We are pleased to announce the dedication of the Town Report to **Don Farnham**.

Don is well known for his 40 years of service on the Sidney Volunteer Fire Department. As Fire Chief for 23 years, he took charge of updating the Fire Department's communication system, which created a safer environment for first responders and provided faster response times to emergencies. Don participated in designing and implementing the first mutual aid pact with five neighboring towns. He spearheaded money raising efforts to purchase lifesaving equipment for the Fire Department, such as the Jaws of Life.

Don's passion for the Fire Service was also proven through his membership on the Maine Fire Chiefs Association and as President of the Central Maine Fire Association, providing a voice for the Town beyond our borders.

Don had a huge influence in establishing and contributing to the Sidney Athletic Association. He coached farm league baseball and understood the need for Sidney's youth to participate on sport teams.

During his retirement years, Don served as a member on the Sidney Budget Committee. In 2010, Don received a Spirit of America Tribute award for his outstanding community service and contributions to the Town of Sidney.

Even though Don is no longer with us, we see his passion for service every day. Whether it is a clear radio call from dispatch to Sidney's first responders or a game at the Sidney Pit Field, we continue to benefit from the contributions Don bestowed upon the Town of Sidney.

Dear Citizens of Sidney:

Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities continues to be the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Raising the minimum wage is not the path out of poverty; I want Mainers to earn a career wage. Reducing the income tax is the biggest and most immediate pay raise for all hard-working Mainers.


Not only does an income tax cut put more money back in your pockets, but it will also attract businesses that can offer good-paying careers to keep our young people here. It shows the nation that we are serious about wanting people and businesses to come—and stay—in Maine.

Unfortunately, voters approved a referendum question to raise the income tax to 10.15% on successful Maine households and small businesses. Enacting the second highest income tax rate in the country shows the nation we are eager to punish people for being successful. It will drive them out of our state and make it even more difficult to attract much-needed doctors, dentists, scientists, engineers and other professionals to Maine. They can live in neighboring New Hampshire, which takes no income tax from their paychecks. Even worse, there is no guarantee the extra revenue from this tax will go to fund education, as proponents promised.

As successful people leave Maine, state and municipal government will lose the significant amount they pay in property, sales and incomes taxes. This will put even more upward pressure on local property taxes. Municipalities will have to get more creative to provide local services without increasing property taxes. Reforming the tree growth program, collecting property taxes on land in conservation or preservation programs, charging a payment in lieu of taxes on state land that is taken off the property tax rolls and having non-profit organizations pay a two-percent tax on their net revenues are all ways for municipalities to increase revenues.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments.

Growing our economy by encouraging job creation remains a top priority. The tax relief bill enacted during this last Congress contains provisions I authored to provide small businesses with the certainty that they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act includes a provision the Maine delegation worked together to champion requiring that military recruits be provided with athletic footwear made in America, as is required for other equipment and uniform items whenever possible. This is a great victory for our troops and for the 900 skilled workers at New Balance factories here in Maine.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and \$1 billion towards the construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen the Navy and our national security, and the additional destroyer will help meet the Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

Maine's growing population of older individuals creates many challenges. That's why, as Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security.

The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. Last May, a call to the hotline helped lead to the arrest of a national crime ring targeting seniors, and in June I worked to secure the humanitarian release of a Maine senior who had been imprisoned in Spain after being victimized by an international drug smuggling scam.

The Aging Committee also released an extensive report detailing the findings of our bipartisan investigation into the abrupt and dramatic price increases for prescription drugs whose patents expired long ago.

I advocated strongly for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. I also championed and authored portions of the 21st Century Cures Act that will further support biomedical innovation and make significant reforms to our mental health system.

The Senate also took steps in the past year to combat the nation's heroin and opioid epidemic by passing the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), which I was proud to cosponsor. CARA is a monumental step forward in our effort to address the devastating addiction crisis affecting countless families and communities across the country and right here in Maine.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2016, I cast my 6,236th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends of Sidney,

Since being sworn into the Senate in 2013, I have made it my mission to address at the federal level the most important issues facing our great state. Working closely with my colleagues in the Maine Congressional Delegation, we've been able to successfully secure a number of legislative victories that support our state's economy, our rich traditions, and the hardworking people I am proud to represent.

In an increasingly polarized Congress, my goal as an Independent is to put partisanship aside, build consensus and further common-sense solutions to address the needs of the American people. To this end, I have co-founded the Former Governors Caucus, a group of former state executives who are frustrated with legislative gridlock and eager to find bipartisan solutions. And as always, I aim to bridge the partisan divide by hosting barbeque dinners in Washington with colleagues ranging from Ted Cruz to Elizabeth Warren. If you know a person's children, then you see them as a mother or father and not a rival vote, and working to further personal dialogue and build relationships can lay the foundation for successful legislation.

One of the accomplishments of which I am most proud is the legislative victory that protects our college students and their families from an expensive hike in student loan interest rates. In 2013, as students faced a significant spike in interest rates that would have taken thousands of dollars out of their pockets, I brought together colleagues from across the political spectrum to broker compromise legislation called the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act. Thanks to this bill, students will save \$50 billion over the next 10 years by lowering their interest rates, which means that a student in Maine will now save between \$3,000 and \$6,000 over the life of their loan.

