## RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of South Portland—*

Gentlemen:—I submit herewith the twenty-second annual report of the City of South Portland, Maine, for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1921. I have followed your instructions and segregated in the sinking fund all revenues paid into the City treasury both on account of collections from our resources as of Feb. 1, 1920 and income from accounts due the City prior to Feb. 1, 1920. Also appropriation for deficit of 1919, and appropriation for reduction of City debt. We have been able to retire \$9,000.00 worth of bonds maturing this year and notes amounting to \$14,625.00 from the sinking fund besides caring for all other items which were properly sinking fund charges, an itemized account of which appears on a later page.

## REPORT OF CITY ELECTRICIAN

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen—*

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1921.

### INSPECTIONS

I have made three hundred and seventy-one inspections and issued one hundred and sixty-four permits as follows:

Ninety-six old buildings, forty-eight new buildings, seven public garages, six factories, four milk rooms, two public buildings and one lunch room.

All of the above wiring has been done to conform to the National Board of Fire Underwriters' rules and requirements.

### FIRE ALARMS

There have been twenty-nine alarms from the following boxes: One from box 12, one from box 15, three from box 25, two from box 32, (one of those was a false alarm), two from box 34, one from box 35, one from box 36, one false alarm from box 38, one from box 44, one double alarm from box 46, one from box 47, two from box 48, one double alarm from box 55, one from box 62, one from box 66, one from box 74, one from box 75, and four from box 77.

The largest fire loss this year has been to City property, wherein we lost our high school, much to the regret of every citizen.

### EXTENSION

We have been unable to do very much in this line the past year, as material has been so high as to prohibit much new work. However, we have replaced the old whistle-blowing machine with a Gamewell machine, and is giving good satisfaction.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

I would recommend that the coming year the wires in ward two and ward three be replaced, as the present wires have out-lived their usefulness and are in a very bad condition; also that the tappers be installed in ward seven.

## PUBLIC BUILDINGS

This department has looked after the repairs on wiring in all of the Public buildings the past year.

Also Union hall has been rewired and put in a first-class condition.

And one of the rooms at the Cash Corner school has been wired, in this case the pupils furnished the material and this department the labor.

Thanking you gentlemen, for your co-operation with me in carrying out the work of the year.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF REGISTRATION

Feb. 28, 1921.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen—*

Gentlemen:—The Board of Registration of Voters hereby respectfully submit the report for the year 1920.

Three election sessions, one Primary Session, the usual revision session, and an extra session for the purpose of preparing for the printing of new voting lists, comprised the work of the Board for the year.

At the Regular meetings of the Board holden previous to the State Election in September and the National Election in November, we were in session for Ten Days as enjoined by Act of Legislature, in Special Session.

The granting of franchise to women has added greatly to the work of the Board. At the session which preceded the State Election in September, it was necessary to employ extra clerks, on account of the large number of prospective female voters who presented themselves for registration.

The first woman to register was Mrs. Elizabeth D. Hawkes, of Ward One.

At the beginning of the year our lists showed a total of 1,752 names of registered voters, during the year 486 names of male voters were added; also the names of 1,198 female voters were placed on the lists during the sessions that preceded the State and National Elections.

During the year 147 names were stricken from the lists on account of death or removal.

Total number of names on lists to date is 3,289, 2,091 are male and 1,198 female.

## REPORT OF COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS

South Portland, Maine, Feb. 1, 1921.

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen—*

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31st, 1921.

### STREETS

Repairs have been made on the following streets, viz:—Front, Stanford, Dyer, Free, West High, Preble, Second, Jefferson, Pine, Richland, Deake, Vincent, Chase, Maplewood, Edwards, Sawyer, Pillsbury, Harriet, Thomas, Ocean, Adelbert, C, D, Evans, Brown, Chapel, Chestnut, Fickett, Skillings, Cash, Westbrook, Spring, (in ward 7) Payne Road, Running Hill Road, Highland Ave., Mussey Road, also the streets in Loveitts Heights and Grand View Park, and a part of the Nutter Road. Mr. F. H. Loveitt gave the city the stone wall on the south side of Preble street and the new stone crusher was set up at the corner of Preble and Deake streets and the crushed rocks were used to surface Preble street from Beach street to the corner of Angell Ave. and also a part of Fort Road.

