MAYOR DYER'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS.

Gentlemen of the Council:

In accordance with law, there was held on Monday, March 4th, an election in the several Wards of the City, at which time and place all political differences were buried and the people of these Wards selected from among their members certain men to act as their servants and to represent them — the people — in the City Government for the ensuing year.

The retiring councilors have rendered most excellent service to the City, and it has been a pleasure for me to sit with them and transact the business affairs of the City during the past year, and I wish to take this opportunity to thank them for their kind consideration shown me at all times and I hope the present year may be equally as harmonious as the past.

In pledging ourselves today to the faithful discharge of the duties incumbent on our several officers, we make the acknowledgment to our fellow citizens of our appreciation for the high honor we have received at their hands. If, at the expiration of our term of office, we have in all matters remained true to the oath here taken, then, and then only, shall we be become deserving of the trust reposed in us.

A movement has already been started toward a change in our City Charter to a Commission Form of Government. I trust I bespeak the sentiment of every member of this City Council when I say that we shall hail with joy the introduction of any improved form of government, proving beneficial to the City of South Portland. It is our duty, however, until a new system is instituted to get the very best results possible out of the present system of government.

We are called upon today to select from the citizens of South Portland, a Street Commissioner, an Assessor, a Treasurer and a Clerk. I doubt not, you are nearly all familiar with the duties that these men must perform. Make your selections with candor and wisdom, electing to these

various offices, men who are thoroughly qualified for the performance of the duties devolving upon them. Personal friendships, party affiliation, or reward for political service should have no influence whatever upon you in making your selections; this likewise applies to the selection of other officers necessary to complete the organization of the City Government for the ensuing year. Keep in mind solely the prosperity and welfare of our City and you will make no mistake.

FINANCES.

In order that you may enter upon your duties with a clear understanding of the financial condition of our City, I would recommend that you carefully examine the Treasurer's report and ascertain the true financial standing of the City.

On account of the delay in making out the Treasurer's report I cannot give a statement at this time but the reports are expected to be printed and in the hands of the citizens the coming week.

TAXATION.

I would say that this is a subject in which all of our citizens are rightfully and deeply interested. I am still of the same opinion that I held one year ago that the real estate of our City is bearing an unjust proportion of the burden of taxation. I wish to urge those who may in the future fill the office of Assessors to be ever vigilant in their efforts to have all form of taxable property bear its just proportion of the burden of taxation. The public records are open for inspection, and if searched will furnish a fund of valuable information for the guidance of the Board of Assessors. It is for the Assessors to make diligent search and determine whether or no anything is escaping the duty of contributing toward bearing the expenses of our City. I believe in keeping our tax rate at the lowest possible figure, which will give us the necessary revenue with which to meet the expenses of the City.

If my assumption that much personal property escapes taxation is correct, it will materially aid in solving the problem of keeping our tax rate at a figure which will be more

satisfactory to the citizens. I believe that our Assessors, because of the small salary paid them, often feel that they cannot devote the necessary time to a proper investigation of these matters. It is their right and privilege to bring every citizen before them and require of him or her an inventory of taxable property.

SPRINKLING.

This question has been much discussed during the past year. We all acknowledge the necessity of sprinkling our streets both for comfort and the preservation of health. Especially is this true of Knightville where there is so much travel over the paved surface, and I hope that something can be done to remedy this condition.

HIGHWAYS AND SEWERS.

In this department we have eighty odd miles of country roads and city streets, also sidewalks, bridges, culverts and sewers. To keep this system in repair and make some permanent improvements with an appropriation varying from \$6,000 to \$8,000 is the problem that confronts the Committee on Public Works.

I believe in permanent improvements and we have made a start in that direction the past year. I refer to the repairing of Ocean street in Knightville, so-called, over the Mill Creek Bridge, and the building of two concrete bridges; one on the Gorham Road, and one across Jackson's Creek so-called. This kind of work is lasting and will save an outlay for repairs and re-building for some years to come. But we have a problem that is confronting us and which must be dealt with this year. I refer to the main throughfares like Summer street and Broadway which are earth roads and are so soft in the rainy season that the heavy trucks which pass over them actually plow furrows in them. Especially is this true of Summer street, which was almost impassable last fall. Now to repair these roads as they should be would necessitate the expenditure of a large sum of money, more than we will be able to raise this year. But something will have to be done and you must face this condition the first thing this spring.

