Athene was born February 7, 1917 on Vinalhaven. Her parents were Dr. Ralph and Florence Thompson.

She lived on the island until she was a teenager when the family had to move to Boston because of the decline of the quarrying industry.

She graduated from Girls Latin School in Boston and then graduated from Framingham Teachers' College in Framingham, Massachusetts. In 1951 Athene received her Master's Degree from Boston University.

Athene taught in rural schools on the Canadian border, as well as in Presque Isle & Houlton, before she married Michael Anthony in 1942. They were married by Rev. Mitchell in the parlor of the family home.

After her marriage, she taught in York and Portland.

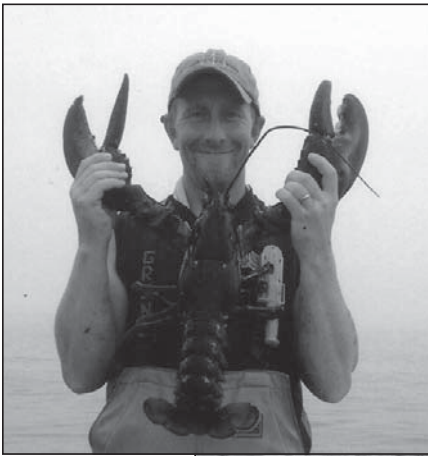
In 1977 they retired to the island. Athene worked on the Wind for 20 years. She was a past president of the Legion Auxiliary, a Secretary of the Historical Society, a member of the Eastern Star, a member of the VH Extension, Treasurer of the St. Timothy's Episcopal Church, and a member of the Fish Hawks group.

She compiled reminiscences of 30 or more elders of the island into a book as a fund raiser for the VH Extension.

In her spare time, she dearly loved to play the piano – either solo or duets. Athene approached her music as she did life – with enthusiasm and joy.

Dear Friends:

In November, the people of Maine entrusted me to serve another term in the United States Senate. I am deeply honored to serve you and will continue to work to bridge the partisan divide and to forge bipartisan solutions to the many challenges our nation faces. With the New Year just beginning, I welcome this opportunity to reflect on some of my work from this past year and to highlight some of my priorities for the year ahead.

The biggest challenge facing our State remains the need for more jobs so that Mainers can stay in our great State to live, work, and raise their families. Since small businesses create the vast majority of jobs, we must help them to start up, grow, and succeed. We must update our tax code to encourage small business investment in equipment and other assets, cut the red tape that is hampering job creators, build the transportation and energy infrastructure to support an expanding economy. We must also foster opportunities for key industries, from agriculture to defense. We must ensure that our workers have the skills they need for the jobs of today and tomorrow. These initiatives will remain my top priorities in the new Congress.

I am pleased to report a number of successes from this past year, including provisions from my "Seven Point Plan for Maine Jobs." My proposals to streamline job training programs and better match workers' skills with employers' needs were enacted as part of a workforce investment act. I helped secure promising manufacturing opportunities for our state—from requiring the military to buy American-made athletic footwear for new recruits, just as it does for other uniform items, to an additional Department of Energy investment in the deepwater, offshore wind power project being developed by the University of Maine, Maine Maritime Academy, and private companies. For Maine agriculture, I succeeded in including the fresh, white potato in a federal nutrition program from which it has been the only vegetable to be excluded.

Also last year, I was pleased to join in the christening of the *USS Zumwalt* at Bath Iron Works, a Navy ship for the 21st Century that will help protect our nation and strengthen one of Maine's most vital industries. And, for Veterans living in rural areas, I secured a two-year extension of the successful Access Received Closer to Home program, which is improving access to health care for Veterans in northern Maine. Finally, after several years in the making, I am delighted that Congress has approved my legislation to form a commission – at no cost to taxpayers – on the creation of a National Women's History Museum. A museum recognizing the contributions of American women is long overdue, and this bill is an important first step toward that goal.

In the new Congress, I will serve as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee. This position will allow me to continue working to ensure investments are made in critical transportation infrastructure, which is essential for our safety and economic growth. To date, Maine has received more than \$90 million for highway, bridge, airport, rail, and port projects through the successful TIGER grant program.

I will also serve at the helm of the Senate Special Committee on Aging in the 114th Congress, a position I sought because Maine has the highest median age in the nation. Working to address pressing issues facing our seniors, from long-term care and retirement security to the vast potential of biomedical research, will be on our agenda. Preventing and effectively treating Alzheimer's should be an urgent national priority as this devastating disease continues to take such a personal and economic toll on more than five million Americans and their families. The Committee will also continue to focus on the scams and frauds targeting our senior citizens and has a toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) where seniors and their loved ones can report suspected fraud.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2014 ended, I continued my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997; a tally that now stands at more than 5,700 consecutive votes.

I hope this letter finds you and your family well. It's an honor to represent you in Congress. Thank you for the chance to update you on my work there and in Maine.

Like many here at home, I find the current partisan environment in Washington and Congress to be very frustrating. Attempts to take away people's health care, weaken environmental protections, and stoke controversy have been put ahead of more meaningful work to create jobs, help people through tough times, and give our children a better future.

But not all the work I do is from Washington. My offices in Portland and Waterville assist hundreds of constituents every year who have issues with federal agencies and programs—veterans benefits, Social Security, and passports among them. She accomplished a number of large projects including the Waste Treatment Facility, renovation of the Washington School for town offices, the library addition, building of the ambulance bay, renovation of the old fire hall, continuance of the paving program and providing guidance to Fox Island Energy. She left our community in a very strong financial position which will provide for the years ahead.

If you review the audit found within the Annual Report you will see that the Fund Balance at the end of the year grew and we currently have \$1,110,935 with \$260,000 of that budgeted for 2014-2015 revenue side of our budget to offset the tax rate. This balance is within the amount recommended by our auditor, Smith & Associates, CPA. This fund balance allows us to operate in the lean months without having to borrow. All departments stayed within their budget and our investment accounts gained with interest rates still low. We were able to bond with low interest rate this past year to do another large paving project and replace our Ford F550. We will see several of our long term debt accounts come to an end this year which includes the Washington School, Sewer Extension Loan and one of our 2006 paving bonds. Our total debt service including the school at the end of this year is \$5,404,366.

With the approval of the 2015-2016 fiscal year budget we will add another \$650,000 for paving and \$85,000 replacing the F550. Our goal for the upcoming year is to continue the road paving and start the gravel road reconstruction program and spread it out over 4-5 years. We are hoping to do the same with all of our large equipment. The Sidewalk Committee saw the start of the recommended sidewalk replacement program that ended the year with an outstanding change that everyone can see. The Committee and Board of Selectmen are continuing to plan for the next phase of paving and sidewalk work.

Depending on the budget, we are hoping to complete the Ferry Terminal sidewalk in 2016 as long as the design works for everyone. The Main Street sidewalk needs immediate attention next to the Camden National Bank which is being planned for June. The remaining Main Street sidewalks are being targeted for replacement in 2016 or 2017. We are hoping to apply for a CDBG grant that will include the Main



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Street infrastructure as well as façade work. The Pier Project is coming to an end in June once we repair the wharf boat launch area that collapsed. DeLong Marine has done an excellent job on the first part of the project.

The Board of Selectmen have been exploring donating Browns Head Lighthouse to the American Lighthouse Foundation over the last year. They are trying to reduce the number of buildings we maintain and focus on the essential buildings that need more attention. The Foundation has expressed their willingness to take it over. The Foundation maintains numerous lighthouses on the east coast and are very well respected by the US Coast Guard and the Maine Historic Preservation Commission. The Coast Guard will still be responsible for the light and fog horn. The Board has been evaluating the current Public Works building. They have had a structural assessment done on the current building which had an estimated cost of renovation of \$500,000. Additionally they have also been attaining estimates and ideas to relocate the PW Department; constructing a more energy efficient and functional garage adjacent to the Transfer Station.

