# MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

---

*Gentlemen of the Council:*

As we meet here this evening, our first meeting for the purpose of talking up our duties as the chosen servants of the people, it is found that the political complexion of our City Government has changed from the Republican Board of last year to a Democratic Council.

There have been returned three members of last year's Council, and there are four new members, although one of the new members has already served the city one year as Alderman, having served in that capacity during the first year of our city form of government. Another new member of our present City Council has served on the School Board during the five years of our existence as a city, and has, therefore, had considerable experience in municipal affairs. And another of our new members has served the city in the capacity of an Assessor, and may well be regarded as an experienced official.

Thus it is seen that the present City Council is made up of experienced men, and of whom our citizens have the right to and do expect good government. I fail to see any reason why the highest expectations of the people should not be fully realized, and I sincerely hope that they may not be disappointed.

## STREETS, ETC.

This is one of the departments of our city which requires and should have the most careful attention.

During the past year, the matter of government aid was taken up in the form of a resolution of the Council asking

for the construction of a military road. This resolution was forwarded to our representative in Congress, Hon. Amos L. Allen, who took the matter up vigorously and gave the same his very careful attention. The matter was referred to the War Department, which very promptly refused to lend us any aid whatever in the direction indicated.

In this direction it might be well to call your attention to the fact that an effort was also made by the last Council to secure a close time on the draw of Portland bridge during the time of our heaviest travel each day. This matter was also referred to the War Department, and a hearing held at the engineer's office in Portland, but the Department refused to grant our request.

#### STATE ROAD.

Last year a small beginning was made in the direction of permanent road building under a state law in favor of state roads. This law provides, in substance, that a city or town may designate a certain street as a state road, and then receive from the state a sum equal to one-half of the amount appropriated and actually expended by such city or town in permanent improvement of such state road. Hence, under this provision for state aid, whenever the city of South Portland appropriates and expends the sum of four hundred dollars, the state will furnish the sum of two hundred dollars, so that the sum of six hundred dollars may be expended in permanent road construction each year for an annual appropriation of four hundred dollars, which amounts to a fifty per cent. dividend on the investment for one year. This is a very liberal provision, and should be regularly utilized each year.

#### SEWERS.

This Council will be called upon to take some action in the matter of sewer construction. The earlier this work can be taken up, the better it can be accomplished.

There are several very pressing demands in this department, and it is very desirable that some action be taken very early in order that the necessary work may be done, and any proposed sewers completed before the approach of the unfavorable fall and winter weather.

This is a matter that should be taken up immediately by the Committee on Sewers, so that they can make report and recommendation to the Council at an early date, in order that the Council may proceed intelligently in whatever sewer work it may determine to have done.

#### VAUGHAN'S BRIDGE.

As you well know, it will be necessary for the present Board to meet the necessity of rebuilding Vaughan's Bridge, and I presume it is advisable that a committee be raised by the Council as soon as possible, to investigate the whole matter and report to the Board. Such committee should act promptly, as it may be found desirable to arrange with the City of Portland for the construction of the entire bridge under one contract or set of contracts, the City of South Portland to pay its proportionate part of the cost; and if such an arrangement is to be made action should be taken at once, as the City of Portland is already proceeding in the matter.

#### OUT POOR.

The out-poor department of our city has heretofore been exceedingly unsatisfactory in the results obtained. Last year was probably the most economical year in the city's history.

Satisfactory results in this department in years past have been practically impossible, largely owing to the lack of adequate accommodations at our almshouse. I trust that each and every member of the present Council will take an active interest and give careful attention to the affairs of

this department, with a view of improving the same as much as possible.

### CITY HOME.

The city now has a suitable almshouse, an establishment that is a credit to the city, and which ought to be very helpful in solving some of the difficult problems of our out-poor department. I hope that every member of the Board will cultivate an interest in this institution and closely observe order, that the best possible results may be obtained in every respect.

### SCHOOLS.

The management of our schools is in the hands of a competent School Board and a very able Supervisor.

It is important that our City Council and our School Board work harmoniously together for the best interests and welfare of our city and our schools. The best interests of our schools are identical with the best interests of our city, and are inseparable.

It will be necessary for this Board to proceed without unnecessary delay to consider and provide for the erection of a new school building in Ward one, to replace the Willard grammar school building, which was destroyed by fire in January last. In determining upon this matter, the Council should reasonably consider the probable requirements of the future, as well as the immediate needs of the present.

