MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Gentlemen of the Council:

We meet this evening to take upon ourselves by the desire of the voters of our city the responsibility of conducting the business of the city for the current year, and we should always have in view the fact that we are handling the people's money, and that it is our duty to get for their money the best results that it is in our power possible to obtain.

One of the most important matters that will first come before you is the appropriations.

We should be very careful to place the money raised for different purposes by taxation to the accounts where it will do the most good and be of the most benefit to our citizens as a whole.

By a careful study of our system of city government I am firmly convinced that it is in every way superior to our old form of town government, and yet there are still chances to improve certain methods that have been in use the past two years, and no doubt there will be chances to still improve as we grow from year to year.

I shall point out in the course of my remarks wherein the mistakes have been made (and mistakes will always be made as long as the world stands) not for the purpose to criticise or condemn, but that in future we may not continue on in the same way.

FINANCES.

To begin with on looking over our finances I find they are in much better shape than is generally supposed, and that

our net debt of about \$47,000, with a valuation of \$2,615,-120.00, taking into consideration our school property, town house, Ferry landing, road appliances, etc., which we own, is practically very little. I believe any citizen who tries to represent us differently makes a statement that does not tend to build us up, but on the other hand it must do us harm.

The general complaint is not caused by reason of the money we spend so much as by reason of what it obtains for us after it is spent. Incompetency in some important subordinate office, with lack of careful investigation by the committee under whose head it comes, is the cause of a great deal of this complaint.

For that reason you should be most careful in selecting your subordinate officers for the various responsible positions.

A great deal of money has been wasted in years past by reasons too evident to all for me to mention, and my experience in town affairs led me to believe that any concern doing business by the same methods would do well to exist.

That measure passed in the Legislature, and which is to be inserted into our charter that "no official of our city government should furnish supplies to the city," is a good one, and if the same measure had governed us in years past we should, without question, be much better off financially today.

"Fair competition is the life of trade," and in order to do our taxpayers justice we should award the contract where we can give them the most for the money.

This is a matter that is very important to our citizens and although the auditor's books are open to the public and his system is one of the best I ever saw, yet the city report is the only source through which our citizens at large are enabled to learn the standing of our city, and for that reason they should get the figures just as they are.

In explanation, the \$1,200 books and school supplies is not available resource. No more than our school fixtures or road appliances. The \$1,324.27 is discount and abatement due J. F. Merriman, collector, '98, by reason of money collected and turned into hands of the present Treasurer that Mr. Merriman had received no credit for.

The \$3,000 unpaid bills are unquestionably a liability that is a pressing one as they should be paid at once. There is no good reason that under our present system of government

with subordinate officers in charge of every department, that at the closing up of our books February first, all bills should not be in.

We should not be willing to take upon ourselves bills contracted by the former administration, neither should we expect the next administration to do differently with bills contracted by us. Attached to the report of resources is this remark.

"There remains the unliquidated account of the City Treasurer of 1899 and 1900 against Woodbury & Moulton, the amount of the original claim being \$4,050.40." That amount should not have appeared in two city reports in succession. Mr. Knapp either was liable for that account or he was not. Although it would perhaps be pleasing to a great many of the citizens of our city if the courts should decide for Mr. Knapp against the city, yet the fact comes home to us that we are handling the people's money and the people are entitled to their just dues.

I will say in justice to Mr. Reynolds that I understand his views on this matter are the same as mine, and that he desired that the Council should adjust it in some manner.

We, the coming year, should not leave for the Board of next year any unpleasant duty that belongs to us to perform.

Our tax rate of \$17.80 is, you will all admit, very low, and the general sentiment throughout our city is that the valuation in most instances is certainly all it should be. The valuation has been raised in the past two years from \$1,861,199.00 to \$2,615,120.00, an increase of over \$750,000. The result is that while we are paying a lower rate in most instances, we are paying a higher tax. In connection with this department I would recommend that the assessors be given a stated salary, a fair compensation for their services.

ALMS HOUSE.