The relocation will improve the down town traffic flow, public works safety and provide more parking space for our year round citizens and visitors. The selectmen will also be evaluating the existing building. They will be asking citizens to make recommendations through the Downtown Revitalization Committee and seek grants to fund alternatives and to improve the Main Street District. We welcome input from the public as we continue to implement Vinalhaven's strategic plan.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

I have enjoyed serving the Town as its Assessor over the last year. The Assessor is responsible for property valuations, tax abatements, supplemental tax bills, and matters regarding property tax cards/maps and the computerized assessing program. I am available at the Town Office two days per month during the summer months and one day per month the remainder of the year. Please call the office to schedule an appointment. Annually, the Assessor's Office reviews valuations and makes adjustments to the valuations that include any additions and deletions. We are also responsible for maintaining accurate records of property ownership. Part of the assessment process includes conducting an annual "ratio study", which compares the actual selling price of property to assessments. The most recent study conducted for the state valuation purposes indicated the assessed values, on average, to be at approximately 100% of market value.

My Assessor's Agents and I have completed the over half of the building review. Over a five year period, all buildings in Vinalhaven will be re-visited. These visits are made to ensure the accuracy of the assessing records. We will take inventory of all buildings, verifying size and condition. Any changes will be made for the following tax bill. Valuations are not being changed to reflect current market value. We will continue to use the existing building schedule that was created during the last town-wide revaluation in 2004.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AND PROPERTY TAX RELIEF HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

Most homeowners whose principal residence is in Maine are entitled up to a \$13,000 reduction in valuation (adjusted by the community's ratio of valuation to actual market sales). To qualify, homeowners must fill out a simple form declaring property as their principal residence by April 1 in the tax year claimed. Once the application is filed, the exemption remains until the owner sells or changes their place of residence. Forms are available in the Assessor's Office.

VETERANS EXEMPTION

Any person who was in active service in the armed forces of the United States during a federally recognized war campaign period and, if discharged or retired under honorable conditions, may be eligible for a partial exemption from taxes on their primary residence.



The Veteran must have reached age 62 or must be receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for total disability, either service or non-service connected.

Application forms can be obtained in the Assessor's Office and must be filed with military discharge documentation on or before April 1st of the year it will go into effect.

BLIND EXEMPTION

Residents of Vinalhaven who are certified to be legally blind by their eye care professional are eligible for a partial exemption from taxes on their primary residence in the town.

VINALHAVEN PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

Thank heavens, spring has finally arrived. It has been a very long winter for all of us. We are very grateful to the Public Works Crew for keeping us plowed and shoveled and open for business.

Our circulation last year was right around 15,000. Over 300 books came to us through Interlibrary Loan. The Friends of Library pay the postage on these which is a great help to our budget. That also means that this is a free service that benefits you.

Thanks also go to Randy Pitts for rescuing us from a major FairPoint problem. Computer use last year was estimated to be 13,000, a vital part of our operations.

Pam Alley and I are busy planning our summer programming.

We will partner with the Vinalhaven Land Trust to bring you HURRY DOWN GUNNTOWN – A WILD RIDE WRITTEN AS ONE HISTORICAL NARRATIVE with Len Yanelli. *Hurry Down Gunntown – A Small Town Tale Of A Stolen Boy And Land Saved* simultaneously takes the reader into the whirlwind of two conflicts separated by two centuries. The land in the Gunntown neighborhood of Naugatuck, CT more than weaves the centuries together. It makes the ecology and tumultuous history of the land have one continuous narrative. The author tells the modern day story as memoir, while a kidnapped boy writes in his journal retrospectively and reveals the 18th century tale. Young people, conflicted in their viewpoints, attempted to rescue one of their own in March of 1780 and, two hundred twenty years later, it was young people who mobilized to save the land itself.

We are also pleased to bring you Serif Yenen. Mr. Yenen is a Turkish travel specialist, travel writer, tourist guide and film-maker. He wrote *Turkish Odyssey* in English, the “first guidebook of Turkey ever written by a Turk”. He is the producer, director and writer of *Istanbul Unveiled*, an award-winning travel documentary with eight international awards.

Serif gives lectures in the US and Turkey about travel in Turkey, Turkish history and culture. The majority of his lectures are in academic communities. His guidebooks are used as textbooks or are on suggested reading lists at various universities, and his articles and columns are published in international magazines and national newspapers. Serif was also asked to give guiding services to VIPs like celebrities and business people among whom are Pope Benedict XVI, Oprah Winfrey, Dr. George Friedman, Matt Lauer and Lester Holt (Today Show), etc.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Vinalhaven Fire Department responded to 78 calls from January 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014, broken down as follows:

2014 proved to be an average year for the number of responses for the FD. Typically the FD responds to roughly 80 calls per year. I would like to thank the men and women who serve the department faithfully, who train for and respond to these calls.

Manpower continues to be our number one concern; as the number of personnel on the roster keeps declining, the age of those still active keeps increasing. The Fire Department is in need of people who can give of their time and serve their community. If anyone has watched the news recently, this is a common problem throughout the State and Country. We on Vinalhaven are a little different, as the timely response of mutual aid departments is not possible, making it imperative that we have a sufficient force of well-trained individuals willing to respond. Fire-fighting is a job that requires a person to be fit both physically and mentally. As our current volunteers age, we need the younger generation, (who are typically more fit) to step-up and fill these roles. We will continue to try and recruit these members of our community throughout 2015 and hopefully strengthen our force.

The Fire Department continues to train on a regular basis, with monthly trainings after each meeting as well as one whole day per quarter in which several topics are taught and practiced. We have recently established a training committee, which has been instrumental in starting to develop a comprehensive training program for the Department. I am excited to see this program work, which will hopefully inspire more personnel to attend training as well as maybe entice a few new recruits.

Access continues to be an issue to some properties on the island due to some roads not being trimmed back to a sufficient distance to allow for access for both Fire and



EMS vehicles. We may not be able to get to you with a fire truck or ambulance if your road is not maintained to a sufficient distance. The minimum travel surface width should be a minimum of 12'. The minimum unobstructed width should be 15', with a minimum vertical clearance of 12'.

The Fire Department issued 703 Burning Permits during calendar year 2014, an increase of 137 permits from 2013. We have added a Fire Danger Sign to the front of the Public Safety Building to alert the public of the fire danger for the day. There are five classes, each of which corresponds to a number and are as follows: LOW – Class 1, MODERATE – Class 2, HIGH – Class 3, VERY HIGH – Class 4, and EXTREME – Class 5. The class day is updated daily and comes from the fire weather forecast given by the State each day at around 8:15am. I will be waiting until I receive this forecast and predicted class day, before I issue any permits on days that conditions are marginal. As always, you must get a permit to participate in any outdoor burning. Permits can be obtained at the Public Safety Building or at the Town Office. Deputy Chief James Harris and Asst. Chief Mike Bunker can also issue permits. An on-line permit can be obtained from the State for a fee, by visiting www.maineburnpermit.com.

Lastly, it is with heavy hearts we report the passing of our long-time photographer and Deputy Emergency Management Director, Chandler Blackington. Chandler served the department faithfully for over 21 years, responding both day and night in all kinds of weather to assist us in any way he could, but his love for photography was his main duty. He supplied us with many photos, capturing not only action shots but also taking pictures for reporting purposes and EMA documentation. Chandler also worked in our front office with our Logistics Division during incidents, where he assisted with communications, incident documentation and support. Chandler was instrumental in developing the Town's first Emergency Operation Plan, putting in countless hours, writing, reviewing, and rewriting the plan. His love of the Fire Service was very evident and continued until his passing. He was a dear friend and faithful fireman and is sadly missed. We ring the bell for you Blackie – one final call.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT

During 2014 the Vinalhaven Office of Emergency Management was active in planning, training, responding to, and mitigating several incidents through the year. We experienced several winter storms as well as a severe wind/rain event in November of 2014. During these incidents we staffed our Emergency Operations Center (EOC), who helped coordinate response between Fire, Law Enforcement, Public Works, and Fox Islands Electric Co-Op. Crews from all agencies cleared roadways, helped restore power, provided traffic control, and performed welfare checks throughout the incident. During these events we contact people in our community who are on our “special needs list” to check on them and assist them if needed. If you are not currently on this list and want to be or know somebody that would like to be on the list, please notify the Emergency Management Director – Marc Candage.