### COMMITTEES.

I wish to remind you of the importance of the committee work. There are very many matters constantly arising which cannot be advantageously considered, in the first instance, by the Council as a whole. Such matters should be referred to the proper committees for investigation and report.

Whenever such a matter is referred to any committee, the

committee should proceed at once to make the necessary investigation. The investigation should be made carefully, and each member of the committee should, as far as possible, familiarize himself with the subject matter, so that when the report of the committee is returned to the Council the Board may have full information and act intelligently; and the committee should be in a position at the time of submitting their report to make some recommendation to the Council for its consideration and guidance, if the same be required.

And I hope that no member of any committee will, even in a single instance, place his name in approval upon any bill against the city, without first satisfying himself in some way that the bill should be approved.

#### IN CONCLUSION.

Last year's City Council made a very careful and constant effort to refrain from referring any matters to this Board, so as not to embarrass this administration in any way. No City Government has ever had the advantage of so clean a start as is presented to you at the beginning of this municipal year, and I congratulate you that you are to be unhampered by any vexatious questions bequeathed by the last Council. It is to be hoped that you will make all reasonable efforts to leave the city's affairs at the end of the municipal year in as good condition as you have found them in the beginning.

The City of South Portland is to be congratulated upon the character of its present Board of Aldermen. As soon as the new City Government is fully organized, all political considerations should be laid aside, and every question should be considered strictly and exclusively on its own intrinsic merits.

The Mayor last year advised that when any member had any matter of importance to bring before the Council, he should confer with other members of the Board, so that all might have a fair opportunity to consider the subject before



being obliged to vote, as snap judgments are dangerous. This suggestion was disregarded to some extent, which caused some confusion at times. The deliberations of the present Council will certainly result much more satisfactorily if the members will freely and frankly confer with each other upon all proposed action before presenting the same in open Council meetings.

As Mayor, I shall serve the City of South Portland and this honorable Council to the very best of my ability, and I know that it is the earnest desire of all the members of this Board to serve well the interests of the people who have reposed their confidence in you and who have elected you to your present responsible positions.

And now, gentlemen of the Council, expressing my desire to co-operate in harmony with you in all things pertaining to our city's interests, and in behalf of the citizens of South Portland, I entrust our municipal affairs into your charge and keeping, feeling assured that the confidence of our people has not been misplaced.

## Report of Street Commissioner.

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SOUTH PORTLAND, February 1, 1905.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of South Portland:*

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report as Street Commissioner, as follows:

### STREETS.

By order of Mayor the labor in each ward was kept separate, but as some ward's account will exceed others it was due to the condition of the streets, so we thought it best to spend our money where it was most needed.

### WARD 1.

Have crowned the following streets:

Pillsbury from Preble to Cottage, Cottage from Sawyer to top Meeting House Hill, Preble from Pillsbury to Angell avenue and Beach from Preble to Myrtle, and other repairs wherever needed.

### WARD 2.

Repairs on Broadway from Stanford to Preble and Preble from Broadway to Front street, but the much-needed work was on the old Ferry Hill, so called. The ledge on east side was blasted out, so as to have good drainage on east side of street. The street was graded with ledge rock and gravel, which put it in good shape.

### WARD 3.

Ward 3 has had no permanent work but has had the general repairs attended to.

## WARD 4.

The condition of Cottage street was found to be such that it was thought best to gravel it from the foot of Meeting House Hill to Ocean street, Knightville, but a part of the expense was paid by the New England Telephone Co. Summer street was graveled from Ocean street to the house of Thomas F. O'Neil.

The usual cleaning of paving in Knightville has been kept up.

The road machine was used on the following cross streets, A, B, C, D and E.

## WARD 5.

In removing the clay from City Home, it was put on Highland avenue. The sand was thrown out, the clay put in bottom and the street crowned with road machine from Ocean street to Anthoine.

The drains on Buzzell Hill were opened, the hill covered with ledge rock and gravel.

The road machine was used on Highland avenue, Evans street to George A. Dyer's, Evans street from Highland avenue to Nutter street.

## WARD 6.

The streets in Ward 6 were found to be in fair condition with the exception of some short places which will have to be attended to next year. Repairs were made where needed.

