Message from President Joan Ferrini-Mundy:

Dear members of the UMaine and UMM communities,

As Chancellor Malloy noted in his [community message](#) Wednesday and as announced in a University of Maine System [news release](#), we are beginning preparations to welcome students back to our campuses in the fall for a more traditional, in-person educational experience. We have every expectation that our fall semester for students, faculty and staff will be very different than last year, maximizing in-person instruction and the campus experience, and ensuring a safe environment for all to learn, teach, work, conduct research and engage in outreach.

At the University of Maine and University of Maine at Machias, we will take the [latest UMS guidance](#) and begin to collaboratively build our plans for summer and fall on our campuses, and in our facilities and offices statewide. Working with faculty, staff, students and other stakeholders, we will take what we have learned in the past year, continue to follow civil guidance and be driven by science, and plan accordingly.

Partnering to address health

- The University of Maine System [Together for Maine website](#) has the latest guidance regarding group gathering limits and spring semester operations. Also on the site is information on summer general operations; expect regular updates throughout the semester as they become available. Transparent and continuing communication

- The fall 2021 schedule of classes will be available in MaineStreet on March 15. Preparation for enrollment should begin by visiting the Office of Student Records website for helpful [enrollment](#) information. Find your enrollment appointment in your MaineStreet Student Center, or use the [enrollment appointment schedule](#) to determine when you are eligible to enroll. Schedule an appointment to meet with your adviser to plan your course selection. Enrollment begins on March 29.
- If you plan to graduate and wish to be part of May 2021 Commencement, and you have not filled out the Graduation Application, please do so as soon as possible. This will ensure that you receive all of the important information regarding Commencement. Find information on how to apply at the Student Records [website](#).

In-person, on-campus experiences and other learning modes

- It's a busy weekend for UMaine Athletics with games at home and away — all without fans, in accordance with COVID-19 health and safety requirements. Today, Field Hockey is at UMass and Women's Basketball hosts Stony Brook in the America East Championship game at 5 p.m. The game will be broadcast nationally on ESPNU, streamed [here](#), and can be heard on the radio locally at 96.1 WGUY-FM or at [GoBlackBears.com](#). Baseball travels to Wagner College for a three-game weekend set beginning with a doubleheader at noon on Saturday before closing the series with a single game at 3 p.m. on Sunday. Football will be playing its first home game in 483 days when it hosts UAlbany at Alford Stadium at noon on Saturday. There will be no spectators or tailgating on campus; the game can be seen locally on WVII ABC 7 Bangor and Maine's CW-WPXT in Portland. It also will be livestreamed via the [FloFootball](#) platform. Local radio coverage is on the [Black Bear Sports Network](#) and [GoBlackBears.com](#), or via the [TuneIn](#) application. Softball begins its 2021 spring slate with a doubleheader at Merrimack at noon on Saturday. Men's and Women's Swimming are in action on Sunday when the men travel to take on Norwich University while the women hit the road to meet Vermont. Both events begin at noon. Women's Soccer hosts NJIT in its home opener, also without spectators. Sunday's Women's Soccer contest can be seen at [AmericaEast.TV](#). Softball concludes its weekend with a doubleheader at Sacred Heart at noon before Baseball meets Wagner College at 3 p.m. in the series finale.
- Saturday's football game with UAlbany in Alford Stadium begins at noon without spectators, in accordance with COVID-19 health and safety guidance. The campus traffic plan remains the same as it is on every game day, with one important exception — there will be no parking in the athletics complex lots. Beginning at 6 a.m. March 13, all College Avenue traffic entering via Long Road will be diverted south on Munson; westbound traffic on Long Road will detour on Flagstaff Road. Tunk Road will be closed. Only authorized vehicles will be allowed in the Alford, Corbett, Dunn, Gym and Satellite parking lots for the safety of student-athletes and staff utilizing multiple facilities in the area, following civil and UMS guidance. Pedestrians in those areas will be required to follow COVID-19 health and safety guidelines, including wearing face coverings and social distancing. Tailgating is not allowed on campus at this time.
- Summer University enrollment is up 11% over last year, with students already registered for more than 2,100 courses. The first session begins May 10. More information about Summer University, including how to register for both UMaine and UMM courses, is [online](#).

Flexibility, responsiveness, empathy, and science

- Earlier this semester, we sent notice that UMaine would revert to the prepandemic pass/fail grading option and extended the deadline to provide time to connect with advisers to ensure an informed choice. Subsequently, UMaine's Student Government (UMSG), noting increasing student concerns and issues as a result of the pandemic, approached UMaine Faculty Senate and UMaine Administration requesting the extension of COVID-19 pandemic pass/fail grading policies and procedures this semester. UMSG offered compelling data to support the request, and its argument that students' learning environment conditions have not substantially changed since fall semester was persuasive. As a result, Faculty Senate, which was very supportive of the students' position, voted on March 10 to support the UMSG request, and the UMaine Administration concurred. Both also support temporary changes to the withdrawal policy this semester. The latest spring 2021 policies and procedures regarding both are [online](#).