Being an Independent in the Senate has allowed me to make calls and vote on policies that are best for Maine, but it has also made it possible to play key roles in finding simple solutions and legislative fixes that make good commonsense to both parties. Of course, much of what we do in the Senate doesn't happen on the Senate floor, or even in committee. Instead, it involves working across all levels of government to ensure the State of Maine receives attention and support from the federal government.

Take, for example, the opioid and heroin epidemic devastating communities across our state. While Congress has passed legislative solutions aimed at expanding access to medical treatment, I've also pressed for other changes that can be accomplished more quickly and make a more immediate difference in Maine. For example, I successfully urged the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to increase the number of patients to whom a doctor can provide medication-assisted treatment, and in 2015 brought the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy to Brewer to meet directly with Mainers and hear their stories. I've also engaged law enforcement – including the Drug Enforcement Agency – to crack down on the production of opioids and work to limit their diversion. Together, Senator Collins and I helped pass the Northern Border Security Review Act to combat drug and human trafficking along our border with Canada.

While the opioid epidemic is certainly our biggest public health crisis, job loss in Maine is still our number one economic problem and that's why we need to focus on bringing good paying jobs back to Maine and protecting the ones we still have. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I teamed up with Senator Collins and Representative Poliquin to successfully secure a provision in the defense bill that can help domestic shoe manufacturers like New Balance. The three of us also worked together with the Department of Commerce to establish an Economic Development Assessment Team, known as an EDAT, to assist Maine's forest industry in the wake of several mill closures. We have an incredible spirit of innovation and ingenuity in Maine and I believe finding ways to invest in that spirit will reignite Maine's forest products sector and our economy. Part of our economic path forward must also include expanding access to high-speed broadband, which can help connect our businesses and communities to information and economic opportunities.

One of the greatest honors of my life is serving as your representative in Congress. This past year, we won some major victories for Maine families, communities, Veterans and local job creators, but there is still more work to be done. Since day one in Congress, I've worked with everyone regardless of party—Republicans, Democrats and Independents—to get the job done for Maine.

My number one priority is creating and protecting jobs. One of my main focuses this last Congress has been on helping secure 900 shoe manufacturing jobs in Maine at New Balance. For years, Maine politicians have worked unsuccessfully to get legislation through in Congress to require the Department of Defense (DOD) to adhere to the Berry Amendment, a provision which requires the DOD to use American-made products for new recruits whenever possible. 

This is a huge accomplishment, and I'm not going to let up an inch until it is fully implemented to secure the 900 Maine jobs at Skowhegan, Norway and Norridgewock.

In Congress, I have also been a steadfast opponent of bad and unfair trade deals, namely the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP), which have the potential to hurt jobs and local businesses in Maine. That's why I voted, twice, against "fast track" trade authority, or trade promotion authority, despite pressure from powerful Washington special interest groups and leaders of my own party. I don't work for any one party—I work for you, the people of Maine.

I am also extremely proud of the services that our Congressional office has been able to provide to help hundreds of Mainers in the past two years. Whether it is a Veteran experiencing issues at the VA or a citizen needing assistance with a case at the IRS, my staff is available to help. I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to share an update on my work to represent you and your family in Washington and in Maine.

As always, the interests of my constituents are what guide my work. There are many things I could talk about in that regard. But I want to focus here on one issue of particular importance—economic development. Having good-paying jobs allows future generations to make this wonderful state their home. With that goal in mind, I'm working to address Maine's economic challenges and capitalize on its opportunities.

One such opportunity is agriculture, where Maine is bucking national trends. The average age of our farmers is actually going down while acreage in cultivation is going up. Consumer demand for local food is driving that growth. I've been successful in reforming federal policies to help farmers and processors meet that demand. My work will continue this year as Congress reauthorizes the Farm Bill.

I'm also working to support jobs in our coastal communities. Last year, I helped block Sweden's proposed ban on the export of Maine lobsters to the European Union. I also introduced legislation to lift unnecessary regulations on seafood exporters and invest in working waterfront infrastructure.

On the House Appropriations Committee, I'm defending federal programs that support jobs throughout Maine. These programs invest in worthy projects that are beyond the reach of private, municipal, or state resources. In our state, they provide loans to small businesses, clean polluted sites for redevelopment, find new marketable uses for Maine's natural resources, build broadband infrastructure, and much more.

Aside from economic development, advocating for Maine veterans is one of my highest priorities. With Congress' current agenda, I'm also fighting to defend Medicare and Social Security, protect clean air and water, and ensure that our communities have the resources to address hunger, homelessness and lack of health care access.

2016-2017 Selectmen Report

The Board of Selectmen welcomes Sandra Tibbetts who joined the board in March of 2016. Offering new perspective and talents, Sandra is a welcome addition.

Daniel Phillips has filled a position at the Transfer Station and Winnie Robbins has joined the staff of the Town office as a full-time Deputy Treasurer, Tax Collector, and Clerk. The Board is pleased to share the praise of one of our vendors, who stated that the Town's employees, in every department, have been pleasant to work with and always willing to come together to achieve the most safe and effective service.

November 2016 saw the elections of not only a new President, but a new Maine State Legislature. Governor LePage has submitted his budget for review. The Board of Selectmen will be watching the proposed budget's potential effects on the town, including but not limited to changes in the following: general assistance funding, Homestead Exemption qualifications, and government oversight that would shift from the state to the town level.