Two years ago, the overseers of the poor, of whom I was a member, made the following report in regard to this matter :

“We desire to call the attention of the incoming city government to the advisability of at once taking some action as to the care of those unfortunate ones who need our assistance.”

The present almshouse is not adequate to meet the needs of the poor, without being enlarged and made more convenient. And the city should carefully consider the best and most feasible plan to meet the growing needs of this department.

We are now supporting a large number of poor outside the almshouse at an expense which could greatly be reduced if a suitable building was provided for them. We have at

the insane hospital twelve patients at an annual cost of \$1,700 per year. Fifty per cent. of them could be supported at a great saving to the tax payers; and at the same time add to the comfort and happiness of those who appeal to our feelings and sympathy by promptly meeting this problem, and taking such action as will at once relieve the city of the onerous burden that weighs upon them.

The same conditions with no improvements exist today. There are two suggestions, either of which is the most feasible should be acted upon as early as possible. One, is the purchase and enlargement of the present quarters, the other the converting of the Town House and High School building into an almshouse. The latter in my judgment is what should be done. The argument is not only in favor of our almshouse but it at the same time favors the location of our High School in the central part of our city, where it most certainly belongs. No other one thing tends so much towards the growth of a city of this size, as its schools. The proposition to bond our city for the purpose would, in my judgment be a good, sound business transaction which in the end would net us good returns for our money.

STREET DEPARTMENT.

This department has cost us more money outside our schools than any other department, and it is the general sentiment throughout the city that more money has been wasted in this department than in any other. We have spent much foolish money on sidewalks that are not only a disgrace to the city but unsafe in many places to walk upon.

Had we used the money we have spent in building something substantial and lasting, the result would have been exactly opposite to what it is today. No other thing would tend so much towards the growth of the city outside our schools, as the establishment of some good, sub-

stantial walks throughout the most populous part of our city. Our neighbors adjacent to Portland are profiting off us by this very reason and by our lack of proper lighting of our streets. In my opinion it is mistaken economy. As the saying is it is the loss of a dollar to save a cent. The interest on a bond of \$25,000, as an illustration, would be less than \$1,000 yearly, which would bring us in improvements to taxable property more than enough to offset it.

Our facilities of transportation are equal to Deering, and if we offered the outside people intending to build the same inducements, we would get our share of growth. The bonded debt of our city will take care of itself, and it is perfectly right a rising generation should pay their proportional part of this. Talk this over with your constituents, and impress upon them the fact that these improvements will do them but little good after they are dead.

ACCOUNTS.

The matter of making our appropriations as I have already made mention of, that affect the different accounts, should not govern you in the making of the accounts any more than the expenditure through the year of the money that belongs to the several accounts.

In my opinion there has always been a wrong method pursued in this direction, and the remedy has not as yet been reached. While it practically makes no difference in the resources of our city how a certain amount of money is expended, I contend that we have no right to take from one account what belongs to another.

If we are obliged to overdraw an account the account should appear overdrawn in our report.

The Contingent Fund, as an example, has posed as a good fellow the last two years, although he never had much cause to kick as everything in sight seemed to be coming his way, and it would hardly have been fair in him to refuse to

settle when the occasion demanded, although in his behalf I will say that he did well stand the strain put upon him.

But really it is no joking matter as the reports show nearly \$2,000 that has gone into that fund this year, the most of which has been spent, that never belonged there.

The people have been taxed for those items once and the only way to square the matter is to tax them again.

If the same amount had been spent from the other accounts the result to our tax payers would have been the same, yet it is plain to see, that if the money had not been spent in the several accounts it would not likely have been spent at all. I should recommend that the Contingent Fund does not exceed \$1,000.

COMMITTEES.

I would impress again upon the several committees whom I may appoint, to have a special care over the subordinate officers who may come under their department. You should know at the end of every month just how their accounts stand, so that we all may be careful in trying not to exceed our appropriations.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

Many needed improvements have been made the past year in our school buildings and they should be in good shape and should require very little money for repairs the coming year.