## WARD 7.

Ward 7 has more miles of street than any other in the city and is subjected to more heavy teaming than any other. Main street has been graveled from Ligonias to Cash Corner. From Westbrook street we used clay and gravel to the house of David Plummer. Brown street from Cash Corner to Boston & Maine Railroad was crowned with road machine and gravel.

There have been numerous culverts and driveways built throughout the city during the year.

#### STATE ROAD.

Appropriation raised by city, four hundred dollars (\$400). Received from State, two hundred dollars (\$200). Was continued on Ocean street, and built of ledge rocks, crushed rock and gravel, the distance built being eight hundred feet (800 ft.), at a cost of seventy-five cents per foot.

#### NEW STREETS.

There were two new streets laid out. One at Prospect Hill, Ward 1, and one to run from Summer street to Hill street, Ward 6, but owing to cold weather only one was built.

#### SIDEWALKS.

The one thing pleasing to the Street Department is that only a few old board sidewalks remain. Have removed board walk and replaced with gravel and cinder walks as follows: School street, from East High, a distance of 500 feet; East High street from Preble to Shawmut. Preble from Broadway to Summit was built with two-inch plank, Ward 2. In Ward 4, the board walk was all removed and about 1,400 feet of cement walk built.

The rest was built with gravel and rock dust, and there was 112 feet of cement walk in Ward 3.

#### NEW SIDEWALKS.

New sidewalk was constructed from the Henry Nutter home to Highland avenue. From the Nutter home to John Cotton's was Ward 6, and from John Cotton's to Highland avenue, Ward 5.

#### BRIDGES.

We found Vaughan's Bridge in a very unsafe condition, and a special committee was appointed as a Vaughan's

Bridge committee. The bridge was covered with two-inch plank and paid for out of Street and Bridge appropriation.

Planked one-half Anthoine Bridge, Ward 6, bridge on Gorham street and Cummings Road Bridge in Ward 7.

### SEWERS.

Under the appropriation the general repairs were carried on, the following catch basins were built. Three in Ward 2, two in Ward 4, one in Ward 6, two in Ward 7. This and the purchasing of two new sewers, relaying three hundred feet on Pine street, completes the sewer work.

### NEW SEWERS.

There were nine in all. Two in Ward 1, two in Ward 2, three in Ward 6, one in Ward 7 and Summer street sewer was extended two hundred and eighty feet. This was all contract work.

## Report of City Solicitor.

SOUTH PORTLAND, ME., Feb. 10, 1905.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Aldermen :*

I herewith respectfully submit my report as City Solicitor for the year ending February 1, 1905.

No actions were pending in court at the commencement of my official term and none are now pending on the court docket in which the city is interested.

The first claim left with me for consideration was against the Portland Water Company. At the time the Willard school was burned, there was an insufficiency of water. On this account a claim was made against the Water Company to contribute towards a new schoolhouse. The Hon. George P. Wescott called a meeting of the Company and voted to pay one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to the City of South Portland, which was paid and accepted in full satisfaction of any claims against the Company.

Two claims for damages were made against the city on account of injuries received on the sidewalk near the home of Daniel McCann, and after the presentation of the evidence the city was considered not liable and the parties had permission to withdraw.

Daniel P. Anthoine made a claim of four hundred and thirty dollars (\$430.00) against the city for rent during the years 1902 and 1903. After presentation of the evidence, leave was given to withdraw.

Frederick G. Orr presented a claim for damages alleged to have resulted from defects on the Cottage road near the Mill Pond Bridge. After a hearing he was given leave to withdraw. No further action has been taken on the case.

Messrs. Soule and Bagley, who were represented by Messrs. Littlefield and Tilden, Boston attorneys, made a claim against the city for damages for locating the sewer improperly on their land. This case had been under advisement for some years and has been finally satisfactorily adjusted.

Jesse Dyer, Esq., of Pleasantdale, claimed damages from the city on account of an overflow of his ice pond. After a presentation of the claim to the City Government, Mr. Dyer had leave to withdraw, and no further action has been taken in this case.

By action of the City Government, a petition has been filed in the Probate Court for my appointment as guardian of William Goth, a person of unsound mind, now in the Insane Asylum at Augusta. I find that his father's estate represented over four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00). His father died without making any will. The mother, who has died recently, made a will, but did not mention William Goth in the will. I find that the family has not contributed anything to the support of William Goth since his commitment, and the commitment was made by the city authorities of Portland. I may be able to get something from the estate to reimburse the City of South Portland in a measure for its expenses already incurred on William Goth's account.