The landscape of the Town's budget was changed with the passing of Referendums this past November. Passage of Question Four, the change in minimum wage, has resulted in an increase of compensation for some employees, and will continue to do so through 2020 as outlined in the referendum language. The initial increase from \$7.50 /hour to \$9.00 /hour is a 20% increase. This will have a direct effect on the bottom line of spending and in turn taxation. As the minimum wage rises all employee salaries will need to be re-evaluated on a yearly basis in an effort to maintain adequate compensation for those employees who have dedicated years of service to the Town.

Question One, the legalization of recreational marijuana, its sale in retail establishments and use in marijuana social clubs was rejected by Sidney residents, with a total of 60% of residents voting no. The legislature has enacted a moratorium on recreational marijuana retail establishments, including stores, cultivation facilities, products manufacturing facilities, testing facilities, and social clubs until February 1, 2018, for further rule making. The Board of Selectmen is proposing an ordinance prohibiting all retail recreational marijuana establishments within Town limits and submits this ordinance to the Town's Legislative body for a vote.

The Board of Selectman also submits an Ordinance regarding the Mooring of Boats at the Public Boat Landing off Hosta Lane on Messalonskee Lake. As the amount of people who are mooring their boats at the public boat landing increase, the Board is taking a pro-active approach of ensuring that all residents are given fair and equal access to such moorings, while balancing the effects on local property owners and citizens who wish to use the landing outside of a mooring.

At the 2015 Town Meeting approval was given for the Snow Pond Center for the Arts (New England Music Camp) to apply for a Community Development Block Grant. The grant was awarded and implemented according to the guidelines for approval. We are pleased to announce that the Grant has been fully paid and its utilization has resulted in 7 full-time equivalent jobs, 5 of which have been taken by low-to-moderate income individuals.

The RSU-18 School District has recently completed a lengthy survey of its five sending towns' buildings under the guide of a Facilities Committee. There have been several proposals submitted that outline various approaches to bringing each facility up to code, including options that would build new elementary facilities to be shared between towns. The Board looks forward to assisting the administration in any way possible in order to ensure the best outcome for Sidney students, as well as the RSU as a whole.

The RSU-18 School Budget continues to comprise an overwhelming majority of the taxes paid by Sidney residents. Despite a decrease in the size of the student body, Sidney residents incurred a 4.7% increase last year in our school budget spending.

As we analyze Town spending and how to best utilize the tax dollars of Sidney residents, we have put together a proposal to accomplish several necessary projects under one bond. This will save tens of thousands on interest as well as the legal fees that are accrued with each individual loan the town undertakes. Interest rates are projected to increase, and the cost of everything from asphalt to vehicles is continually on the rise. We feel taking advantage of a low interest rate in light of all these facts is a benefit to the Town and the most fiscally responsible approach. The bond, in the amount of up to \$2 million, would pay off all of Sidney's current debt, as well as funding the following:

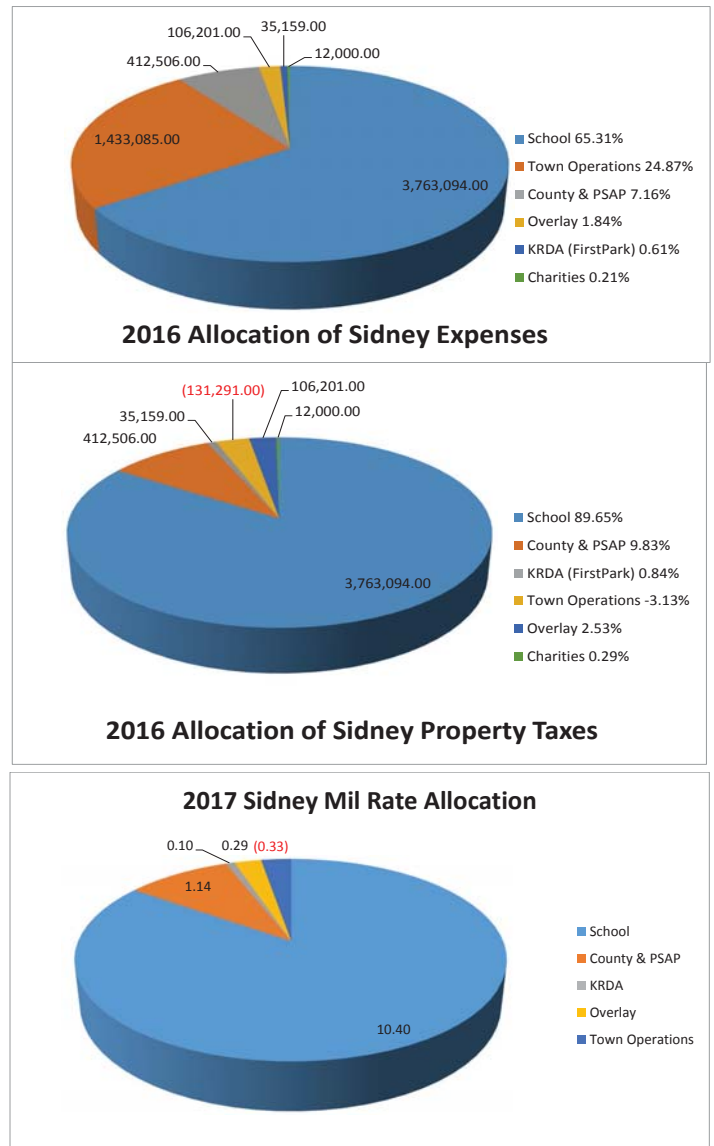
- Replace the Culvert on the Town Farm Road. The culvert was installed during the construction of I-95

(late 1960s/early 1970s). This culvert is on the verge of collapsing after years of erosion undermining its integrity. If the culvert were to collapse the damage to the road would be substantial and result in not only extensive road repairs but increased inconvenience to people who utilize that road on a daily basis.