Our sewerage has also received the attention which it should have received before, and the money raised by bonds of \$18,000 was well expended. Although the commissioners of this department recommends further improvements the coming year it does not involve a large amount.

IN CONCLUSION.

Anything I have said in my remarks, I have intended only for the welfare of the city; any errors that have been

made, I have pointed out as they appeared to me, so that we might profit by them. Perhaps we ourselves, in the beginning could have done no better, if, as well. I hold the office of Mayor neither from honor, nor from choice of myself, but because I have the welfare of my city at heart, and I seemed at the time to be the most available man in my party. I ask nothing of the city for my services and will allow you to place it to the account where it will do the most good. It will be my aim, as I believe it will be yours, to act impartially at all times on all measures, and if we do that which in our judgment the coming year is best to do for our city, we shall feel satisfied with ourselves, and our citizens and constituents should be satisfied with us.

Report of Street Commissioner.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen :

I herewith submit to you the annual report of streets, bridges, sidewalks and sewers from April 1, 1901, to Feb. 1, 1902.

In giving this, the annual report of the Department, I will in a few remarks, show the work that has been done the past season, the different kinds of work, also materials teamed and money expended for same.

In doing the work of the past year on streets it has been necessary to team 5,972 loads of gravel and rock at the cost of 50 cents per load, which has been distributed on the following streets, Woodbury, Willard, Preble, Fort Road, Myrtle, Pickett, Broadway, High, Jefferson, School, Sawyer, Pine, Front, Cottage, Highland Ave., Ocean, Summer, Evans, Lincoln, Main, Cash, Brown, Westbrook, E, D, B, C, and Stanford streets.

There have been built and repaired 73 culverts in the city, and a 140 foot stone wall on Lincoln street.

The east side of Ferry Wharf has been replanked, and both sides of Vaughan's bridge have been sheathed to make it safe for this year, and 20 running feet have been planked.

We have turnpiked the following streets with the road machine : Myrtle, Woodbury, Preble, Highland Ave., Westbrook, Cummings Road, Running Hill Road, Spring Summit, and Grand streets, and have cleared bushes off Pine and other streets.

There are nine bridges within the limits of the city, the principal one being Vaughan's, and the next in size is Long Creek and Mill Creek.

Vaughan's bridge is in a very bad condition and must be seen to the coming year, also the bridge on Payne Road.

It appears to me that it would be for the interest of the city to replace these bridges with iron ones as fast as rebuilding becomes necessary.

SIDEWALKS.

I find the sidewalks in several wards in very bad condition, and those that were not rebuilt this year will have to be the coming year.

There have been built this year 2,100 feet of plank sidewalk, 8,310 feet of stone, gravel and ash sidewalk, and there has been built by the abutters in different parts of the city 965 feet of cement sidewalk, for which the city has furnished 494 feet of curbing, at 47 cents a foot.

To build the earth sidewalk it has been necessary to team 2,580 loads of rock, gravel and ashes.

There will be a demand for curbing this year, and there should be a special appropriation for same.

Instead of the wooden sidewalks I should recommend Warren Brother's Tar Bituminous Concrete, which costs about 75 cents a square yard, and can be laid without curbing.

DRAINS AND SEWERS.

I have built 2,025 feet of sewer, and 194 feet of 24 inch drain, 14 catch-basins, 8 manholes, and have cleaned out all catch-basins, and general repairing of same, the cost of which you will find below.

There has been built this year 30 new catch-basins making in all 73, and there should be built as many more to drain the streets properly.

There are two wooden sewers in ward 2 and 3 that should be rebuilt. The one on Pickett street is in a very bad condition and is liable to cost the city more for damages than it would to build the sewer.

The other is on Sawyer street from High street to Broadway.

There should be built on Free street a new sewer as soon as the ground will permit, as the abutters are willing to pay their part, and have petitioned for same.

The above named sewer would be a benefit to the school-house on Pleasant street, which has no drainage and which is in bad condition, and dangerous for the health of teachers and scholars, and if the Board of Health would do their duty they would condemn the same.