My attention has been called to some wharf property near Rocky Point in South Portland, which many of our citizens claim belongs to the city, and also to a lot of land near Fort Preble, which many claim also belongs to the City of South Portland, and so appears on some of the old maps. I would suggest, if the city authorities do not at this time think it advisable to try and recover possession of this property by law, that the depositions *in perpetuum* be taken of the old residents who are acquainted with the facts relating to the ownership of the property by the town and made a matter of record, and then notices be served on the adjoining owners and those claiming any interest in the property to prevent their obtaining an easement therein.

I am pleased to report that there has been very little, if any, litigation requiring the professional services of the City Solicitor during the past year.

## Police Department.

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*To the People of South Portland :*

During the past year there has been more money expended for police service than during any previous year of our existence as a city. Nevertheless, the results obtained have been very far from satisfactory. This has not been so much the fault of the officers as the fault of the people themselves, this deplorable condition being principally due to a diseased public sentiment. So long as the people of South Portland persist in sympathizing with and supporting the hoodlum element, as against the officer of law and order, just so long must any attempted police regulations prove inefficient and unsatisfactory from the law and order standpoint.

This is a matter that is largely in the hands of the people. When the people will support the officers in the discharge of their duty, and cease to applaud and encourage those inclined to be unruly or disorderly, then, and only then, can the administration of this department be made efficient and satisfactory.

In support of the foregoing, there might be cited many instances during the past year which unmistakably showed the tendency of a large percentage of our people to support the disorderly factions as against the enforcement of law and order.

Assuring you that this statement is made strictly in a spirit of friendliness, and with the hope that public sentiment may be improved in the direction indicated, this report is

## Report of Board of Health.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of South Portland :*

GENTLEMEN:—We hereby submit the annual report of the Board of Health of the City of South Portland for the year ending Jan. 31st, 1905.

The board organized in March, 1904, and chose James W. Lowell as chairman and Gregory E. Blish as secretary.

The total number of deaths in this city for the year was 90, a decrease of 25 from last year, a rate of a little less than thirteen per thousand. The deaths from contagious diseases are as follows: Consumption, 11, typhoid fever, 1, membranous croup, 1.

Disinfection of rooms, bedding, etc., after contagious diseases has been continued as heretofore, at the expense of the city.

The laws of the State require that householders and physicians shall, within twenty-four hours, give notice to the Board of Health of the existence of cases of contagious diseases. We earnestly request the co-operation of our citizens, in order that these diseases may be confined within the narrowest possible limits.

We have been obliged to quarantine several houses on suspicion of having been exposed to small-pox, but happily our fears were groundless. We have caused quite a number of children to be vaccinated as a prevention against the disease.

Whenever it becomes necessary to order vaccination for proper protection, there are those who question the authority of the board. For the information of our citizens, the fol-

following extract from Chapter 18, of the Revised Statutes, is submitted :

Sec. 82. "The Board of Health of each city, village, town and plantation shall annually on the first day of March, or oftener if they deem it prudent, provide for the free vaccination with the cow pox, of all the inhabitants over two years of age within their respective localities, to be done under the care of skilled practicing physicians, and under such circumstances and restrictions as said authorities adopt therefor."

We regret to announce the death on Oct. 8th, 1904, of the President of our board, James W. Lowell, M. D. The doctor has been on the board for many years and was thoroughly conversant with the requirements of his office, and with the laws bearing on all matters pertaining to the public health. His place will be hard to fill.

## Report of Building Inspector.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of South Portland.*

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit my annual report as Inspector of Buildings.

In accordance with the provisions of the city ordinance relating to the inspection of buildings, I have performed such duties as are specifically set forth, and also such other duties as from time to time have been ordered by the City Council, and have inspected many buildings at the request of the owners thereof. In doing so, I have generally received courteous treatment and my suggestions have been cheerfully complied with.

The whole number of permits granted during the year ending Jan. 31st, 1905, was 34. In addition to this number, there have been many alterations and repairs of old buildings, necessitating a thorough inspection. In the performance of my duties I have made more than one hundred and fifty calls during the past year, and carefully inspected each building in process of construction or of being repaired, as required by law.