My idea of this road is a concrete pavement about six or eight inches thick. I believe that this is the cheapest and best pavement that will hold up the large coal and oil trucks that pass daily over these streets. We hear many complaints against these trucks breaking up our streets, but they are here to stay and we must meet the present needs and build roads that will stand this heavy trucking. Perhaps we shall be able to repair the worst places this year and by doing a little every year finally accomplish a suitable paving of the main streets. This concrete pavement has been estimated to cost about one dollar per square yard, which is less than one-half what granite blocks or macadam would cost.

Another matter which this department must look into is that of sewers. Two or three sewers are actually necessary and they should be built the present year. I refer to Hill street, Highland avenue, Pine street and an extension on Broadway.

POLICE AND FIRE DEPARTMENT.

We are doing the best we can with these departments with the available money we have at hand. We are in hopes that the City will be able to purchase new fire apparatus in the near future.

POOR DEPARTMENT.

This department is now in an excellent condition. The inmates at the home are comfortably provided for and the outside poor have been and are properly supplied. I would say that the calls for outside help this winter have been the largest number of any year, which accounts in a measure for the overdraw in this department. Much credit is due the keeper and matron of the City Home for their faithful and efficient services.

SCHOOLS.

Of all the departments over which we exercise control none is so vital to the public at large as the schools. Every child-blessed citizen, rich or poor, is quick to detect any

legislation tending toward good or ill touching this important question. It is my pleasant privilege to report nothing but advancement in connection with this department.

It must be a source of satisfaction to us to note that under the administration of our efficient superintendent, the schools of South Portland have been steadily advanced to their high standing; especially is this true of our High School which is rated second in the State. I believe that the money which we spend in the education of our children is a safe and paying investment.

The Estimates Committee of the School Board has recommended the remodeling of the Pleasant street schoolhouse and also recommend that an addition or wing be constructed on the High School Building. I would advise you to look carefully into the school needs as we do not wish to embarrass this department but we must at all times keep in mind the financial condition of our City and the burden of taxation that rests upon the citizens. I heartily recommend that all repairs and improvements, involving the expenditure of any considerable amount of money be based on specifications and contracts awarded to the lowest responsible bidder who is fitted and qualified to do the work.

In closing, gentlemen of the Council, we are brought face to face with our duties. I wish for you during the year harmony of feeling, wisdom of action, and hope at the end of your term of office you will receive commendation of your fellow citizens.

REPORT OF CITY ELECTRICIAN.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

In accordance with the requirements of my office, I have to report as follows:

Inspections made as follows: 48 new Buildings; 29 finished buildings; 3 oil buildings; 1 factory; 6 stores.

All of the above have been wired to conform to the National Code Rules.

There has been a fire whistle installed on Knightville School Building on which there has been some delay in completion caused by using the old ten inch whistle instead of the eight inch whistle that was contracted for with the Loper Fire Alarm Co., of Stonington, Conn.

Should recommend using a reducing valve and a low pressure reservoir so as to maintain an even pressure of eighty pounds, as this present whistle is not intended to be blown with the high pressure we now have and is blown at a varying pressure at each succeeding blast, which changes the tone.

The master fire alarm box has been installed at the Knightville Power House and controls the alarm for localities where there are no boxes yet installed.

The whistle has been connected to the lines of Hose No. 1, which connects the boxes in Ward Two and Three directly with the whistle.

There has also been installed box 45 at Knightville.

I would recommend that the City extend the alarm circuits to other Wards the coming summer to avoid any undue delay in pulling an alarm as at the present time it is necessary to telephone the Power House from which place the alarm is rung in from the Master Box.

I have also found the owners and contractors very agreeable.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

*To His Honor the Mayor, the Honorable Board of Aldermen,
and likewise the Honorable Citizens of So. Portland:*

We submit the following report:

STATISTICS.

Total number of inhabitants in the city, 1912, 7140.

Total number of births, 118; still births not included.

Total number of deaths, 112.

Total number of deaths over seventy, 27.

Total number of deaths under five, 13.

CAUSES OF DEATH OCCURRING UNDER 70 YEARS OF AGE.

Death from diseases of heart, 12; average age 43 1-3 years, 6 males, 6 females. Deaths from tuberculosis, 9; average age 36 years, 3 males, 6 females. Deaths from disease of kidney, 8; average age 47 years, 2 males 6 females. Deaths from apoplexy, 6; average age 54 2-3 years, 2 males 4 females. Deaths from cancer, 6; average age 56 1-2 years, 3 males, 3 females.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Typhoid Fever, cases reported 5, deaths resulting, 1; age 23. Measles, cases reported 3, deaths resulting 0. Scarlet Fever, cases reported 18, deaths resulting, 1; age 6. Diphtheria cases reported 43, deaths resulting, 1; age 1. Pneumonia, cases reported 0, deaths resulting, 6 — not reportable.