In closing I would say, in numbering the streets I find 67 miles of street to be taken care of every year, and the yearly appropriation looks large to the citizens, but when divided up in 7 wards or on 67 miles of street it doesn't amount to much.

If the city should do what each tax payer wanted done it would cost more than \$60,000 a year to supply their wants.

You cannot expect any man to build roads with nothing. The stone crusher is no good, and we have no street roller,

and to build good roads in this city we must have them both.

I should recommend a more liberal appropriation for streets and sidewalks, and a four horse roller, and that the city should sell the old crusher and boiler and buy a new one, or take the money and buy crushed stone. I think it would do more good.

And we should adopt a system of building streets and sidewalks, and carry on the same, and build what we can each year. I think that the taxpayers would be better satisfied in so doing.

There is one thing that the city should do the coming year, that is to establish the street lines and bounds so that the Street Commissioner can build on the line and know what he is doing.

In the spring of the year we often hear the inquiry as to where all the money has gone to. If our citizens would read the report over carefully from year to year they would readily see where the money was expended, and be better judges for doing so.

I have herein tried to show the citizens of the city the work that has been done the past season. While I may have omitted some important points, it has not been intentional.

Report of City Solicitor.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

I herewith submit my report as City Solicitor for the year ending February 1st, 1902.

There were pending in the Superior Court at the beginning of the year two suits against the city, both brought by Alice B. Lowell, as follows:

Action for two thousand dollars damages, brought June 13th, 1900, for personal injuries alleged to have been caused on the 14th day of June, A. D. 1899, by a defect in the sidewalk on Front street.

Action for five hundred dollars damages, commencing Nov. 13th, 1900, for personal injuries alleged to have been caused on June 23d, 1900, by a defect in the sidewalk on Sawyer street.

These cases were carried along together and finally prepared for trial at the November term, 1901, when the plaintiff accepted the offer of the city and settlement was reached, by the terms of which the city was relieved of all liability in both cases upon payment of two hundred dollars.

There are pending at this time the following claims against the city upon which suit has not yet been brought:

Gardner Seavey, for damages resulting from change of grade on Clemons street.

Adeline Miller, for land damages.

Matthew Wood, for damages to building caused by a defective culvert.

Estate of John Abbott, for janitor's services.

Sarah Etta Walsh, for personal injuries caused by an alleged defective sidewalk.

The extension of the tracks of the Portland Railroad Company on the Saco road has caused considerable attention during the year, and has resulted in an appeal to the Supreme Judicial Court from the decision of the Railroad Commissioners granting leave to the railroad to lay its tracks across the Boston & Maine railroad over the bridge near the junction of the Rigby road.

It was the opinion of the municipal officers that the addition of tracks would make the bridge too narrow for public safety and convenience, and they requested that it be widened at the expense of the street railroad. The Board of Railroad Commissioners, however, denied the city's request and gave the railroad permission to cross the bridge as at present constructed. Under the direction of the City Council, an appeal was taken from this decision, and the matter will probably be in order for trial at the April term, 1902.

In a former report, I called attention to the imperative need of an edition of our charter and city ordinances, revised and annotated to date. The need is now more urgent than before, owing to the many rules and orders that are constantly being passed and amended. Citizens can have no intelligent understanding of the laws of the city when opportunity of acquiring the desired information is not furnished, and until our ordinances are placed within reach of everyone, it is useless to expect them to be observed.

Up to within three months previous to the closing of this year's administration there has been but an unusually small percentage of contagious diseases in this city. But in the time as above specified, diphtheria, especially in wards one, two and three, has had an unusual run, necessitating the closing of the schools in wards two and three for one week.

About fifty complaints have been received during the year in regard to unsanitary conditions, where in most cases everything was satisfactorily adjusted, there being a few as yet hanging fire awaiting the spring for some decided action to be taken.

Report of City Physician.

To the Honorable Mayor and Aldermen of the City of South Portland :

GENTLEMEN :—As City Physician for the municipal year ending Feb. 1st, 1902, I respectfully submit the following report: During the past year there has been but little sickness among the inmates of the Almshouse. The Overseer and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Jordan, deserve much praise for their excellent care of the sick, and for their judicious management of affairs pertaining to the health and comfort of those under their charge.