I would recommend that copies of the ordinances relating to the "Erection and Alteration of Buildings" be printed for distribution, as many of our citizens are ignorant of any law on the subject, and consequently I have found buildings nearly completed for which no permit has been granted.

## Report of City Electrician.

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*To the Honorable Mayor and Aldermen of the City of South Portland.*

GENTLEMEN:--In accordance with the requirements of the office of City Electrician, I have the honor to report to you the condition of the electric wiring. Of the inside wiring I have inspected seventeen new buildings, all of which have been wired to conform with the New England Board of Fire Underwriters' rules; also several buildings of the old work, and have had some changes made. Of the outside work, the Northeastern Telephone Co. have built lines through the city; they have been built very satisfactorily. They have some changes to make on Broadway, where they cross the trolley wires and cables of the Railroad Co.

The New England Telephone Co. have built a new line out by Town House Corner, and they are to rebuild the old line on Broadway in the spring. The Railroad and Electric Light Co.'s lines are in very good shape.

I most earnestly recommend that the city take some action in regard to a fire alarm system. There are several locations where there would be a delay of ten to twenty minutes in giving an alarm, which is very important in case of fire. We also have the water front of South Portland proper, where a few minutes' delay might cause a conflagration. The alarm, could also be used for school purposes, which the city is in need of.

Below is a report of the City of Westbrook of their system of fire alarm, which I think clearly demonstrates itself.

“October 8th, 1896, in accordance with a vote of your Honorable Body, the Gamewell System of Fire Alarm Telegraph was installed in our city, and has since that time performed its work to the entire satisfaction of all our citizens. It has, I think, clearly demonstrated that by its use some ten and in many instances fifteen minutes are saved in giving an alarm, and the additional means of locating a fire within a very few minutes of its discovery is to members of the fire department at least of incalculable value, and one which I believe to be thoroughly appreciated by every interested member of the Westbrook department.”

## Report of School Board.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

At a regular meeting of the superintending school committee, held on Wednesday evening, Feb. 1, 1905, the report of the Superintendent of Schools was presented (a copy of which is subjoined) and by the committee accepted and adopted as its report to your honorable body.

*To the Superintending School Committee of the City of South Portland:*

GENTLEMEN:—The conditions and the needs of the school department have had full discussion at your regular monthly meetings, where you have had laid before you full information regarding such phases of the work as seemed to demand your attention. There seems to be little need that I should make to you a formal report, unless it be to comply with the custom, but this custom had its origin in the notion that the people gain their knowledge of public affairs through official reports, and I am satisfied that to-day a majority of our citizens do not read the school reports, and that the few who do regard them as having been written for rhetorical effect rather than as meaning what they say. I shall therefore make the present one brief and to the point.

The city ought to pay a salary of one thousand or twelve hundred dollars to its Superintendent, and elect a man who should devote his entire time to the schools; it would pay. I should be obliged to decline the position under those terms,

but I can see a vast amount of routine and detail work that might profitably be taken up and carried forward by the Superintendent if he had the time.

The law makes it the duty of the Superintendent to inform himself for the benefit of the board of the workings of the schools, and of the competency of the teachers. This part of my duty I have performed as best I could, and I know pretty well which of our teachers live in their work, and which ones live by their work. Some of them study the earth, the sea and sky for new pieces of knowledge to give to their pupils, while there are others who content themselves with performing in a more or less perfunctory manner the stereotyped routine of a teacher's tasks. I think I have them pretty accurately classified into two grand divisions, of those who are worth more than they are paid, and those who ought in justice to themselves, as well as to their schools, to be otherwise employed.

Of the latter class, which constitutes a very decided minority, some are doing their best, but are temperamentally unfitted for their work ; they make honest efforts, but owing to their personal traits, which in other spheres of usefulness would perhaps not be at all to their disadvantage, they can never succeed as teachers. It does not require the sagacity of a prophet or a seer to read in the attitude and conduct of the teachers, as I meet them both in school hours and out, their qualifications for their work.

