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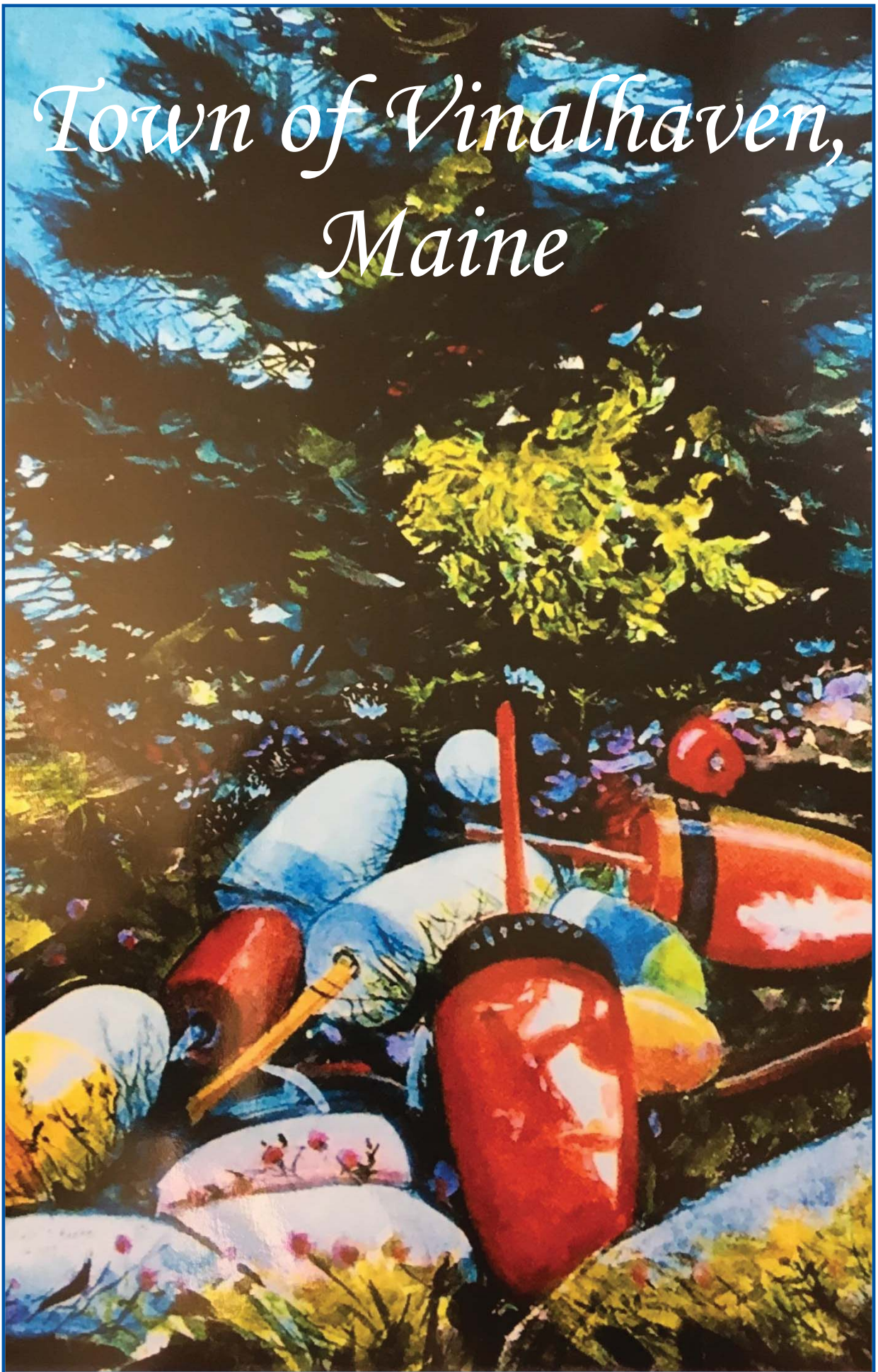

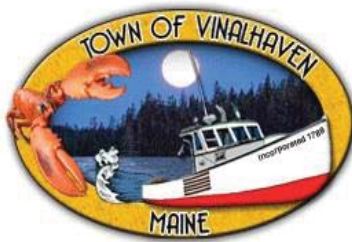

*CHARLOTTE GOODHUE*



Charlotte Goodhue settled with her family on Vinalhaven in 1971. She brought with her a background in visual and performing arts and relished the opportunity to participate in the Arts and Crafts Society, Fox Island Concerts, The Vinalhaven Garden Club, and playing flute in the Town Band. In the 1970s, she offered art and music lessons to students after school. Charlotte found artistic merit in practical tasks as well. Hammering a nail is a thing that she felt all kids should know, so during the 1980s, she started a 4-H club, offering woodworking, knot tying, as well as exploring old island homesteads - cellar holes, stone walls and apple trees. She was an advocate for Maine Organic Farmers and Gardeners Association, growing vegetables for farmers' markets, delivering eggs, providing a local grain supply shop, and breeding pigs.

Sensing outside pressure on traditional island livelihood, Charlotte joined the town planning board to preserve the working waterfront and allow families to operate commercial businesses from their homes. She served as secretary for more than thirty years. She was alarmed by the lack of affordable housing for year round island residents and as a member of the Comprehensive Planning Committee she focused her attention on trying to find solutions.

During the 1990s, Charlotte found her own niche along the working waterfront. As a founding board member of Fox Island Seafood Handlers, she coordinated moving fresh crab, shrimp, and urchins from boats to processors. She used her contacts in the seafood business to organize donations for the Vinalhaven Fisherman's award, a scholarship she felt necessary to help boost the careers of young island fisherman.

Charlotte was happiest in her garden. She enjoyed sharing her knowledge about saving seeds and growing food with kids and friends and, in doing so, created a neighborhood gathering center in her garden, fields, and orchard. The community celebrated four decades of events at her place – apple pressings, Easter candy hunts, picnics, concerts, brunches, weddings, haunted barns, and Rampage.

She was often seen on her tractor, plowing gardens in Spring and mowing fields in summer and will be remembered most fondly riding her tractor through town waving her straw hat at passersby.