In 2014 the Office of Emergency Management was able to obtain another Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) through the State in the amount of \$8,603.25. This money is used to support the Town’s Emergency Management Program and requires us to submit a work plan for the year, a proposed budget, as well as a summary of the previous year’s activities in regards to Emergency Management.

We are still working on the re-write of the Town’s dated Emergency Operations Plan, which hopefully will be completed by the end of the summer.

Below are some of the accomplishments for 2014 and on-going activities that the Office of Emergency Management is actively working on:

- Updated local and regional contact lists
- Updated our “Special Needs Population List”
- Appointed Jeff Aronson to the position of Public Information Officer (PIO). Jeff completed several courses in public information (IS-00029 & G290) in order to serve in this capacity.
- Continued work with Vinalhaven Eldercare on improving evacuation procedures as well as assisted them with starting to develop their Emergency Operations Plan
- Participated in “I Am Responding” training for 1st Responder Agencies hosted by Knox EMA and then integrated the program into our local response to emergencies.
- Provided general emergency training to the public, including First Aid, CPR & AED use, and portable fire extinguisher training.



- Provided fire extinguisher training to Maine State Ferry Service employees.
- Provided for and participated in G402 training. “Incident Command System (ICS) Overview for Executives and Senior Officials” – hosted by Knox EMA.
- Hosted review of the Boston Marathon bombings, presented by Neil Blackington – Deputy Superintendent of Boston EMS.
- Facilitated and participated in municipal safety drills, including Lockdown Drills and Fire Drills at the Vinalhaven School.
- Distributed preparedness information to residents through the Town Office and Office of Emergency Management
- Attended Knox County Local Director’s Meetings on a monthly basis.
- Participated in a workshop in Emergency Management for Damage Assessment and Reporting – hosted by Knox EMA.
- Participated in WEB EOC Training hosted by Knox EMA.
- Provided hazardous materials training for Fire Department, EMS, and Public Works.
- Completed Incident Command System training in compliance with NIMS requirements.
- Maintained training records for the Office of Emergency Management
- Tracked local EMPG grant hours for Emergency Management work tasks and submitted invoices and all other required paperwork for EMPG reimbursement.
- Provided Knox County EMA with updated public safety resources and personnel information.
- Provided Knox County EMA with an updated Local officials List.
- Conducted monthly radio communications checks.
- Acquired nine cots from Rockland FD to be used for emergency sheltering.

As always, I would ask you all to stay well informed and be prepared in the event of an emergency / disaster. The Office of Emergency Management has information on how to better prepare yourself and your family for an emergency. I would encourage you all to develop an emergency plan as well as assemble a home disaster preparedness kit. Please report any hazardous condition or unusual activity to emergency services.

VINALHAVEN AMBULANCE

Ambulance calls become noticeable to people when they affect their lives in some way – because they have a personal need, or a loved one or neighbor is taken to the hospital. On Vinalhaven, they are also noticeable when the morning boat doesn't run because of an emergency the night before.

Although there were more night ferry trips in 2013 than 2014 (30 in 2013, 24 in 2014), fewer morning trips were cancelled in 2013 because the Maine State Ferry Service was able to staff the morning boats. Last year that was not the case, and on most occasions the morning boat did not go following a night run .

This has led to a more serious inconvenience to island residents, and more than one person has suggested that we get an ambulance boat. The Selectmen did consider this – even if it were possible to get a grant to purchase and outfit the boat, the expense to maintain and staff the boat for 24 to 30 runs (or even 40) is prohibitive. Consider that we would have to find a properly licensed captain, and pay him to be available, pay for transport time, and maintain the boat in the harbor when ice is closing in around it. Consider easing a stretcher down an icy ramp at low tide, along with our LifePak (cost \$30,000 in 2012). And consider that even then, there might still be times when only the ferry can handle the seas. The Selectmen concluded that it would be more advantageous to work on solving the morning boat cancellation problem than to add all this expense to the town budget. That does not preclude reconsidering it in the future, however, as our senior population increases and our runs will likely increase as well.

On an exciting note, Vinalhaven was the location for an experimental distance learning class for the Basic EMT level. Normally requiring a residential stay for three weeks in New Hampshire, or multiple weeks of one to two nights and some Saturdays on the mainland, acquiring a Basic license has been out of reach for most people – the conflicts with work and family are too great for many – especially young people – to overcome.

This experimental class, while still grueling, made it possible for four young women to achieve their licenses – Denise Hopkins, Candra Perry, Jenn Gupitill, and Sarah Crossman – while staying (for the most part) on island. They are already strong contributors to the service, and bring new energy and enthusiasm to the organization.



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Best of all, because all of the students in this class (also North Haven and Long Island) were so successful in their exams, the “experiment” has good marks, and may be expanded to include the Advanced level.

We continue to appreciate the warm personal support we find in the town, as well as financial support, such as the donation of diesel fuel to run both ambulances by Alternative Oil, and donations by many individuals.

We also count on the hard work of the Benefit Challenge Committee, who organizes our only fundraiser, the Run/Bike race to be held this year Sunday, July 26th, 2015. Proceeds from the race support education and equipment not usually paid for by taxation – such as tuition and books for this year’s EMT students. We hope to see you on the course this year – as participant, fan, or sponsor.

Our regular crew currently includes Troy Ames, Jeff Aronson, Marc Candage, Richie Carlsen, Leigh Chilles, Sarah Crossman, Jenn Guptill, Jim Harris, Denise Hopkins, Neal Martin, and Candra Perry. Jessie Cochran was a huge help on the crew in 2014. We have seasonal help from Cindi Martin and frequent assistance from members of the Fire Department. These folks show up to help their neighbors, with good humor and enthusiasm, in all kinds of weather and at all times of the day and night.

**MAINE STATE FERRY SERVICE
ADVISORY BOARD**

The Maine State Ferry Service Advisory Board dealt with several important issues in the past year concerning the continued reliability of the ferry service to Maine's island communities. Last spring the MSFS administration proposed a drastic change to the line-up policy in Rockland for the Vinalhaven and North Haven boats. The proposed policy would have prohibited people from lining up in the morning for an afternoon boat. After a vociferous flood of letters and telephone calls from concerned citizens and at the advice of the Advisory Board, the plan was abandoned.

Parking remains a real problem at the Rockland terminal and the Advisory Board along with Maine DOT have been examining the issue and studies are being conducted on the feasibility of a parking garage.

Crew shortages as well, are an ongoing issue. Salaries remain well below industry standards leading to a lack of long-term crew. Unless there is a change to Maine DOT's budget for this line item the problem will most likely persist for the foreseeable future.

The transport of propane has become a concern to the U.S. Coast Guard and restrictions have been placed on how many passengers may be on a vessel when propane is being transported. As of now there is no easy solution to this problem and there are concerns about what these restrictions will mean during the busy summer months.

ISLANDS COMMUNITY MEDICAL SERVICES, 2014

On behalf of the ICMS Board of Trustees and our dedicated healthcare providers, I'm very pleased to share a 2014 recap of our Medical Center. It was a busy and rewarding year for ICMS and we are proud of our accomplishments.