I realize that a word of criticism is pregnant with the portents of disaster to him who would venture it, and I will go no further than to offer the above general statement ; indeed, I will cheerfully say that our teachers are generally of a high order of capability and universally faithful, but I must in the conscientious discharge of my duty admit that not all of our teachers are gifted to an equal degree with that natural talent for school-room work that is absolutely essential to the highest success. And why should such a



proposition be construed as a reflection upon any one, "for to one is given the word of wisdom, to another the gifts of healing, and to another, prophecy." If a young lady were to select the occupation of a trained nurse or of a stenographer, or to engage in soliciting, and were to meet with ill success in consequence of her ill adaptability to the calling of her choice, she would very readily and without the slightest feeling of humiliation declare herself as unsuited thereto, and would engage in another pursuit; but because of some restraining force, which seems to me to be none other than a species of false pride, a teacher usually has a supreme dread of leaving a school under circumstances suggestive of any lack of fitness on her part. If it is public esteem she seeks, she should rather dread to remain in a school to which she is not wholly adapted.

It is painful to me in the extreme to recommend the dismissal of any teacher, for my personal relations with them and personal regard for each of them are such as to make such action seem like stabbing a friend, but the dire evil and gross injustice to the expanding lives of the pupils resulting from incompetent and unsympathetic instruction is a consideration which impels me at least to repeat a suggestion which I made last year, that we can at least use the greatest care that none but competent and worthy teachers be elected to fill vacancies, and in this connection I am happy to say that of the ten new teachers last summer added to our list I can commend nine of them as having added distinctly to the strength of our force. I might say much upon the subject of the insufficiency of salaries paid, but I realize that the remedy for this wrong is not within your power, and that you exercise the greatest care to have the amount at your disposal bestowed as equitably and to as good advantage as possible.

The question of truancy is to me a troublesome one. I am aware that there is a large amount of it, but to remedy

it entails two objections: First, it involves an expense of considerable magnitude, to meet which there are no funds provided, and second it would impose upon teachers already so overtaxed with work an additional burden of caring for a contingent of pupils not adapted to any particular grade and of the worst possible type from a disciplinary standpoint. In many cases, if all the truants were gone after and brought into school, the result would be to demoralize the whole room and destroy its usefulness to the pupils who attend regularly by absorbing so much of the teacher's time and strength.

A third practical difficulty in the way of enforcing the truancy laws lies in the fact that most of the truancy has the consent and even the support of parents, and an attempt to compel attendance is met by the claim that the pupil is not of an age when he can be compelled to attend school, or by an appeal on the ground of poverty and necessity for the child's assistance at home that is hard to resist. I shall be most happy, however, to carry out any policy which seems to you to give promise of conferring the greatest good upon the greatest number.

By reason of a change in the State law the school census this year was made to include all children between the ages of five and twenty-one, instead of four and twenty-one as formerly. The enumeration showed our school population to be 1,788 as against 1,837 last year. The average attendance for the year has been 1,088.

I append hereto a table, showing the enrollment in the several schools by grades.

## Report of the City Physician.

The work for this year has been much less than in previous years. There has been less sickness of the out poor as well as at the City Home. I can see a great change for the better on account of the new home. This has been needed for a long time, as all the tax payers well know the accommodations at the City Home are very much better than in the average private home. There is one thing that should be attended to before warm weather comes again, that is, the windows should be screened, as it not only adds comfort to the inmates and superintendent's family, but will do away with a great amount of sickness that is transmitted by the fly and mosquito. The walls and ceilings are too white and nice to be allowed to become soiled and disfigured by neglect.

There have been fewer cases of contagious diseases than in previous years.

The overseers have been very faithful and prompt in the performance of their arduous work.

## Report of Board of Registration.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen :*

GENTLEMEN:—The Board of Registration of voters hereby respectfully submits this, its annual report, for the municipal year ending Feb. 1st, 1905.

As forecast in our last report, this has been the busiest year of our official existence.

Besides the regular annual revision session there have been also four election or registration sessions, to wit:

Municipal,	March 7th, 1904
Special (annexation),	June 20th “
State and County,	Sept. 12th “
Presidential,	Nov. 8th “

In the several foregoing sessions the following accretions by registration were made to the city voting lists:

March	election,	106	names
June (special)	“	19	“
September	“	99	“
November	“	10	“
Total for year,		234	“

In the annual revision there were found missing from the list of polls transmitted to us by Board of Assessors 127 names borne on the voting lists used in the preceding March election. By the same authority and other proper information sources, 45 changes of ward residence were also noted and confirmed.

Of the missing names, after a judicious and searching canvass, 97 were struck from the lists, as having either died or removed from our city.

