If these items and the balances and overdrafts of the previous year are taken into consideration, the Treasurer's and Auditor's accounts would show no differences.

REPORT OF CITY ELECTRICIAN.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen —

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1918.

INSPECTIONS.

I have made two hundred and sixty-five inspections and issued one hundred and twenty-seven permits as follows:

Fifty-three new buildings, sixty-seven old buildings, three ship yards and four oil works.

All of the above wiring has been done to conform to the National Board of Fire Underwriters rules and requirements.

FIRE ALARMS.

There has been twenty-nine alarms from the following boxes: One from box 12; three from box 15; one from box 16; one from box 18; one from box 25; one from box 26; five from box 34 (two of these were false alarms); one from box 37; two from box 38 (one of these was a false alarm); one from box 44; one from box 56; one from box 64; one from box 65; one from box 66; one from box 71; one from box 74; four from box 75; one from box 77, and one from box 78.

The total loss from the above alarms has been very small. We have at present twenty miles of wire in our fire alarm system of which fifteen miles were constructed in 1916 and 1917, also the present year we had to reconstruct the circuits the whole length of Broadway, on account of the building of the new power lines to furnish power to the new ship yards.

The tapper system has been extended to the Willard Hose Company and to the Knightville Hose Company. The wires have been run out as far as Elm Street for the Pleasantdale Company, but on account of not being able to procure the necessary material, through market conditions, we were unable to complete that section.

At the present time we have fifty-nine tappers in working condition and thirty in stock to be installed as soon as we can get the proper material.

Box twenty-five, located at the corner of High and Preble Streets, has been replaced with a modern Non-Interference Successive Gamewell box.

The coming year brings a large responsibility on our fire companies, as we have four ship yards that are doing a big business together with the other large manufacturing plants that are in operation at present, which are using altogether, over 1,000 h. p. in electric motive power.

Thanking you, gentlemen, for your co-operation with me in carrying out the work of the past year. And especially I wish to thank the chairman of the fire committee, Frank H. Winslow, for his untiring interest and labor in bringing the fire alarm system to its present efficiency.

There are a number of persistent contractors in different sections of the city, that is very noticeable for the number of buildings they have constructed, and the thoroughness of their workmanship.

I have inspected all buildings immediately upon notification, and have found them, with few exceptions, very substantially built and according to the building laws of the city.

There has also been many extensive repairs and alterations on the buildings this year. Considering the number of shipyards and other enterprising concerns, South Portland has made a very favorable progression this year.

Within the above mentioned time, thirteen (13) outside vaults have been abandoned for the more modern plumbing, and to conclude my report, I would again recommend, as I did in my report of February 1st, 1917, that all buildings that are accessible to a sewer should enter it, and where there is no sewer, a cesspool should be built the lawful distance from the house and a system of plumbing installed which would conform with the laws of the Board of Health.

REPORT OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION.

Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen —

Gentlemen:—The Board of Registration of Voters hereby respectfully submit its usual annual report. Three sessions, two elections and the regular annual revision, covered the major part of our work for the year.

The posted lists for the municipal election one year ago, contained a total of 1,895 names of legal voters. In said municipal session, we registered 65 new voters, and in the special September session, 14 others qualified, and 9 were reinstated, a total of 88 for the year.

In the July (revision) session, and at other times during the year, we struck from the lists, 28 names of deceased voters, also 150 others as having removed from our city. We also found and confirmed 53 ward changes and corrected a large number of residence changes. Revised lists now ready for posting in the several wards prior to the forthcoming March election, contain a total of 1,805 names of legal voters. By wards, these are divided as follows: Ward 1, 284; Ward 2, 246; Ward 3, 236; Ward 4, 260; Ward 5, 228; Ward 6, 260; Ward 7, 291.

The following named elections occur this year. Municipal, Monday, March 4th. State Primaries, Monday, June 17th, and the State Election, Monday, September 9th.

Prior to each of these events the Board will be in session for the qualification of voters the days and hours prescribed by statute.