- Purchase of a replacement plow truck. The 2001 Volvo needs to be replaced. We were fortunate to be able to safely get one more year of service out of it, but have been told emphatically by DOT that it will not pass inspection again.
- Shepherd Road Repairs: The removal of the upheaved boulders and paving on the Shepherd Road went a long way to improve that stretch of road in 2014. The Road Foreman feels strongly that ditching, culvert replacement, shim, and overlay this year, along with planned regular maintenance and hot topping, will be a worthwhile investment.
- The Sidney Volunteer Fire Department has requested a Class A Fire Engine that can hold 1,500 gallons of water. They feel response time to the southern end of Town will be greatly improved as well as life safety for residents. They have also requested a Squad truck to haul gear and equipment (including the rubber raft, boat, and John Deere Gator (ATV/UTV).
- Sand and Salt Shed Building: The current sand and salt shed is not adequate to meet the needs of our growing town. The storage, safe mixing practice, and timely distribution of salt and sand will be greatly increased with a new building design. It will allow the Road Crew to store more sand, salt, and a sand/salt mix while maintaining a higher safety standard.

The Town of Sidney is one of few remaining municipalities in Maine that utilizes a Town Meeting form of government where the resident participants are the governing body. It is our hope that each Sidney voter will evaluate the proposals outlined in this year's Town report and join us at Town Meeting to achieve the best direction for our Town.

We have ended our lease and are no longer occupying the building located on Harold Drive. With this change all club meetings are being held at the Sidney Grange Hall. We listened to the members and we were able to work with the local land owners and extend our trail system so you can now gain access to both of the local stores in town. Instead of a Christmas Party this year, we donated the gifts to The Maine Children's Home for Little Wanderers. As always ride right, respect the land owners and stay safe of the trails.

End of year DA letter, 2016

What a year it's been! The District Attorney's Office has been busy!

Thanks to the legislature, I was able to implement the Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence & Elder Abuse Unit in both Kennebec and Somerset Counties. These are cases that require specialized knowledge and time-intensive work. I am pleased to now have attorneys focused exclusively on these cases and am thankful to be seeing the results in the increased criminal sentences for sexual assault and strangulation.

We also now have consistency across the district in juvenile prosecution with one attorney handling all the cases in Kennebec and Somerset Counties. Her focus is on rehabilitation with the implementation of Restorative Justice. We are thankful to our community partners providing such programs as Rebound to Success (Alfond Youth Center) and Diversion to Assets (Boys & Girls Club). Our goal is to work with the juveniles so they never return to the adult criminal justice system.

The Veterans' Court graduates continue to all be crime-free and volunteer veteran mentors are a big part of the reason. The Co-Occurring Disorders Court addresses mental health and addiction and has not had a graduate commit a new crime since 2014. Our newest alternative substance abuse program in Skowhegan continues to grow with all successful graduates. And our CARA (Criminogenic Addiction and Recovery Academy) participants recorded a music CD and continue to be super hero volunteers in our community. Not everyone who enters one of these programs graduates—it's hard work to turn your life around. But those who graduate never return to the criminal justice system. Every graduate saves the community tens of thousands of dollars by avoiding incarceration, but the benefits to their families and dependents are priceless.

Mailboxes

In the 2015 Town Report, the Sidney Highway Department included information for the correct installation and maintenance of mailboxes along roadways. We have included the Town of Sidney's Mailbox Policy for Sidney Roads in this Annual Report. Please find the mailbox information following this notice.

Snow in Roadways

The Sidney Highway Department would like all property owners to be aware of the safety and legal issues of putting snow in roadways and covering culverts. Due to many issues we have encountered this winter already, we are sharing the following information released by the Maine Department of Transportation and Marc Guimont (MDOT's Director of Maintenance and Operations), December 1997:

"PUTTING SNOW IN ROADWAY IS ILLEGAL AND UNSAFE"

"As you are clearing your driveway after the next snowstorm, the Maine Department of Transportation wants you to remember that it's unsafe and illegal to dump the snow into the road for the State or local snowplow to move for you."

Despite State statute found in 29A MRSA § 2396, "State and municipal snowplows routinely encounter situations where someone has plowed, snow blown, or even shoveled snow from a driveway into the road instead of disposing of it safely and properly."

"The law making those actions illegal was passed to protect the driving public. Drivers encountering snow plowed from a driveway onto an otherwise clear or lightly-covered roadway stand a good chance of losing control of their vehicles when they hit the accumulated snow. Snow pushed, blown or thrown from a driveway could lead to an accident that puts someone in the hospital, or worse."

State and municipal departments have the option of asking for State and local police assistance if they are constantly dealing with snow deposited into the roadway and over culverts. However, we would rather remind people about the serious problem that this causes before an accident occurs. Therefore, as you clean snow from your driveway, please be sure to remove any snow pushed into the roadway and please do not plow over the end of culverts. Thank you for your cooperation.

