Your Collector of Taxes would also report to you that he finds a widespread and strongly developed sentiment among a very large percentage of the tax payers against the payment of any taxes to the City. This sentiment has evidently been

fostered by a lax enforcement of collections. Under the existing conditions, this office cannot secure satisfactory results without the support of the City Government. This support was given the Collector by last year's Council, but was withdrawn by the present Board. A comparison of the annexed 1914 list of unpaid taxes with the 1915 list will show the result of the lack of support during 1915.

The Treasurer begs leave to call your attention to the fact that the city holds tax titles to some three hundred parcels of real esate. These properties, in many instances, are sold to the city year after year, for unpaid taxes, with the result that the city is receiving no income whatever from them, but is in the position of paying on their account the State, County and Bridge District taxes. And the tax payers *who pay* are obliged to assume the taxes assessed on these properties each year, in addition to paying their own, which necessarily makes the burden very heavy. The Treasurer would urgently recommend that immediate steps be taken to the end that this unjust treatment of *tax payers* be discontinued.

## REPORT OF CITY ELECTRICIAN.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen —*

Gentlemen:— I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1915.

### INSPECTIONS.

I have made 192 inspections and issued 161 permits as follows: 72 new buildings; 104 old buildings; 1 factory; 1 oil plant; 3 stores; 1 pool room; 4 garages; 6 motors. All of the above have been wired to conform to the National Board of Fire Underwriters' rules and requirements.

### FIRE ALARM.

There have been 37 alarms from the following boxes: three from box 13; two from box 25; two from box 26; two from box 32; one from box 35; three from box 36; one from box 37; (two from box 38; those were false alarms); one from box 42; two from box 45; one from box 47; one from box 54; one from box 63; one from box 64; one from box 67; one from box 72; three from box 74; two from box 75; three from box 77; two from box 78; two from box 79.

There have been some much needed improvements in the Fire Alarm system this past year: the apparatus that was located in the Knightville schoolhouse has been housed in a new building on O'Neil Street, and there have been installed a modern storage battery system and a three loop Gamewell switchboard, also a protecting device for the motor and the other apparatus with a circuit breaker and signal bells.

The system in the new building has been working very satisfactorily; but there is a great need of the extension of the system as the firemen in the western part of the city do not get the alarm when the wind is blowing from that direction. And it is a matter of fact that we have so much mileage to cover in the city that it is impossible for the one whistle to give the alarm to the firemen that have not got tappers in their homes, under all weather conditions.

I would recommend that the system be extended to the wards in the city not at present equipped and that a bell striker be placed on the First M. E. church tower on Brown's Hill, and also giving each member of the Fire Department a tapper, thereby giving more satisfactory results.

## REPORT OF BUILDING INSPECTOR.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen —*

I herewith submit my report as Building Inspector for the year ending Jan. 31, 1916.

There has been a marked increase in the building line this year, the City Council having granted ninety-one permits, fifty-four of this number being for dwellings, the balance for garages, barns, stables, etc.

I have examined all buildings immediately upon notification and all buildings inspected have been found to comply fully with the building laws.

The same condition exists as in former years; a very noticeable negligence on the part of some builders and owners in calling on the inspector to examine their buildings. Many will notify the inspector before the building is ready, others will call on him when the construction has progressed too far, while some have erected buildings and have not called for them to be inspected. Such a condition shows a marked disregard for law and makes much unnecessary work for the inspector.

The city lacks a thorough, up-to-date building ordinance which also greatly hampers the inspector in his work.

In view of the fact that all conditions point to greater building activities in South Portland in the near future, I would recommend that the City Council enact a set of building ordinances, giving the inspector more power in regard to the erection of buildings and which will give the city a safer and more substantial class of buildings.

I would suggest that this ordinance be particularly strict as regards safeguards for the catching and spreading of fire between buildings, as well as within the buildings themselves, also that it cover the sanitary conditions in tenement houses; that the city will not in the future have to deal with a congested, unhealthful and unsafe tenement district.

## REPORT OF PLUMBING INSPECTOR.

*To the Honorable Board of Health —*

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit my report of the work performed by me as Plumbing Inspector of the City of South Portland, Maine, for the year ending January 31st, 1916.

I have inspected and looked after the work for which 142 permits were issued. Following is a detailed list of plumbing done within the above mentioned dates:

There have been thirteen outside vaults done away with in the above mentioned time. This is a joy and a benefit to the neighborhood in which they were located. In going about from place to place, my notice has been called to these annoying out-houses, but the parties making complaint did not wish to sign complaint. I would say no one with a reasonable complaint to make need have any hesitation in making it over his or her own signature, as the Board never makes known the names of complainants.

I would say that all buildings that are accessible to a sewer should enter it and where there is no sewer, then build a cess-pool the lawful distance from the building and installing a system of plumbing of which the plumbing laws recommend.



I would advise the owners or agents of property in our city, before having the plumber do any work, to see that he is a licensed plumber and has a permit for each and every job that is to be done. In doing this it will insure good lawful work for the owner and make it easier for the Board, and shut out those not qualified in the craft of plumbing.

During the last year, a majority of the people having work done looked for its approval by the inspector. In all but two or three cases the work has been done in a satisfactory manner, both in sanitary appliances and workmanship.

There have been 2 deaths from diphtheria, 1 from typhoid fever and 1 from scarlet fever. Deaths from other causes will be found in the City Clerk's report.

### FUMIGATION.

### MEDICAL INSPECTION.

In March all of the children in the Knightville School had their throats examined; although there was no contagion present in any one of them, about all had more or less trouble with the throat, and this Board does earnestly recommend that the schools of our city have medical inspection at least twice a year. We hope that you will give this careful consideration.

I herewith submit my report for the year ending February 1st, 1916.

Co-operating with the Treasurer, I have tried to realize money on the property held by the city by virtue of tax sales, and although the task has not been without its difficulties, considerable money has been forthcoming.

A petition was brought by Wilbur F. & Sarah E. Dresser, asking the Assessors to abate a portion of their real estate tax. The petition was denied, and an appeal taken to the County Commissioners, who allowed an abatement. From this decision an appeal has been taken to the Supreme Court where the action is now pending.

Suit has been brought against the city by James H. Harford & Son to recover the sum of \$169.81 claimed to be due for printing done in 1910 - 1911. Although this action is pending in the Supreme Judicial Court for the County of York, a settlement is expected soon.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION OF VOTERS.

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*Hon. Mayor and Board of Aldermen —*

Gentlemen:— Said Board of Registration herewith submits a report for the fiscal year ended January 31st, 1916.

Said date one year ago discovered our voting lists bearing a total of 1,830 names. In the registration session incident to the municipal election, we qualified 82 new voters, making a total of 1,912 for the year.

In our annual session for revision, held in July, and in other sessions, we struck from the lists for reason of death, or removal from our city, 153 names. We also discovered and confirmed 56 ward changes, and, in view of having to go to the printer for new lists, we as far forth as possible, corrected all changes in street numbers, some 280 such changes coming to our notice for correction. New printed lists pasted in each ward thirty days next prior to our municipal election, Monday, March 6, 1916, make the following exhibit: Ward 1, 254; Ward 2, 267; Ward 3, 241; Ward 4, 267; Ward 5, 194; Ward 6, 266; Ward 7, 268. Total, 1,757. Besides the municipal election before cited, there will be three other elections this year: State and county primaries, Monday, June 19th; State election, Monday, Sept. 11th; Presidential, Tuesday, November 7th.

In each and all of these events, this board will be in session the prescribed legal period for the qualification of new voters and other revision of the voting lists.