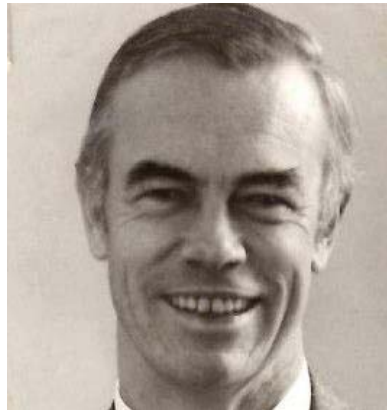

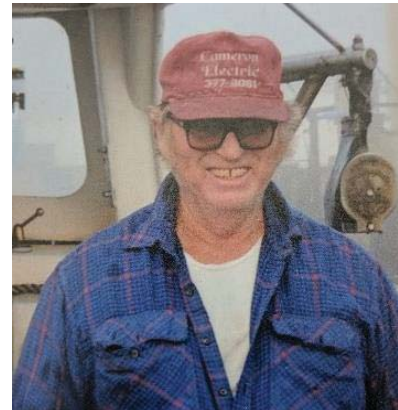

**SELECTMEN / TOWN MANAGER'S  
2016/2017 FISCAL YEAR REPORT**

The Board of Selectmen (BOS) goals for 2016/2017 fiscal year goals included:

- Administration
  - Website Update – the town's new website was launched and is now maintained within our office. We have attempted to create some helpful pages and provide necessary information that can be at your reach from a computer or device anywhere. If you have ideas/suggestions/comments just send us a message.
  - Credit Card Payment – many have asked about paying with credit cards and we are happy to say the program has worked with great success, even in spite of the 2.5% fee passed on to the customer as required by law.
  - Budget Software – Our cash receipting software is separate from our budget/accounting, so we are in the progress of bringing these together with TRIO, an existing municipal management software.
- Town Property
  - Park Inventory/Assessment – Maintaining and knowing what to maintain in our parks has been a bit of a challenge since Bodine Ames retired from the volunteer post (many, many thanks BO for all you have and still do). The committee has asked many questions and made many requests and have begun creating an inventory/needs assessment for our parks.
  - Cemetery Stone Restoration – Many grave stones have fallen, sunken, or broke over the years, most could be cleaned to restore the names carved beneath the lichen. Thomas Stevens was able to come reset and clean some of the stones in the Carver's Cemetery – go take a look at some of the beautiful stones.
- Fire/EMS
  - Finish Emergency Operation Plan – a plan that outlines how we would react to many different emergency situations has been under review and in need of updating. The progress was delayed by a Bureau of Labor Standards audit, but we will resume the update in the following year.
  - Recruit Members – always on the mind of the BOS and Department as retaining and recruiting new members is vital to our island's safety. There is a need to be proactive in recruitment.
  - Research Inventory/Supply Software
  - Review On-Call Policy – the changing needs/expectations of the department have changed over the years and demands a review of current practices. The policy has expanded to include a third on-call member for night and weekend shifts as the third person is instrumental in orchestrating emergency transport.
- Transfer Station
  - Building Maintenance/Improvements – the building needs some minor repairs including the roof and back wall. We will need to keep this in the forefront so as not to end up with a deteriorated building.
  - Camera Upgrade – the system was replaced with better cameras and longer playback so we are able to review any issues that may arise.
  - Research Single-Stream Recycling Options – the Solid Waste Committee (Waste Watchers) has dug in deep with understanding the pros/cons of single-stream recycling and found the reduced prices for recycling might mean lower costs if we can become more efficient and reduce the MSW/demo.
- Public Works
  - Research Computer Software for Infrastructure Assessment – A road management software was purchased and will require field work to assess road surface conditions. Look for an update in the 17/18 FY report.

- Determine PW Facility Placement – Following a feasibility study to determine PW Facility needs, Marty Stein presented options for the committee and BOS to consider. A public meeting was held to present the findings and a decision will need to be made soon.
- Continue Gravel Road Improvements – Last year we outlined a plan to improve some of our gravel roads and we have continued that this year with work on Crockett’s River Road and Zeke’s Point Road. New ditches, ledge removal, and new surface have all been a part of these rehab projects.
- Sidewalk Repairs near Bank – after the erosion of the embankment under the Main Street section of sidewalk, we had to have a retaining wall and new sidewalk poured. This is one of many challenges of maintaining infrastructure located along the shoreline.
- Capital Projects
  - Develop Plan for Carrying Place Bridge – an engineered draft of the bridge report is available on the town website. Consideration for the raising of the deck height to mitigate future flooding events as SLR will increasingly challenge the integrity of our infrastructure will need to be decided.



## ASSESSOR'S REPORT

The total taxable property valuation for the 2017-2018 tax year was \$509,319,386, a reduction of \$6,168,718 (-1.2%) from the previous tax year. There were 345 Homestead exemptions valued at \$6,900,000 and 35 Veteran's exemptions valued at \$210,000 granted. There were 12 parcels in Tree Growth valued at \$198,500, three parcels classified as farmland valued at \$40,000, and 56 parcels in the Open Space program valued at \$3,528,800. In all, there was \$60,102,300 of property exempt from taxation (excluding Homestead and Veterans exemptions).

After including reimbursements and other anticipated revenues, Vinalhaven had to raise \$5,811,334.19 from property taxes. This calculated to a rate of \$11.41 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

You may qualify for a Homestead exemption if you are a permanent resident of Vinalhaven, which would have reduced your taxes by \$228.20 this year.

I have completed my first year after returning as Vinalhaven's Assessor. While preparing this report I reviewed the report from 2003. In 2003 there were 349 (vs 345 now) Homestead, 58 (vs 35 now) Veterans and two (vs none now) Blind exemptions. Also in 2003 there were 46 (vs 12 now) parcels in Tree Growth and 23 (vs 56 now) parcels in Open Space.

Some things have changed and some have not, including the Assessor.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Vinalhaven Fire Department responded to 98 calls for assistance from January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017, broken down as follows:

In 2017 we saw an increase in the number of responses up from 83 calls in 2016 to 98 calls in 2017, mainly due to storm related calls for trees and power lines down from the severe wind storm we experienced in October. Most of the other responses stayed pretty consistent with the previous year with the exception of the number of fire alarm calls, which dropped from 13 in 2016 to 7 in 2017. The FD encourages people to have their alarm systems serviced annually to help limit the number of alarm malfunctions and false calls.

Call 911 – this is the best and quickest way to get a response from Emergency Services, whether it be from the Fire Department or EMS. A 911 call for an emergency goes into Knox County Regional Communications Center (KRCC) where the call is answered by a professional dispatcher. They will process the call and notify the proper agencies to respond, as well as give instruction on what to do until 1<sup>st</sup> responders arrive. There have been, and continue to be instances where people call the fire station or attempt to call me at home for an emergency or a potential emergency. If you are lucky enough to catch someone at the station or at their residence, then they in turn have to call 911 and report the emergency to initiate a response. This not only delays the response, but critical information can be missed in the transfer of information. Please dial 911 if you have an emergency, this is the fastest and most efficient way to receive help.

