27TH ANNUAL NORTHEAST CONFERENCE ON ANDEAN ARCHAEOLOGY AND ETHNOHISTORY
October 11-12, 2008, University of Maine, Orono

Keynote Speaker: Peruvian archaeologist Luis Jaime Castillo will present a public lecture on his eighteen years of archaeological research on the Moche culture (2nd – 8th centuries AD) of northern Peru. Castillo is currently Professor of the Humanities Department and Director of the International Relations and Cooperation Department at the *Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú*, in Lima, Peru. The lecture will be delivered in English.

Where: Wells Conference Center, University of Maine

Luis Jaime Castillo's lecture is part of a series of presentations which will be offered during the 27th meeting of the Northeast Conference on Andean Archaeology and Ethnohistory, to be held at the University of Maine. This conference is an annual affair that rotates among colleges and universities within the northeast region of the United States. The purpose of the conference is to bring together scholars dedicated to understanding the rich cultural heritage of the Andes region of South America from a variety of related disciplines, including both the human and environmental sciences. The small-conference venue is intended to foster dialogue among colleagues regarding ongoing research on Precolumbian society and culture change in the Andes, as well as providing the public with an opportunity to learn about Andean research.

Professor Castillo is a Peruvian archaeologist and specialist in the Moche culture of the north coast of Peru. He will be speaking on his eighteen years of research at the archaeological site of San José de Moro, a ceremonial and funerary complex that has been the focus of investigation since 1991. The talk will be offered at 8:30 pm on Saturday, October 11, 2008 and is free and open to the public. The lecture is being presented during Maine Archaeology Month—a month established by Gov. Angus King in 2000 to present archaeological research to the public through scholarly lectures, exhibits, and tours of archaeological sites.

Among the Hudson Museum's collections are significant Peruvian archaeological and ethnographic holdings that are utilized for research and exhibition. This lecture will enhance the understanding of these collections as well as supporting Andean research that is conducted on campus.

The lecture is being advertised across the UMaine campus and in the greater community through announcements on the web and through a printed flyer. Students in upper level classes and graduate students are being encouraged to attend, as well as community members interested in Archaeology.

Funding is requested in support of travel costs and lodging for Professor Castillo. Match is being provided by the Peruvian American Foundation and SPIA (School of Policy and International Affairs).

Biographical Sketch: Luis Jaime Castillo Butters received his bachelor's degree and licenciata (professional degree) in Archaeology from the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú (PUCP), where now he is Principal Professor of the Humanities Department and Director of the International Relations and Cooperation Department. He also holds an MA in archaeology from the University of California, Los Angeles, where he is a doctoral candidate. Since 1991, he has been director of the San Jose de Moro Archaeological Program, a collaboration project between the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú, UCLA (1991-1992), California State University of Northridge, and the University of Western Ontario (1995-1997). The project continues as a PUCP sole endeavor, attracting students and researchers from around the world to learn the techniques of mortuary archaeology (digging the dead). Castillo has published numerous articles and books in Spanish and English (including among others a co-authored book on ancient Peruvian silver published by the Metropolitan Museum of Art and Yale University Press), and he has been invited to lecture in both Peruvian and foreign universities. In 1998 he was honored with the Julio C. Tello Award for the best thesis in archaeology, which is given by the Concejo Nacional de Ciencia y Tecnología (CONCITEC). Castillo was recently appointed as co-editor of *Latin American Antiquity*, a flagship journal of the Society for American Archaeology.

Summary of Program for which grant funds were rewarded, including a brief description, place where the program was held, and date and time:

Luis Jaime Castillo's lecture was a keynote associated with the 27th meeting of the Northeast Conference on Andean Archaeology and Ethnohistory, held at the University of Maine. This conference is an annual affair that rotates among colleges and universities within the northeast region of the United States. The purpose of the conference was to bring together scholars dedicated to understanding the rich cultural heritage of the Andes region of South America from a variety of related disciplines, including both the human and environmental sciences. The small-conference venue was intended to foster dialogue among colleagues regarding ongoing research on Precolumbian society and culture change in the Andes, as well as providing the public with an opportunity to learn about Andean Research.

Professor Castillo is a Peruvian archaeologist and specialist in the Moche culture of the north coast of Peru. He spoke on his eighteen years of research at the archaeological site of San José de Moro, a ceremonial and funerary complex that has been the focus of investigation since 1991. The lecture was presented during Maine Archaeology Month—a month established by Gov. Angus King in 2000 to present archaeological research to the public through scholarly lectures, exhibits, and tours of archaeological sites. Professor Castillo's lecture included an extensive slide show of incredible quality, which captured the audience's attention for the length of the talk.

The lecture was held in the Wells Conference Center on Saturday October 11, 2008, from 8:30-9:45pm.

How many people attended the event(s)? If possible describe the different audiences that this program served (i.e., UMaine Students, general community, teachers, etc.).

The event was attended by students and faculty from UMaine and other northeast regional universities, regional community members, and other visitors to the conference, totaling between 110-120 individuals.

How was the event Promoted? Please attach copies of promotional material.

The event was promoted electronically via listserves, and paper flyers posted around campus and local communities (see attached). Please note that support from CADLS was not awarded until after the event; therefore, the flyer did not include CADLS as a sponsor). Joe Carr also put out a news release (http://www.umaine.edu/news/article.asp?id_no=2297) that resulted in a small piece in the Bangor Daily News several days before the lecture.

Please describe any modifications to program or budget made after award:

We have made a slight change in the categories paid by CADLS and the Peruvian American Fund. We still ask CADLS to pay the \$500 honorarium to Castillo and the \$210 mileage reimbursement portion of the travel costs (to Jeffrey Quilter). We also ask that the CADLS pay the \$117 per diem

to Castillo. We ask the remaining \$29.30 of the CADLS allotment be reimbursed to Dan Sandweiss for a portion of Castillo's hotel charge. We are asking Peruvian American Foundation to pay all of the airfare (\$783.30) and most of the hotel (\$216.70) to make up their \$1000 commitment. The remaining \$3.00 results from an increase over projection of \$1.00/day in the hotel charge; Sandweiss will cover that out of pocket. Please see the attached budget form for the adjusted breakdown.
