The two old hose carts are in very poor condition and should be replaced with something more modern.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Island Falls:

It is my duty and pleasure to present this, my first, annual report on the condition of your school system. This is the fourth annual report since Pearl Harbor, and while education, like everything else, has suffered, Island Falls has been fortunate in comparison with many other communities in the state. Many schools are without teachers, and several hundred positions are being filled by teachers having permits or 'sanctions', but not actually qualified for the work they are doing. Island Falls has had to employ none of these unprepared teachers. The language department in the High School has been our only war casualty.

The schools have continued to do all possible to aid in winning the war. The purchase of stamps and bonds has been steady and consistent. Mr. Michaud's weekly visits are looked forward to, especially in the Houlton Street School, with much interest, and he hardly leaves before there is much rapid figuring to find out which room has the flag for highest percentage of purchases for the next week. The purchases of stamps and bonds from Sept. 1, 1944 to Feb. 23, 1945 for the Houlton Street

School total \$958.05, and from the Junior-Senior High School total about \$1000.00. The Junior High, under the leadership of Mr. Ross, is collecting waste paper. If you have any ready, let him or any of the Junior High students know, and it will be called for.

The Houlton Street School had two changes in the faculty this year, but we were fortunate in securing the services of experienced teachers. It wouldn't do to tell them, but I suspect one would have to travel far to find a better staffed elementary school than we have right here in Island Falls. Our salary schedule has lagged behind surrounding towns, probably because the teachers live in town. The scale should be revised upward, to a point commensurate with the ability and experience of the teachers. We have replaced four hot-air furnaces in this building with a modern steam plant, using coal. This is more economical than wood, even if wood could be obtained. We have put in new chairs and tables in the first grade room, and I am sure Mrs. Webber would be glad to "show off" both the furniture and the pupils to visitors.

The Island Falls Junior-Senior High retained four teachers from last year, and was fortunate in securing the services of two men in addition. Richard P. Pippin, a graduate of the University of Maine, is teaching English and other subjects, while Hubert Ross, an experienced upper grade teacher, is in the Junior High. I mentioned above that we failed to secure a language teacher. However, Hilda Gellerson has taken on Latin in addition to her regular subjects, so French is all that the students did not get. It is hoped that we can find a French teacher for next year. Agriculture should also be returned to the curriculum as soon as possible. Basketball was revived after a two-year lay off. The teams, coached by Herbert

Hoar and Richard Pippin, improved throughout the season. The outstanding thing of the season to me was not the winning of games, but a particular game in which the boys were beaten by a large margin and yet played as hard the last minute as they did the first. People from the other school remarked that they never saw a badly defeated team play as hard right up to the end. If the same spirit stays with those boys in later years, they will go far.

Academic progress of the schools has in general been satisfactory. The fall term was more or less broken up, not only by the closing of school to pick potatoes, but because of considerable absence during the fall. It is important that parents realize that it is impossible for pupils to do good work if they miss much time. Conditions make some time out necessary, as work must be done, and the teachers are glad to help the pupils make up the work, but such times out of school should be as few as possible. The downward trend of enrollment for the past few years has evidently stopped, as the enrollment is about the same as last year. By grades, the present enrollment is as follows:

This includes tuition pupils as follows: Crystal 10, Hersey 2, Dyer Brook 3, Castle Hill 1, Masardis 2, total 18.

There are several repairs which need to be done. For the last two years large expenditures were needed to modernize the heating plants. This fact, combined with the lack of labor, has resulted in the neglect of repairs which would otherwise have been made. The High School roof needs attention, as it now leaks in some places, and is getting worse. Both buildings will need painting as soon as funds and labor are available. The lighting system in both buildings is poor. This should be surveyed, and a start made toward installing a modern lighting system, as there are many days when pupils are subject to eye strain.

WARRANT

To John J. Marr, one of the Constables of the Town of Island Falls,

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Island Falls, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Community Hall in said Town, on Monday the nineteenth day of March A. D. 1945, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1. To elect by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

- Art. 2. To elect by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three overseers of poor, three assessors of taxes, Town Treasurer, and one member of the School Board, and all other necessary Town officers.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to employ a Town Manager under the provisions of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1939.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to waive the printing in its annual report of an itemized statement of its receipts and disbursements of its officers, and also to waive the printing of the State Auditor's report, except the financial statement of the Town.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the report of its officers as printed.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner, or have the same appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Common Schools.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for High School.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Text Books, Insurance, apparatus and supplies.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for a School Physician.

- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of school buildings.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for General Government, as follows: Selectmen, Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Town Manager, Health Officer, School Board, and all other miscellaneous Town expenses.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Hydrant Rentals.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for Street Lighting.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Care of Cemeteries.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Anti-Tuberculosis Society.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for patrolling of State, and State Aid Highways.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair and maintenance of Third Class Highways.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to reappropriate and allocate the amount raised at the annual meeting held March 20th, 1944 to the building of the State Aid Highway as was voted at said meeting.

- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for care of dependent children and Mother's Aid.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for support of poor.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for payment of Town debt.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for interest on Town debt.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for care of town dump.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for abatements and discounts.
- Ar.t 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Katahdin Public Library.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the purpose of supplies and apparatus for the Fire Department.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery and possession of such real estate as has heretofore been acquired by the Inhabitants of said Town by non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.

- Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer under the direction of the Selectmen, for such sums of money as said Selectmen may see fit to accept therefor, to sell and convey all the right, title and interest in and to such parcels of land as the Town has acquired by tax deeds and tax liens, and also to authorize the Treasurer to sign, execute and deliver in the name and in behalf of said Town deeds therefor.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable; and also to see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, at what rate of per cent.
- Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to have its Collector of Taxes settle in full for all taxes committed to him for collection, and to fix the time therefor.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will ratify and confirm the doings of the Selectmen whereby they have recommended that certain taxes as appear in the town report be abated.
- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm the action of the Selectmen in investing certain of the Town Funds in Government Bonds.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, to wit:—

An ordinance relative to parking of Motor Vehicles upon the streets and ways.

Section 1. No motor vehicle shall between the first day of December and the fifteenth of the following April

be parked upon any of the Streets or ways in said Town between the snow plowed parts thereof longer than two hours.

Section 2. Whoever violates the foregoing Section shall be liable to a penalty of not more than \$10.00 to be recovered by complaint before any Court having competent jurisdiction thereof one half of said penalty to be paid to the complainant and one half to the Town treasurer of said Town.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at said Community Hall on said nineteenth day of March, at nine o'clook in the forenoon and until the polls are closed for the purpose of correcting the list of voters and hearing applications for the right to vote.
