## MAYOR'S ADDRESS

---

*Gentlemen of the City Council:*

I desire at this meeting, the last which this body will attend prior to our annual election, to submit to you and through you to the citizens of Waterville, a brief review of our year's work, together with some suggestions concerning the future which may be of value to those who succeed us.

We undertook, at the beginning of this year, in spite of the somewhat discouraging condition in which we found the finances of the city, to make certain permanent improvements which seemed absolutely necessary, and to take care of a considerable expenditure of money outside of the ordinary expense of carrying on our city government. I think it is no more than due to us to say that we have succeeded in that undertaking and I desire to call attention to the fact that we have done it without raising the tax rate, without any general raise in valuation and without burdening the city with a largely increased debt.

The state tax for 1911 was nearly \$8,000 larger than for 1910. The available funds for local use were reduced by just that amount. So that we started the year with a substantial handicap made necessary by the condition of the state's finances, but no easier for us to pay simply because it was necessary. We raised the pay of the firemen at the beginning of the year and in order to get rid of the fee system among our patrolmen, raised their pay also. We also were obliged to spend some money in repainting the interior of the City Hall, in repairing a portion of the wharfing on Water street and in replanking Ticonic bridge. In spite of these expenditures we have paid our current bills and invested about \$55,000 in permanent improvements, in which I include the buying a lot for and building of the Central Fire Station, the work on the new High School building, the repairing of the Armory, and the extension of Hayden Brook sewer. No reasonable man can deny that that is a fair record of accomplishment for a single year.



The new fire station, costing, lot and all, about \$25,000, is a credit to the city. The need of it was obvious. Anyone who looks it over will be satisfied that the contractors who built it, the inspector who supervised the work, and the committee which took charge of it, rendered good service to the public. I do not believe that any private firm, individual, or corporation doing business in Waterville could have gotten a better building for the money.

The Armory was a wreck when we undertook its repair. If let alone, in two or three years it would have been worthless. The adjutant general would not have been justified in permitting its use as an armory had we been unwilling to have repaired it. It is now in good shape, so good that the state is now allowing us \$500 a year rental for it as against \$400 for last year and \$150 for the year before, and besides that permitting the city to retain the use of it more than one-half of the time so that it should yield next year a gross rental of at least seven or eight hundred dollars.

Hayden Brook sewer has been extended a considerable distance. The building of this sewer, begun in 1906, was discontinued in 1908, resumed again in 1909 and discontinued again in 1910. It ought not to be discontinued again until completed. Sufficient progress has been made on this work so that during the coming year it can and should be carried at least as far as Gilman street bridge.

The work on the new High School building has not been as encouraging as the work so far mentioned. After contracts had been placed for completing enough of this building so as to take care of our present needs and it seemed reasonably certain that the High School would be transferred to its new quarters in the fall, it was discovered that the foundation of the building was unsafe, and in consultation with Mr. Green, the City Engineer, and Mr. Freeman, the architect in charge of the work, an expert construction engineer was employed, under whose direction work has been going on ever since last summer, to make the building safe to finish and occupy. This work will be completed this month. It will cost approximately \$11,000. Some men who know but little of the facts, principally those who have no children's lives to risk in an unsafely constructed school building, have criticised us for expending this money. They are welcome to the criticism. If any administration sees fit to place the lives of three hundred boys and girls in jeopardy rather than to spend a few thousand dollars in insuring their safety, I sincerely hope that none of us will be connected with it.

I believe that the purchase of the lot on which the new High School building stands and the building of such a structure as we found partially completed when we came into office was a piece of stupendous folly. The city owned a better lot, better situated than the one which



it bought for \$7,000 and for which it still owes \$6,000. Had a reasonable sized building been put up on that lot it would have been ready for occupation long ago. But we had nothing to do with that. The building can be completed and ready for occupation next fall. The next administration should appropriate \$20,000 for that purpose and finish the work.

In order to meet the bills necessarily contracted in the work which we have done, we have been obliged to increase the net debt of the city about \$18,000. A cursory glance at the figures would cause it to be inferred that the increase was larger. For some reason the last administration figured as an asset about \$13,000 expended last year on the new High School building. In one sense, of course, it was an asset. That is, they had created that much new property. The increase should have appeared in the list of city property but not in the Auditor's balance sheet. The actual net debt of the city at the close of last year was \$315,578.43 instead of \$302,838.06. A comparison of the former figures with those given in the Auditor's report of this year will show the real increase in debt.