The Fire Department, with the approval of the Select Board, has ordered a new Utility that will replace the '96 Jeep Cherokee when it arrives, hopefully by the end of June. The new Utility will be a 4wd, one ton pick-up truck with a service body that will feature 20" deep compartments, as well as bed space to carry portable pumps, hose, tools, etc. The new vehicle will allow us to carry more equipment in a more organized manner. The Utility, as its name suggests, carries a multitude of tools, equipment, and supplies in support of the FD at almost every incident, as well as serves the Department in Command functions, inspections, investigations, and daily tasks. Funds to purchase the new Utility came from the Department's "Vehicle and Equipment Reserve".

The number of fires in 2017 was again relatively low, which is a testament to the community being responsible and demonstrating good fire prevention practices in day to day life. The Fire Department takes an active role in enhancing these practices throughout the Town in several ways. We offer and maintain chimney cleaning equipment for anyone in the community to borrow at no charge. Chimney, woodstove, and Life Safety Code inspections are done upon request and we have an active Fire Prevention Program within the school system for children in grades Pre-K through 5. In late 2015 the American Red Cross partnered with local fire departments throughout the State in sponsoring The Home Fire Preparedness Campaign. This is a great program, in which

members of the fire department will install FREE smoke alarms (provided by the Red Cross) in the appropriate places and in the appropriate numbers within your residence. As part of the program the family receives, in addition to the security of new smoke alarms, a short fire safety “class”, as well as information on fire safety and prevention. The Red Cross will be continuing this program for a minimum of three more years and are strongly considering it to be part of their on-going mission. The detectors come with a 10yr battery, so there is no need to change batteries. I urge anyone with the need to participate in the program. Please contact the Red Cross at (207)-941-2903 ext. 113 to get started or the Fire Department for more information.

The FD issued 673 open burning permits, up from 631 in 2016. A burning permit is required for anyone wishing to burn and the fire must be attended, watched, and controlled. The law strictly prohibits the burning of plastics, rope, Styrofoam, rubber, chemicals, or other solid waste and the fire has to be out before you leave it. Permits can be obtained at the Public Safety Building or at the Town Office. Deputy Chief James Harris and Asst. Chief Mike Bunker can also issue permits. There is a Fire Danger sign on the outside of the Public Safety Building which has the fire danger level posted for the day. The class day is updated daily and comes from the fire weather forecast given by the State each day at around 8:15am. I will be waiting until I receive this forecast and predicted class day, before I issue any permits on days when conditions are marginal. We continue to get a few calls a year where a fire is not authorized, meaning it has been left unattended or there was no permit issued for the fire. Please be cautious when participating in outdoor burning and adhere to the requirements set forth on the permit.

Clarence “Cap” Conway graciously retired in 2017. “Cap” spent his life serving the Fire Department and his dedication to this organization was like no other. In his **64 years of service**, he served in almost every position, including Chief and put his heart and soul into the department. He served as our Delegate to the Knox County Firefighters Association, as well as Delegate to the Maine State Federation of Firefighters up to his retirement, all the while voicing our concerns and offering input on local and regional issues. Clarence was awarded Firefighter of the Year in 2004 by the Maine State Federation of Firefighters, an award which is not easily achieved. Throughout his service he saw good and bad and was always there when someone needed help. He answered the call faithfully up to the day he laid down his helmet. For that and for everything he has done, we thank him from the bottom of our hearts. We will be hosting a retirement / open house this summer and hope you all can make it to personally thank “Cap” for his service.

## **VINALHAVEN AMBULANCE**

Transportation! Arranging transportation off the island is one of the most challenging (and unusual) aspects of our service. It is such a challenge that one of our crew is dedicated to figuring out how we will get off the island.

There are two main considerations: patient condition and weather. Once EMS has been activated to transport a person to the mainland, our first choice is always air transportation, because it is much faster for both patient and crew. Air is not always an option – the weather may make it unsafe, and crew and equipment may be unavailable.

Our second choice is the ferry. It can safely travel in fog, rain, snow, and handle most wind and waves, our patient is in a quiet and climate controlled environment, and all our tools are with us. However, should our patient deteriorate during the trip, there is no one to call for help. We are on our own. The ferry, too, is also not always an option – 10 foot seas, for example, or lack of crew availability may preclude this option.

There are obvious circumstances when transportation has to be gotten at all costs. We are frequently asked “is this a life-or-death situation”. It is easy to say yes when we have a person who has suffered a stroke, a heart attack, or has been resuscitated following sudden cardiac arrest – these are situations that are easily understood by most people as “true” emergencies.

It is not so easy to answer that as a yes or no on most our calls, and these are the source of complaint by people inconvenienced by interrupted flight or ferry schedules. A patient who had a traumatic head injury, excruciating abdominal pain, or a rapid irregular heart beat is often seen returning on the first boat in the morning.

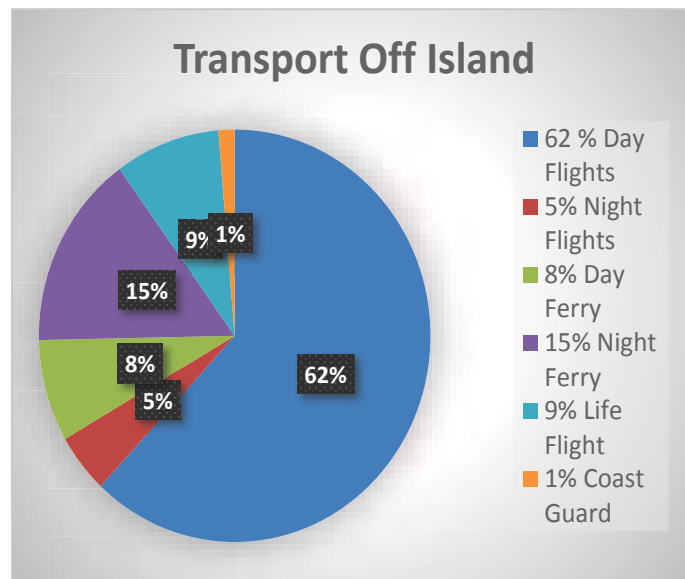
Diagnostic tests may have shown the head injury to be a simple concussion with no further treatment necessary, but the patient could also have had significant brain swelling that, untreated, would get slowly but progressively worse until death. If we waited to transport the patient until definitive signs and symptoms appeared, the two hours of transport time could prove fatal.

Likewise, the patient with abdominal pain may have had indigestion or a kidney stone that passed, but it could also be an intestinal obstruction that could burst and be fatal if still two hours from surgery. The person with a rapid, irregular heart beat might convert to a normal rhythm all by themselves, or the heart could be exhausted and lead to a heart attack and death.