Many of the changes in 2014 related to staff. In 2013, we received the unexpected resignation of two of our three medical providers who both decided to relocate off the island. Recruiting for replacements began immediately and we were very pleased to welcome two new providers: Erwin "Earl" Morse, PA-C who started in January 2014, and Brian Webster, FNP who joined us in June 2014. They both have demonstrated a strong commitment to our island community and have settled in nicely. Earl and his family are involved in many community volunteer activities, and they have purchased a home on the island. Earl is also a leader of the national organization, Honor Flight, and has already sponsored several visits to Washington DC for our island veterans so that they are able to see the War Memorials to their military service. Brian's children are students in our school and Brian's wife, a Registered Nurse, is assisting patients on the island by doing home visits for Kno-Wal-Lin Homecare and Hospice Agency, an affiliate of Pen Bay Hospital. While any turnover presents us with a challenge, we feel our new medical team is a strong and capable group of clinicians who are providing superior care to their patients.

Another important highlight was the appointment of Jen Desmond, FNP, as ICMS Clinical Director. In her new role, Jen oversees the entire medical team. Dr. Stuart Damon continues as our Medical Director responsible for medical quality. Jen however, provides the day-to-day leadership to ensure the highest quality patient care and emergency response.

Due to a growing demand for Behavioral Health services, Jennifer "Jenn" Feezor increased her hours to become our second full-time counselor working with Car-eyleah MacLeod and coordinating treatments with our Medical Providers where appropriate.

In 2014 we won two important grants. The first was a federal grant to significantly improve our facilities. We will be adding an extra exam room which will allow us to expand and broaden services. We are adding office space for the new, in-house, efficient billing activity and new offices for our second behavioral health provider, who currently shares space with her colleague. The grant allows us to install much needed new carpet, and a new emergency generator replacing the current nearly 30 year-old generator. All these changes are being done by reconfiguring existing space, not expanding the current building. Once we were notified of this award,



planning led to construction, which is currently underway. We anticipate the construction will be completed by early 2016.

The second grant came from the Maine Health Access Foundation. It is intended to improve the access and provisioning of patient care between the mainland and the islands of Vinalhaven, North Haven, and Islesboro. ICMS took the lead in applying for this grant and work began in 2014 and will continue in 2015. Pen Bay Hospital is part of the working group along with representatives from the other islands. Issues like Emergency Room access and hospital patient discharge coordination are being addressed.

Also funded by grants, our community has benefited from our Island Institute Fellow Kelsey Byrd, who is busy planning and implementing programs to improve the health of islanders by leading a Healthcare Coalition of over 40 residents. This initiative is addressing three issues: substance abuse, aging in place and nutrition & fitness. Activities and projects have included compiling a list of services and providers for our aging population; publishing healthy recipes in *The Wind*; offering cooking classes; revising the Vinalhaven School Drug and Alcohol Policy; and providing adolescent substance abuse training for our ICMS Counselors. This work has touched hundreds of islanders so far and continues in 2015.

In September, an audit team visited ICMS from the Health Resources and Services Administration, HRSA. This is the federal agency that provides us with a grant every year that pays for 20% of our annual operating budget. The audit process is extensive. Preparing for the audit team was a herculean task requiring our staff to assemble 21 binders of documentation for the inspection. The on-site audit involved many of the ICMS staff and the Board. The results were both constructive and validating. ICMS passed the inspection with flying colors.

This fall was the second year of open enrollment for the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Once again, two members of our ICMS team, Elizabeth “Carter” Short and Kelsey Byrd, assisted residents of Vinalhaven, Matinicus, and North Haven with buying health insurance. As the ACA continues to mature, their work will make a meaningful difference to the health and peace of mind of a large number of our patients.

During 2014, ICMS had 4,654 medical visits. There were 682 dental visits and 1,524 behavioral health visits. There were almost 1,400 physical therapy visits and over 80 women’s health visits. 171 patients were helped by our Sliding Fee discounts and ICMS provided close to \$292,000 in free and uncompensated care.



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Contributions made up about 15% of our operating budget; a budget that did not receive any local tax dollars. Over 90% of our donors loyally give every year. We are grateful for this support and hope that our patient care and 24 hour presence on the island will continue to inspire the community's confidence and sustained commitment.

THE VINALHAVEN COMMUNITY WELLNESS COALITION

The Vinalhaven Community Wellness Coalition is a community driven, collaborative effort to address the most pressing health concerns on Vinalhaven. The Coalition has a vision of a healthier Vinalhaven where we all support each other in living healthy and fulfilled lives. The Wellness Coalition is part of the larger Community Wellness Project sponsored by ICMS and supported by many other organizations including the Vinalhaven School, the Town of Vinalhaven and VLT. In 2012, multiple island organizations started to discuss a collaborative effort to support a healthy Vinalhaven. In the fall of 2013, Kelsey Byrd (Island Institute AmeriCorp Fellow), was granted a fellowship as “Community Wellness Coordinator” under the direction of ICMS and The ARC.

Over the course of several meetings in the Fall of 2013 the Wellness Coalition defined their mission to provide our community with tools and resources to live healthy and fulfilled lives. The group decided to address three areas of wellness (fitness and nutrition, substance abuse prevention, and aging in place). They formed three separate work groups of 7-8 members each, representing different organizations and parts of the community. Work groups were open to all and constantly seeking feedback and participation from community members.

In its second year, the Wellness Coalition started to address some of the community needs that were identified through interviews, discussions and surveys with community members in the first year. The aging in place work group used Census data to project what the island will look like in the next 15 years and found that in 2030 about 40 percent of the island will be over 65 years old and about 130 people will be in need of assisted living level care. As a group we believed these numbers illustrated the need to start looking into alternative housing situations so that people can stay on the island as they age. We have discussed Winter Move-Ins, the older boarding house model, in-home services and the need for a transportation program. The fitness and nutrition group started the Active Vinalhaven Facebook page to allow people to post about opportunities to be active on Vinalhaven. In addition, they are sponsoring a cooking class for teens with Angie Olsen. And finally, the substance abuse prevention group hosted a series of community and school events with a group of three young adults from Youth in Recovery (Portland, ME). The students have enjoyed talking with and hearing the stories of these amazing young adults. The substance abuse prevention group is also working on the AHA! Campaign to provide teens with helpful resources about how to deal with the stresses of being a teen. Each of the work groups are focused on collaborating with existing organizations to provide the community with tools and resources to live healthy and fulfilled lives.



As Kelsey's fellowship wraps up this summer, the Wellness Coalition will also be finishing their work. Some of the work groups will continue in a smaller capacity with the hopes to keep these important topics (substance abuse prevention, fitness and nutrition and aging services) at the forefront of community discussions. Many people have committed a lot of their time and energy to the work of the Wellness Coalition. We have accomplished a lot as a group and started to make progress on some very challenging issues. Everyone who has played a part in the Wellness Coalition should be proud of their part in making Vinalhaven an even better place to live!



MAINE ISLANDS COALITION - 2014 ANNUAL REPORT

The Maine Islands Coalition (MIC) was officially formed in March of 2004 to represent and advocate for the concerns and interests of the fourteen year-round Maine Coast Island communities. Each island's municipal governing body or primary civic organization sends an elected or appointed representative to the quarterly meetings in Rockland or Augusta.

There are two constant components on each Meeting's agenda. The first is *Island Check-ins*, wherein we each speak at some length about current matters, issues and events on our own island and field questions from other island representatives; it is an invaluable exchange of information. The second is *Legislative Check-ins*; there are usually a couple of legislators present and they inform us about anything happening in Augusta which could affect our communities. Often there is at least one legislator from the House and one from the Senate; also, often there is both a Republican and a Democrat, so that we can enjoy both comprehensive and balanced reporting from the Capitol.