We raised about \$12,000 more this year than last by direct taxation. We availed ourselves of certain assets which have been turned into cash and expended to good purpose; we received a bonus of \$6,000 from the Central Maine Power Co. in connection with the lighting contract and we have exercised strict economy in our various departments. By a combination of all of these means we have succeeded in doing what we have done.

The members of the city council deserve the thanks of the public for the service which they have rendered the city this year. Serving without pay and without hope of indirect reward you have been prompt in attendance at regular and special meetings, have done valuable work in committee and have gone through the entire year without friction and with no apparent desire to do anything excepting your plain duty. I have heard a great deal about the evil results of jealousy among the wards. If any has existed this year it has not been apparent. I have heard of the difficulties which arise between the two boards. I have seen no such difficulties. I have heard of the bitterness of partisanship which comes from men being elected on party tickets. It has not been exhibited in this chamber since I became familiar with it. You deserve the thanks of the public and personally I want to thank you for your courtesy, your industry, and your intelligent and honest co-operation in carrying out the work of the year.

The heads of our various city departments deserve great credit for their work. I do not believe it is possible to justly criticise one of them. Anyone can find fault. It is the easiest thing in the world to do.



It is quite another matter to find something upon which to base a just criticism. I have been in close touch with the work of every department. I do not say that improvements cannot be made. That would be absurd. But I do say that it would be a very difficult thing for anyone to point out any act of non feasant or mal feasant on the part of any of the officials whom you and I elected or appointed a year ago.

In connection with their work I wish to call your attention to the standing of their accounts. The appropriations which we allowed each department were made as small as possible, too small indeed, but the financial condition of the city did not warrant making them larger. Notwithstanding the limited means at their hands, the street commissioner has lived within his appropriation, as has also the clerk to the overseers of the poor. The police department expended somewhat more than its appropriation, by reason of the raise in pay of the patrolmen, but has been conducted with great economy as the report of that department shows.

It may be that no one of us will be connected with the city government another year. That is, perhaps, not a very important matter. The important thing is that the city work should go along on progressive and intelligent lines. With the year's work behind us we can see certain things which experience alone could teach. It is not improper then for us to leave on record such suggestions as we deem of value. Our successors will not be bound by them. They may find them of assistance.

In the first place, it is entirely feasible to slightly lower the tax rate next year without disturbing the valuation, except so far as it needs to be changed in order to equalize it more nearly and without risking the necessity of borrowing money. The rate is now 23 1-2 mills. It can safely be reduced to 23 mills. If it were not for the new High School building needing an appropriation of \$20,000, it could be reduced to 20 mills, which is as high as it ordinarily ought to be. But a slight reduction is better than none. It is a step in the right direction.

With the rate at 23 mills, the total income of the city from property and poll taxes and miscellaneous sources will exceed \$173,000. Of this amount \$20,000 should be devoted to the new High School building and \$5000 to Hayden Brook sewer, leaving \$148,000 to be divided as follows:

This schedule permits increasing this year's appropriation for common schools from \$12,000 to \$14,000; for High school, from \$6,000 to \$8,000; for Fire department, from \$9,000 to \$10,000; for police, from \$8,000 to \$9,000; for sewers, from \$1,000 to \$2,000, and for streets, from \$13,000 to \$15,000.

No appropriation is made for the Armory which will be self sustaining next year, and the usual appropriation for parks, bells and clocks and printing can be taken care of out of miscellaneous receipts. If this plan of taxation and appropriation is followed and expenditures are kept within these limits, the tax rate can be dropped to 20 mills in 1913, provided, of course, that the state tax rate is not raised by the next legislature and that no other legislation is undertaken which affects our local expenses. It is to be noted that our state tax for 1912 is \$13,900 less than for 1911. This is equal to about the amount of our usual annual appropriation for streets. Economy in state affairs is appreciably felt in local taxation and is a considerable factor in enabling us to make needed local improvements.

Considerable financial benefit might accrue to our poor department if the farm at the Almshouse were used to better purpose. The land is not in condition to produce much at present but if put in shape this spring and fertilized, as it can readily be, by having the city teams haul out the dressing from the fire stations, there is no reason why a substantial saving cannot be made in the expense of maintaining that establishment.