SIDNEY, MAINE

Town of Sidney Mailbox Policy for Sidney Roads Adopted by the Board of Selectmen February 23, 2015

For convenience and practicality, mailbox installations have been allowed within the right-of-way of Sidney's roads; however it is important to recognize that such installations have two very important conditions:

- The mailbox must be installed in accordance with applicable standards to ensure that mail can be delivered and that the mailbox does not create an obstacle or safety hazard to those that use or maintain the highway, and
- The mailbox is installed entirely at the owner's risk. In other words, if the mailbox incurs damage during any sort of highway operations or maintenance, the property owner is not entitled to replacement or compensation. In fact, if the mailbox was not installed in accordance with the applicable standards as stated above, the owner may even be held liable for injuries or damages that may have been incurred as a result.

Mailbox Design

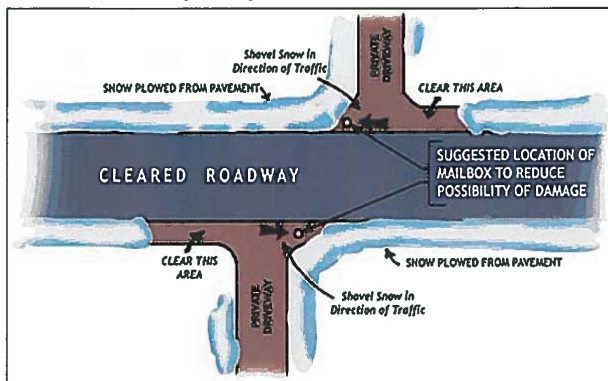
Mailbox design and installation standards are available from several sources, and mailbox owners are expected to consult this information prior to undertaking any mailbox installation or replacement. The following standards have nationwide relevance and were developed in cooperation with one another:

- The United States Postal Service (USPS) Mailbox Guidelines. The USPS defines the standards for mailbox construction, as well as the placement tolerance that must be met to accommodate postal operations. - American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) Roadside Design Guide. The AASHTO Roadside Design Guide, Chapter 11: *Erecting Mailboxes on Streets and Highways* deals with the safety and construction of privately owned mailboxes, mailbox supports, and mailbox turnout designs and is less focused on postal operations. 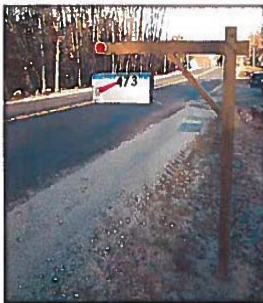
The Town of Sidney has developed this policy to promote compliance with these national standards and to help further clarify the expectations and responsibilities of Sidney mailbox owners to improve the safety of our roads and highways. The following pages further specify the details associated with the mailbox height, location, offset, and post type to minimize the potential hazards associated with mailbox installations and to reduce the opportunities for damage to mailboxes.

Mailbox Installation Standards

- General Location:** Whenever possible, mailboxes should be located after the driveway opening. This location placement improves visibility, minimizes the amount of snow that comes off of the snow plow, and improves the approach for the mail carrier. The diagram below further clarifies this preferred placement:



- Mailbox Support Design:** It is best to use an extended arm type of post with a free-swinging suspended mailbox. This allows snowplows to sweep near or under boxes without damage to supports and provides easy access to the boxes by carrier and customers. The following picture shows a free-swinging suspended mailbox:



- Offset:** Mailboxes should be set back from the edge of the shoulder – regardless of whether the shoulder is gravel or paved. In other words, the face of the mailbox should be at least **one foot (1')** back from the edge of the normally plowed surface of the highway or the face of curb. Greater offset distances are encouraged whenever possible to allow the mail carrier to get further out of traffic and to further minimize potential damage to the mailbox. The following picture shows a mailbox with a reasonable offset:



- Height:** According to USPS standards, a mailbox must be installed with the bottom of the mailbox located between 41" and 45" high above the surface of the highway shoulder. The Sidney Public Works Director recommends that this height be closer to the 45" measurement to minimize conflict with the height of the plow truck wing when snow is being pushed back during, or between, winter storms. The following picture further clarifies the height considerations:



- **Post Size, Type and Embedment:** Mailbox posts must be sturdy enough to hold up the mailbox in all types of weather conditions, however they cannot be so rugged that they present a hazard to vehicles that inadvertently leave the road. If a mailbox support is struck by a vehicle, it must easily break away. Therefore, the following types of posts are deemed acceptable:
 - **4" x 4" wooden posts** embedded 2 feet into the ground. Larger wooden posts may be used only if the post is drilled through with an appropriate spade bit to create a shear plane that is no higher than 6" above the surface of the surrounding ground. The number and size of the drilled holes depends upon what is necessary to bring the cross-section of the larger post down to the equivalent cross-sectional area of a standard 4" x 4" post. (MaineDOT Standard Specification 606.06)
 - **1" to 2" round diameter steel or aluminum pipe or standard U-channel post** embedded 2 feet into the ground.
 - Unacceptable mailbox supports include: anything that is filled with concrete, masonry and stone structures, heavy steel structures, and most objects that were intended for other uses (e.g. antique plows, I-beams, and various other household tools and objects).

NOTICE: Mailboxes, attachments or support systems not consistent with this policy are considered "Deadly Fixed Objects" (also known as "DFOs") and are in violation of 23 MRSA §1401-A. As such, when these installations are recognized by the Sidney Road Commissioners, the owner will be informed of the hazard and immediate removal will be requested. If the property owner does not comply with this request, the Sidney Road Commissioners may elect to have the installation removed and seek reimbursement from the property owner for all costs incurred.

