Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1915:

INSPECTION.

I have made 107 inspections and issued 85 permits as follows: 31 new buildings; 46 old buildings; 4 motors; 2 wireless plants; 1 factory; 1 garage.

All of the above have been wired to conform to the National Board of Fire Underwriters' rules and requirements.

FIRE ALARM.

There have been 37 alarms from the following boxes: four from box 13; two from box 15; two from box 22; two from box 24; one from box 25; three from box 27; three from box 32; one from box 34; three from box 37; one from box 45; two from box 48; one from box 55; one from box 58; one from box 65; one from box 66; one from box 67; one from box 68; one from box 72; two from box 74; two from box 75; two from box 77.

The Fire Alarm system has been working very satisfactory the past year and I would recommend that the circuits be extended to the other wards in the City and that one or two street boxes be installed in each Ward and then the City Government could add other boxes from time to time as it were able to appropriate for them.

I also would recommend that the City discontinue the rule of collecting the wiring inspector's fees from the citizens, and that the City Government pay the inspector for the work.

I would like to thank the City Government and the committee on fire for their earnest co-operation with me in the past in bringing this department up to its present efficiency.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

I herewith submit my report as City Solicitor for the past fiscal year.

The greater part of my work has been in connection with the collection of overdue taxes, sewer and sidewalk assessments.

Many suits have been brought to enforce payment of such taxes, all of which have been disposed of except three that are now pending in the Superior Court. These are the only actions now before any court in which the city is a party.

I have been called upon frequently to advise the city officials, to draft deeds and other contracts, and the earnest effort they have shown to faithfully perform their duties has made this part of my work a pleasure.

There is a large amount of money tied up in tax deeds, and the property which the city was thus obliged to buy is yielding the city no income.

I recommend that actions be brought to obtain possession of such property so that the city may be in a position either to sell or rent the property it was compelled to buy.

REPORT OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION OF VOTERS.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN:—Following the custom of previous years, we herewith submit a report of this board for the year ending February 1st, 1915. The beginning of said municipal year found our city voting lists carrying a total of 1,755 names of legal voters. During the year, besides our regular annual revision session, we were called to hold four other political or pre-election sessions. In the municipal and revision sessions, we struck from the lists 175 names, 37 by reason of death, the others as having ceased to be residents of our city. In the several pre-election sessions, 250 names were added by registration, and 10 others were reinstated, the latter number having satisfied us of their continued legal residence. Changes of residence from ward to ward were found to the number of 50, and were adjusted as the law provides. A feature of our State election was the qualification as legal voters of 18 United States soldiers, these men having gained citizenship by residing with their families, three months or more, outside the government reservations. The city voting lists preparatory to public posting for the 1915 municipal election, contain a total of 1,830 names, a net gain of 75 for the year.