The city owns a wood lot in Sidney. The sole use which has been made of this property for several years is to pay taxes on it. If it cannot profitably be utilized as a wood lot, it should be sold.

The city also owns a part of the electric lighting system now used by our local companies. Some twenty years ago the poles owned by the city were turned over to the Waterville & Fairfield Railway and Light-



ing Company, to use, under a ten year agreement, the consideration being embraced in the cost of lighting. Ten years ago the agreement was renewed without apparent consideration. The city is receiving nothing from any source for the use of these poles at the present time. They should either be sold or leased so as to make this asset of some value, and undoubtedly a fair arrangement between the city and the companies using the poles can be readily arrived at.

Some arrangement ought to be made under which the city can more readily make use of the local hospital in emergency cases. At present we pay out considerable sums to out of town hospitals for services which might be rendered here under some general arrangement satisfactory to both the hospital and the city.

I have already mentioned the fact that the patrolmen have been put on straight salaries instead of fees. It is a much better system and it would be, I believe, much more satisfactory if the system could be extended so as to include all city officials. As the law stands this can only be done by agreement. But it seems unlikely that city officials would refuse a reasonable agreement of this kind and I think it would be wiser and better, if possible to do so, to arrange that all city officials should receive such salaries as might be deemed proper, in lieu of the fees now collected by them, the fees to be turned into the treasury. There might very likely be no financial gain to the city in this suggestion but in many ways it would be an improvement.

## City Solicitor's Report

---

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

At the time of my appointment as City Solicitor in November the city had one case pending in court, Skowhegan vs. Waterville, which was disposed of at the December term of the Supreme Judicial Court in Somerset County by giving the plaintiff judgment.

At the November term of the Superior Court for this county I brought an action upon a bond given by Elias Katel as principal, and George John and Joseph George as sureties, which is still pending.

The most important matter that the city is involved in, which may result in litigation, is the claim of Hanson, Webber & Dunham relative to a right of way which is covered by the Armory.

On November 21, 1894, the firm of Hanson, Webber & Dunham purchased of Hall C. Burleigh a right of way ten feet wide extending from the rear of their business block along the southerly side of what is known as the George Stackpole lot to Front St. On July 15, 1896, the City of Waterville bought of the heirs of Hall C. Burleigh the land over which this right of way extends and moved the Armory upon it, covering up a portion of the right of way. Hanson, Webber & Dunham now request that the city do one of two things: either remove the Armory from the right of way and restore the surface of the earth to its original condition, or pay \$333.33 for the right of way (the price paid by them for same), come under obligations to keep in repair so much of their sewer as is under the Armory and grant them a right of way on either side of the Armory. In event of either offer being accepted they ask that they be reimbursed for reasonable counsel fees and charges incurred in the adjustment of the matter.

At a joint meeting of the city government a committee consisting of two aldermen and three councilmen was appointed with full power to act in place of the city government in the matter. No adjustment has as yet been made.

## Board of Health Report

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Waterville:*

Gentlemen:—The Board of Health begs leave to submit the following report for the year ending January 31, 1912.

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit my report in relation to the cattle tested during the past year. Last year the Board of Health adopted rules and regulations for the testing of all cattle furnishing milk and cream to the city of Waterville. This year those same rules and regulations were amended, so as to include the cows furnishing butter as well. 164 herds—937 cattle were tested during the past year, by four (4) different veterinarians, and twelve (12) of these animals were condemned.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS AS AMENDED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

It is hereby ordained by the Board of Health of the city of Waterville, that section one of the Rules and Regulations of said Board of Health relating to the sale of milk and cream within the city of Waterville, as amended on July 8, 1911, is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm, corporation, association or society, shall at any time, by himself, his clerk, servant or agent, directly or indirectly, sell or offer for sale, or keep with intent to sell, any milk,



cream or butter within the city of Waterville, or deliver or bring the same therein for the purpose of sale, unless the cows from which said milk or cream shall have been taken or said butter shall have been derived, shall have been examined by tuberculin test or otherwise, sufficient to determine the physical condition of the cows, applied by some veterinarian approved by this board and the live stock sanitary commissioner, and a certificate of such examination, giving the name and residence of the owner or keeper of the cow, a description sufficient for her identification, and the place and conditions as to food and drink furnished, or to be furnished such cow, and showing that said cow is healthy and free from disease, shall have been filed with the secretary of this board. Said examination must be made and said certificate filed with said secretary once each year, and all cows and herds not previously tested, must be so tested and examined and the certificate aforesaid filed on or before the first day of September of each year.

