## **Cover Information**

The Town Seal of Somerville was created by Somerville resident Claudia Fujinaga and accepted by the Somerville Board of Selectmen in August 2012. The Seal was presented to the Town at the dedication of the town office in October 2012.

The Seal represents the importance of nature in Somerville's history, depicting a moose at water's edge with a mountain covered with pines in the background. Wildlife is plentiful in Somerville, which has three ponds and the Sheepscot River traveling southeast to the coast. Pine woods abound in the area, supporting logging as a primary occupation in Somerville.

## DEDICATION

This year's Town Report is dedicated to the many individuals who are currently contributing and who have in the past contributed their time and talent to make the lives of ALL the residents in Somerville better. Those persons all help our Town to be the best place in Maine to live. Without the efforts of those volunteers many of the things we all take for granted would not be.

2013 saw the passing of two of the Town's most active volunteer residents – Cecil Brann and Orrin "Buddy" Crummett. 2013 also saw the addition of several members to the Volunteer Fire Department and to the Appeals and Planning Boards, and the continued involvement of many residents. All of our board and committee members, appointed and elected officials, as well as the paid staff, have spent a very busy year on a large variety of tasks and projects, all working toward a common goal of helping Somerville.

Traditionally, much of the work of running the town fell to those who had the time, talent, and inclination to volunteer their services. Those persons who owned the right equipment used that equipment to provide a service for the town. Much of the time, those services were provided at no cost to the town. Over the years, as the population changed – either by the passing of those residents, the growth of the next generations, new families moving in, and certainly, as the demands of life increased – full-time jobs, second jobs, etc. - the availability of those volunteers has lessened.

In the current "world", Somerville's population has indeed changed – the average age of our residents is over 60 according to the last census, a number of households are not "year-round" residents, younger persons must commute to work, and the activities of children take ever more time of the parents. So, it has become more difficult to not only meet the demands of everyday life, but is even more difficult to add volunteer hours to the community to the "to do list".

What we have found over the past three years is that there are still a number of residents of Somerville who willingly and gladly volunteer their tremendous talents and limited time to working on those projects that are easily put on the back burner. Those projects that will be more important to the residents of the future than they may be to us who are the current residents – comprehensive planning, tax mapping, road construction planning, updating ordinances – projects that will help Somerville continue to be a vibrant, alive community while keeping its rural, small town character.

We want to thank all those people who volunteer to serve our town in elected or appointed positions, and on boards and committees – without your service our Town would not be such a special place to live!

To the Residents of Somerville,

This past year-plus has been quite a busy one! We successfully negotiated the 18-month budget and tax collection cycle that was voted on at the town meeting in March 2013. So, we are now back to a 12-month budget and tax cycle. You'll be seeing a tax bill in September as always, and will see that you are able to pay the bill in two payments – the first due in November and the second due in May.

Unfortunately, we saw Martha Staples leave our town government, though she is still active in the Fire Department as their Safety Officer. We are missing her; she brought a lot of local knowledge and upbeat manner to the Board and to the Town Office. Our appreciation goes to Lynne Tallberg who stepped in to serve as Town Clerk for the remainder of Martha's term.

This past winter was a challenging one for many – the Road Commissioner and his crew and the Fire Department spent a lot of hours cleaning up fallen limbs and trees, and clearing roads. We had a greater number of General Assistance requests as well, as the need for heating oil and wood was greater than in years past.

There has been a significant amount of work done by the Comprehensive Plan Committee and the Planning Board. We owe a great thanks to the persons who serve on those committees since they are working on the much-needed updates to our ordinances and other documents.

As those of you who have been to the Town Office may have noticed, we paved the parking area and eliminated the muddy mess we had last year! The Town Office also has a new metal roof that has taken care of the roof leaks and will carry us through for another 25 years or so. Our Town Office has been used quite a bit this past year for the Town committees; as well as the Tri-County Waste Management group, the Sand Hill Cemetery Association, and the Somerville Day Committee's Halloween Party for the community.