Deaths per thousand has been slightly less than 16, while nearly four out of every thousand have reached their seventieth year and the average length of life has been 45 years.

For reasons for omitting causes of death occurring in those over 70 years of age, see report of last year.

Monthly cycles has had no appreciable influence upon death rate.

The nuisances reported to the board and requiring special attention have been more than double those of any previous year, but all have been happily cared for and without any unpleasant developments.

We have yet with us two special sources of unsanitation. The lesser of these is the Vincent St. Cess-pool, which each year becomes more acute; this year, for the first time it became necessary, during the summer months, to keep sterile the overflow. To accomplish this we caused to be made four treatments at a cost of one dollar each. The future will undoubtedly require greater annual expenditures and we would recommend that you give it your careful consideration as it portends future difficulties.

But the great source of our uncleanness is our water front. Our sewers should be extended to deep water; we should provide public dumps and make some provision for their care. We should also prohibit the broadcast scattering of debris along our shores.

Your board has twice during the past season caused the leveling and cleaning of the Spear dump, on Front Street. This was done once by Forgoine & Romano, at a cost of three dollars and forty cents, and at an other time by a young Italian obtained through them for \$3.25.

We this year provided free vaccination to the inhabitants of our city. 227 taking advantage of it, mostly school children.

The work of the board has been greatly increased this year. This was due to the ever increasing requirements of the State, and the more strict observance of the technic of those requirements, the constantly increasing necessities of the city, and this year by our late epidemics of Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria.

We beg to be allowed the privilege of making two suggestions for enactment, valuable alike from both a sanitary and financial standpoint:

No floor in any building, especially sheds, should be less than eighteen inches from the ground, and the space intervening between said floor and ground should be so provisioned that cats may have free access thereto. All buildings con-

structed with double walls should be made rat proof between said walls at the ground floor.

It has been repeatedly charged, that our chairman, Mr. Strout, had shown little interest in the work of the board during the past year. Nothing could be further from the truth. Mr Strout is an exceptionally able and efficient member, although quiet and unassuming he always maintains a firm grip upon everything pertaining to the health of the city. He has been of the greatest helpfulness to the board during the last year.

CITY CLERK'S REPORT.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council of
South Portland, Maine:*

GENTLEMEN:— Inasmuch as my predecessor did your work as City Clerk, seven and one-half months, and myself four and one-half months; and for the further reason that he could make this report so much better than I, it seems to me almost as though I am invading another's field of work in giving this report; however, as I am the last man on the job it may not be out of place for me to give some data and facts, and a few suggestions pertaining to the City Clerk's office relating to the fiscal year 1912.

In the Auditor's and Treasurer's Reports will be found a statement of the receipts and expenditures for this office for the year. Since taking the office a detailed account of every cent paid out and every cents taken in, has been kept.

From the beginning of the Municipal year, March 11, 1912, to the close of the fiscal year, January 31, 1913, your Honorable Council has had twelve regular meetings (including the Inauguration), twenty-seven special meetings; twelve juror drawings and two public meetings of citizens.

In your meetings, regular and special, the non-attendance of two members during the last of the year, at least, has caused me to make many black marks and has marred materially what would have been an unusually excellent attendance.

LICENSES, PERMITS, ETC.

This office has licensed during the year; of dogs, males, 291; females, 14; kennels, 1; has registered 68 building permits; has issued 38 sewer permits; has issued 26 junk licenses; has issued 4 pool licenses; has issued 6 victuallers licenses; has issued 8 licenses to sell fire-works; has issued 1 license to a bowling alley keeper; has issued 1 permit to run a picture hall; has issued 1 permit to run a steaming plant; has issued 1 permit to sell eatables; has issued 1 auctioneer permit.

Of permits to move dwellings, remodel dwellings, open up streets, do blasting, fix sidewalks, etc., it has issued 34.

VITAL STATISTICS.

It has issued 71 marriage licenses, has received 133 death certificates, has received 174 birth certificates. All of the fees for the past year have been turned over to the City Treasurer, according to law. The salary of the office, \$1,200.00, is not large for the labor and care which should be devoted to it, but money is not everything — the experience one gets in the city work and the pleasure and helpfulness one gets by contact with the people of the city is good for one.