### SEWERS AND DRAINS

The Ocean street sewer was completed this spring, and new sewers have been laid in Smith street, Chase street, Anthoine street and Homestead Ave.

A short section of relief sewer was laid from Broadway at Clemons street to tide water.

New outlets have been built for the Preble, Front, Stanford and Dyer street sewers. The outlets of Myrtle Ave. and Willard street sewers have been repaired.

Repairs have been made and obstructions removed from the sewers in Preble, Elm, Cole and East and West High streets. One new manhole has been built in the Preble street

sewer. All manholes in the location of the State Aid Road at Summer street have been repaired and the tops reset to the new grade. Two new catch basins have been built at the corner of Preble and Smith streets, one at the corner of Preble and Deake streets and one at the corner of Cottage street and Homestead Ave., many others have been repaired and castings reset, and all sewers and catch basins have been cleaned and flushed out at least twice since spring. Driveways and culverts have been repaired or new ones built when necessary.

### CEMENT SIDEWALKS

A new walk has been laid on the north side of Willard street from Preble street to the land of the Cumberland County Power and Light Co. at the beach. One short length has been laid on Preble street near Front street and a short length on Sawyer.

A defective section on Elsmere Ave. has been replaced.

### REPAIRS TO PERMANENT PAVEMENTS

Repairs have been made on Broadway, Ocean, Cottage, Summer and Sawyer streets. All of the above streets have received two applications of Tarvia B and sand as a wearing coat and preservative. Experimental sections of gravel and stone roads were also treated with Tarvia B with excellent results.

### BRIDGES

No work has been done on Bridges or large Culverts.

### NEW MACHINERY

One new stone crusher and gasoline engine to run it have been purchased this year.

Property in charge of Commissioner of Public Works: Steam Roller, Gasoline Loader, Road Machine, Road Grader, Steel Road Drag, Stone Crusher, Gasoline Engine, Stone Drag, Road Plows, Scrapers, Tar Kettle, Gravel Screen, Store House, and the Gravel Pit at Meeting House Hill.

## GENERAL REMARKS

Because of the excessive cost of all work and of the very urgent need of new school buildings, etc., it will probably be advisable to confine the operations of the street crew for the coming season to patrol and small repair work, yet it may not be out of place at this time to call the attention of the incoming City Council and of the tax payers in general, to a few matters that will have sooner or later to be taken up.

The pavement on Ocean street from Portland Bridge to the junction of Cottage Road is in a wretched condition due entirely to the lack of proper foundation course and suitable subdrainage, this condition may be remedied either by removing and recutting the granite blocks and relaying them on a concrete base or by substituting in their place a heavy concrete pavement. The section of Ocean street from Highland Ave. to the Cape Elizabeth town line, Brown street from the B. & M. R. R. crossing to Crockett's corner and Lincoln street from Brown street to Ligonias should be graded and paved with concrete as the volume and character of the traffic now using the streets render the use of anything less permanent than concrete inadvisable.

In closing I wish to thank the Mayor and every member of the Council for their kindness and help and I can truly say that it has been a pleasure to serve them.

Portland Water District, to extend six inch water pipe from mainland to Peaks Island.

William Underwood Company, to build pier at South Portland, easterly from Ferry Wharf, and to excavate from harbor channel to and alongside same.

Licenses of Benjamin F. MacVane, Samuel Goody, Peter MacVane and Maurice Lubee as Pilots have been renewed to October 31, 1921, satisfactory eye tests having been furnished in each instance.

Special requests have been received from Board of Trade of Halifax, N. S., for information as to harbor regulations for coaling of steamers loaded with petroleum and from Port of Seattle asking a two thousand word article on general description and terminal facilities of the Port of Portland, which were promptly complied with.

The appointment of Thomas J. Laithwaite as Harbor Master and Willis B. Wormell as Deputy Harbor Master have been renewed to July 12, 1921.