Our new Assessor's Agent has been working diligently to bring our property tax records up to date and ensure everyone's property acreages are recorded properly, ultimately to ensure every property owner is assessed equitably and fairly. This process is quite lengthy and time-consuming, but one that is long overdue.

The Board has been very involved with all aspects of the town management, attending training, community meetings, and legislative sessions. With the help of officials from other towns and cities, from the State and County, we have been able to expand our knowledge of town operations and bring many of our town processes up to date.

As we've said before – please come to our Selectmen's Meetings – the second Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. We welcome your involvement and input.

## **Somerville Emergency Management Agency**

The ice storm of December 2013 brought trees down all along our roads and Somerville lost power for about 96 hours. Through the tremendous efforts of members of the Somerville Volunteer Fire Department and the Road Commissioner and his crew, our roads were quickly cleared of fallen trees and broken limbs. The cost of our recovery efforts were reported to Lincoln County Emergency Management Agency, which in turn reported to the State. While the damage inland was significant, the costs did not meet the federal threshold level for a Federal disaster declaration.

To meet State requirements, a tabletop exercise is being planned for July. Newly elected and appointed town officials will become familiar with their roles and responsibilities during a disaster. The exercise will be conducted at the Town Office. Anyone who is interested in participating will be welcome. More information will be available soon.

If you need assistance during a storm or other emergency event, please call 911 which will dispatch the appropriate response team to you. If you have damage to your property or buildings during a declared disaster, we can assist you in completing the forms needed to receive FEMA assistance.

## **General Assistance Officer's Report**

To the Residents and Officials of the Town of Somerville:

During the period of January 2013 through May 2014, we had 10 requests for general assistance. Of these, 3 were found to be "in-need" by State definition, 3 requests were voluntarily withdrawn, and 4 were found to be ineligible by the State General Assistance Office.

Somerville General Assistance funds are limited and a safety net when Somerville residents truly need help. Stringent State laws must be followed when considering applications and distributing GA funds. An application attesting to financial status, along with supporting documentation is required. A complete application must be submitted to the General Assistance Officer for consideration. The application form and instructions are available at the Town Office during office hours, or may be obtained from the General Assistance Officer during non-business hours.

We have information available about the agencies that provide assistance with heating, home repair, and other services. Please call if you need assistance.

## **Tax Mapping Report**

In the summer of 2013, Bill Duffy of Northern Geomantics delivered to the Town of Somerville a set of tax maps based on approximately 150 registered maps and survey plans, 600 deeds, and other descriptions provided by the Town and property owners. Along with the maps, Bill created a geographic information system (GIS) database which contains calculated acreages for roughly 90 percent of the parcels in town. The database also rates each lot as to completeness and validity.

In addition to the tax maps, Bill provided a map that shows by color code the accuracy of the property boundaries. In some cases, the discrepancies are due to conflicting or non-existent deeds and surveys. A second map shows the agreement of the calculated GIS acreage and the current TRIO tax database. As the information is further updated, and as the Assessor's Agent is able to visit those properties in question, the tax maps will continue to be updated and improved.

With these two maps, we have identified many issues that need to be resolved relating to property boundaries and acreages. However, this first pass at creating tax maps for the entire town resulted in good to fair parcel boundaries for 80 percent of the parcels in Somerville. To help in resolve the boundaries of the remaining 20 percent, we again ask that you bring in your surveys and/or deeds and compare them to the tax maps.

## **Tri-County Solid Waste Management Organization**

A lot is happening with TCWMO and waste management nationwide. New technologies will make waste management more cost effective however, we must all do more recycling. The facility located in Union has bins for recycling that are labeled for items to be recycled.

Claudia Fujinaga and I are Somerville's representatives on the Board and will try to answer any questions you may have. Also, personnel at the TCWMO waste site can help you with onsite questions.