There would be many, many more ambulance calls transporting to the mainland if our dedicated medical providers at ICMS were not using their knowledge and skill, 24/7, to take care of us. There are situations, however, when the specialized diagnostic equipment and clinical team at the hospital are necessary to distinguish between the concussion and traumatic brain injury, the indigestion and the obstructed bowel. None of us are willing to risk human life by playing the odds.

In 2017 we had a total of 216 runs, of which 150 patients were transported to the mainland. Penobscot Island Air handled 100 of those calls. The graph shows our challenge: what other transportation do we have available when we can't fly?





#### **Know your AEDs**

Quick access to and application of AEDs, or automated external defibrillators, is one of the most critical steps in resuscitation of someone in sudden cardiac arrest.

AEDs can be found on the ferries, at the ferry terminal, Harbor Wharf (in the bathroom), Tidewater Motel (street side entrance), Union Church (basement entrance), the school, and Pleasant River Chapel (coat rack).

Training for hands only CPR takes 30-45 minutes, and is best refreshed every couple of years or even more frequently. To schedule a class, please contact the office – 2119, or [plundholm@townofvinalhaven.org](mailto:plundholm@townofvinalhaven.org)

## **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT**

In 2017 the Office of Emergency Management played an active role in preparing, mitigating, responding, and recovering from several severe storms. We opened our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) on a couple of occasions to help manage these severe weather events. The severe wind storm that occurred in October of 2017 knocked out power and blocked various roads within our community for most of the day, keeping our Fire Department, Public Works, and Fox Islands Electric Co-Op crews busy. Coordination from the staff at the EOC helped coordinate a safe and efficient response to a multitude of emergency calls. This storm generated a Presidential Disaster Declaration that makes Public Assistance Funds available from FEMA. The preliminary paperwork has been submitted and we are currently waiting for a FEMA representative to contact us. If all goes through as submitted, the Town should receive approx. \$7,800 for expenses incurred as a result of the storm.

Work goes forward on completing the Town's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). This document serves as a guide on how, we at the local level, manage natural and man-made disasters. As always, we periodically update our local and regional resource lists and continue training in areas such as hazardous materials, electrical safety, response to disasters, and incident management. We are currently participating in the Knox County Hazard Mitigation Planning process. The plan identifies hazards and vulnerabilities within our community and Knox County that would be susceptible to damages from various disasters, whether natural or man-made and identifies various strategies to help mitigate them.

One key part of our Emergency Operations Plan that needs addressing is the sheltering component. Living on an island, most people are pretty self-sufficient and are reluctant to leave their home due to an extended power outage or other disaster that would warrant being re-located. We, as the Office of Emergency Management need to have in place a sheltering plan that would include location(s), staffing, and administration. Work needs to be done on finding a suitable location with emergency back-up power and the needed facilities to serve as a shelter. A bigger challenge is finding and training the staff to set-up and run such a shelter if one were needed. In other Towns, often a civic organization or a church group, who are used to working together, fill this need. It is my hope that we can find such a group that would be willing to be trained and fill this role.

The Emergency Management Performance Grant that we were lucky to take advantage of for several years is no longer being funded at the local level. This money was reimbursed to the Town for having an active Emergency Management Program. It is our hopes that the grant program will be funded again in the future, but at this time there are no funds available.

We continue to work with our local and mainland partners in developing and exercising plans and as always encourage all to stay informed, be prepared, and to report any hazardous condition or unusual activity to emergency services.

Just a reminder that all structures, regardless of size, permanent or temporary status must have a permit. All campers must be registered, along with your cars and trucks. We are here to answer all questions so if in doubt, call the office. I will be very happy to try to answer your questions.

The Town Automobile Graveyard and Junkyard Ordinance is been enforced. Maurice Morton would be very unhappy to have to apply and pay a fee to register his land as an Automobile Graveyard, but family or not he would have to comply. A clean island is a happy island!

## **PLANNING BOARD REPORT**

The Planning Board acts on building and/or change of use requests in accordance with the Town of Vinalhaven Land Use Ordinances. Those ordinances are available at the Town Office or online at the Town of Vinalhaven website.

Meeting twice monthly, the members volunteer their time to assess applications and assist applicants in meeting the conditions of the ordinances. The first meeting of every month is devoted to an informal review and discussion of each application; all voting on applications occurs at the second meeting.

For 2017 the Planning Board issued 46 permits as outlined in the chart below. In addition the Code Enforcement Officer issued separate permits for those circumstances permitted by the Town ordinances.

The Planning Board also contended with changes in regulations concerning Shoreland Zoning and FEMA Flood Plain mapping. Some of our Town ordinances defer automatically to those changes, and keeping abreast with them demanded additional time and energy on the part of Board members.

As a Board we benefited greatly from the historical perspectives and experience granted to us by Charlotte Goodhue's long term service as Secretary and a Board member. Her decades of service to the Board exemplified the importance of civic responsibility to the strength of a community. We also want to acknowledge the work of member Bill Shane Forner, who moved off island this year.

We offered our thanks to former Code Enforcement Officer Jacqui Robbins for years of expertise to the Town, and welcomed our interim CEO, Faye Grant, to her new position. Town Manager Andrew Dorr served as interim CEO during that recruitment and hiring period. The Board also benefitted from the organizational and conceptual talents of its new Secretary, Shelby Smith.

As a Board we want to thank the applicants who came before the Board for their hard work in preparing applications and providing additional information as needed to us make our best judgements. We appreciate your assistance and patience in enabling us to carry our responsibilities.

\*September 7<sup>th</sup> – Ken Reiss spoke about his book, *From the Beginning: Vinalhaven from 1760 to 1850*. (Co-hosted with the Vinalhaven Historical Society.)

\*September 21<sup>st</sup> – Jeannette Lasansky introduced the film, *Fragments of a Time Gone By* about Swedish granite quarrying. (Co-hosted with the Vinalhaven Historical Society.)

Beyond the above programs, the library was a very busy place for both visitors and employees during 2017. Below are some activities and events that marked the past year.

\*May 10<sup>th</sup> – The library had a thorough professional cleaning of carpets and windows by a contracted cleaning firm.

\*The library participated in the first annual summer ReadME statewide reading program featuring two books selected by Maine author Monica Wood: *Unknown Caller* by Debra Spark (fiction) and *The Moth: 50 True Stories*, ed by Catherine Burns (nonfiction). ReadME is co-sponsored by the Maine State Library and the Maine Humanities Council.