No deaths have occurred at the Almshouse during the year and but one death, among the outside poor coming under my care.

The year just closed has been for the greater part one of unusually good health to our city. The summer of 1901 was remarkable for the general good health of the community. Later diphtheria has prevailed to some extent, but it is hoped that its spread may be prevented and our city be freed from its presence. It is my opinion that the number of cases arising from neglected cesspools and other unsanitary conditions is much greater than that from transmission. In this connection it would seem advisable that still greater diligence should be exercised by our Board of Health.

The near approach of smallpox calls for stringent enforcement of the law in regard to vaccination. All who are in any degree unprotected should at once attend to vaccination and revaccination.

In my relations with the Overseers of the Poor I deem it but justice to say that in my opinion, they have, in all cases been mindful of the interests of the city, and faithful in supplying the wants of the destitute.

Report of Board of Registration.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN:—For the information of your honorable Board, as well as for that of our citizens generally, we respectfully submit the following annual report:

At this time a year ago we had just posted the city voting lists for the municipal election of March 4th, 1901, and revised lists are now posted for the ensuing annual election. A year ago the posted lists contained an aggregate of 1,257 names. The registration session preceding the March election was a fruitful one in its harvest of voters, greatly exceeding the most liberal forecast made, adding to the lists 173 names.

There were also 27 "strike off's" this session so the revised lists on the day of election contained the names of 1,403 qualified voters.

The usual clerical work entailed by an election session was followed later on by the regular annual revision, which under the law should be in July. Owing to our inability to obtain, in season, the requisite statutory data for carrying forward this work, coupled with the fact that there would be no election before spring, the revision was postponed to a more convenient date. Sufficient to say, beginning Oct. 1st, the work was continued from day to day, until a complete revision was effected.

Four lists for each ward, 28 copies in all, were prepared, *i. e.*, 7 copies for posting, 14 copies for use of election officers and 7 copies (1 each ward) for the use of the Board.

Early in the year the City Council took steps to correct the confusion existing in our street names, also to have all dwellings and business places renumbered after some regular and permanent system.

In our work of revision, finding it impossible to obtain a complete and reliable report of the renumbering, we deemed it wise to ignore that feature as well as the new street names, until both could be transmitted to us in a finished and certified form. This course enables us to use our old voting lists in the ensuing March election at a considerable present saving to the city for the cost of new ones. After striking from the lists all who have died, and all, as far as known, who have removed from the city since the last annual revision, 103 in all, there remains on our lists as now posted at the several polling places 1,327 names. While, during the year there have been added to the voting lists 173, there have also been 103 "strike off's," making a net gain of 70 for the year.

Change of ward residence, 25 in number, were made as part of the work of revision.

The total number now borne on the voting list (1,327) is distributed as follows in the several wards: Ward 1, 175; Ward 2, 210; Ward 3, 231; Ward 4, 161; Ward 5, 135; Ward 6, 186; Ward 7, 229.

No doubt the approaching registration session will add quite as many voters to the lists as did the corresponding session a year ago, in which event we will have rising 1,500 names for the municipal election of 1902.

It has ever been the aim of this Board to keep expenses down to the minimum, and within the allowances made for its maintenance, and we point to the Auditors' reports as evidence of this.

But for the grossly inadequate appropriation (\$150) made the first year of our municipal existence, compelling the use of each succeeding year's allowance to pay the previous

year's bills, we might now, with the sums since voted, show a handsome balance to our credit instead of the small sum exhibited.

Memorial Day Report, 1901.

SIRS:—I herewith submit my report of the observance of Memorial Sunday, and Memorial Day, 1901, by the Veteran Association and Citizens.

OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL SUNDAY BY SOUTH PORTLAND VETERAN ASSOCIATION AND CITIZENS.

Some fifty members of the Association accompanied by citizens, honorary members and visiting comrades from Portland were formed in line by the Marshal, Comrade M. A. Hanna, and marched to "The Cole Memorial Church," Sawyer street, where they were favored with fine singing and an eloquent, patriotic sermon by the Pastor, the Rev. Mr. Pennoyer.