Cost of operation is paid for by the special waste bags, available at the town office or at the waste site; sale of some recycle materials; and by the member towns of TCWMO. The largest cost is payments to PERC, an operation that burns the green bag contents, and the handling of those waste bags. The PERC operation sells power generated to electric companies. Their contract will end in 2017 and it is anticipated that costs will increase.

Somerville's contract with TCWMO will end soon, and we must have discussions on whether to continue with TCWMO or seek other options. All are invited to attend any meetings we have with TCWMO to ask questions or to be better informed.

The next meeting will be on August 21, 2014 in Union.

## Dear Residents,

It has been an honor for me to manage the TCSWMO Transfer and Recycling facility for the past 22 years. During this time, with the continued guidance of a dedicated Board of Directors, TCSW has established itself as both forward thinking and fiscally prudent. Our recycling rate, for the most part, has remained over 40% since we opened in '92. We have more often than not been among the first to recycle difficult items such as computers, televisions, fluorescent lamps, poly-coated papers, & 1 and 3-7 plastics. This has all been accomplished while managing a budget over all these years with no shocking peaks and valleys in assessment to the tax base.

As I mentioned last year, changes will occur over the next 4 years. The disposal site for our household trash, the PERC Incinerator in Orrington, will likely not be a viable option once its electricity sales contract with Bangor Hydro comes to an end in 2018. The Municipal Review Committee, which oversees our investment in the PERC plant is actively pursuing disposal options and is confident it will have a long term alternative in place by the time it is needed. Another change will likely be how we recycle as increased capacity for single stream recycling becomes available in the State by the end of 2015. While we believe it is best practice to sort recyclables at each individual facility and ship product over the road, single stream's ease, public sentiment and loss of volume from our current program with Lincoln County Recycling will likely mean the end of our current strategy sometime over the next two to four years.

While there is little we can implement now in preparation for the up-coming changes, when the time arrives, we will need to move deliberately and efficiently. To that end, a manager will need to be present and focused on the future needs of the facility and our community. Since I've been managing two facilities for the past six years, this seems to be a most appropriate time to pass the management of TCSW over to a new manager whose singular focus will be on this community. The next couple of years will provide a new manager time and information to come up with the best plan for our community. In the meantime, I will be better able to focus on the Rockport facility and my new position on the Board of the Municipal Review Committee which is charged with identifying and implementing the next solution for our household trash past 2018.

I've enjoyed working at TCSW; with the community as well as our stellar crew. Hank, David, Russ and Jeff have done a great job over the past years and I expect that will only continue. I cannot help but mention Tim Fogg who worked here many years providing consistency, kindness and explosive laughter for anyone interested.

You've been able to count on these great characters over the past decades and should continue to into the future. Along with all the color and knowledge they provide this facility they will still provide high degree of consistency, including the materials recycled, Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day on the third Saturday of June, the full bird feeders around the facility and our mint green garbage bags. I have a few things to wrap up administratively and should be finished by the end of this year. ## Superintendent's Message

Dear Citizens of Somerville,

The 2013-2014 school year has been a busy one for RSU 12 Schools. Throughout the district, the staff has been honing their skills and developing school-wide strategies in order to help all students succeed and to continue to increase student achievement. RSU 12's weekly one-hour early release for RSU 12 students approved by the RSU 12 school board has allowed for valuable professional learning time for all staff throughout the district. We are already seeing the benefits of this consistent weekly hour.

RSU 12 students have shown steady growth in student reading and math achievement since the formation of RSU 12. State testing from fall 2013 showed that students, on average, district-wide, exceeded the state average. These improvements are noteworthy in tough financial times. This is an exciting achievement for the RSU 12 community and a testament to the updated curriculum materials, new programs, intensive training, and the talented, dedicated staff in RSU 12. The RSU 12 communities should be proud of these achievements.