\*Weeding materials is a critical component of collection development. This year, Allan Hayes continued the unending (literally) process of weeding our nonfiction collection while I completed the annual weeding of our works of fiction. Linda has been weeding the children's section and those books will be donated to the annual Children's Book Swap co-sponsored by the Vinalhaven School Library, Vinalhaven Reads, and the Vinalhaven Public Library.

\*Allan Hayes ran a summer youth Math Club in the library's reading room.

\*The library remained open for Halloween evening this year. We thought island kids (and parents) might appreciate another spot to stop to collect candy and show off great costumes. We were not disappointed. Lots of costumed patrons dropped by and visited with us (and dipped into the candy bowl once or twice). We've decided to make this an annual tradition, so be thinking of your costumes to impress us in October.

Some goals and activities planned for calendar year 2018:

\*Movie Nights at the Library: Twice each month (January – May and September – January), the library will host feature films. Huge thanks go to Marian "Munch" Grogan for making this all happen. Examples of early films include *Dunkirk*, *Loving Vincent*, *Get Out!*, *Lady Bird*, *The Salesman*, and *Snowden*. Watch for titles of upcoming films in *The WIND*, on posters around town, and by calling the library at 207.863.4401. We have a dedicated and growing audience and we would love to have you join that number.

\*Read ME 2018: We will once again participate in this, the second, annual statewide summer reading program co-sponsored by the Maine State Library and the Maine Humanities Council. This year, author Paul Doiron has selected two titles by Maine authors: *River Talk: Stories* by C.B. Anderson

(fiction) and *Settled in the Wild: Notes from the Edge of Town* by Susan Hand Shetterly. We will circulate four copies of each book for a seven day period and present programs and discussion opportunities around each title. The summer reading program will culminate in an event featuring the authors at a Maine venue (TBD).

\*Reading Round-Up: I will attend the annual Reading Round-Up conference in Augusta. This conference focuses on children's and young adult literature and features author events, key note speeches, and various workshops/trainings. The workshops I have selected deal with (a.) providing author visits to libraries to stimulate children's interest in writing, (b.) creating safe spaces in libraries to promote civil discourse and honor/protect our diverse patrons/communities, (c.) facilitate opportunities for the writing and production of student-generated books (The Telling Room), and (d.) Libraries working with schools and historical societies to explore and present local (hi)stories.

\*Opioid Collection: In response to the growing concern with and need for materials addressing the opioid epidemic, I have decided to create a special collection at the library that will include books, dvds, printed and digital resource materials and contacts. The materials will be located in an easy to access and well-marked library location and assistance will be provided using these items and obtaining others via library purchase or interlibrary loan.

Again – I sincerely thank everyone who has helped make the library a valuable and enjoyable resource for the island community. Please continue to support the library by attending programs, donating materials, and thanking volunteers, Friends of the Library, and our Board of Trustees.

## **SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

Dear Citizens of Vinalhaven Island,

It is with pleasure that I write my first article for the Vinalhaven Town Report. Principal Ann Kirkpatrick and I began our tenures as Vinalhaven School leaders in July, 2017, and we have embraced the challenges we faced as leaders in this unique and special part of the world. We have worked hard to learn and understand the values and traditions of Vinalhaven and the school, while bringing our own experiences and expertise to bear when appropriate. We began our tenure by spending three days in July at the College of the Atlantic (sponsored and facilitated by The Island Institute) with the VS Teacher Leadership Team. This experience was invaluable as we grew as a team and processed long and short-term school goals.

Over the past several years, our Priority Team, comprised of administrators, teachers and parents, has developed three key goals based upon an analysis of our student assessment data and extensive feedback from parents and teachers. Our most significant work this year has been to bring focus and accountability to those key school goals as we plan for the future. The goals are:

1. Proficiency Based Education (PBE): Aligning our standards, indicators, assessments and reporting practices.
2. Family Engagement: Helping students and families understand PBE, increasing community presence at school, and improving two-way communication between the family and the school.
3. Response to Intervention (RTI): Implementing strategies to assist students in our PBE environment by differentiating how we teach, supporting students who struggle, and creating an environment whereby students “own” their learning.

In addition, we have moved forward in the following areas:

1. Special Education: We have a number of students with significant disabilities and we are restructuring our special education program to meet the needs of these children. The goal is to serve these children here on the island and mitigate any need for them to leave the island for the special services they currently, and may in the future, require.
2. ACES or Adverse Childhood Experiences: Our staff has engaged in discussions and training to better understanding how adverse experiences impact children and their educations, and how we can best support these children.

It has been an exciting and challenging year at Vinalhaven School. I thank a very supportive School Board, staff, community, parents and students for welcoming me to the community.

## Vinalhaven Water District

The Vinalhaven Water District is pleased to report on its activities during 2017. Vinalhaven water customers continue to be some of the most efficient water users in Maine. Average residential water use in 2017 increased to 114 gallons per day, a figure still well below the Maine average of 125 gallons per day. Overall water sales were above 2016 reflecting the nice summer weather from July through September, and utility revenue increased slightly as a result.

Round Pond continues to be an excellent source of fresh water, and the District continues to provide water service that meets or exceeds all federal and state public health requirements throughout the year. Annual water quality reports are available at [www.mainewater.com](http://www.mainewater.com). 2017 was a normal year in terms of rainfall, and Round Pond remained at safe levels throughout the year.

Maintenance expenses of the District increased in 2017 as we took advantage of the contractor on the island for the water main project to address a list of other items, such as repairing the road into Folly Pond. We had only one significant main break during the year, but we continue to be challenged by frozen water service lines that split and allow the water to run. When this happens in unoccupied buildings over the winter, it can be difficult to find and fix quickly. Please be sure to winterize your property properly to avoid frozen and broken water pipes.

Capital investments increased this year as the District completed a major pipe replacement project on the east side of the village. Mountain Street, Starr Street, Sands Road and Blueberry Lane were completed in 2016 and Carriage Lane and Brighton Avenue were completed in June of 2017. The focus of the project was to replace aging infrastructure, improve water quality and reduce leaks. Over the last two years, the District invested \$650,000 in the water system with the help of a low interest loan through the Maine Drinking Water Program.

Water rates increased on December 1, 2017 as a result of the new investment. There is a surcharge of 5% on your water bill, collected through an additional charge of \$0.6242 per hundred cubic feet of water use. That's an additional 4/10<sup>th</sup> of one cent per gallon. Due to the size of the project, this charge will be increased again this summer in order for the District to meet its new loan payments. As always, the District will work to minimize future rate increases and will keep you informed on any plan to increase rates as far in advance as possible.