The remaining 30 were retained as citizens still having a voting status in our city, and these names were further dealt with by us as required in Sec. 11, state registration law.

The September election contained elements of interest



sufficient to warrant one of our city political committees, demanding under terms of new caucus law, check lists for use in forthcoming caucuses. In a brief clerical session copies enough were prepared and delivered to the City Clerk for use of both Republican and Democratic parties. This extra draft upon our lists, together with the special (June 20th) election demand, completely exhausted our stock and put us to our wits to patch up revised copy from which to have new lists printed.

The latter work was made a part of the annual revision session, the copy prepared by us from which new lists were printed, containing a total of 1,387 names; and clean, new, all-printed lists, bearing that number of legal voters, were posted prior to the September election.

In the sessions incident to the September and November elections, as already shown in tabular form, 109 new names were added by registration, bringing the number of legal voters on the November voting lists, less a loss of 3 by death, up to 1,493.

Death has since reduced the foregoing total to 1,485, and lists bearing the latter number of names are now ready for posting for the municipal election March 6th, 1905. As exhibited by wards, the voting strength of our city is as follows: Ward 1, 202; Ward 2, 252; Ward 3, 237; Ward 4, 194; Ward 5, 144; Ward 6, 196; Ward 7, 260. Total, 1,485.

A fresh supply of registration slips (a trifling item of expense) is the only equipment replenishment required this year. An order for these has already been placed with the proper committee.

The board again congratulates itself and the people on being able to show a comfortable unexpended appropriation balance to its credit.

## Memorial Day Report, 1904.

SOUTH PORTLAND, Jan. 24th, 1905.

*To his Honor, the Mayor, and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of South Portland :*

GENTLEMEN :—The following is submitted as a report of the observance of Memorial Sunday and Memorial Day, 1904, by the South Portland Veteran Association and the City Government and citizens.

### OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL SUNDAY, MAY 29th, 1904.

The South Portland Veteran Association and their invited guests attended divine service at the Knightville M. E. church, Rev. W. P. Lord, pastor.

The church edifice was very prettily decorated with flags, wreaths and potted plants. The music and singing were excellent. Mr. Lord chose for the foundation of his sermon the 5th and 6th verses of the 137th psalm : "If I forget thee, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget her cunning. If I do not remember thee, let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth ; if I prefer not Jerusalem above my chief joy." From this text the reverend gentleman delivered a sermon full of patriotic sentiments, depicting the grandeur of our land, giving the men who stood between treason, disunion and secession and loyalty and unity credit for making it possible for this country to become what it now is, the grandest and best on God's green footstool. The service closed by the audience rising and singing "America."

### OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY, MAY 30TH, 1904.

The comrades and guests, to the number of fifty, assembled at Knightville at 9 A. M., where teams were taken for the yearly visit to the resting places of our honored dead.

Brown's Hill, as usual, was the first cemetery visited. Here decorations were placed on twenty-eight graves, with the usual service of prayer, singing and benediction. A detachment, consisting of comrades Palmer, Hayes and Lindsey, accompanied by the Rev. W. P. Lord, proceeded to Forest City Cemetery with special decorations for the graves of comrades who in life had been members of our Association.

At Bay View the graves of twenty-one were appropriately decked with wreaths and flags. Prayer was offered by the Rev. W. P. Lord; singing by the Masonic Quartette and benediction by the Rev. Mr. Palmer. Returned to Knightville for lunch, where twelve veterans from Cape Elizabeth joined us by invitation.

While waiting for lunch to be served, the companies of Coast Artillery from Forts Preble and Williams passed by on their way to Portland to take part in the G. A. R. parade. Our Association was formed in line and stood at "attention," with heads uncovered, while they passed by with arms apart, the past saluting the present. Observers could easily note the difference between *now* and *then*.

After dinner, Mount Pleasant was the next place to demand our attention. Here one hundred and one narrow homes of those who had camped on this hill of the dead were fittingly honored by their surviving comrades and friends.

Nearly one hundred school girls joined us and assisted with their songs. Wreaths were placed at the foot of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument amid singing and prayers.

The old North Church, which had been decorated with flags, stands of arms, etc., for the occasion, was quickly filled with the people who had gathered to do homage to the dead. The opening prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Pratt, of Cape Elizabeth. The melody of memorial songs filled the audience room and words of welcome were spoken by the Marshal.