Section 2 of said Rules and Regulations is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Veterinarians for such examination may be approved by this board and by said live stock sanitary commissioner, and their approval revoked at any time, but their certificate shall remain in force one year and no longer.

Section 4. Any violation of the foregoing by-laws by any person, firm, corporation, association or society shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof such person, firm, corporation, association or society shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$50.

## Report of Milk Inspector

Gentlemen:—As Milk Inspector I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31, 1912. Forty-eight dealers have been licensed to sell milk in the city of Waterville the past year. The licenses are issued by the Agricultural Department of the State of Maine, free of charge.

Our milkmen are striving and are having wonderful success in giving their customers pure, clean, sanitary milk. A great many samples of milk were tested during the year, and only six stood below standard. During the year I have only had five complaints about the standard and quality of the milk.

I do not hesitate to say that the Waterville milk supply is up to a high standard this year, and I respectfully invite the consumers of milk to visit the farm of your milkman, he will be glad to have you come and see for yourself the improvements that have been made in caring for the health of the cattle, also the sanitary ways of handling the milk, to guard against contamination.

Without doubt our milkmen are hard-working, honest fellows, striving for one thing, to furnish their customers with pure, clean, sanitary milk.

## Engineer's Report

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

Gentlemen:—The following is submitted as a report of the work of my department:

### SEWERS

May street from man hole at junction with Spruce street northerly, 119 feet of 8 inch pipe including two branches.

Burleigh street, from end of old sewer (65 feet north of man hole at Gilman street) to a point 160 feet north of man hole at Gilman street, 95 feet of 8 inch pipe including two branches. A lamp hole at the end of old sewer was moved to end of new sewer.

College avenue, near Highwood street, southerly from the end of the old sewer, 55 feet of 8 inch pipe.

Oak street, west of Drummond avenue from end of the old sewer, westerly 114.5 feet of 8 inch pipe.

Total, 383.5 feet of pipe sewer.

Hayden Brook sewer from end of the old sewer near West street, northerly 350.7 feet of 66 inch reinforced concrete sewer, costing as follows:

There is an unsettled claim for land damage on this sewer. A survey was made for the extension of the outfall of the sewer below the Lockwood Company's mill but this was not built.



## STATE ROAD

A section of state road was graveled from upper College avenue crossing, 2600 feet northerly.

## SIDEWALKS

Greenwood street, southerly side, from College avenue westerly to Central avenue 676.5 feet. Material, gravel.

Eastern avenue, westerly side, from Seavey street northerly to Collins street, 1170 feet. Material, gravel.

Sherwin street, southerly side, from Summer street, easterly, 277.65 feet. Material, gravel.

## WATER STREET WALL

A section of wall on the easterly side of Water street, 30.5 feet in length was built by J. L. Parkin & Son.

## CENTRAL FIRE STATION

After excavation on the site of the Central Fire station, it was found that a portion of the foundation wall and several columns must be placed on a very soft clay. A new plan for larger footings was designed which makes a perfectly safe foundation.

## STREET LINES AND GRADES

Street lines and grades have been given in many instances where abutters wished to grade.

## NEW HIGH SCHOOL FOUNDATION.

While digging in the basement of the new high school, about August 1, 1911, a very soft and wet condition of the soil was found. Further investigation with a sounding rod by the city engineer failed to reveal that there was hard bottom at a depth of 60 feet and it was deemed unsafe to continue the construction on the building any farther. After consultation with the architect and building inspector, it was decided to obtain the services of an expert engineer, familiar with quicksand.

Mr. Sawyer of Sawyer & Moulton, Consulting Engineers, Portland, Me., was called and a further investigation was held. It was found that the soft clay or quicksand reached a depth of 95 feet so that piling was not considered suitable. Accordingly, plans were made by Mr. Sawyer for increasing the bearing surface of the foundations and taking off a



portion of the water in order that the quicksand might become hardened. This work is now being done and when it is completed will insure a safe foundation.

