Maine House Has Musical Session

AUGUSTA (AP)—The Maine House had musical entertainment today—the signing of the legislature's official song "One Hundred" by a Portland barber shop quartet.

The song, written by Mrs. Hal G. Hoyt of Richmond and accepted for the commemoration of "the 100th legislatures of Maine," got crowded out last week when the celebration was held.

The quartet was here today for another purpose so the legislators seized the opportunity and drafted them into service. Mrs. Hoyt also was present and played

the song on the piano for the quartet's rehearsal.

The first verse goes: "We are here again for the hundreth time to make new laws for you. We will mix hard work with a jolly time and raise your taxes too!"

Mrs. Hoyt is the wife of the director of the Securities Division of the Maine Banking Department.

The quartet came to Augusta for the signing by Gov. Reed of a proclamation designating April 8-15 as National Harmony Week. They call themselves the Down-easters and are from the Portland Chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc.

Members are Jim Gillchrest of Bar Mills, lead; Dick Place of Waterboro, bass; Ted Sawyer of Portland, baritone; and Dick Wheeler of Falmouth, tenor.
