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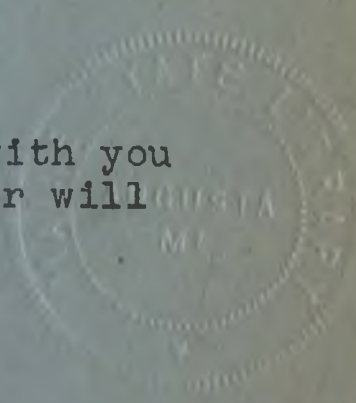

Report of the Superintendent of Schools .

To the Citizens and School Committee:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report of the conditions of the schools of Island Falls.

Enrollment in the elementary schools continues to fall. But a few years ago we were seriously considering placing another teacher in the grades to assist the other teachers who were teaching between 40 and 50 pupils per room. Enrollment in 1934, for instance, was 261 in the six grades; this year we have but 173 children. The average enrollment per teacher therefore has dropped from 43.5 to 28.8. For that reason the present offering of the school to the pupil is now better than formerly because of the extra attention individually that the teachers can give the children.

In the high school, on the other hand, registrations have remained fairly constant with a slight tendency to increase. The enrollment this year follows;

Six-Six System

Island Falls was one of the pioneering schools in the unified six-six system of education whereby a child makes easier transition from the "grades" to the "high school" The school still ranks up with the best in state standing and, as each year passes, this type of program gains more and more in the state.

Another marked tendency, in the high schools of today, is to make the school less and less a college preparatory school and more and more a training school for life outside. This has brought about the dropping from the schools of the country such subjects as Latin, laboratory physics and chemistry and higher mathematics. Island Falls High School, as with the other schools of like rating, has been forced to change its offerings to meet the demands of the pupils of the school. Third year Latin, the "Cicero" of the high school of a generation ago, as well as fourth year Latin or "Virgil" is now practically extinct in most schools.

Many of the elder generations can remember when Greek was an accepted offering of the high school. It will not be long until Latin will follow the path of that older and more classic language. In Island Falls we still offer Latin three and four but there is no demand on the part of the pupils for the subject and very probably next year will see this offering withdrawn.

In keeping with this tendency in the high schools we find that the colleges have changed. Not so long ago no pupil could hope to be admitted to a fine arts college to study for an "AB" degree without six years of foreign language--two of a modern language such as French, and four years of Latin. Today colleges are offering "AB" degrees with but two years of French as the high school offering for admission to such a college.

The tendency in the opposite direction, of course is the present day offerings of the high schools of the country in subjects dealing with Social Science, Economics, Political Science, and the vocational subjects such as Agriculture, Home Economics, Manual Training, and Shop and Trades Courses.

Island Falls High, in keeping step with other progressive schools now offers a complete course in Social Science and Agriculture.

Recommendations

The present high school plant would be more efficient if used on the "home room" plan of instruction. I therefore recommend that the present high school assembly room be discontinued as it now is and the making of that room an assembly hall where movable chairs could be used to give an auditorium seating 300 or 400 people. The present Sophomore and Senior classes now use that room for their home rooms. The Sophomores could well be moved into what used to be the six grade room for their "home room" while the senior class could have the present recreation room for their home room. The seventh and eight grades would remain as they now are.

Such a plan would allow the shutting off of the many radiators in the high school room and a considerable saving in heating costs for the plant. This saving, over a period, would wipe out the cost of equipping the new assembly hall with seats. The cost of this project would be about \$300.00--not more--for the purchase of chairs for this assembly room.

In the grade building, \$200 should be appropriated to insulate the ceilings of the room on the second floor. From the attic it is possible to see the light shining through the matched-board ceilings of those rooms and the heat from those rooms, of course, goes up through this attic and is wasted.

Finances

Following the recommendation of the state auditors and Mr. Doughty of the board of selectmen, a change has been made this year in record-

ing the assets of the school accounts. No money is listed under the assets unless it has actually been paid to the town. Tuition earned by the high school and as yet unpaid is not listed in the assets.

There is a variation of less than \$50.00 between the amounts recorded as available in the town accounts, booked by Mr. Doughty, and those of the school department. This variation is brought about by the fact that Mr. Doughty reads the reports from Augusta differently than do the school authorities. The entire sum is in the account of Crystal's tuition. The State paid 92% of Crystal's indebtedness to the town as that was the entire amount due Crystal on their school fund. The school account, therefore, lists 92% of the spring term's tuition bill as having been received. The selectmen's account, on the other hand, lists the entire amount of the Fall and Winter terms tuition as paid and writes off so much of the spring term's tuition charge as the balance of money will cover.

