## ***IN MEMORY OF DAVID KEENE***



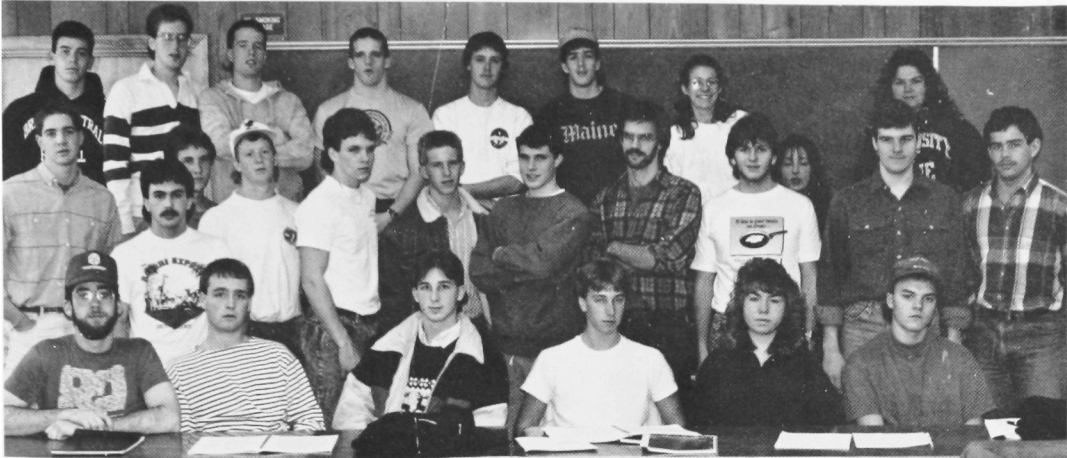

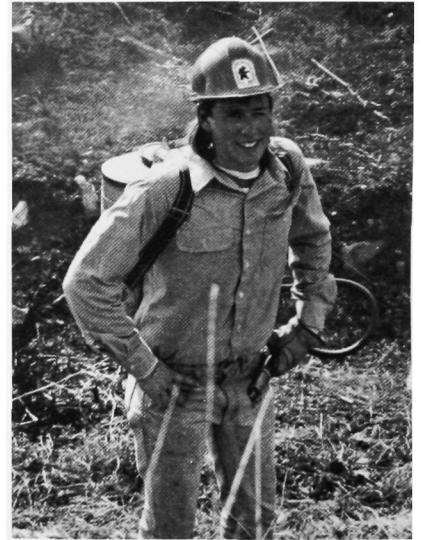


# FOREST FIRE ATTACK TEAM



The Forest Fire Attack Team is a non profit organization which operates through the University of Maine in the Orono area. Its primary objective is hazard reduction through control burns for the town of Orono and private landowners. At the same time the team is on call with the Maine Forest Service whenever they need help.

The team is currently finishing work on the team building and our four wheel drive truck. The insulation and the new door allows us the advantage of being able to work throughout the cold winter months without being dependent on the weather. The truck is very near completion and has been in service for over a year. Training is a continuous process done throughout the spring months. Green card training is offered in the winter courtesy of Gerry Parsons and the Maine Forest Service. Hands on training takes place through actual control burns done with the Orono Fire Department and our advisor, Al Kimball. The team encourages anyone who is interested in learning about fire management while having some fun to come out and join us in the spring.





# FOREST PRODUCTS RESEARCH SOCIETY

Founded in 1947, the Forest Products Research Society is an international, non-profit organization geared at promoting the interests of all segments of the forest products industry. F.P.R.S. also provides an important link between industry and research by encouraging the development and application of new technology and by supplying new technical information to the industry through journals, newsletters and meetings.

Members of the student chapter of F.P.R.S. are provided with a variety of services including chapter activities, Forest Products Journal, newsletters, employment referral services, and more. Student members here at Maine enjoy participating in field trips to forest products mills, hearing guest speakers from the industry, attending forest industry association conferences, and holding monthly meetings to discuss upcoming matters. The majority of the student members are wood technology and timber utilization majors, but anyone is welcome to participate.

Activities this past year included a field trip to Brunswick, Me. to see The Decoy Shop, a mill which specializes in duck and loon decoys and a trip to Hammond Lumber in Belgrade, Me. Also, students manned a booth to help with the spring Woodsmen's meet here at Orono, sponsored by the Woodsmen's team. A booth to provide information about forest products was set up during parent's weekend in October. Many different wood products were displayed and questions from the public were answered by student members.

The highlight of this past year was the New England Kiln Drying Association's conference held in Portland, Me., this past November. Ten students from Professor Richard Hale's Kiln Drying and Wood Preservation class attended the meeting which included presentations by many professionals on kiln operation and maintenance, and on the latest technology in the field. Students had the opportunity to converse with perspective employers and to gain insight into the challenging field of wood drying. Students also got a taste of Portland nightlife and visited many of the fine establishments throughout the city.



Future activities include perspective trips to Bethel Furniture Stock in Bethel, Me. (hardwood and white pine stock), and to Island Falls Cedar Products, Katahdin Forest Products, and Ward Cabin Co., all in Aroostook county. Leon Favreau, from Bethel Furniture Stock, will also come and speak to the student chapter in February.

Students involved in the chapter and its activities gain valuable experience through interactions with the forest products industry, and this in turn allows students to communicate with the public and inform them of the importance of forest products and forest products research to our society.
