The Auditor desires parties, whose claims against the City have been allowed, to be prompt in their calls to receive payment, and when bills have been once presented, ascertain if allowed before duplicating the amount on a subsequent bill, as is sometimes done.

## RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of South Portland —*

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit the twenty-first annual report of the City of South Portland, Maine, for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1920. It will be noted that I have followed the instructions of your Honorable Board in placing the bookkeeping under control of the City Auditor. The old single entry method of bookkeeping in use prior to February 1, 1919, has been discarded, and a double entry system has been set up with a system of controlling accounts which if required, will enable your Auditor to render correct financial statements at any period in the year. Making this change involved the elimination of all balances which did not represent actual resources or liabilities, and these were charged off in a readjustment account. The following is the financial statement of the City of South Portland as of January 31, 1919, after transfers had been made.

The following order passed by your Honorable Board has been carefully adhered to in accounting for receipts and ex-

penditures as will be seen by referring to Auditor's "Detail of Receipts" and "Detail of Expenditures."

IN COUNCIL.

May 14, 1919.

*"Ordered,* That the Treasurer shall cause to be kept and deposited in a fund to be known as a sinking fund all monies received from all indebtedness due the City previous to February 1, 1919, from all sources, together with costs and interest on the same, and is further ordered and directed to use any part of said fund for the purpose of paying off any part of the floating debt or bonds of the City when in his judgment it is proper or when directed so to do by the Finance Committee."

The purpose of this order was to segregate the revenue which was properly the income of the 1919 administration and to charge against same only such expenses as were properly obligations of the present administration. This of course resulted in a loss of revenue available to the administration, the amount in this particular year being \$5,034.68, but it would seem desirable for subsequent City Governments to continue this as it would result in accumulating a sizable Sinking Fund to take care of City indebtedness and enable each administration to finance their own expenditures.

There are some further changes in the method of handling the City's accounting which I would have been pleased to have recommended, but owing to the extremely short time between the passage of the final Council Order for payment of January bills and the time set for delivery to the printer of the copy for this report, I have not deemed it advisable to disturb the present classifications. No doubt this will be taken up in due time by some future Council and the present method of presenting the annual report greatly improved upon.

## REPORT OF CITY ELECTRICIAN

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen —*

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1920.

### INSPECTIONS

I have made two hundred and forty-six inspections and issued one hundred and thirteen permits as follows: Seventy-five old buildings, twenty-six new buildings, four garages, one shipyard, one coal shed, three new stores, one sardine factory, one barber shop, and one shoe repairing shop.

All of the above wiring has been done to conform to the National Board of Fire Underwriters' rules and requirements.

### FIRE ALARMS

There has been seventeen alarms from the following boxes: One from box 12, one from box 14, two from box 15, one false alarm from box 27, one from box 32, two from box 35, three false alarms from box 37, two from box 45, one from box 71, two from box 75, and one from box 84.

The above statement shows the smallest number of alarms and also the smallest fire loss for the seven years that I have been in office.

### EXTENSION

This year the wires on Cottage Street, from Walnut Street to Thomas Street have been replaced by two thousand and fifty feet of underground cable. The Knightville and Pleasantdale tappers have been connected with the same, so that all of the firemen's tappers are at the present time connected with the electrical building. All of the hose companies with the exception of Hose five of Cash's Corner are equipped with tappers. We have fifteen tappers in stock for the equipment of Ward seven which should be completed the coming year.

The wires in Wards two and three will have to be replaced this year to a great extent as they are in a very weak condition from long usage.

We should also have a new whistle-blowing machine, or an electric valve, as the old Loper machine that we have at present has never worked accurately from its first installation.

Thanking you, gentlemen, for your co-operation with me in carrying out the work of the year.

It has been my custom in past reports to recommend discontinuing cesspools where a sewer is accessible, and installing modern plumbing. Within the past year thirty outside vaults have been abandoned for the more modern plumbing, and I would again recommend such procedure whenever possible.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION

February 2nd, 1920.

*Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen—*

Gentlemen:—The Board of Registration of Voters hereby respectfully submit the 1919 annual report:

Three election sessions and the usual revision session, comprised the work of the Board for the year. This date a year ago our lists showed a total of 1,734 names of registered voters.

During the year, 108 other voters qualified, viz.:—Municipal session, 81; Water Trustee session, 10; Referendum session, 17; making a total of 1,842 names borne on the city voting lists for the year 1919.

In our revision session and at other times, 122 names were stricken off, voters having died, or ceased to reside in our city. Fewer ward changes were discovered than for several years past, 31 only, being found and confirmed.

Copies of the city voting lists now being posted prior to the March, 1920, city election, carry a total of 1,720 names, distributed by wards as follows:—Ward (1), 255; Ward (2), 231; Ward (3), 214; Ward (4), 255; Ward (5), 228; Ward (6), 272; Ward (7), 266. Never before have the number of our voters by Wards been so nearly equal as is shown by the foregoing figures. They also show that our Ward lines could not be better adjusted.