The Rev. Geo. R. Palmer, a veteran of the Civil War,

orator of the day, thrilled and held the audience spellbound by his eloquence for thirty minutes.

The disappointment of not having Lincoln's Gettysburg address read was partially atoned for by the recitation by Comrade Hanna of Mrs. Elizabeth Akers Allen's poem dedicated to the 7th Maine on their return from Antietam's bloody field to recruit their depleted ranks.

Stirring remarks were made by his Honor, the Mayor, George T. Spear, Comrade Reynolds and the clergymen present.

The roll of honor was read by the secretary, six names having been added since last year.

"Sleep on, brave heroic dead  
In Freedom's cause ye fell,  
And may a grateful Nation show  
To all the world, both friend and foe,  
A Union Soldier is honored well."

The exercises closed by the quartette and audience singing America, and benediction by the Rev. Mr. Palmer.

### Rules of the City Council.

SEC. 1. The presiding officer shall take the chair promptly at the time appointed for the meeting, and having called the Council to order, and a roll-call showing a quorum present, shall proceed at once to business.

SEC. 2. He shall be entitled to speak on questions of order, but not on any other question when occupying the chair; shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Council, declare all votes, preserve order and decorum, and shall appoint all committees unless they are otherwise provided for.

SEC. 3. When stating a question or motion, or when addressing a Council, the presiding officer shall rise, but may read sitting.

SEC. 4. When a question is under debate no motion shall be in order except the following :

1. To adjourn.
2. The previous question.
3. To commit
4. To amend.
5. To postpone indefinitely.
6. To lay on the table.

SEC. 5. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except when immediately repeated.

SEC. 6. The following questions shall be decided without debate :

1. To adjourn.
2. The previous question.
3. All questions of order and appeals from the decision of the chair thereon.
4. To lay on the table.



SEC. 7. When a vote has been passed, any member who voted in the majority may move a reconsideration of said vote at the time, or at the next succeeding regular meeting, but not afterward, but a vote to reconsider shall require a majority of all the members of the Council.

SEC. 8. Every member present shall vote unless specially excused by the Council before the vote is taken.

SEC. 9. A motion to commit shall take precedence of all amendments of the main question.

SEC. 10. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if any member shall so request.

SEC. 11. The enacting form as an ordinance shall be as follows: "Be it ordained by the City Council." The form of an order shall be as follows: "In City Council, Ordered:" etc. The form of a resolve shall be: "In City Council, Resolved:" etc.

SEC. 12. When a vote is doubted, the members for and against the motion shall rise when called upon by the presiding officer and remain standing until counted.

SEC. 13. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question at any one meeting unless by permission of the Council.

SEC. 14. The Council may resolve itself into committee of the whole on any question and the presiding officer shall appoint a member who shall occupy the chair.

SEC. 15. Special committees of the Council shall report within one month, unless further time is granted.

SEC. 16. When a member wishes to speak, he shall rise and address the presiding officer and not proceed until recognized by the chair. He shall confine himself to the question under discussion and avoid intemperate and abusive language.

SEC. 17. The Clerk shall keep a record of all votes, orders, ordinances and other proceedings of the Council in a journal; shall prepare and present to the Mayor all votes, ordinances and documents requiring his signature, unless the Council shall otherwise direct; shall notify, or cause to be notified, all members of the Council of the time of special meetings, as provided by the charter; and shall perform such other duties, not inconsistent with the charter, as the Council may from time to time prescribe.

SEC. 18. All by-laws passed by the City Council shall be styled ordinances, and shall receive at least two readings before they are finally passed to be ordained, not more than one of which readings shall be at the same meeting of the City Council; and all amendments, alterations or repeals of ordinances shall be made in the same manner and subject to the same number of readings as original ordinances.

SEC. 19. None of these rules or orders shall be suspended unless by a two-thirds vote of the members present; and such suspension shall continue only during the meeting at which such vote is taken; and no rule or order shall be altered or repealed unless written notice shall have been given at a preceding meeting, nor unless a majority of all the members of the Council vote to so alter or appeal.

SEC. 20. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by the presiding officer subject to an appeal to the Council.

### **Order of Business.**

The following shall be the order of business unless when otherwise determined by the Council:

1. Roll-call.
2. Reading of minutes.
3. Unfinished business.
4. Orders of the day.
5. Reports of the committees.
6. New business.
7. Adjournment.