This "Mailbox Policy for Sidney Roads" is hereby adopted by the Sidney Board of Selectmen to be effective immediately upon signing and will remain in effect until revoked or amended.

At the end of this presentation, there was a great round of applause and many school districts from across the state stayed afterwards asking and wondering how we have incorporated these things into our schools. To me the answer this is easy and it is that our staff is focused on Every Student in Every School, Each and Every Day. It is hard work but it pays handsome dividends!

Our work on this front is not done. Our District goals for this school year are to continue raising the bar on student achievement, growing and developing our staff, and further developing the strong culture that exists in our schools. While it seems simple, focusing on these core fundamentals is what truly successful companies and organizations do. Stay tuned for more good news from RSU 18. We are achieving these academic successes while still being fiscally responsible to the five communities of RSU18. The current school year's budget is \$34.6 million, only \$800,000 more than the 2009-10 budget of \$33.8 million. The represents an increase of 2.4% over the last eight years or 0.3% per year, well below the inflation rate of 1.3% covering the same time period.

Your Board of Directors is a dedicated and talented group and their collective efforts directly benefit the towns of Belgrade, China, Oakland, Rome, and Sidney. They do a wonderful job, and if you are out and about and happen to see them, please thank them for their continued service on your behalf.

The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2016. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections' Services, Civil Process, Court Security and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including Drug Investigations, K-9, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and the Special Response Team.

In 2016 nineteen Deputy Sheriffs serving in the Law Enforcement Division both in full-time and part-time capacity responded to over 16,000 calls for service. As a result deputies made 920 arrests, issued 665 traffic summonses, and responded to 537 motor vehicle accidents. Deputy Sheriffs also responded to 616 alarms, 174 domestic disturbances, and assisted other agencies 771 times. Deputies and Detectives made 81 drug seizures, of which most were opiate related.

Our Civil Process deputies serve documents from a number of legal agencies, state agencies, lawyers' offices and other entities. In 2016, the four deputies served 7,076 documents or legal papers to the citizens of Kennebec County.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 3,212 inmates, 226 less than last year. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Burglaries to Homicides. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. With the help from many members of the Kennebec County delegation, we were able to secure funding for the CARA (Criminogenic Addiction Recovery Academy) Program within the State biannual budget. CARA was delayed for several months because of the long delay in financing. We were still able to complete three CARA program courses helping 29 inmates with the treatment and recovery process.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are considered to be a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. For every two days worked, one day is reduced from their sentence, resulting in a \$451,077 bed day savings to the citizens of Kennebec County. Throughout 2016, inmates worked 10,069 community service hours, valued at approximately \$75,523. Our inmates raised 25,020 pounds of produce and gleaned 10,075 pounds of produce for the inmate kitchen, area food pantries, churches, homeless shelters, schools and elder programs in 2016.

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Sidney, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Sidney Town Office, Friday the 17th of March A.D., 2017 at 12:15 P.M., Eastern Standard Time to vote on Articles One and Two. Then the meeting will recess until 9:00 A.M., Eastern Standard Time, Saturday, the 18th of March A.D., 2017, at which time it will proceed to vote on the remaining articles at the James H. Bean School, to wit:

ARTICLE 1: To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2: To choose by ballot the following:

Officers for the ensuing year in accordance with M.R.S.A. 30, Sec. 2061, thereto wit:
one Selectman, Assessor, Overseer of the Poor to serve for a three year term;
one Selectman, Assessor, Overseer of the Poor to serve for a two year term; and
one RSU#18 School Director to serve for a three year term.

Municipal Referendum Question in accordance with M.R.S.A. 28-A, Chapter 5 § 123.1, hereto wit:

¶ Shall this municipality authorize the State to issue licenses for the sale of liquor to be consumed on the premises of licensed establishments on days other than Sunday?¶

The polls or ballot box for receiving ballots for the above mentioned Officers and Municipal Referendum Question will be open at 12:30 P.M., Eastern Standard Time and will close at 8:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to set September 1, 2017 as the due date for payment of 2017 taxes with interest on unpaid balances beginning October 1st, 2017 at 7%. (2016 due date was September 1st, 2016 with 7% interest charged October 1st, 2016)

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to fix an amount of interest to be paid by the Town on abated taxes that have been paid for the fiscal year 2017-2018. (Current rate fixed by the Town is 3%)

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept pre-payment of taxes for 2017, not yet assessed and to pay interest at a rate of ____% (not to exceed 8%) on such pre-payment made prior to commitment of those taxes. (Interest was voted at 0% in 2016)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend overlay money to pay tax abatements and applicable interest granted during this fiscal year.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend an amount not to exceed 1/6 of the budgeted amount in each category of the 2017 annual budget during the period from February 1, 2018 to the year 2018 annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer monies received from excise tax to the surplus account at the close of the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell any real estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes, and to execute the quit claim deeds for such properties.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will elect two members to serve for three year terms, and two alternates to serve for one year terms on the Budget Committee. 



Mooring Regulations Ordinance
Town of Sidney, Maine

Section 1. Title

This ordinance shall be known as the □Town of Sidney Mooring Regulations Ordinance.□

Section 2. Authority and Scope

2.1 This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the enabling provisions of Article VIII, Part 2, Section 1 of the Maine Constitution, Title 38 M.R.S.A. Sections 1-13, Title 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 3001, and Title 12 M.R.S.A. Section 13072.