Facilities improvements continue in RSU 12 despite an extremely tight budget. A five-year capital improvement plan is currently in development by the RSU 12 Facilities Committee. The Facilities Committee is exploring "performance contracting" in order to fund the five year plan and upgrade the facilities through savings from energy upgrades. This is a zero-based budgeting technique that many school districts are using in order to improve facilities while being sensitive to the taxpayer.

Goals this year for RSU 12 include improving the curriculum in order to align with the newly updated Maine Learning Results standards, refining the student intervention system, and updating the facilities.

The recent withdrawal of the town of Wiscasset from RSU 12 will mean many changes in the future of RSU 12. The most significant change appears to be the reduced cost to run the district. RSU 12 will run much more efficiently without having to fund the three schools in Wiscasset. Cost per student will decrease now and into the future.

Somerville Elementary School will continue to house the RSU 12 Central Office next year. Somerville Elementary School will also be the new home of an expanded Head Start Pre-K program in RSU 12. This new program will serve Somerville, Whitefield, and Palermo students. There will be a limit of fifteen students for next year in the new program, but we hope to expand this program in the future.

The 2014-2015 RSU 12 school budget was adopted at the District Budget Meeting on May 20<sup>th</sup>. This budget was developed in consideration of a state subsidy that is \$467,000 lower than expected. We have worked hard to develop a FY15 budget that maximizes programming while remaining fiscally conservative. It is our responsibility to the RSU 12 community to be transparent in our operations and in our vision for the future of RSU 12 Schools. You can learn more about our schools through our website, www.svrsu.org, by speaking with our staff, and School Committee, or by attending School Committee meetings.

After serving as Superintendent of RSU 12 for less than a year, I have been very impressed with the education provided to the students of RSU 12. We will continue to improve upon the many, many strengths of our RSU 12 schools. I look forward to working with the Somerville community to make this happen.

To The Residents of Somerville, Maine:

The thoughtful and careful leveraging of our resources and support for Erskine Academy made us a high performing school in 2012-13. The combined influence and efforts of our teachers, students, parents, and alumni has established for our school the sixth highest graduation rate (nearly 98% of our students graduate in four years) and one of the lowest dropout rates in the state. This achievement, along with our students' three-year average scores on state mathematics and reading tests, has earned our school the letter grade "B" in the first year of Maine's school performance grading system program, a grade not typical of most schools in our region.

A private school serving a public purpose, with 571 students in grades nine through twelve, Erskine is the second largest town academy in Maine and the only one to serve a completely voluntary student body exclusively on a school choice basis. As has been the case historically, 97% of our students come primarily from eight sending towns; a small number, which now includes 13 international students, attend on a private basis. Therefore, our students come from primarily humble, hard-working backgrounds and circumstances to experience a school program that blends traditional values with contemporary programs and modern methods to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in the region.

The activities pursued by of our students and staff this past year are testimony to the vibrancy of the school community:

- Thirteen courses taught here for college credit by a first-class teaching corps has resulted in nearly two-thirds of seniors earning credits for a considerable savings in college tuition
- The addition of the "Jobs for Maine Graduates" program teaches essential work seeking, training, and employment skills.
- Eighty-seven percent of the Class of 2013 is accepted into some form of higher education, many to the most selective colleges in the nation.
- A competitive robotics class and club were added and funded primarily by grants and financial gifts from our friends and alumni.
- For a third time, we brought nearly 250 area sixth graders to our school for a program of early exposure to high school designed to build their confidence for doing high school work.
- Our students have done a great deal of good, contributing literally thousands of hours of community service and raising a similar amount in dollars to aid those in need from nearby and afar, as far as Costa Rica, in fact.
- A 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Walk to Cure Breast Cancer Walk, with nearly 100% of our student body participating, raised in excess of \$3000 for the Maine General Breast Care Center.

This year, as we do every ten years, we engaged a new cycle of accreditation through the "New England Association of Secondary Schools," not only to earn quality assurance from this nationally respected organization, but to further improve our school and the student experience. Our process began with an intensive study of all major programs and operations and a reaffirmation of the school's long-held traditional values. Placing equal value on *scholarship*,

*leadership, stewardship and relationships*, we have articulated a vision of academic success for all students; created a climate that is safe, supportive, and hospitable to education; and cultivated responsible leadership and civic-mindedness in our young people.