Elections this year occur as follows: Municipal, Monday, March 1st; Primaries, Monday, June 21st; State, Monday, September 13th; Presidential, Tuesday, November 2nd.

The Board will be in session the lawful number of days next prior to each and all of these events, for the purpose of qualifying new voters.

## REPORT OF COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS

South Portland, Me., Feb. 1, 1920.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen —*

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my annual report as Commissioner of Public Works for the year ending Feb. 1, 1920.

### STREETS

Repairs have been made on the following streets, viz.:—Mussey Road, Westbrook, Brown, Evans, Kelsey, Elm, Chapel, Sawyer, Preble, Franklin, Front, Kincaid, Pierce, Maple, Pine, Randall, Dyer, Pleasant, Thomas, Mussey, Harriet, Emery, Clemons, Lincoln, Chestnut, Pearl, Running Hill Road, Rigby Road, Highland Avenue, Broadway, Elsmere Avenue, Mitchell Road, Channel Road, Cloyster Road, Highland Road, Ocean Road, Forest Avenue, A, B, C, and D Streets.

Most of the work consisted of grading and smoothing with the road machine or drag, hauling gravel and filling ruts and holes. On Randall Street it was necessary to do considerable grading.

Sawyer Street from Ocean Street west to the Southworth place was graded with the road machine and surfaced with screened rock and rolled with the steam roller.

A short length of stone base with earth surface was laid on Westbrook Street.

Brown Street from the Saco Road west to the B. & M. bridge was graded with the road machine and surfaced with rock and rolled with the steam roller.

### SEWERS AND DRAINS

One new sewer is in process of construction on Ocean Street from Highland Avenue south to the Cape Elizabeth line.

One new sewer has been built from a point in Maplewood Street, near the big cesspool, easterly to connect with the Preble Street sewer at Smith's Corner.

The School Street sewer was extended northerly about forty feet.

The sewers and catch basins have been flushed and cleaned when necessary. The sewer hose is practically all worn out and new hose should be purchased as soon as possible.

One new catch basin has been built at the corner of Pine and High Streets, one at the corner of Preble and Day Streets and one each on Sawyer, Brown and Walnut Streets, and one has been rebuilt on Summer Street. At the junction of Randall and High Streets two catch basins have been repaired and one new surface intake has been built.

A storm water drain at the Brown Street bridge of the B. & M. R. R. was relaid.

Many driveways or culverts have been replaced or repaired.

### CEMENT SIDEWALKS

New walks have been laid on Harriet, Sawyer, Preble, and Mt. Vernon Streets and Cottage Road and Elsmere Avenue.

### REPAIRS TO PERMANENT PAVEMENTS

Repairs have been made on the following Streets and Roads, viz.: Broadway, Cottage, Ocean, Sawyer and Summer.

### NEW STREETS

Surveys have been made and descriptions written for the following new streets, viz.: Willow Street, Homestead Avenue, Fairlawn Avenue, Cedar Street, Margaret Street, Sixth Street, Walnut Street, Mt. Vernon Street, Bonnybrier Road and Keswick Road.

### BRIDGES AND CULVERTS

No work of any importance has been done on bridges or culverts and the attention of the City Council is respectfully directed to the following structures, each of which, in its own way is a standing invitation for a serious accident: Anthoine Creek bridge and retaining wall. The bridge over Sawyer's brook on Sawyer Street. The culvert under the Waterhouse Road at the Cape Elizabeth line, and the culvert at Kelsey Street near the residence of R. D. Fickett.

Property in charge of the Commissioner of Public Works: Under this heading I shall omit such things as picks, shovels, brooms, rakes, hoes, etc., which are continually wearing out



and are usually worthless at this time of year and will list only those things that are either fairly permanent or that happen to be worth listing for use next season. Besides the screening plant and three buildings at the gravel pit on Meetinghouse Hill, there are the following articles:

Steam roller, gasoline loading elevator, road machine, road grader, steel road drag, wooden road drag, two road plows, one trailer, one stone drag, four scrapers, one tar kettle, two iron wheelbarrows, one grindstone, two cross-cut saws, one hand saw, ten lanterns, three tampers, five stone hammers, three sewer spoons, one grass scythe, one bush scythe, one pair pruning shears, fifteen wooden street horses, ten stone forks, two manure forks, one crowbar, four slicing bars. The sewer hose is nearly all worn out and is therefore not listed.

Your City Physician for the year 1919-1920, reports that there has been less sickness at the City Home and among the out-poor, this year, than at any time since our incorporation.

One very important thing has been brought to the attention of the City Physician during the past week and that is the necessity of having a place where we can have our insane cases cared for during the process of commitment, which takes at least from three to five days. We have to ask the City of Portland to take our cases to their City Home, a privilege which they are very reluctant to grant as of course it causes them a great deal of trouble and inconvenience. They called me during the confinement of our last insane case, at least five times and said we would have to take the patient away, as they could not keep her longer. You can see what we would be up against if they should refuse to take our patients there. I hope you will give this matter your earnest consideration.