At the close of the sermon the audience arose and united in singing "America," and were dismissed with the benediction.

OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY, MAY 30TH, 1901.

Notwithstanding the threatening aspect of the weather, 35 Veterans of South Portland considered it a sacred duty incumbent on them to assemble at the City Building, Post Office Square, on Memorial Day morning for the purpose of showing their respect to the memory of their fallen comrades, by strewing garlands of flowers and wreaths of evergreen on their graves and assisting in suitable services in their memory.

Brown's Hill was first visited. The Rev. Mr. Leitch invoked the blessing of Almighty God on the work in which we were engaged.

The quartette sang "No more the sound of the bugle" in a very touching manner, twenty-three graves were decorated by placing a miniature U. S. flag and a wreath of evergreen and flowers at the head of each comrade.

A detachment under command of Comrade J. H. Taylor, accompanied by the Rev. Mr. Pennoyer, proceeded to Forest City Cemetery where special decorations were made.

"We decorate their graves to-day" was rendered by the quartette. Benediction being pronounced by Elder Hiram Mains, the line of march was conducted to "Bay View."

At "Bay View" the veterans formed in line in the center of the burial place, and "We gather here with reverence" was sang by the quartette. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Corey of the "Peoples Church" after which 17 graves of departed ones were suitably decorated. The quartette sang "Decoration Day" and Rev. Mr. Newcomb pronounced the benediction. The procession then proceeded to Knightville where a bountiful collation awaited. Hiram Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons put their dining hall and dishes at our disposal, for which the Veteran Association is truly thankful.

At the collation Cape Elizabeth veterans, members of the City Government, other invited guests and comrades who had been detained by the weather and other causes, joined with us so that there were present at dinner 78. The Rev. Mr. Lawton having asked Our Heavenly Father to bless the food of which we were about to partake, the assembly fell to with appetites whetted by the exercises of the morning.

After the usual after-dinner smoke and talk we climbed the hill to "Mount Pleasant." Prayers were offered by the Rev. Mr. Newcomb of "Bethany," and the Rev. Mr. Pennoyer of "The Cole Memorial" church. "No more the bugle

calls," was sung by the quartette. Ninty-five flags and wreaths were placed on the resting places of ninty-five comrades who had answered the last roll call.

At the Soldiers and Sailors' Monument appropriate services were held, consisting of prayer by Elder Hiram Mains, decorating with wreaths (Cape Elizabeth furnishing one for the south, and South Portland one for the north side) singing and benediction.

The old North Church which is always at the disposal of the veterans was then occupied; it having been fittingly decorated with flags and pictures of war time heroes, by Comrades Sylvester and Hanna. Eulogistic remarks on our late Comrade, Noah B. Knight were made by the Marshal.

Rev. Robert Lawton, pastor of the church, speaking in behalf of himself, the society, and parish, welcomed the veterans to their place of worship; prayer was also offered by Mr. Lawton. The quartette sang "Welcome Grand Army Men." Comrade E. C. Reynolds, the orator of the day, favored the audience with a splendid oration; patriotic, eloquent, and instructive. At the close the quartette sang "Flag of our Country."

Remarks were then in order from clergy and invited guests, and the remaining time was improved by five minute speeches by Elder Hiram Mains, Rev. Mr. Newcomb, Rev. Mr. Pennoyer, Rev. Mr. Leitch, Rev. Mr. Corey, Rev. Mr. Lawton, His Honor Mayor Trefethen, Alderman Small and Geo. F. Henley, Esq.

The Roll of Honor was read by the Secretary. "America" was sang by the quartette and audience, and the services for Memorial Day, 1901, were ended.

In concluding my report I wish to add that when the committee "on procuring an orator" waited on Mr. Reynolds to ascertain his charge for the service, they were informed by that gentleman that the pleasure afforded him by having the privilege of addressing the veterans on that occasion was

considered by him (Mr. Reynolds) an ample reward, which no doubt will be duly appreciated by the veterans.

