

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens and School Committee:

As required by Statute, it is my honor and privilege to submit the report of the financial and disciplinary conditions of the schools of Island Falls.

School Routine

The "rotating" schedule of recitation is now well established in the High School. The specific plan is the "seven-five" rotation which means only that there are seven periods in the teaching program and that five periods meet each day. Mondays, for instance, periods one to five are held; Tuesday starts with period six, seven and then one again and so on. This plan is highly successful not only in Island Falls but in many other schools as it makes for longer recitation periods wherein pupils may be given help in supervised study and project work under the teacher's direction. It also makes allowance in the program for a wide program of activities such as art, music, and the handicrafts. While the activity program in our school is as yet largely experimental, promise is had of a wide and varied program as the sponsors of the various activities learn of the most productive clubs and how to conduct them.

There is a definite demand, on the part of parents and pupils of the high school alike, for a course in Agriculture in the town. This course could be handled by a half-time teacher from a neighboring high school. Under this scheme this teacher would work in one town in the mornings and in the other in the afternoon. The cost of such a teacher would be less than we are now paying our classroom teachers, and I recommend the establishment of such a course in the school next Fall.

This type of position is a full time job for the man selected. During the summer he works with the neighboring farmers in the matter of inspection of seed plots, poultry husbandry and with the boys of the school in their summertime projects on their own farms. Inasmuch as the State and Federal government pays two-thirds of the cost of such a course, it is an economical move to establish one. With the present enrollment in the high school, state requirements can be met by employing four and one-half teachers, rather than the five we now employ. The enrollment, on the other hand, is too large to be handled by four teachers so we must either keep the five teachers now employed or make the slight change in putting in this half time teacher for agriculture. Hence from the viewpoint of demand as well as that of economy, I make the recommendation.

Graded Schools

In the grades an adaptation of the platoon system of instruction was put into effect last term. Under the plan one teacher handles all the Geography in grades 4, 5, and 6; another teaches Arithmetic, while the third conducts the classes in History. The teachers chose their own subjects and each was assigned that subject she preferred. This method makes for better continuity in the classes as the teacher, knowing what will be offered the next year, can better plan this year's work. Highly gratifying results are again being noted this year in the primary grades. The teachers are now well skilled in the teaching of "phrase" reading and the rapidity with which the pupils actually learn to read during these first three years is amazing.

Our schools this year are benefiting by the professional attitude of the teachers as shown by the attendance of four at summer school last Summer. At Aroostook Normal were Miss Maynard and Miss Gregg. Mr. Wagnis attended Bates while Miss Soper and your superintendent were at the U. of M. Many newer methods, studied by this group have been handed on to the rest of the teaching force through teachers' institutes and meetings.

Finances

The school accounts continue to remain in good shape. In the general school funds, a balance of over \$1600.00 is unexpended. This has been brought about by the greatly increased amount of equalization money made available to Island Falls. In the common schools the average cost per pupil is \$23.70 for the year, about fifty cents less than a year ago. In the High School the average cost of the year's schooling was \$64.26 per child as compared with \$68.97. This \$4.51 drop in cost was occasioned by an increased enrollment in the school. These low averages do not bespeak curtailment of any essential offering but may rather be traced to the economical consolidation of the school system and the care on the part of the committee over expenditures.

Hereunder are tabulations showing the enrollment and the personal data about the employees and their positions.

Health and Hygiene

Miss Clara Tapley, a dental hygenist from the department of Health and Welfare, spent ten days in the schools, working grades 1, 3, 5, and 7. Of the 122 children examined, she found but two with clean mouths; but eight with controlled caries. In addition 76 per cent of the children examined showed carious permanent teeth and 71 per cent showed carious "baby" teeth. As discouraging as this report is, it should not convey the idea that improvement is not possible. Should this dental health education program continue, coupled with subsequent corrective treatment, the time and money spent will return to the town in the form of estimable citizens.

In the matter of health, the picture is entirely different. Dr. Swett has continued his work as school physician. He has guided us through another year without serious epidemic. He is liberal with his office calls to all parents whose children are sent for attention by the school officials and he follows up those matters referred to him by the teachers with home visits and instruction. The routine examination of the children not only tends to check what might be a serious illness, but educates the children to look upon the doctor not only for aid in illness but as a guide in the keeping of good health.

Education is a fascinating and important work. We of the faculty request your cooperation in our study of the widely varying personalities we daily meet in the classroom. Each and every teacher appreciates your calls and suggestions.

WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

AROOSTOOK SS.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Island Falls, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Community Hall in said Town on Monday, the twentieth day of March A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator by ballot to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose by ballot a Town Clerk; three selectmen; three assessors; three overseers of the poor; town treasurer; member of the school board for a period of three years; and all other necessary town officers.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of its Town Officers as printed.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or have the same appointed by the Selectmen.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of Common Schools, including teachers' salaries, fuel, janitor service and conveyance of scholars. Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for a Free High School.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for text books, insurance, lights and apparatus and supplies.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for School Physician.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repairs of the school build-ings.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for General Government as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Health Officer, and all other miscellaneous expenses.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Hydrant rentals.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Street Lighting.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for care of cemeteries.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Anti-Tuberculosis Society.

Art. 15. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 16. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for patrolling state, and state aid highways.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of roads and bridges and snow removal.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of, and maintenance of Third Class highways.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the support of poor.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of the Town farm, and the repair of the buildings thereon.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for payment of principal of Town debt.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for interest on town debt.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for WPA projects.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the improvement and care of Town dump.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$111.00 for public health work in Island

Falls; said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for abatements and discounts.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to brings writs of entry for the recovery and possession of such parcels of real estate as has been acquired by the Inhabitants of said Town for non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen, for such sums of money as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefor, to sell and convey all the right, title and interest in and to such parcels of real estate as the Town has acquired by tax deeds, or tax liens, and to authorize the Treasurer to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of said Town deeds thereof.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to Grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day and appoint a committee to expend the same.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable; also to see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes, paid at such time, or times, as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to have its collector of taxes settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection and to fix the time therefor.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$144.00 for interest on school fund.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to elect and elect a lady member of the Board of Mothers' Aid.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen whereby they have recommended that certain taxes as appear in the Town report be abated.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town; such notes to be paid during the current year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to settle with Fred S. Sewall for damage occasioned by building the School Sewer across his land; and to make a permanent contract with him.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will expend out of any unexpended balances, not exceeding the sum of \$300. to be expended upon the Pleasant Lake road in conjunction with the Town of Dyer Brook.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named Hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9.30 in the forenoon until the polls are closed.