At each four-hour meeting we prepare for and address a *Keynote Topic*, usually vetted in a panel format. Our first 2014 quarterly meeting took place on January 23rd at the State House in Augusta. Eight legislators both enjoyed our lunch offerings and in turn offered their commentary on what involvements each of them has where there could be impacts on the year-round Maine island archipelago. As ever, they invited feedback and citizen involvement so they can better do their jobs. Following their presentations, we discussed Town Governance and fuel delivery challenges among other current issues.

On May 9th, back in Rockland, we focused on Emergency Services. On August 8th there was an intensive concentration on Energy - efficiency, distribution, cost, weatherization and innovative initiatives. Ticks and Lyme Disease were the overwhelming topic on November 14th but as at many meetings we also touched on: lobstering, groundfishing, aquaculture, ferry service (a serious problem in Pen Bay), recycling, economic and community development, solid waste, junk cars, elder health care, public assistance, and fire and EMT training and service.

Kathy Warren is the Vinalhaven representative to the MIC and will welcome any questions about what happens with MIC as well as suggestions for what needs addressing from the Vinalhaven community's viewpoint.



**VINALHAVEN PARK COMMISSION
LANE'S ISLAND STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE**

Vinalhaven Park Commission - This spring the park trails grew out of control from the wet weather and snow melt. We urge walkers to take loppers and cut as they walk.

After 40 years plus I have decided to let others do the Town Parks. Thank you to Marjorie Stratton and the Town Office ladies – you make many things happen to help keep the parks going, as do the Landfill and Public Works Departments.



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Lane's Island Stewardship Committee – The trails were so wet from early spring until mid-summer it was hard to keep up on lopping the bushes. Thanks to the walkers who took the loppers with them on their walks at Lane's Island.

We had 3 groups from Hurricane Island Outward Bound and got the trails cut back to the Fishermen's Memorial and some of the paths towards the harbor cut back.

VINALHAVEN LAND TRUST

From just about any vantage point – boat, shoreline, trail, or road – Vinalhaven has some of the most pristine woodlands and beautiful landscapes on the whole Maine coast. Making sure these spaces remain open for traditional uses is one part of Vinalhaven Land Trust's mission. If you have suggestions for how we can fulfill our mission and do more with what we have, we would love to hear from you.

In 2014, Vinalhaven Land Trust:

- Maintained 15 miles of trails on 900 acres of land that will always be open and accessible for hunting, recreation, and scenic enjoyment.
- Provided educational programs in the school, including support for trips to Tanglewood, Hurricane Island, and Baxter State Park, and ran a three-week-long summer camp well attended by both students enrolled in the Vinalhaven School and students enrolled at other schools.
- Continued to protect 117 acres of land in the watershed of the town's water supply.
- Held over forty events in our Walks and Talks series, scheduled on both weekends and weekdays in response to requests last year to vary the schedule.
- Continued developing trails and access points on the Tip Toe Mountain Preserve so the public can enjoy this beautiful property, free from development and "no trespassing" signs.
- Paid full property taxes on a sale lot on the Granite Island Road as well as made a voluntary payment in lieu of taxes of \$5,482, equivalent to the taxes that would be due if all our properties were enrolled in the Maine Open Space program.

**2014 ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE VINALHAVEN WASTEWATER SYSTEM**

The Vinalhaven Wastewater system operated throughout 2014 in full compliance with its Waste Discharge license granted by the State of Maine and administered by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. Daily and weekly lab testing is completed to monitor the discharge from the treatment facility and confirm all discharge to the harbor is within the limits allowed by the operating license.

The system treated 8.6 million gallons of wastewater in 2014, an average of 23,833 gallons per day. This is about the same as 2013. December was the peak flow month, due in large part to the 9.87 inches of rain we received, with average daily use of the system increasing to 32,516 gallons per day. Diverting this wastewater from direct discharge into the harbor or to groundwater is the purpose of the system. A cleaner environment for our village is the goal.

The system of pipes, pumps and treatment equipment continues to require constant oversight and maintenance. We are pleased to report no major repairs were needed in the last year.

Please remember that discarding the wrong items to the sewer can cause damage. Our ordinance prohibits items that can clog the system from being flushed, including diapers, sanitary napkins, and non-tissue items like cleaning wipes and swiffer duster sheets. Let's be respectful of the system and use it properly! The ordinance also prohibits sump pumps from discharging to the system, yet we see increased inflow during rain events that suggests there may be stormwater drains or sump pumps connected to the sanitary sewer. Please review your drains and call us if you have questions.

There were no changes to the sewer ordinance in 2014. User rates have been stable since September 2009 and are not anticipated to increase in 2015.

The Sewer Committee oversees the ordinance and the operation of the wastewater system and makes recommendations to the Select Board. Thanks are due to Pam Alley, Jackson Gregory, Bruce Hopkins and Paddy Trainor who volunteered their time to this committee in 2014. The committee meets at 10:30 AM on Tuesdays on a quarterly basis. Call the Town Office, 863-4343, for the date of the next meeting. All are welcome!



**VINALHAVEN WATER DISTRICT
SUMMARY REPORT FOR 2014**

The Vinalhaven Water District is pleased to report on its activities during 2014. Vinalhaven water customers continue to be some of the most efficient water users in Maine. Average residential water use in 2014 was 77 gallons per day, a figure well below the Maine average of 125 gallons per day. Overall water sales were 2% higher in 2014 than in 2013, and utility revenue increased slightly as a result.

Round Pond continues to be an excellent source of fresh water, and the District continues to provide water service that meets or exceeds all federal and state public health requirements throughout the year. 2014 was another wet year in terms of rainfall, so Round Pond remained near full throughout the year.

Capital investments were lower this year than in 2013, when the District invested over \$400,000 in new pipes on Atlantic Avenue, Leo's Lane, Clam Shell Alley, Ava Street and Indian Creek. The focus of these projects was to replace aging infrastructure, improve water quality and reduce leaks. The next project scheduled is pipe replacement on Mountain Street, Starr Street and Carriage Lane and the District will seek funding for the 2016 construction season.

Water rates were last changed on January 1, 2007. As always, the District will work to minimize future rate increases and will keep you informed on any plan to increase rates as far in advance as possible.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATIVE DISTRICT EIGHT

April 28, 2015

Vinalhaven taxpayers,

As we hit the homestretch of this school year, I am pleased to report that we have had an excellent year at the Vinalhaven School. Our new school principal, Tim Kane, arrived on the island in late August with his family and jumped right in with both feet. He clearly heard the Board's concerns about attendance and immediately enacted a consistent practice of tracking down absent students and holding them accountable for their absence. He soon found out that while our high school students are very visible when they are absent, our larger absentee problem was at the elementary level. This is concerning because much of the learning that occurs in the elementary grades is from direct instruction and when a student is not in school, they are missing those learning moments. Tim is working hard to build trust with parents and reinforce the need for students to be in school. It has been my observation that he deals with parents in an open, fair, and consistent manner and he will support what is best for the student even if parents may not agree.

Many of you may be aware that we are on the "priority school" list for the State of Maine as we did not meet the expected levels for test scores and attendance. We are working hard on the three year process to move off this list. The school has established a 'priority schools' committee and the committee will be identifying relevant professional development opportunities to address some of the needs as well as laying out a timeline of expected progress. Last year we worked with a literacy consultant and this year we are working with a mathematics consultant as these are two areas where we identified some weaknesses that needed to be addressed. No one wants to be on the 'list,' but we are, and the staff are taking this as an opportunity to improve our school rather than seeing it as a penalty.