We enthusiastically welcome and educate a substantial number of Somerville's high schoolers. The Somerville families who have entrusted us to educate and care for their children these many years, energizes, encourages, and strengthens our resolves to provide the highest quality educational program possible and the conditions to inspire our students to their highest potential in school, at work, and within their communities. We are grateful for your confidence in and support for Erskine Academy.

## The Sheepscot Valley Conservation Association

The Sheepscot Valley Conservation Association is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is: "To conserve the natural and historic heritage of the Sheepscot Watershed through land protection, habitat restoration, advocacy, education, and support for compatible land uses." With its headquarters in Newcastle, the organization crossed a major threshold in 2012 when it achieved accreditation from the Land Trust Accreditation Commission, an independent program of the nationwide Land Trust Alliance. This distinction is the result of a three-year effort by the board and staff to review and update the operations of the Association and demonstrate that SVCA complies with national standards for land trusts. SVCA is one of only 241 U.S. land trusts, and nine in Maine, to be awarded accreditation since the fall of 2008.

Another major event of note in 2012 was Executive Director Maureen Hoffman's announcement that she would retire at the end of the year. Maureen took up the position in January 2002, and much of SVCA's expansion, both in protected properties and role in the community, has occurred during her tenure. She was replaced by Steve Patton, who worked for The Nature Conservancy for nearly 23 years. The President of SVCA's board of directors, Honor Fox Sage, also stepped down in 2012 and was replaced by John Atwood, a retired Maine Superior Court judge who, before being appointed to that position, held a number of high-level positions in Maine state government.

SVCA was founded in 1969 to both conserve land and advocate for the environment. This was, and remains, an unusual combination of programs for a land trust in Maine. SVCA has done so successfully, demonstrating its ability to identify conservation goals and carry them out while simultaneously being a voice for conservation in local issues.

That said, land conservation is SVCA's primary mission. The Association has worked with many conservation-minded landowners to protect 15 miles of riverfront and 3,708 acres of working farms, forests and important habitat in over 55 conservation properties, including seven preserves open to the public for low-impact recreation including hunting and fishing. In 2012, SVCA welcomed the donation of a conservation easement on 66 acres in Alna and in 2013 it received a gift of a 38-acre conservation easement on Deer Meadow Brook in Newcastle.

Most recently, the SVCA has been a leader of the new 12 Rivers Conservation Initiative, a group of 10 local land trusts seeking to accelerate conservation of the forested landscape from the Kennebec to the St. George to achieve a network of conserved lands that protects the Midcoast's ecosystems and ensures multiple human benefits for generations to come.

SVCA maintains seven of its properties as preserves open to the public:

- Palermo Preserve, with one mile of interpretive trail, on the upper stretch of the Sheepscot;
- Whitefield Salmon Preserve, along the confluence of the west branch and the main stem of the Sheepscot, with nearly two miles of trails:
- Stetser Preserve, in Jefferson, with 150 wooded acres and a 1.5-mile loop trail;

- Trout Brook Preserve, in Alna, protecting over 4,200 feet of the brook, frontage on the Sheepscot, with a half-mile loop trail and the new one-mile Hoffman Trail;
- Bass Falls Preserve, in Alna, with one mile of Sheepscot River frontage and three miles of trails:
- Griggs Preserve, in Newcastle, with two miles of trails through hilly woodlands;
- Marsh River Preserve, in Newcastle, with over one mile of frontage on the Marsh River and two miles of trails including an interpretive trail.

SVCA's Water Quality Monitoring program completed its 20<sup>th</sup> year in 2013. Volunteers sampled test sites throughout the watershed every other week during the summer and investigated one of the tributaries in depth. The data collected helps guide not only SVCA's river-protection efforts but also those of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection and the former Atlantic Salmon Commission, now a part of the Bureau of Sea-Run Fisheries and Habitat.