2.2 The Town of Sidney hereby establishes that this Ordinance shall apply to activities occurring within or directly affecting harbors and channels within the boundaries and legal limits of the Town of Sidney.

Section 3. Purpose

3.1 The purpose of this Ordinance is to establish regulations to protect property and promote public safety and orderly use of the Town of Sidney's waterways, harbors and channels, to promote availability and the equitable and fair use of this valuable public resource, and to create a fair and efficient framework for the administration of that resource.

3.2 This Ordinance allows the installation of moorings for the purpose of securing a sailboat that takes a significant amount of time to prepare for use (traditionally sailboats 18 to 25 feet in length) in the Designated Mooring Anchorage area defined in this Ordinance.

Section 4. Designated Mooring Anchorage and Safe Harbor

4.1 The area on Messalonskee Lake in the Town of Sidney known as Safe Harbor is a designated mooring anchorage, and users will adhere to the rules listed in this Ordinance. The approximate location of the Safe Harbor designated mooring anchorage is as follows:

- a. Located at the Sidney Town landing starting 50 feet south of the dock.
- b. A line parallel to the dock out 200 feet (Safe Water Zone), this 200 foot from shore mooring zone will continue to the end of the peninsula and around the end of the peninsula (but not to a point where the distance becomes closer to the dock). **See Figure 1 for depiction of area described herein.*

4.2 The Safe Harbor will allow use of the town dock on both sides without any moored boat to impede its use and also keep open the area in front of the beach for kayaks and other unpowered watercraft.

4.3 The area defined herein will comfortably support six (6) sailboat moorings. If there are more than five (5) boats, excluding the Sidney Fire Department Boat, then the Town may place additional moorings after determining safe distance and grid coordinates for mooring placement.

4.4 A mooring shall be permitted in the Safe Harbor Area defined herein closest to the town dock for the Sidney Fire Department to secure its motor boat used to provide emergency response to lake users and waterfront property owners.

Section 5. Mooring Standards

Moorings must conform to all specifications and registrations required by this Ordinance as well as all applicable Federal and State regulations and laws.

- a. Anchor Standards: All moorings shall be mushroom anchors.
- b. Line Standards: The line between the mooring and the buoy shall be chain of a size to fit boat exposure and water depth. The buoy, as set by the Maine Department of Conservation, shall be colored white with a single BLUE horizontal band clearly visible above the water line.
- c. Mooring Removal: The complete mooring must be removed prior to the lake freezing and not installed until after the ice is out.
- d. Mooring Labels: All mooring buoys shall be clearly labeled with the boat owner(s) last name and phone number.
- e. Minimum Tackle Standards: Mooring gear and tackle used in the Town shall meet or exceed those specified in the current edition of *Chapman's Piloting & Seamanship*. The Town assumes no liability whatsoever for the actual performance or adequacy of any mooring system employed by a mooring holder whether or not such system conforms to these minimum standards. The mooring owner is responsible for the adequacy and performance of all mooring gear, tackle and maintenance thereof.
- f. Mooring Inspection: At least once every two years, each mooring shall be either self-inspected by the mooring owner or inspected through a mooring service company chosen by the mooring owner, and in either case, must be in a safe condition before being placed in any Town anchorage. Mooring owners are responsible for any and all expenses associated with the mooring systems placed within the designated mooring area as described herein.

Section 6. Penalties

- 6.1 Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a minimum civil penalty in the amount of \$100.00 and a maximum civil penalty in the amount of \$250.00 per day.
- 6.2 The violator may be ordered to correct or abate the violation unless a court finds that such action will create a threat or hazard to the public health or safety, substantial environmental damage, or substantial injustice.
- 6.3 Each day that such a violation continues to exist shall be considered a separate violation.

Section 7. Enforcement

- 7.1 This Ordinance may be enforced by the Code Enforcement Officer or by any other municipal official specifically designated by ordinance or other law or by the municipal officers, with such authority.
- 7.2 Pursuant to 30-A M.R.S.A. §3009-A, the Board of Selectmen may contract with the Kennebec County Sheriff's Department for the enforcement of this Ordinance.
- 7.3 Upon determining that a violation has occurred, the enforcing officer shall notify the violator of the violation, may order the immediate removal of the vessel, and impose an appropriate civil penalty.
- 7.4 If the vessel or equipment is not removed in accordance with the notice issued by the enforcing officer, the enforcing officer may cause the vessel or equipment in violation of this Ordinance to be moved and placed in a suitable area, at the expense of the owner of such water vessel or equipment, and without the Town being liable for any damage that may be caused by such removal. The enforcing officer shall notify the owner of the removal and shall inform the owner of the location of the water vessel or equipment and the fees due for release. The water vessel or equipment may not be released to the owner until the towing and storage fees are paid to the Town.
- 7.5 Water vessels or equipment that are not claimed within thirty days from the date of the enforcing officer's notice shall be disposed of by the Town pursuant to the laws governing abandoned property.

Section 8. Conflict

Whenever a provision of this Ordinance conflicts with or is inconsistent with any other ordinance, regulation, or statute the more restrictive provision shall apply.

Section 9. Severability

The invalidity of any part of this Ordinance shall not invalidate any other part.