We are also busy undertaking the legislated requirement that we graduate students with a proficiency based diploma starting with the class of 2020. This is a significant change from our current practices and the practices you remember when you went to school. A student's right to graduate will be determined by evidence that he or she has been able to show proficiency in certain graduation standards. Showing proficiency will require more than 'doing your homework,' being physically in attendance, or doing just enough to earn a 'passing grade.' Students will have to clearly demonstrate knowledge and understanding of selected concepts deemed necessary to be successful contributing members of adult society. This will be a change and a challenge.



Education seems to be in a constant state of change and this past year that has certainly been the case. Despite all that is going on with ‘priority schools’ and proficiency based diplomas, your students are doing well at school in and out of the classroom. Student success is due, in no small part, to the efforts of parents and the continued support from many local organizations and individuals. There is a lot of truth to the saying “it takes a community to raise a child”.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.



Basis for Qualified Opinion on the Government-Wide Financial Statements

The general purpose financial statements referred to in the first paragraph do not include the activity of the Town of Vinalhaven's Ambulance Dualthon, which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, business-type activities, each major fund, and remaining fund information of the Town of Vinalhaven and the changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, of those activities and funds and the budgetary comparison for the general fund for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matter

The Town of Vinalhaven, Maine has not presented Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States has determined is necessary to supplement, although not required to be part of, the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. – General Statement

The Town of Vinalhaven, Maine was incorporated in 1789 under the laws of the State of Maine and currently operates under a Town Manager-Selectmen Form of Government. The accompanying financial statements present the government and its component units, entities for which the government is considered financially accountable, fiscally dependent or because of the nature and significance of its relationship with the Town of Vinalhaven. Blended component units, although legally separate entities, are in substance, part of the government's operations.

Maine School Administrative District No. 8 serves all the citizens of the government and because of the nature and significance of its relationship with the Town has been included. A complete financial statement of the District is available at the Superintendent's Office.

The accounting and reporting policies of the Town relating to the funds and account groups included in the accompanying financial statements conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to state and local governments. Generally accepted accounting principles for local governments include those principles prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants in the publication entitled *Audits of State and Local Governmental Units* and by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (when applicable). The more significant accounting policies of the Town are described below.

In June 1999, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) unanimously approved Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments*. Certain of the significant changes in the Statement include the following:

The financial statements include:

- A Management Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section providing an analysis of the Town's overall financial position and results of operations, which has not been presented as indicated in the Independent Auditors' Report.
- Financial statements prepared using full accrual accounting for all of the Town's activities.
- A change in the fund financial statements to focus on the major funds.

These and other changes are reflected in the accompanying financial statements including notes to financial statements.

B. – Financial Reporting Entity

The Town's combined financial statements include the accounts of all Town of Vinalhaven operations. The criteria for including organizations as component units within the Town's reporting entity, as set forth in Section 2100 of GASB's *Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards*, include whether:

- The organization is legally separate (can sue and be sued in their own name).
- The Town holds the corporate powers of the organization.
- The Town appoints a voting majority of the organization's board.
- The Town is able to impose its will on the organization.
- The organization has the potential to impose a financial benefit/burden on the Town.
- There is fiscal dependency by the organization on the Town.

Based on the aforementioned criteria, the Town of Vinalhaven has no component units that are not included in this report, except as indicated in the Independent Auditor's Report.

C. – Financial Statements – Government-Wide Statements

The Town's financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the Town as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the Town's major funds). Both the government-wide and fund financial statements categorize primary activities as either governmental or business-type.

In the government-wide Statement of Net Position, both the governmental and business-type activities columns (a) are presented on a consolidated basis by column (b) and are reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The Town's net position are reported in three parts – Net investment in capital assets; restricted net position; and unrestricted net position. The Town first utilizes restricted resources to finance qualifying activities.

The government-wide Statement of Activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the Town's functions. The functions are also supported by general government revenues (property taxes, certain intergovernmental revenues, charges for services, etc). The Statement of Activities reduces gross expenses (including depreciation) by related program revenues, operating and capital grants. Program revenues must be directly associated with the function or a business-type activity. Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (whether operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants.

The net costs (by function) are normally covered by general revenue (property taxes, intergovernmental revenues, interest income, etc).

D. – Financial Statements – Fund Financial Statements

The financial transactions of the Town are reported in individual funds in the fund financial statements. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprises its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund equity, revenues and expenditures/expenses. The various funds are reported by generic classification within the financial statements. The following fund types are used by the Town.

Governmental Funds

The focus of the governmental funds' measurement (in the fund statements) is upon determination of financial position and changes in financial position (sources, uses, and balances of financial resources) rather than upon net income. The following is a description of the governmental funds of the Town:

General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. The MSAD 8 School District is considered a major fund. The Maine School Administrative District No. 8 provides elementary and secondary education to students on the Island of Vinalhaven. The District's financial statements include the operation of all organizations for which the Board of Education exercises oversight responsibility.

Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities (other than those financed by business-type/proprietary funds).

Permanent Funds are used to report resources that are legally restricted to the extent that only earnings, and not principal, may be used for purposes that support the reporting government's programs, that is, for the benefit of the government or its citizenry. A permanent fund would be used, for example, to account for the perpetual care endowment of a municipal cemetery.

Proprietary Funds

The focus of proprietary fund measurement is upon determination of operating income, changes in net position, financial position, and cash flows. The generally accepted accounting principles applicable are those similar to businesses in the private sector. The following is a description of the proprietary funds of the Town of Vinalhaven:

Proprietary Funds (Continued)

Enterprise Funds are required to be used to account for operations for which a fee is charged to external users for goods or services and the activity (a) is financed with debt that is solely secured by a pledge of the net revenues, (b) has a third party requirement that the cost of providing services, including capital costs, be recovered with fees and charges or (c) establishes fees and charges based on a pricing policy designed to recover similar costs. The Wastewater Department, a major fund, operates in a manner similar to private business enterprises. The intent is that costs for sewer services provided to the general public on a continuing basis be recovered or financed primarily through charges to users. Maine Administrative District No. 8 maintains three enterprise funds, Smith Hokansen Memorial Hall Fund, Unemployment Fund and the Playground Fund. These funds are intended to improve the educational experience for District students.

Fiduciary Funds

Fiduciary Funds are used to report assets held in an agency capacity for others and therefore are not available to support Town programs. The reporting focus is on net position, changes in net position, which are reported using accounting principles similar to proprietary funds.

The Town's fiduciary funds are presented in the fiduciary fund financial statements by type (agency). Since by definition these assets are being held for the benefit of a third party (other local governments, private parties, etc.) and cannot be used to address activities or obligations of the government, these funds are not incorporated into the government-wide statements. The Maine School Administrative District No. 8 Student Activities accounts are considered Fiduciary Funds.

The emphasis in fund financial statements is on the major funds in either the governmental or business-type activities categories. Non-major funds by category are summarized into a single column. GASB No. 34 sets forth minimum criteria (percentage of the assets, liabilities, revenues or expenditures/expenses of either fund category or the governmental and enterprise combined) for the determination of major funds. The non-major funds are combined in a column in the fund financial statements.

E. – Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus refers to what is being measured; basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

E. – Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting (Continued)

The government-wide statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The economic resources measurement focus means all assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) are included on the statement of net position and the operating statements present increases (revenues) and decreases (expenses) in net total assets. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned. Expenses are recognized at the time the liability is incurred.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when susceptible to accrual; i.e., when they become both measurable and available. “Measurable” means the amount of the transaction can be determined and “available” means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period.

A one-year availability period is used for recognition of all other Governmental fund revenues. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences are recorded only when payment is due.

F. – Budgetary Control

Formal budgetary accounting is employed as a management control for the general fund of the Town of Vinalhaven.

The Town of Vinalhaven's policy is to adopt an annual budget for operations. The budget is presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting which is consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

The following procedures are followed in establishing budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- Early in the second half of the last fiscal year the Town prepared a budget for this fiscal year beginning July 1st. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- A meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Vinalhaven was then called for the purpose of adopting the proposed budget after public notice of the meeting was given.
- The budget was adopted subsequent to passage by the inhabitants of the Town.