SVCA also organizes numerous nature hikes and canoe trips in the watershed throughout the year, open to all. New in 2013 and continuing in 2014 are our *FLASH* walks that we announce on our e-mail distribution list, Web site, and Facebook page. We do these walks when we know the weather is going to be just right for the walk. Starting in January 2014 we began hosting a series of talks on Citizen Science, how YOU can participate in the collection of data for research projects related to the plants, animals, and natural communities of the Sheepscot River Watershed. Check our Web site and Facebook page for a listing and description of our programs. There are many other ways to join the fun and meet new people who share an interest in conservation, the outdoors, and outdoor recreation, including opportunities to assist in trail maintenance, preserve stewardship, easement monitoring and other volunteer activities.

## Watershed Survey for Nonpoint Source Pollution

Staff and volunteers contributed over 200 hours to conduct a survey of the entire Damariscotta Lake Watershed in May of 2014. The purpose of this survey was to find sources of erosion, or nonpoint source pollution, in the watershed that may be impacting the water quality of Damariscotta Lake. The last survey of this kind in this watershed was conducted in 2001. Moving forward, we will seek to conduct this survey only once every 10 years. Much of the town of Somerville was included in this project. Landowner participation in this project was completely voluntary and we sincerely thank all of our neighbors in Somerville for their willingness to participate in this project. As a result of this project, DLWA will be creating a report on our findings that will be made available to the public in the fall of 2014. We seek to assist landowners in any way possible to address erosion or pollution issues they may be having, especially as it relates to water quality. The ultimate goal of this project is to use our findings to apply for federal funding that is available under the U.S. Clean Water Act which, if awarded, would allow us to subsidize landowners in the implementation of any erosion control practices that are recommended as a result of this watershed survey. Individuals, road associations, and municipal governments will all be eligible to receive these subsidies if the funds are awarded. We would be glad to hear from you if you have any feedback about this project or if there are any sites you believe would benefit from receiving more attention to prevent current or future erosion issues.

## **Invasive Plants**

The invasive plant Hydrilla continues to infest Damariscotta Lake, however, we are continually making considerable progress in managing what biologists call "the worst invasive aquatic plant in North America." Our staff and volunteers will continue monitoring the two infestations in the lake, in Davis Stream and in Cranberry Cove, throughout this summer growing season. Due to the extremely low density of Hydrilla plants found growing in Davis Stream in 2013, DLWA and the Maine Dept. of Environmental Protection have not sought to renew the Surface Use Restriction that prohibited watercraft from using a section of Davis Stream in previous years. While this means Davis Stream will once again be open for use to all watercraft, we kindly ask that any watercraft in Davis Stream behind the Jefferson General Store please stay to the middle of the channel and out of the shallow areas of the stream. As Hydrilla can survive in the sediment for up to 10 years or more, it is important for us to stay diligent in this area. Keeping boats out of the shallow areas will help us to prevent the possible spread of whatever plants may remain. Our staff and volunteers will continue to monitor this area to make sure any plants growing are removed quickly, but we need everyone's help to make sure they do not spread further. If you think you find Hydrilla or any other aquatic or terrestrial invasive plants, please report it immediately to DLWA.

In Cranberry Cove, we will be installing a pond liner to suffocate and control what Hydrilla plants remain in the Cove. The liner will cover as much of the Cove bottom as possible

to eliminate the potential for Hydrilla to grow within the Cove. Hydrilla has never been completely eradicated from any water body where it has been found, so we are waging a constant battle against this plant and using our resources as efficiently as possible.

## **Land Protection**

We continue to maintain the West Branch Preserve in Somerville and Jefferson as open and available to the public for outdoor education and recreation. In the winter of 2013/14, our staff completed a new Management Plan for this Preserve, which outlines the uses that are allowed on the Preserve as well as our future goals and ideas of what we would like it to offer. We would love to hear from our friends in Somerville if you have any ideas of what you would like to see or do on the West Branch Preserve. DLWA exists to facilitate the enjoyment of the watershed for all residents and we need your input to make that a reality.

