Spelling. The results of these classes have not been checked as yet but reports reaching the superintendent from the teachers tend to show marked improvement in these two essential courses.

The health of the pupils in both schools remains at its high standard and under the close supervision of the school physician, Dr. Swett. No epidemic diseases have appeared throughout the year and the attendance has been good.

Teaching Force

Following this report is a tabulation of all the teachers showing training experience, salary and other data. The worth of any school system is determined by the teachers. We are fortunate in Island Falls in holding most of our teachers for a period of years. In a one-teacher rural school it may be well to have a change in teachers rather frequently, but in a graded system where the pupils meet a new personality each year a faculty that does not change is better for it tends to stabilize the instruction and the teachers grow to know what the grades above expect from their promotions.

In the graded system this year are two new teachers. Miss Gregg was elected to replace Miss MacKenzie upon the latter's resignation last Spring. Miss Gregg is capable, popular and has her daily work thoroughly prepared before school starts. Miss Erskine, in the first grade, brings to Island Falls a wealth of training and experience and, in this critical position, we are fortunate in having such a teacher. Trained in normal school, college summer schools and in Perry Kindergarten school, Miss Erskine is probably one of the best first grade teachers in the county and under her guidance the beginners are making fine progress.

In the Junior-Senior high school branch, Island Falls lost every teacher but Mr. Cough, the principal, last spring. Such a turn over of teachers is not good for a school but due to the re-organized courses and the introduction of the commercial course, no better year could have been chosen, had we the choice, than this year. The training and experience of the new teachers in this school

are in the tabulation hereunder and need not be gone into here except to say that the school is now better organized, offers a much wider choice of subjects, and is a more finished high school than for several years past. The skill of Mr. Cough in re-organizing a new faculty is highly commendable. He has inspired loyalty and unity of purpose in these new teachers and the organization as a whole is now running smoothly and efficiently.

The student boy of the school maintains the high standards always connected with Island Falls High. Without a loyal and unified student body the best of schools may fail. The pupils in Island Falls High believe in the school and all its stands for and this tribute is paid them because they deserve it. In my wide experience with school boys and girls over the State, I have yet to come in contact with a better student body.

Finances

To the taxpayer the most important part of any school system is the cost. This year it has cost us \$7471.89 to educate the 326 boys and girls classified as "common school" pupils in the lower eight grades. This makes the average yearly cost for teachers, supplies and textbooks, \$23.10. On a daily basis, it costs Island Falls 12.8 cents to send a child to school one day. The State average this year for the common schools is \$36.92 per pupil per year.

In the High School we have expended for all school purposes the sum of \$7,035.43 to educate 102 high school pupils. This means \$68.97 per pupil for the year while the State average for the past year was \$60.97.

Due to the favorable action of the special session of the legislature on the school bill, so-called, Island Falls received a large apportionment of this new equalization money. This money is apportioned on the basis of tax rate for schools as compared with the State average for schools as well as a comparison between the whole tax rates of the various towns and the state average. This year the rate for Schools in Island Falls was .01827 while the State average for Schools was .01243; the local tax rate was .068 while the State average was .05736.

Equipment

The buildings are in good shape. Mr. Gradie as janitor is able and faithful and saves the town money by being able to do much of the minor repairing himself rather than hiring it done. As attendance officer he checks on the absence and tardiness of pupils, and the good record of attendance is helped by his work.

All employees enjoy Island Falls and are working together to give the schools and the children in them the best possible educational advantages. We all appreciate the town's loyalty to the schools and pledge the continuance of our best efforts.

WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

To John J. Marr, a Constable of the Town of Island Falls in the County of Aroostook, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Island Falls in said County, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Community Hall in said Town, on Monday the twenty first day of March A. D. 1938, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

- Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3 To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of its Town officers, subject to an audit by the State Auditor.
- Art. 4 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of Common Schools, including teachers' salaries, fuel, janitor service, and conveyance of scholars.

- Art. 5 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Free High School.
- Art. 6 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for text books, insurance, lights, and apparatus and supplies.
- Art. 7 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for School Physician.
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for General Government, as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Health Officer, and all other miscellaneous expenses.
- Art. 9 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Hydrant Rentals.
- Art. 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Street Lighting.
- Art. 11 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for care of cemeteries.
- Art. 12 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Anti-Tuberculosis Society.
- Art. 13 To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for State Aid construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provision of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public laws of 1937.
- Art. 14 To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State aid roads in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chap. 132, Public laws of 1935.

- Art. 15 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for patrolling state, and state aid highways.
- Art. 16 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges, and snow removal.
- Art. 17 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of, and maintenance of Third Class Highways.
- Art. 18 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Mother's Aid.
- Art. 19 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Support of Poor.
- Art. 20 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of Town farm.
- Art. 21 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for payment of principal of Town debt.
- Art. 22 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for interest on Town debt.
- Art. 23 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for WPA projects.
- Art. 24 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 25 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the improvement and care of Town Dump.
- Art. 26 To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$75.00, or more for school nursing to be expended under the auspices of the State Department of

Health and Welfare. As the amount of the appropriation increases the services will be proportionately increased.

- Art. 27 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for abatements and discounts.
- Art. 28 To see if the Town will ratify and confirm as debts of the Town the sum of \$600.00 in notes now held by the Katahdin Trust Company and \$2,000.00 in notes held by George W. York, and to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to execute in the name and behalf of said Town any renewals of said notes.
- Art. 29 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery and possession of such parcels of real estate as have been acquired by the Inhabitants of said Town for non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.
- Art. 30 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen for such sums of money as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefor, to sell and convey all the right, title, and interest in and to said parcels of real estate as the Town has acquired by tax deeds or tax liens, and to authorize the Treasurer to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of said Town deeds thereof.
- Art. 31 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and to appoint a Committee to expend the same.
- Art. 32 To see if the Town will vote to fix a time when taxes are due and payable: also to see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid at such time, or times, as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.

- Art. 33 To see if the Town will vote to have its collector of taxes settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection, and to fix the time therefor.
- Art. 34 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept Town orders in payment of taxes.
- Art. 35 To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$144.00 for interest on school fund.
- Art. 36 To see if the Town will vote to elect and elect a lady member of the Board of Mother's Aid.
- Art. 37 To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen whereby they have recommended that certain taxes as appear in the Town report be abated.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money for and in the name and behalf of the Town to pay debts contracted in the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes assessed for the ensuing year, not to exceed \$5,000.00, and also to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to sign notes therefor, and deliver and negotiate the same for and in behalf of the Town for the purposes aforesaid.
- Art. 39 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of schoolhouses.
- Art. 40 To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner, or leave his appointment to the Selectmen.
- Art. 41 To see if the Town will vote to adopt a resolution protesting the adoption of any further reduction of the quota of potatoes to be imported from Canada.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon until the polls are closed.