Section 10. Liability

Any person using the facilities within the limits of a harbor or channel in the Town of Sidney shall assume all risk of damage or loss to their property and the Town of Sidney assumes no risk on account of fire, theft, Act of God, or damages of any kind to vessels within the harbor or channel.

Section 11. Effective Date

The Ordinance shall take effect on March 18, 2017, upon voter approval.

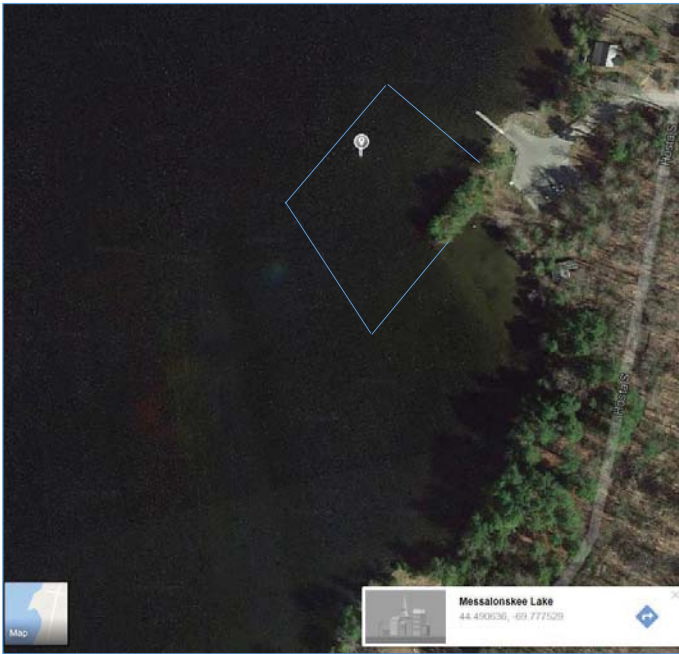

**Ordinance Prohibiting Retail Marijuana
Establishments and Retail Marijuana Social Clubs in
the Town of Sidney, Maine**

Section 1. Authority.

This ordinance is enacted pursuant to the Marijuana Legalization Act, 7 M.R.S.A. c. 417; and Municipal Home Rule Authority, Me. Const., art. VIII, pt. 2; and 30-A M.R.S.A. § 3001.

Section 2. Definitions.

For purposes of this ordinance, retail marijuana establishments, including retail marijuana stores, retail marijuana cultivation facilities, retail marijuana products manufacturing facilities and retail marijuana testing facilities, and retail marijuana social clubs are defined as set forth in 7 M.R.S.A. § 2442.

Section 3. Prohibition on Retail Marijuana Establishments and Retail Marijuana Social Clubs.

Retail marijuana establishments, including retail marijuana stores, retail marijuana cultivation facilities, retail marijuana products manufacturing facilities, and retail marijuana testing facilities, and retail marijuana social clubs, are expressly prohibited in this municipality.

No person or organization shall develop or operate a business that engages in retail or wholesale sales of a retail marijuana product, as defined by 7 M.R.S.A. § 2442.

Nothing in this ordinance is intended to prohibit any lawful use, possession or conduct pursuant to the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act, 22 M.R.S.A. c. 558-C.

Addendum B

Section 4. Effective date; duration.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon enactment by the municipal legislative body unless otherwise provided and shall remain in effect until it is amended or repealed.

Section 5. Penalties.

This ordinance shall be enforced by the municipal officers or their designee. Violations of this ordinance shall be subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 4452.

Effective date of this Ordinance March 18, 2017.

Definitions of Terms

The following are definitions of terms are used in this manual:

1. **Abatement:** A reduction of assessed property taxes, if it is deemed that an error was made in the original assessment of the said property.
2. **Accrual:** This is money that was appropriated at Town Meeting for a specific expense or project that is not completed before the end of the year. Money left over is carried forward to finish the project in the next fiscal year.
3. **Block Grant:** Is funds received from the State to compensate towns for winter plowing of State roads.
4. **Borrow:** A loan to fund large ticket capital improvement items such as vehicles, new buildings or improvements to existing buildings, etc.
5. **Contingency Fund:** Money that can be used only for unbudgeted emergency use.
6. **Escrow / Reserve:** Money that was approved to be set aside for future use for a specific item or purpose. Voters must approve the use of escrow money.
7. **Overlay:** Monies that are appropriated at commitment time to cover errors in property assessments through an abatement process. Overlay amounts are determined by a formula set up by the State.
8. **Raise:** Funds that are appropriated through the mil rate, to fund expenses such as education, County, overlay, the Kennebec Regional Development Authority and items voted on at the Town Meeting that are not appropriated through the surplus.
9. **Receipts:** Income received, such as interest or donations that can be utilized to cover a shortage in a specific account. If not used, it will be placed into the reserve account for that department or will be rolled over into surplus.
10. **Surplus / General Fund:** Money left over at the end of the Fiscal Year. It consists of collected excise tax, fees, undesignated receipts, and unexpended money. Surplus reduces the amount money to be raised to cover the approved budget. Rather than using projected receipts like the State of Maine and other municipalities, we use only collected receipts to help keep our budget in check.

Gifts & Grants as allowed by 2016 Town Meeting Article 38

ARTICLE 38: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend or utilize on behalf of the Town any grants or funds awarded to the Town by any State or federal agency, any grant or other monetary donation from any other public or private entity, organization or individual, and any gift of personal property. This includes the authority to apply for such grants, funds or donations where an application is required, or take any other action thereon.