We continue to monitor the 600+ acres of conservation easements that we hold on land around the watershed. To a certain extent, conservation easements can be altered to fulfill a landowner's wishes while protecting the land from future high-impact development, as well as providing the benefit of tax incentives to landowners who have a conservation easement on their land.

## Water Quality

Thanks to a grant from the Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund, we are investing even more into the future of Damariscotta Lake. With these funds, we have acquired advanced water quality monitoring equipment which will allow us to collect detailed water chemistry samples throughout the summer when water quality is most at risk from the adverse effects of pollution and erosion, such as algal blooms. In previous years, this in-depth chemical analysis was only conducted once per year, giving only a limited view into the overall health of Damariscotta Lake and its tributaries.

Staff and volunteers continue to take basic temperature, dissolved oxygen, and water clarity data from May to September each year in the three basins of Damariscotta Lake. There continues to be low levels of oxygen in both Muscongus Bay and the South Arm of the Lake during late summer and fall, however, these trends fall within historic norms and are not cause for immediate concern. The overall water quality of Damariscotta Lake remains near average when compared to other Maine lakes.

### 2013 Service Report - Somerville

Delta is pleased to be able to continue providing superior quality emergency Paramedic response to the people of your community at no cost to the community.

As a not-for-profit organization, we fund our operations solely by reimbursement for patient calls directly from the patient and the patient's insurance policy. This is possible in large part due to our economy of scale. We write off approximately 28% of our care annually as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured and support of special community events.

In 2013, we responded to 23 *911*-calls. Of these, 2 calls were for assistance from patients who did not require hospital care. These patients were evaluated by our paramedics and received no invoice. Additionally, we also serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 18.2 minutes for emergencies.

Paramedic care is the highest level of Pre-Hospital care available. #### Dear Friends:

It is a privilege to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of my work from the past year.

Encouraging the creation of more jobs remains my top priority. I have developed a Seven Point Plan for Jobs in Maine, which includes proposals to spur small business investment, ensure robust workforce education and training, reduce regulatory red tape that stifles job creation, support Maine agriculture and manufacturing, and invest in the infrastructure needed to expand our economy. Traditional industries and small businesses remain the backbone of Maine's economy, and innovation will be important for future jobs as well. I have supported Maine's effort to lead the world in deepwater wind technology and was proud when the University of Maine and its private sector partners launched the first prototype this year. This emerging industry has the potential to create thousands of good jobs here in Maine.

BIW remains a major Maine employer and is critical to our national security. I have worked hard to support the Navy's request for a 10<sup>th</sup> DDG-51 and to continue construction on the DDG-1000s at the shipyard. This year's annual defense policy bill also contains more than 30 provisions to eliminate sexual assault from our military, including several provisions that I authored.

Partisan divisiveness in Washington continues to prevent us from addressing some of our nation's most serious challenges. Gridlock reached a peak in October with the federal government shutdown that pushed our country to the brink of defaulting on its financial obligations and damaged our economy. As the shutdown continued with no end in sight, I presented a proposal I believed both sides could support. Within days, I was leading a bipartisan coalition of 14 Senators that worked night and day to craft a plan to reopen government, avert default, and restart negotiations on a long-term plan to deal with our nation's unsustainable debt of more than \$17 trillion. Known as the "Common Sense Caucus," we will continue to work to develop solutions and bridge the partisan divide.

Earlier this year, across-the-board federal spending cuts known as "sequestration" took effect. These indiscriminate cuts jeopardized priorities from national security to medical research and stand in stark contrast to the thoughtful and thoroughly debated spending priorities set at town meetings throughout Maine. To bring some Maine common sense to this process, I authored bipartisan legislation to allow federal agencies to set priorities in administering the required cuts and wrote a new law to ensure that sequestration would not disrupt air travel, which plays such an important role in fueling Maine's tourism economy.