APPENDIX.

Rules of the City Council.

SEC. 1. The presiding officer shall take the chair promptly at the time appointed for the meeting, and, having called the Council to order and a roll call showing a quorum present, shall proceed at once to business.

SEC. 2. He shall be entitled to speak on questions of order but not on any other question when occupying the chair; shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Council, declare all votes, preserve order and decorum, and shall appoint all committees unless they are otherwise provided for.

SEC. 3. When stating a question or motion, or when addressing a Council, the presiding officer shall rise, but may read sitting.

SEC. 4. When a question is under debate no motion shall be in order except the following:

1. To adjourn.
2. The previous question.
3. To commit.
4. To amend.
5. To postpone indefinitely.
6. To lay on the table.

SEC. 5. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except when immediately repeated.

SEC. 6. The following questions shall be decided without debate:

1. To adjourn.
2. The previous question.
3. All questions of order and appeals from the decision of the chair thereon.
4. To lay on the table and take from the table.

SEC. 7. When a vote has been passed any member who voted in the majority may move a reconsideration of said vote at the time, or at the next succeeding regular meeting, but not afterward, but a vote to reconsider shall require a majority of all the members of the Council.

SEC. 8. Every member present shall vote unless specially excused by the Council before the vote is taken.

SEC. 9. A motion to commit shall take precedence of all amendments of the main question.

SEC. 10. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if any member shall so request.

SEC. 11. The enacting form as an ordinance shall be as follows: "Be it ordained by the City Council." The form of an order shall be as follows: "In City Council, Ordered:" etc. The form of a resolve shall be: "In City Council, Resolved:" etc.

SEC. 12. When a vote is doubted the members for and against the motion shall rise when called upon by the presiding officer and remain standing until counted.

SEC. 13. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question at any one meeting unless by permission of the Council.

SEC. 14. The Council may resolve itself into committee of the whole on any question and the presiding officer shall appoint a member who shall occupy the chair.

SEC. 15. Special committees of the Council shall report within one month unless further time is granted.

SEC. 16. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the presiding officer and not proceed until recognized by the chair. He shall confine himself to the question under discussion and avoid intemperate and abusive language.

SEC. 17. The clerk shall keep a record of all votes, orders, ordinances and other proceedings of the Council in a journal; shall prepare and present to the Mayor all votes, ordinances and documents requiring his signature, unless the Council shall otherwise direct; shall notify, or cause to be notified, all members of the Council of the time of special meetings, as provided by the

charter; and shall perform such other duties, not inconsistent with the charter, as the Council may from time to time prescribe.

SEC. 18. All by-laws passed by the City Council shall be styled ordinances, and shall receive at least two readings before they are finally passed to be ordained, not more than one of which readings shall be at the same meeting of the City Council; and all amendments, alterations or repeals of ordinances shall be made in the same manner and subject to the same number of readings as original ordinances.

SEC. 19. None of these rules or orders shall be suspended unless by a two-thirds vote of the members present; and such suspension shall continue only during the meeting at which such vote is taken; and no rule or order shall be altered or repealed unless written notice shall have been given at a preceding meeting, nor unless a majority of all the members of the Council vote to so alter or repeal.

SEC. 20. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by the presiding officer subject to an appeal to the Council.

Order of Business.

The following shall be the order of business unless when otherwise determined by the Council:

1. Roll call.
2. Reading of minutes.
3. Unfinished business.
4. Orders of the day.
5. Reports of the committees.
6. New business.
7. Adjournment.

Standing Committees.

On Finance and Claims: To consist of the Mayor and two aldermen.

On Streets, Bridges and Sidewalks: To consist of three aldermen.

On Public Buildings: To consist of three aldermen.

On Sewers: To consist of three aldermen.

On Engrossed Ordinances and Printing: To consist of three aldermen.

On Laying Out of New Streets: To consist of the Mayor and two aldermen.

On Education and Schools: To consist of three aldermen.

All committees shall report on matters referred to them within one month.