If in order I would like to suggest that the Treasurer and City Clerk should have larger offices using the unfinished room below for the Clerk's office, allowing the Treasurer the two rooms, both have at present, and giving much needed office rooms upstairs for the Assessors, Board of Registration and Board of Health.

I shall always hold the last four and one-half months of the present year as one of the best periods of my life and I want here and now to thank the Aldermen of this city for giving me this experience and my predecessor and office friends for making my work so easy and pleasant.

The past year has been uneventful and only notable for the small number of cases of sickness as compared with other years.

Number of calls at City Home, 17; outside calls, 41. At the City Home there has been one death.

Number of police case, 1. These police cases are apt to be of a surgical nature, and I would recommend keeping a basin, some bandages and a few other necessary things on hand at the Police Station, for emergencies.

During the recent diptheria epidemic the City Physician was called upon by the Board of Health to investigate some cases of that disease.

In the considerable period that I have held this office, I have always found the members of the City Government ready to aid the City Physician in his work.

Thanks are due the Overseers of the Poor for their part, they always seeing that the physician has what is necessary for his work.

Mr. and Mrs. Durost are the same valuable and efficient people they have always been.

This concludes my report.

It had never been entered into the new sewer on Sawyer street. I had to raise 108 feet of said sewer as to properly connect with the Sawyer street sewer. I recommend that I be instructed the coming spring to purchase iron pipe for the two Willard Beach sewers, that the pipe there at present is not sufficient to stand the action of the sea, and have been compelled to repair it twice this last summer. I also find that the trunk line from the Stanford street sewer,

leading out back of the breakwater, will have to be repaired this spring, as the wooden box is in bad condition. The engineer, Mr. Skillin, will make the report on new sewers.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I herewith submit my annual report as City Solicitor:

The work of this department has, during the past year, been fairly uniform with that of preceding years. As new men succeed to the various offices the demands upon the city solicitor for advice as to their respective rights and duties multiply; the past year has been no exception and it has been my endeavor to answer all inquiries so that the various city officials might carry on their work intelligently, but here I want to observe that an official who is obliged to feel his way along guided by knowledge imparted to him by another cannot possibly do work as satisfactory to himself or as valuable to the city as one who can proceed in the light of the more certain knowledge gained by years of experience in the details of his own particular department.

There are in Maine today many town clerks, overseers of the poor and assessors who have served so long that no detail of their work is unfamiliar to them and who are far better qualified to protect the interests of their municipalities than any new man could possibly be even with competent legal advice. Our officials without exception have been most solicitous to perform every duty in accordance with the requirements of the law and have freely consulted me, but if we could adopt a policy of retaining in office with some inducements to perfect themselves, at least such officials as city clerk, treasurer, overseers of the poor and health officers, a degree of efficiency might be developed that would work a vast economy to the city.

Especially in the poor department is this true, in securing reimbursement from the State for expenditures in behalf of state paupers and in adjusting claims arising between our own and other towns, an overseer who thoroughly knows his subject can act at a great advantage over one who is unfamiliar with his rights and duties, though guided by ever

so good legal advice. Moreover, the amount of work put upon a City Solicitor by being required to give so much time to the assistance of the many officials in doing the work which with a little experience they would be perfectly equal to themselves, is wholly out of proportion to the salary paid to the City Solicitor; it should be larger.

I do not wish to be understood as complaining at the amount of work required of me; it has always been a pleasure to be of assistance, both by reason of the nature of the work and of the cordial relations with the officials; I merely wish to emphasize my judgment that the plan of displacing so many officials just as they begin to get qualified is not good for the city and incidentally only, not profitable to the City Solicitor.

During the year I represented the city in a hearing before referees on the claim of Ethel Dyer for damages by reason of raising the grade of Cottage street in which case an award of three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$375.00) was paid.

I also represented the city, assisted by Scott Wilson, Esquire, at the request of the Mayor, in the trial of a suit against the city brought by William E. Dyer, to recover for damage sustained by reason, as claimed, of improper maintenance of a city sewer. In this case the plaintiff recovered a verdict of two hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$297.00) but the matter has been taken to the law court for the purpose of getting a new trial.

REPORT OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION.

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN:—The Board of Registration of Voters respectfully submit the following resume of its work for the past (1912) municipal year. As was pointed out in last year's report, the year was pregnant with elections, albeit the Honorable Council seemed to ignore that fact in not making adequate provision for the Boards' maintenance. Five sessions, four elections and one for annual revision comprised the meetings of the Board for the year. A total of 1826 names was carried on the lists posted thirty days prior to the City election one year ago. In the session incident to said election we qualified 83 new voters, and on information furnished by the several ward committees, 48 names were stricken off, leaving a total of 1,861, qualified to vote in said election.