I have also enjoyed my work as the ranking member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging where, with Senator Bill Nelson of Florida, we work on issues of critical importance to Maine seniors. The committee has created a toll free hotline (1-855-303-9470) to make it easier for senior citizens to report fraud and scams and to receive assistance. I also serve as the Senate Co-Chair of the task force on Alzheimer's, a devastating disease that takes a tremendous personal and economic toll on more than five million Americans. Better treatment for Alzheimer's and ultimately finding a cure should be an urgent national priority.

Finally, I am proud to reflect our famous Maine work ethic by completing another year of service without missing a single roll call vote. I have not missed a vote since I was elected – a streak that stands at more than 5,300 in a row.

May 2014 be a good year for you, your community, and our great State of Maine.

**ARTICLE 17:** Fund balances to be carried forward. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to carry balances forward to the coming year on certain accounts, if they deem it would be in the best financial interest of the town to do so.

**ARTICLE 18: Unanticipated Expenses and Emergencies.** To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to authorize the municipal officers to appropriate from surplus as they deem advisable to meet unanticipated expenses and emergencies that occur during fiscal year 2015. Board of Selectmen recommends \$20,000.00.

**ARTICLE 19: Surplus and overdraft accounts.** To see if the town will vote to authorize that the surplus and overdraft accounts be lapsed to the General Fund.

ARTICLE 20: Disposal of real estate acquired by the Town. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

ARTICLE 21: Funds to pay for sale of Town-acquired property. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appropriate money from the sale of any Town acquired property to pay the costs of said sale.

ARTICLE 22: Transfer of funds received from the sale of tax-acquired property. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer up to \$10,000 of funds received from the sale of tax-acquired property to the revaluation reserve account and transfer up to \$50,000 of funds received from the sale of tax-acquired property to the capital road construction reserve account.

**ARTICLE 23: Prepayment of Taxes.** To see if the town will vote to authorize the tax collector or treasurer to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506.

**ARTICLE 24: Discount on Taxes.** To see if the town will allow taxpayers a discount on taxes paid within 30 days after the postmark date on the bill and to set the rate thereof at 2%.

**ARTICLE 25:** Set the interest rate charged for late payment of taxes. To see if the town will vote to charge an interest rate of .583% per month (7% per annum) or fraction thereof, on all taxes paid after November 30, 2014 and May 31, 2015.

ARTICLE 26: Use of surplus funds for reduction of taxes. To see if the town will vote to authorize the expenditure of up to \$60,000.00 from the General Fund, for the purpose of reduction of taxes.

ARTICLE 27: Authorize receipt and expenditures of grants and other receipts. In addition to amount raised and appropriated at the town meeting on March 30, 2013 to see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to receive and expend such other sums as may be received from federal, state or local grants or programs or other sources during the period January 2013 through July 2014 for town purpose, provided that such grant, programs, or other sources require less than \$10,000.00 expenditures from other funds and matching funds which would be taken from surplus.

ARTICLE 28: Allow distribution of funds from snowmobile registrations. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the funds that are received from the State of Maine in 2014 and 2015, from snowmobile registrations, to the Backwoods Bouncers Snowmobile Club for the purpose of maintaining their snowmobile trails, to be open to the use of the public at all times, excluding the use of ATVs without landowner permission; and shall the Selectmen be authorized to enter into an agreement with the Club under such conditions as the Selectmen may deem advisable, for that purpose?

**ARTICLE 29: Subdivision Ordinance.** Shall an ordinance entitled "Somerville Subdivision Ordinance" be enacted? Note: An attested copy of the full text of this ordinance has been posted together with this warrant and is available at the Town Office from the Town Clerk and will be available at the polls.

The Registrar of Voters will be at the Somerville Town Office on the day of said meeting, namely June 20, 2014, at 2:30 p.m. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