The Town does not adopt budgets for the Special Revenue Funds.

G. – Cash and Investments

Maine statutes authorize the Town to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agencies, repurchase agreements and certain corporate stocks and bonds. Generally, the Town invests certain funds in checking, savings accounts or certificates of deposit.

The Town has defined cash and cash equivalents to include cash on hand, demand deposits, and cash with fiscal agent. Investments are recorded at fair market value.

H. - Capital Assets

Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$5,000 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Land Improvements	20 Years
Buildings and Improvements	7 - 40 Years
Equipment	3 - 20 Years
Vehicles	3 - 10 Years

The Town of Vinalhaven has elected not to retroactively report their major general infrastructure assets.

I. - Compensated Absences

The Town of Vinalhaven recognizes accumulated sick leave compensation during the period in which the related liability is incurred. In compliance with the Town's personnel policies, the total for accrued compensated absence pay was \$34,318 at June 30, 2014.

J. - Interfund Activity

Interfund activity is reported as loans, services provided, reimbursements or transfers. Loans are reported as interfund receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation. Services provided, deemed to be at market or near market rates, are treated as revenues and expenditures/expenses. Reimbursements are when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund and reduces its related cost as a reimbursement. All other interfund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers between governmental or proprietary funds are netted as part of the reconciliation to the government-wide financial statements.

K. – Equity Classifications

Government-Wide Statements

Net position represent the differences between assets and liabilities. Equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

Government-Wide Statements (Continued)

- Net investment in capital assets – consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- Restricted net position – consists of net position with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Unrestricted net position – all other net position that do not meet the definition of “restricted” or “net investment in capital assets.”

Fund Statements

Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. In the governmental fund financial statements, fund balances are classified as nonspendable, restricted, or unrestricted (committed, assigned or unassigned). Restricted represents those portions of fund balance where constraints placed on the resources are either externally imposed or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Committed fund balance represents amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the Board of Selectmen, such as an appropriation. Assigned fund balance is constrained by the Board’s intent to be used for specific purposes by directive. See Note 10 for additional information about fund balances.

L. – Use of Estimates

Preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the use of management’s estimates and assumptions. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and the reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

M. – Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable at June 30, 2014, primarily consist of miscellaneous intergovernmental and ambulance receivables. There is an allowance for doubtful accounts for ambulance receivables for the Town in the amount of \$46,125.

NOTE 2 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Maine statutes authorize the Town to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. Agencies, repurchase agreements and certain corporate stocks and bonds. Generally, the Town invests such excess funds in checking accounts, savings accounts, certificates of deposit or repurchase agreements.

The Town's deposits are categorized as follows to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Town at year end: Category 1 includes deposits covered by federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the Town or by the Town's agent in the Town's name; Category 2 includes uninsured deposits covered by collateral held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Town's name; Category 3 includes uninsured and uncollateralized deposits.

A. Deposits

At June 30, 2014, cash and cash equivalents of the Town and School District were all insured or collateralized and are to be considered Category 1.

B. Investments

Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 3 requires the investments to be classified into three categories. Category 1 includes investments which are insured or registered or for which the securities are held by the Town or its agent in the Town's name. Category 2 includes uninsured and unregistered investments, investments held by the financial institution's trust department or agent in the Town's name. Category 3 includes uninsured and unregistered investments for which the securities are held by the financial institution's trust department or agent, but not in the Town's name.

At June 30, 2014, the Town held Category 2 investments in funds at LPL Financial in the amount of \$263,485.

NOTE 3 – PROPERTY TAXES

The Town is responsible for assessing, collecting and distributing property taxes in accordance with enabling state legislation. The Town of Vinalhaven's property tax is levied on the assessed value listed as of the prior April 1st for all taxable real and personal property located in the Town. Assessed values are periodically established by the Assessor at 100% of assumed market value. The assessed value for the list of April 1, 2014, upon which the levy for the year ended June 30, 2014, was based, amounted to \$513,596,591. This assessed value was 100% of the estimated market value and 99.43% of the 2014 State valuation of \$516,550,000.

The Town is permitted by the laws of the State of Maine to levy taxes up to 105% of its net budgeted expenditures for the related fiscal period. The amount raised in excess of 100% is referred to as overlay and amounted to \$51,710 for the year ended June 30, 2014.

In the fund financial statements, property taxes are recognized in compliance with NCGA Interpretation-3 *Revenue Recognition – Property Taxes* which states that such revenue is recorded when it becomes measurable and available. Available means due, or past due and receivable within the current period and collected no longer than 60 days after the close of the current period.

Tax liens are placed on real property within twelve months following the tax commitment date if taxes are delinquent. The Town has the authority to foreclose on property eighteen months after the filing of the lien if tax liens and associated costs remain unpaid. The following summarizes the 2013-2014 levy:

Property taxes on real and personal property accounts were due on November 1, 2013, and May 1, 2014. Interest was charged at 7.0% on delinquent accounts after those dates.

NOTE 4 – SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS

At the Annual Town Meeting on June 19, 2013 and the Special Town Meetings on February 2, 2014 and May 13, 2014 the Townspeople voted appropriations of general fund balance totaling \$324,597 which is reflected as the excess of budgeted expenditures over budgeted revenues on Exhibit VII.

NOTE 5 – JOINTLY GOVERNED VENTURE

School Administrative District No. 8 is one of ten participants in the Region 8 Vocational School, a governmental unit that provides vocational training for its members' students. There is no equity interest; however, the District has an ongoing financial responsibility each year to fund a proportionate part of the Vocational School's budget. In fiscal year 2014, the District provided \$79,298 in funding, which is approximately 2.78% of the Vocational School's budget of \$2,850,064.

NOTE 6 – RISK MANAGEMENT

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the Town carries commercial insurance. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage's during the fiscal year and no significant settlements that exceeded insurance coverage.

In accordance with 30-A MRSA, Section 5702, as amended, the amount of long-term debt that can be incurred by the Municipality is limited by state statute. Total outstanding long-term obligations during a year can be no greater than 7.5%, with certain exceptions, of the state valuation of taxable property as of the beginning of the fiscal year. As of June 30, 2014, the amount of outstanding long-term debt was equal to 1.26% of property valuation for the year then ended.

Under a provision of state law, the State of Maine reimburses the School District for the financial costs of the approved School construction. Annual principal and interest payments of \$834,388 for the School's long-term debt were received for the year ended June 30, 2014. Such amounts were used to reduce the assessments levied to the participating municipality. Future reimbursements are dependent upon appropriation by the legislature of the State of Maine.

NOTE 10 – GOVERNMENTAL FUND BALANCES

Previously, the Town implemented the following accounting standard issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB):

- GASB Statement 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions.

GASB Statement 54 clarifies the existing governmental fund type definitions and provides clearer fund balance categories and classifications. The hierarchical fund balance classification is based primarily upon the extent to which a government is bound to follow constraints on resources in governmental funds and includes the terms: nonspendable, committed, restricted, assigned, and unassigned.

The Town's fund balances represent: **(1) Nonspendable Fund Balance**, resources that cannot be spent because of legal or contractual provisions that require they be maintained intact. (e.g. the principal of an endowment). **(2) Restricted Purposes**, which include balances that are legally restricted for specific purposes due to constraints that are externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; **(3) Committed Purposes**, which include balances that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the Board of Selectmen; **(4) Assigned Purposes**, which includes balances that are constrained by the government's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. **(5) Unassigned Fund Balance**, net resources in excess of what is properly categorized in one of the four categories already described. A positive amount of unassigned fund balance will never be reported in a governmental fund other than the general fund, because GASB Statement 54 prohibits reporting resources in another fund unless they are at least assigned to the purpose of that fund. However, funds other than the general fund could report a negative amount of unassigned fund balance should the total of nonspendable, restricted and committed fund balance exceeds the total net resources of the fund.