Our next session in order was preceding and pertaining to the primary election of June 17. Conflicting views were held throughout the State as to the correct interpretation of the terms of the "Davies Bill," creative of the primary election law, and some municipalities "short circuited" the problem.

This board, however, acting in harmony with the views of our City Clerk followed the strict letter of the law and furnished both duplicate check lists and enrollment lists for each ward. In this session 24 new voters were qualified.

The annual revision session fixed by statute followed. Five days were devoted to this duty, resulting in 130 strike offs, 42 ward changes and some 300 changes of residence numbers. A complete revised set of lists for copy from which to have new stock printed was part of the work of this session.

New lists were received from the printer in season for printing, the legal period prior to the State election, September 9th, and said revised and corrected lists bore the names of 1755 legal voters.

In the session pending said State election, 72 new voters were added by registration and seven were stricken off by reason of death or removal from our City.

In the session preceding the Presidential election, November 5th, 37 other names were taken on. In the preparation of lists for public posting thirty days prior to our next City election, March 3rd, 1913, nine more names (death the cause) were stricken off, which leaves our voting strength as exhibited by the lists now posted with a total of 1848 names, a net gain of 22 for the year. MEMORIAL DAY REPORT, 1912.

To His Honor the Mayor and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of South Portland:

GENTLEMEN:— I beg leave to submit this as a report of the observance of Memorial Sunday and Memorial Day, May 26 and May 30, 1912, by the South Portland Veteran Association, assisted by the clergymen and the citizens of our City.

The observance of Memorial Sunday consisted of an oration by the pastor of the North Church, the Rev. John A. Waterworth, at the North Church. Singing by the Sabbath school, the reading of the Roll of Honor, the reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and the sounding of "Taps" — Lights Out.

The oration was largely historical and highly interesting and was greatly appreciated by the large audience gathered to listen to it. The singing of the children was very good considering the time spent in the preparation.

The Battle Hymn of the Republic sung by the school, the audience joining in the chorus awakened a good deal of enthusiasm. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address was read by Miss Coombs, a pupil of the South Portland High School.

The call of the Roll of Honor showed that but two had joined the ranks of the departed during the last year. Taps or Lights Out was sounded by Merl Day, a grandson of a veteran. The service was closed by prayer and the benediction by the pastor.

OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY, MAY 30, 1912.

The day opened with heavy showers, thus making the service of decorating the graves very disagreeable. Notwithstanding the weather conditions, twenty-four veterans, six sons of veterans and as many juniors, His Honor, Mayor Dyer, Alderman West, three clergymen and a quartette of singers assembled at Knightville ready to perform the duties of the association.

The several schools of the City had prepared music for this service but it was not thought prudent for them to take part as the exercises were mostly out of doors, but at Brown's Hill the schools in that vicinity had assembled at the vestry of the Methodist Church and favored the Veterans and guests with the part that had been assigned them.

As it rained very heavily while at this cemetery the work of decorating was hurried as much as possible. At the vestry prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Banghart, America was sung and benediction by Rev. F. W. Smith was said.

The service at Bay View and Mt. Pleasant was very much shorter than usual. The services at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument consisted of prayer, singing, decorating and benediction.

Comrade Edward J. Woodbury decorated the south side with a beautiful wreath furnished by the Veterans of Cape Elizabeth, while comrade Daniel Sylvester placed an equally beautiful wreath furnished by South Portland on the north side. This ended the ceremonies of the day.

VITAL STATISTICS.

COMPILED BY THE CITY CLERK.
OF THE CITY OF SOUTH PORTLAND, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR
ENDING JANUARY 31, 1913.

Along with our increasing population and the diversity of business enterprises, there comes a growing need of care in the registration of the births, marriages and deaths, so our State government wisely insists that this data be kept accurately, and provides certain rules governing it and certain penalties to be imposed if the law is not complied with. A knowledge of the fundamentals governing registration is essential if we comply with law.

BIRTHS.—The attending physician or person in charge shall report all births to the Clerk of their town or city within six days, blanks can be obtained from the Clerk's office or from the State Registrar at Augusta. Fee 25 cents.

MARRIAGES.—On general principles, exceptions — foreigners, soldiers, sailors — intentions of marriage shall be recorded by the City Clerk five days before the certificate of marriage can be issued.