### **2017 Annual Report of the Vinalhaven Wastewater System**

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The Vinalhaven Wastewater system operated throughout 2017 in full compliance with its Waste Discharge license granted by the State of Maine and administered by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. Daily and weekly lab testing is completed to monitor the discharge from the treatment facility and confirm all discharge to the harbor is within the limits allowed by the operating license.

The system treated 7.18 million gallons of wastewater in 2017, an average of 19,673 gallons per day. This is almost exactly the same average as 2016, which was 19,816 gallons per day. January was the peak flow month, with average daily use of the system increasing to 24,580 gallons per day. Diverting this wastewater from direct discharge into the harbor or to groundwater is the purpose of the system. A cleaner environment for our village is the goal.

The system of pipes, pumps and treatment equipment continues to require constant oversight and maintenance. We are pleased to report no major repairs were needed in the last year.

Please remember that discarding the wrong items to the sewer can cause damage. Our ordinance prohibits items that can clog the system from being flushed, including diapers, sanitary napkins, and non-tissue items like cleaning wipes and swiffer duster sheets. Let's be respectful of the system and use it properly! The ordinance also prohibits sump pumps from discharging to the system, yet we see increased inflow during rain events that suggests there may be stormwater drains or sump pumps connected to the sanitary sewer. Please review your drains and call us if you have questions.

There were no changes to the sewer ordinance in 2017. User rates were adjusted in July, 2017 in order to establish a reserve account within the sewer department. This increase of approximately 6% aligns with the completion of the repayment period for the house service hook up loans in 2015.

The Sewer Committee oversees the ordinance and the operation of the wastewater system and makes recommendations to the Select Board. Thanks are due to Pam Alley, Jackson Gregory, Bruce Hopkins and Paddy Trainor who volunteered their time to this committee in 2017.



## VINALHAVEN LAND TRUST

At Vinalhaven Land Trust, (VLT), we see Vinalhaven as a place where every person benefits from the lands and waters that make this island so special. But there is much more to "conservation" than just land and water:

In areas of the island where hunting is permitted, our preserves offer large contiguous parcels of woodlands, open to hunting in season.

For the past two years, VLT has provided logistical support for the DMR's work in restocking alewives in Old Harbor Pond. As we learned from Robin Alden and Ted Ames at Annual Meeting last summer, alewives are an important part of the food chain, as well as local culture and the fishing industry. We eagerly anticipate the arrival of the final shipment of alewives this spring, and will be on the lookout for when the mature fish return to breed.

VLT supported the town's successful application for a Maine Coastal Communities Grant to assess the vulnerability of our down town area to sea level rise, coastal storms, and storm surges. A VLT staff member serves on the Town's Sea Level Rise committee, with the goal of helping the community understand both the risks and the short and long term adaptation options.

In 2017, we offered fifteen environmental education programs to all students in grades K-8, and all students taking high school science. Programs ranged from comparative geology to kelp aquaculture. Our popular Island Explorers summer camp encouraged younger students to make new friends while learning about habitats, farms, and exploring different parts of the island. We work with Partners in Island Education in bringing Perspectives after School to students in grades K-5, offering these younger students quality afterschool activities in a wide range of subjects, from snowflakes to night skies; making compost to tapping maple trees.

Board, staff and many volunteers clean up along the shores of the Basin every spring and participate in Coastal Cleanup each fall, gathering several truckloads of beach debris each time, much of it plastics.

In partnership with Vinalhaven Reads, the Story Trail encourages adults to read to children and children to read to themselves while enjoying both an easy hike to the shores of the Basin and a well-known children's book. "Blueberries for Sal" by Robert McCloskey is up on the trail now, with the next book scheduled to be installed in mid-summer.

The trails at Middle Mountain Town Park were reclaimed and are currently maintained by land trust staff and volunteers. These trails seem a natural extension to those across the street at our A.W Smith Preserve (aka Fox Rocks), while offering different views and hiking experiences. Kiosks have been built and delivered for several of the town's parks and we have supported the Park Commission as they create maps and materials to better showcase these special places.

Throughout the year, our season of Walks and Talks offers programs for all ages and abilities as we encourage all those who love Vinalhaven to learn more about this island we call home, whether you've lived here your entire life or are visiting for the first time.

With eight preserves and over sixteen miles of well-maintained trails, opportunities abound for birders, walkers, hikers and trail runners to spend time in many of the varied habitats Vinalhaven enjoys.

## The Maine Islands Coalition 2017 Annual Report

### *Fire and Water*

In 2017, the MIC convened and hosted four discussions which are, or should be, of great interest and concern to all of Maine's fifteen year-round island communities. But, all four topics certainly hold the potential for having a major impact on Vinalhaven.

In March, after a snow postponement, we met in Augusta and focused on **Fire Safety**. Our special guest was Joe Thomas, former Portland Fire Chief and current Maine State Fire Marshall. We heard about safety policies and practices around Aging in Place; the Red Cross Partnership for getting smoke detectors into all homes; recommended steps around mobility issues of our Wounded Warriors; the State program for clearing dangerous growth away from our homes; and Senator Collins' co-sponsorship of a Fire Safety Act focusing on the installation of sprinklers in institutional buildings. *We were fortunate to have had fourteen legislators attended this meeting.*

In November, we participated in an incredible program around **Sea Level Rise**. Expert speakers from the Gulf of Maine Research Institute (GMRI), the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the Maine Geological Survey enthralled us with mapping and graphic imagery. They loaned us their laptop computers and taught us how to see what our islands could look like in future decades with varying rates of rise. By current estimation, sea levels could rise anywhere from one to eight feet by the year 2100.

### *Dogfish and Schools*

In May, back at the Island Institute in Rockland, we discussed the impacts of all sorts of **short term rentals**, including AirBnB's, hotels and even floating rental units. Should these rentals have regulations particular to them? What are any tax implications?? Are they stiff competition for traditional longer term rentals or are they making the industry more user-friendly for both parties???

Finally, in August, with school openings not far away, we heard a comprehensive report from The Island Institute's Yvonne Thomas on **School Sustainability**. There are 467 students living on these fifteen islands; six of them have only a handful of pupils while Vinalhaven has the most. The Teaching and Learning Collaborative (TLC) came in for great praise as a means of electronically linking the pupils in the smallest schools together – replacing isolation with collaboration.

As always, any questions about what happens with MIC as well as suggestions for what needs addressing from a Vinalhaven viewpoint will be welcome. Extensive minutes of all meetings are available at <http://www.islandinstitute.org/program/community-development/mic>.