The Town of Vinalhaven has the responsibility for committing fund balance amounts and likewise would be required to modify or rescind those commitments.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Town's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed. When committed, assigned, and unassigned resources are available for use, it is the Town's policy to use committed or assigned resources first, then unassigned resources as they are needed.

The Town's General Fund unassigned fund balance total of \$849,215 represents fund balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that has not been restricted, committed or assigned to specific purposes within the General Fund.

NOTE 12 – DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN

Eligible School District employees are covered under the Maine Public Employees Retirement System.

A. Plan Description

Public School teachers contribute to the Maine Public Employees Retirement System ("System"), an agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system that acts as a common investment and administrative agent for public school teachers, state employees (except as members of the judiciary and legislature who are covered under the Judicial and Legislative Retirement systems) and political subdivisions.

All public school teachers participate in the System. Benefits vest after ten years of service. Teachers who retire at or after age 60 with 25 years of credited service are entitled to an annual retirement benefit, payable monthly for life, in an amount equal to 2% of the average of their highest three year earnings per year of service. The System also provides death and disability benefits. These benefit provisions and all other requirements are established by State statute.

Teachers are required to contribute 7.65% of their annual salary to the System. The State of Maine contributes the remaining amounts necessary to fund the System, using the actuarial basis specified by statute. The District is required to contribute a comparable amount for those teachers funded by federal grants.

D. Eligible Town Employees are Covered under an IRA or 457(b) Account

Plan Description

The Town of Vinalhaven provides full time employees with a retirement benefit of 6% of the individuals gross annual earnings, not including overtime, to be deposited in an IRA or 457(b) account. An employee shall have the option to match any or all of the employer contributed amount. IRA and 457(b) administration is subject to applicable Federal and State regulations.

NOTE 14 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Town of Vinalhaven and School Administrative District No. 8 participate in numerous State and Federal grant programs, which are governed by various rules and regulations of the grantor agencies. Costs charged to the respective grant programs are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor agencies; therefore, to the extent that they have not complied with the rules and regulations governing the grants, refunds of any money received may be required and the collectability of any related receivable at June 30, 2014, may be impaired. In the opinion of the Town and School District, there are no significant contingent liabilities relating to compliance with the rules and regulations governing the respective agents; therefore, no provision has been recorded in the accompanying combined financial statements for such contingencies.

NOTE 15 – TAX INCREMENTAL FINANCING

On November 5, 2009 the inhabitants of the Town of Vinalhaven qualified by law to vote approved the Municipal Development and Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District (Fox Island Wind Project) and adopted the Development Program for such District presented at a Special Town Meeting. Fox Island Wind, LLC (FIW) proposed to construct three 1.5-megawatt wind turbines in the District at a cost of \$14.5 million. The District's means and objectives are to capture and retain all (100%) of this increased assessed value from both real and personal property improvements in the District. The Town will allocate a portion of the tax increment revenue attributable to the FIW Project to FIW to help finance costs of the Project. The Town will retain 10% of the balance of the Tax increment revenue attributable to the Project to help finance public improvements.

Allocation to FIW of 90% is pursuant to a Credit Enhancement Agreement between the Town and FIW dated July 1, 2010. The term of 30 years runs from July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2040.

NOTE 16 – STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

A. - Budgetary Accounting

The Town of Vinalhaven utilizes a formal budgetary accounting system to control revenues and expenditures accounted for in the General Fund. This budget is established by the Board of Selectmen and must be approved at the Annual Town Meeting.

B. - Excess of Expenditures over Appropriations

For the year ended June 30, 2014, expenditures did not exceed appropriations. Exhibit VII shows no overdrafts.

C. - Deficit Balances

Generally accepted accounting principles require disclosure of individual funds that have deficit balances at year-end.

As of June 30, 2014, no individual fund held a deficit balance.

NOTE 17 – DEFERRED OUTFLOWS AND INFLOWS OF RESOURCES

All governments with periods beginning after December 15, 2011 were required to implement the following statements:

GASB No. 63, Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position and GASB No. 65, Items Previously Reported as Assets and Liabilities.

GASB 63 and GASB 65 amend GASB 34 to incorporate deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources into the financial reporting model. These terms are defined as follows:

Deferred Outflows of Resources - a consumption of net position by the government that is applicable to a future reporting period. It has a positive effect on net position, similar to assets.

Deferred Inflows of Resources - an acquisition of net position by the government that is applicable to a future reporting period. It has a negative effect on net position, similar to liabilities.

The GASB emphasizes in GASB 63 that deferred inflows and deferred outflows are not assets or liabilities and therefore should be separately categorized in the financial statements.

GASB 65 clarifies which financial statement items should continue to be presented as assets and liabilities and which should be reclassified as deferred outflows and deferred inflows, and which items should be treated as current period expenditures (outflows) or current period inflows.

The term “Net Assets” has been replaced with the term “Net Position” on the face of the statements. For governmental, proprietary and fiduciary statements, the residual amount remaining after the effects of assets plus deferred outflows less liabilities and deferred inflows has been referred as Net Position rather than Net assets, Proprietary, or Fiduciary Fund Balance or equity.

The previously component of net assets title “Net Assets Invested in Capital Net of Related Debt” is now named “Net Investment in Capital Assets.” It also changed the calculation of that amount to include the effects of deferred outflows and inflows related to the acquisition, construction or improvements of those related capital assets. Lastly, it removes the portion of debt or deferred inflows related to unspent proceeds of those capital related financing transactions from the calculation of Net Investment in Capital Assets.

Unavailable revenues from property taxes is the only type of deferred resources that qualifies for reporting in this category. These amounts are deferred and recognized as an inflow of resources in the period in which the amounts become available.

NOTE 18 – DATE OF MANAGEMENT’S REVIEW

Management has evaluated subsequent events through December 8, 2014 the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Article 44. Article 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept conditional gifts of money to the Town and to appropriate and expend the funds for the purposes for which the gift was made and in accordance with any conditions imposed by the donor and to accept conditional gifts of personal property to the Town and to use the property in the manner specified by the donor.

Article 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept state and federal grants and grants from nonprofit organizations on behalf of the Town for municipal purposes, including when necessary, the authority to sign the grant contract and accept the conditions that accompany grant funds, and to appropriate and expend funds for the authorized purposes.

Article 48. To see if the Town will vote to set a date when taxes shall be paid, and if so, what rate of interest shall be charged on taxes unpaid after said date.

(Maximum allowable rate is 7.00 percent.)

Selectmen Recommend Due Dates of November 2, 2015 and May 1, 2016 and an interest rate of 7%.

Article 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and dispose of tax acquired property on such terms and conditions as the Board deems advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property, provided that notice of intent to sell and dispose of such property is posted for four consecutive weeks, except that said posting shall not be required if the property is sold to the owner or owners of record from whom the property was tax acquired.



Article 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and dispose of excess equipment and supplies on such terms and conditions as the Board deems advisable.

Article 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector or Treasurer to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506.

Article 52. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to lease real property and buildings for periods not to exceed ten years under such terms and conditions as the Board deems advisable.

Article 53. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to make final determinations regarding the closing or opening of roads to winter maintenance pursuant to 23 M.R.S.A. § 2953.

Article 54. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the municipal officers to appropriate an amount not to exceed \$10,000 from unappropriated fund balance as they deem advisable to meet unanticipated expenses and emergencies that occur during fiscal year 2015 – 2016.

Article 55. Shall an ordinance entitled ‘Fire Works Ordinance’ be enacted pursuant to 30-A M.R.S.A. §3002(3).