Intentions of marriage must be recorded in the town where each party resides. The certificate must be received by the clergyman or justice before solemnizing the marriage.

The certificate must be returned to the Clerk by the clergyman or justice within six days.

Residents going into another state for the purpose of marriage, and it is there solemnized, on their return shall file a certificate of their marriage with the Clerk of the City where each lived within seven days after their return, under a penalty.

Fraudulent statements in the certificate are punishable by penalty of law.

DEATHS.—The undertaker or other person moving the body, or superintending the burial shall furnish the City Clerk with a "Death Certificate," including the Physician's statement. The City Clerk may issue it.

BURIAL PERMITS.— A Death Certificate presented to the Clerk or any proper Registrar is necessary to " Burial Permit," which must be returned to the Clerk of the City in which the death occurred within six days.

FALSE RETURNS.— False returns are punishable by law.

PHYSICIAN'S DUTY.— Physicians are required within twenty-four hours after the death of a person to make out a " Death Certificate," for the use of Undertaker or others.

Appendix.

RULES OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

SEC. 1. The presiding officer shall take the chair promptly at the time appointed for the meeting, and having called the Council to order, and a roll-call showing a quorum present, shall proceed at once to business.

SEC. 2. He shall be entitled to speak on questions of order, but not on any other question when occupying the chair; shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Council, declare all votes, preserve order and decorum, and shall appoint all committees unless they are otherwise provided for.

SEC. 3. When stating a question or motion, or when addressing the Council, the presiding officer shall rise, but may read sitting.

SEC. 4. When a question is under debate no motion shall be in order except the following:

1. To adjourn.
2. The previous question.
3. To commit.
4. To amend.
5. To postpone indefinitely.
6. To lay on the table.

SEC. 5. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order except when immediately repeated.

SEC. 6. The following questions shall be decided without debate:

1. To adjourn.
2. The previous question.
3. All questions of order and appeals from the decision of the chair thereon.
4. To lay on the table.

SEC. 7. When a vote has been passed, any member who voted in the majority may move a reconsideration of said vote at the same, or at the next succeeding regular meeting, but not afterward, but a vote to reconsider shall require a majority of all the members of the Council.

SEC. 8. Every member present shall vote unless specially excused by the Council before the vote is taken.

SEC. 9. A motion to commit shall take precedence of all amendments of the main question.

SEC. 10. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if any member shall so request.

SEC. 11. The enacting form as an ordinance shall be as follows: "Be it ordained by the City Council." The form of an order shall be as follows: "In City Council, Ordered," etc. The form of a resolve shall be: "In City Council, Resolved," etc.

SEC. 12. When a vote is doubted, the members for and against the motion shall rise when called upon by the presiding officer and remain standing until counted.

SEC. 13. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question at any one meeting, unless by permission of the Council.

SEC. 14. The Council may resolve itself into committee of the whole on any question and the presiding officer shall appoint a member who shall occupy the chair.

SEC. 15. Special committees of the Council shall report within one month, unless further time is granted.

SEC. 16. When a member wishes to speak, he shall rise and address the presiding officer, and not proceed until recognized by the chair. He shall confine himself to the question under discussion and avoid intemperate and abusive language.

SEC. 17. The Clerk shall keep a record of all votes, orders, ordinances and other proceedings of the Council in a journal; shall prepare and present to the Mayor all votes, ordinances and documents requiring his signature, unless the Council shall otherwise direct; shall notify, or cause to be notified, all members of the Council of the time of special meetings as provided by the charter; and shall perform such other duties, not inconsistent with the charter, as the Council may from time to time prescribe.

SEC. 18. All by-laws passed by the City Council shall be styled ordinances, and shall receive at least two readings before they are finally passed to be ordained, not more than one of which reading shall be at the same meeting of the City Council; and all amendments, alterations or repeals of ordinances shall be made in the same manner and subject to the same number of readings as original ordinances.

SEC. 19. None of these rules or orders shall be suspended unless by a two-thirds vote of the members present; and such suspension shall continue only during the meeting at which such vote is taken; and no rule or order shall be altered or repealed unless written notice shall have been given at a preceding meeting, nor unless a majority of all the members of the Council vote to so alter or repeal.

SEC. 20. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by the presiding officer subject to an appeal to the Council.

2. Reading of minutes.
3. Unfinished business.
4. Orders of the day.
5. Reports of the committees.
6. New business.
7. Adjournment.