**HURRICANE ISLAND CENTER FOR SCIENCE AND LEADERSHIP  
2017 ANNUAL REPORT**

We want to thank the Vinalhaven School staff and students for embracing and supporting our work as we have grown since our incorporation in 2009. Vinalhaven students in the high school chemistry and middle school science classes grew kelp in their classrooms last fall, then took field trips to Hurricane Island to deploy the kelp and learn about our aquaculture initiatives. Kelp Night at the Vinalhaven School is May 17<sup>th</sup>. Students and community members will share their kelp-related project results! We also thank the Vinalhaven Land Trust for their support of our work with Vinalhaven students.

Our wild fishery and aquaculture research work is growing. Currently we have three Limited Purpose Aquaculture licenses to grow kelp: two for the Vinalhaven students and students from Edna Drinkwater School, and one for a University of Maine Orono student's graduate research. We continue to work with the Department of Marine Resources on accelerated water sampling with the goal of changing our water quality classification and applying for an experimental lease off of Hurricane Island.

We continue to monitor scallop growth rates in lantern nets at three locations (Hurricane, Tenants Harbor, and Stonington) in partnership with the Maine Aquaculture Cooperative (MAC). MAC was formed in 2016 by commercial fishermen who are interested in starting scallop aquaculture. This project will help inform site selection and culture techniques for the emerging scallop aquaculture industry. In 2017 we co-authored two papers on environmental education and authentic science experiences in schools, including using kelp aquaculture to address misconceptions in science.

We are delighted to share that we were selected as a 2017 Underwriters Laboratories Innovative Education Award Winner, and we received \$50,000 to support our educational work. The award broadly recognizes nonprofit organizations who engage K-12 students in exceptional STEM and environmental education. We also received a small grant from the Maine Community Foundation to continue the Hurricane archaeology work with Fred Koerber. He continues to synthesize findings from the two field weeks we had in the summers of 2015 and 2016, and is preparing to teach a three-day archaeology adult education workshop this July on Hurricane. Come join us!

Our Medical Center continues to provide services 24/7, 365 days each year. Our days are filled providing primary, dental, behavioral health and emergency care for many of you – our neighbors, family and friends. It is truly an honor to provide these services for the people of our community and we are always available to answer your questions about ICMS.

We have had some personnel changes – all of which have worked out well. ICMS has also had a major change in our facility, in that the town deeded the building over to our Medical Center in November 2017. This transfer of ownership, which had been in process for a number of years, allows ICMS to upgrade and maintain the facility when needed, without any burden to the town. The transition has gone very smoothly and we thank Andy Dorr and the Board of Selectmen for their assistance and cooperation. The building recently appraised at \$730,000 and that value has been added to the ICMS assets.

The Medical Center's renovations and upgrades we have done to date, which we hope many of you have seen, have been paid for by federal grants. You can imagine that in order for our Medical Center to remain certified, we must have state-of-the-art computer systems, allowing for proper record keeping and ensuring that confidentiality procedures are in place. We have also been able to add space to our building, allowing our providers to see more patients and offer more privacy.

We added new heat pumps to the building with the help of Patient Centered Medical Home Alteration Renovation grant dollars. This upgrade allows us to have much more efficient heat and air conditioning so that our staff and patients are more comfortable. Thanks to Niall Conlan of Luna Rock for his incredible flexibility in working around our office schedule, and to C.W. Conway and Sons and Fox Islands Electric for their great work in helping complete the project on time and under budget.

We are also very proud of our patient care statistics this past year. During 2017, ICMS had 4,495 medical patient visits with an additional 3,001 nurse visits. Our providers did 242 home visits as well as 418 after hours/emergency visits. There were 1,274 dental visits, and 1,338 behavioral health visits. There were almost 1,100 physical therapy visits and 104 women's health visits. Our Sliding Fee scale helped 162 patients and there were 529 patient outreach visits including insurance enrollment and care management services. ICMS provided close to \$277,653 in free and uncompensated care.

Four members of the community joined the Board in 2017: Steve Blatt, Emily Lane and Heather White, and Chris Radley. These members have joined the other hard working board members in fulfilling their responsibility to oversee the community interface, medical quality, operations, and financial health of ICMS.

ICMS hired Corey Walmer, LCSW in 2017 and she is an excellent addition to our behavioral health team. Linda White, LCPC left us in November 2017 and we continued to recruit for an additional behavioral health provider. Brian Webster left us in July to move to Pennsylvania with his family. Coverage since he left, has been provided by Cindy Bolles, PA-C, on an interim basis, as we work to recruit a new provider. We also have added Patience Trainor, Physical Therapist to our team, and she began offering her services with us in February 2018.



In addition to the hard work and commitment of our ICMS Team, our accomplishments last year were made possible thanks to the generosity of our donors. Contributions made up about 11 % of our operating budget; a budget that does not receive **any** local tax dollars. Over 90% of our donors loyally give every year. We are grateful for this support and hope that our patient care and 24-hour presence on the island will continue to inspire the community's confidence and sustained commitment.

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments.

Growing our economy by encouraging job creation remains a top priority. The tax relief bill enacted during this last Congress contains provisions I authored to provide small businesses with the certainty that they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act includes a provision the Maine delegation worked together to champion requiring that military recruits be provided with athletic footwear made in America, as is required for other equipment and uniform items whenever possible. This is a great victory for our troops and for the 900 skilled workers at New Balance factories here in Maine.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and \$1 billion towards the construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen the Navy and our national security, and the additional destroyer will help meet the Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

Maine's growing population of older individuals creates many challenges. That's why, as Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security.

The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. Last May, a call to the hotline helped lead to the arrest of a national crime ring targeting seniors, and in June I worked to secure the humanitarian release of a Maine senior who had been imprisoned in Spain after being victimized by an international drug smuggling scam.

The Aging Committee also released an extensive report detailing the findings of our bipartisan investigation into the abrupt and dramatic price increases for prescription drugs whose patents expired long ago.

I advocated strongly for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. I also championed and authored portions of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Cures Act that will further support biomedical innovation and make significant reforms to our mental health system.

The Senate also took steps in the past year to combat the nation's heroin and opioid epidemic by passing the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), which I was proud to cosponsor. CARA is a monumental step forward in our effort to address the devastating addiction crisis affecting countless families and communities across the country and right here in Maine.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2016, I cast my 6,236<sup>th</sup> consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Representing Maine in the United States Senate is an honor.

I continue my work on the Senate Armed Services Committee, each year authorizing the funding required to build our military capabilities and ensuring that our service members are trained and equipped to defend our nation. I was pleased to be part of a bipartisan effort to enact a new law to simplify the appeals review process to reduce the backlog our veterans are facing, as well as a new law that provides critical funding to the VA Choice Program, allowing veterans in rural Maine to access services closer to home.