While the account shows a balance of \$2114 unexpended, actually there is earned the sum of \$1072, that will be paid in July 1940. On top of that sum there is still 8% of Crystal's back tuition that is due and payable from that town.

In the repairs account is included a new furnace to replace one that fell apart when it was overhauled last spring. This is the second new furnace and very probably the other two furnaces will soon need replacing. Mr. Gradie reports that there is a great difference in the wood consumption of the new furnace and much better heat from the smaller amount of wood.

Health and Hygiene

The dental clinic was continued this year and we have now offered dental prophylactic treatments to all the grade children and follow

this up with classroom discussions and talks on the value of good care of the teeth and mouth.

Dr. Swett examined 139 children of the first five grades during the winter term and recommends seven throat operations from the group at the tonsil clinic. Smallpox vaccination is needed by the entire 139 pupils while he recommends that diphtheria toxoid inoculation be given 68 pupils.

The past practice of the school physician of granting one office call to parents of pupils who have been referred to him by any of the teachers has been continued and he has been available to the teachers upon call to help them when they were uncertain as to whether or not any unusual symptom noticed in the children appeared.

To John J. Marr, one of the constables of the Town of Island Falls in said County and State,

Greeting:-

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Island Falls, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs; to assemble at the Community Hall in said Town of Island Falls, on Monday the eighteenth day of March, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:-

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator by ballot to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose by ballot a Town Clerk; three selectmen; three assessors of taxes; three overseers of the poor; Town Treasurer; and two members of the school board; one for one year and one for three years; and all other necessary Town officers.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of its Town officers as printed

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner, or have the same appointed by the Selectmen.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the maintenance of Common Schools, including teachers' salaries, fuel, janitor service; and conveyance of scholars.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for a free High School.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for text books, insurance, lights and apparatus and supplies.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for School Physcian.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repairs of the school buildings.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for General Government as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of taxes, Health Officer, and all other miscellaneous expenses.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Hydrant Rentals.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Street Lighting.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for care of cemeteries.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Anti-Tuberculosis Society.

Art. 15. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Sec. 3, Chap. 229, Public laws of 1937.

Art. 16. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous sur-

face treatment to State aid roads in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chap. 132 P. L. 1935.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for patrolling state, and State Aid highways.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repairs of maintenance of Third Class Highways.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of roads and bridges, and ~~snow removal~~.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of Town Farm, and the repair of the Buildings thereon.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for payment of principal of Town debt.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for interest.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for WPA projects.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the improvement and care of the Town Dump.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for public health

nursing in Island Falls. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise for abatements and discounts.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$85.00 for the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day and appoint a committee to expend the same.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery and possession of real estate as has been acquired by the inhabitants of said Town for non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, under the direction of the Selectmen, for such sums of money as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefor, to sell and convey all the right, title and interest in and to such parcels of real estate as the Town has acquired by tax deeds, tax liens, and to authorize the Treasurer to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of said Town deeds thereof.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable; also to see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes, paid at such time, or times, as it may determine and if so what per cent.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to have its collector of taxes settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection and fix the time therefor.

Art. . 35. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen whereby they have recommended that certain taxes as appear in the Town Report be abated.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying the obligations of the Town; such loans to be paid during the current year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Slectmen to procure or lay out a road to Mattawamkeag Lake, and a landing thereon, for the benefit of the public over land of the Federal Land Bank and John W. Carr. Also to see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for said purpose.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will expend out of any unexpended balances, not exceeding \$300.00, to be expended upon the Pleasant Lake Road in conjunction with the Town of Dyer Brook.

Art. 39. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Katahdin Public Library.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the Barker Ridge Schoolhouse.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

An Ordinance Relating to
Outdoor Advertisements.

Sec. 1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter erect, construct or maintain any outdoor advertising structure, device or dis-

play upon the ways, and highways, within the Town of Island Falls, except such directional signs as may be approved by the State Highway Commission.

Sec. 2. Any person, firm, or corporation violating the foregoing ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than Ten Dollars.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named Community Hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said Meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters from 9:30 in the forenoon until the polls are closed.