While my committee work is important, working to combat the opioid epidemic is one of my top priorities. Although Congress has made some important strides, much remains to be done to provide additional funding for prevention, treatment and enforcement. I am working with colleagues on both sides of the aisle to pressure the Drug Enforcement Administration to reduce the amount of opioids produced and to thwart the flow of fentanyl and other deadly drugs into our country.

I am very optimistic about the integrated, multiagency effort I led with Senator Collins to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy. Through the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT) we are already experiencing increased federal investments that will strengthen our existing forest products industry and help support job creation in rural communities. Initiatives like Cross Laminated Timber, Combined Heat and Power, nanocellulose, 3D printing with biobased materials and other biobased products will mean that Maine's wood-basket will continue to be a major jobs and economic contributor for our future.

Finally, the coming year will continue the work of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence in the ongoing investigation of Russian interference in the 2016 election. Our Committee has held seven public hearings and numerous classified sessions, reviewed tens of thousands of pages of documents and conducted hundreds of interviews. I remain focused on the security of our elections and committed to developing strategies to prevent interference by foreign governments in our democracy.

May 2018 be a good year for you, your family, your community and our great State.

I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to share an update on my work to represent you and your family in Washington and in Maine.

As always, the interests of my constituents are what guide my work. There are many things I could talk about in that regard. But I want to focus here on one issue of particular importance—economic development. Having good-paying jobs allows future generations to make this wonderful state their home. With that goal in mind, I'm working to address Maine's economic challenges and capitalize on its opportunities.

One such opportunity is agriculture, where Maine is bucking national trends. The average age of our farmers is actually going down while acreage in cultivation is going up. Dear Citizens of Vinalhaven:

For the past seven years as your Governor, my priority has been to make Maine—our people—prosper. Helping you keep more money in your wallet by reducing taxes has been part of that mission.

Too many Maine families are facing skyrocketing property taxes that strain household budgets. Our elderly on fixed incomes are particularly vulnerable to these increases. School budgets are often blamed for annual increases in property taxes. But there's another reason. A tremendous amount of land and property value has been taken off the tax rolls, leaving homeowners to pick up the tab.

As of 2016, towns and cities owned land and buildings valued at nearly \$5.5 billion statewide. Large and wealthy non-profits, such as hospitals and colleges, often escape paying property taxes on their vast real estate holdings—totaling more than \$5.1 billion statewide.

In Maine, nearly 2.5 million acres of land have been set aside for conservation by the federal and state governments and non-profit organizations, including land trusts. Municipalities are losing out on property taxes on an estimated \$2 billion in land that has been either removed from the tax rolls or prohibited from development—shifting the cost of municipal services to local homeowners through higher property taxes.


It's time to recognize the results of taking property off the tax rolls and identify solutions to reduce the burden on our homeowners. My administration's proposals have been met with staunch resistance.

In 1993, about 35,800 acres of land were documented as land-trust owned. That number has increased by an astonishing 1,270 percent. Land trusts now control over 490,000 acres with an estimated value of \$403 million. We must restore the balance. We will be working this session to ensure all land owners are contributing to the local tax base. It's time for them to pay their fair share.

I encourage you to ask your local officials how much land in your municipality has been taken off the tax rolls, as well as how much in tax revenue that land would have been contributing today to offset your property taxes.

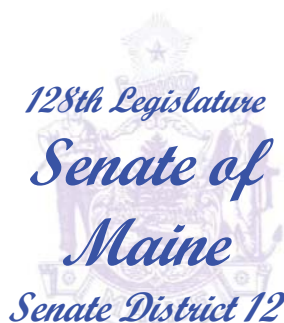

Dear Residents of Vinalhaven,

I hope 2018 finds you and your family doing well. It is an honor to represent you and this community as your State Senator.

This past year, the Legislature made progress in providing direct property tax relief to Maine homeowners. I fought tirelessly to increase the Homestead Property Exemption from \$15,000 to \$20,000. In addition to direct property tax relief, we also protected state funding for local services such as fire departments and road maintenance, and increased public K-12 education funding by \$162 million over the biennium. These efforts will decrease the pressure on municipalities to increase mil rates. I know this is a top priority for many in our district and I will continue to work towards greater relief.

I would also like to share some information about the state's unclaimed property list. "Unclaimed property" is money owed to Maine people by third parties, such as former employers, banks or utility companies. Organizations are required to give unclaimed property to the State Treasurer after a specified period of time, after which the owner of the unclaimed property can retrieve it from the state. Even if you have done everything right, you could have unclaimed property. It could be from a forgotten account, an overpaid bill or uncollected wages. This money could be unclaimed as a result of a change in name, addresses or bank account. Visit [maine.gov/unclaimed](http://maine.gov/unclaimed) or call 1-888-283-2808 to see if you have any unclaimed property.

This past session, we considered over 1,600 pieces of legislation on a variety of issues. As part of my effort to bring matters happening in Augusta back home to our district, I am pleased to email a legislative newsletter to share information about ongoing legislative issues and useful resources. Dear Vinalhaven Residents,

It is an honor to serve once again as your State Representative. As I serve out my final year in office due to term limits, I have worked hard throughout this session to provide responsive constituent services and advance legislation that benefits the people of our island and coastal communities.

This year the Legislature limited its agenda mostly to emergency legislation and bills carried over from 2017. We took up crucial bills on education funding, tax fairness, wages for direct care workers, who take care of our seniors and those with disabilities, and implementing the MaineCare expansion overwhelmingly passed by voters last November.

We were on our way to completing our work when a small minority of lawmakers in the House blocked the two-thirds vote we needed to extend our session and finish those bills. I joined a majority of my House colleagues and the entire Maine Senate in voting to stay at work and do our jobs. Hopefully we will soon return to the State House and finish all the remaining bills. I know there are many people around the state counting on us.

I'm relieved that we did pass some measures related to the opioid crisis and that we found consensus to implement the voter-approved citizen initiative legalizing the limited recreational use and sale of marijuana. We extended a program that helps people struggling with rising electric bills, protected some of the benefits laid out in the Affordable Care Act and made it easier for disabled veterans who work for the state to keep their retirement benefits if their condition worsens.

This year I once again co-chaired the Legislature's Marine Resources Committee. We worked with the Department of Marine Resources on more effective enforcement, improving lobster marketing efforts, strengthening the scallop fishery, exploring ways to reopen the shrimp fishery, providing more flexibility for fishermen and harvesters who experience medical issues and continuing to support ways to improve the health of our oceans.

I have enjoyed working with all of my colleagues, regardless of party affiliation, to do the best work we could for the people of our district and all the people of Maine.