### STREET LINES

These are not properly marked in many cases and a portion of the street is used by the abutter. These street lines should be carefully surveyed and bounds so placed that the city will not lose title to the side of the street, and I would recommend that an appropriation be made for this.

I wish to thank the members of the city government and the former city engineer for their help and advice.

## Free Public Library

---

*To the Honorable, the Mayor and the City Council:*

The trustees of the public library have attended to the duties entrusted to them by your honorable body and beg leave to report.

The year has been one of progress in every department of the varied work of the library. The trustees, with deep regret report the death of one of their number, Dr. John L. Fortier, who had given to the library his deep interest, his counsel and his hearty support. The president of the library board, Dr. F. C. Thayer, has continued to give to all its interests his careful attention both as president, member of committees, and donor of many valuable books. This service is gratefully recognized. The committee on buildings and grounds, Hon. Frank Redington and Hon. E. L. Jones, has attended well to the material condition of the library plant and this is satisfactory at the present time. The reading room committee, Judge Shaw, Senator Johnson and Hon. Horace Purinton, has furnished a reading room that has been greatly enjoyed and largely patronized. The children's room committee has delighted the hearts of an increased number of the children during the year.

The finance committee has given careful attention to the financial condition and needs of the library and their very conservative report is worthy of the careful consideration of your body.

The book committee has given much time and endeavor to secure for the library the books best suited to the needs and desires of the patrons and within the reach of the resources provided.

Mr. H. D. Bates has continued his important and unpaid service as secretary and treasurer.

Of course the largest element in the successful work of the year has been the faithful, courteous and careful service of the librarian, Miss Caswell and the assistant librarian, Miss Smith. They have made strenuous endeavor to meet whatever questions have been referred to them and have not complained over the fact that many people instead of con-



sulting the reference books and the card catalogue, habitually ask the librarian for anything that they want. The librarians are doing their best to make the resources of the library available to all and when we note that over one-third of the entire population of the city are enrolled as users of the library books, it is plain that the library is the most broadly extended educational influence within the control of the city.

The service of Mr. Philip Brown as janitor has been efficient as usual and as usual has extended to many things not falling strictly within a janitor's duty.

The trustees report favorably a recommendation of the book committee that action should be taken toward the formation of an association of the several libraries in Waterville, in order to make them more fully available, for purposes of serious study and also in the line of economy in the purchase of expensive reference books.

The trustees express their gratitude to all who have presented books during the year, the list of such donors appearing in the report of the librarian. Such gifts are of large and permanent service and should be greatly increased in number.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

*To the Board of Trustees of the Waterville Public Library:*

I have the honor to submit the Fifteenth Annual Report of the Waterville Public Library for the year ending January 31, 1912.

Although no unusual increase has occurred in any of the various departments the gain has been steady in each of them and the Library is fast gaining a place in the community both as an educational center and as furnishing a means for reading and for recreation.

The department of French books established last year has proved very useful. Additions have been made as the funds have allowed but we still have not enough books to supply the demand.

The reports usually received from the State of Maine and from the United States Government have been placed on the shelves where they are often consulted. Through the courtesy of Senator Johnson additional valuable reports have been received.



## LOAN DEPARTMENT

### REFERENCE ROOM

No one department of Library activity has increased more during the past year than has that of the reference room. The pupils of the various schools are turning to the Library as the natural place to find help in their school problems. Much individual aid has been given them and the entire sophomore class of the High School came to the Library for a talk on "How to use a Library." This talk consisted of practical demonstrations of the use of the card catalog, magazine indexes and reference books in general. Each pupil was given some question to look up and the results were very gratifying. Plans for continuing this work with the other classes are in process of formation. In every way we have tried to co-operate with the teachers in the schools. Lists of books and all available material have been made out both for our own patrons and for persons writing for information. Whenever our own Library has not had sufficient material books have been borrowed from the Maine State Library, Colby College Library, Boston Public Library, New York State Library, and the Waterville Historical Society Library. As an example of the work done in this room we would state that during the month of December material on 63 subjects was furnished. 2,146 persons have used the room during the year.

### CATALOGING

The number of books to be added this year has been unusually large, a total of 840 books having been placed on the shelves, of this number 21 were replacements, 652 were added by purchase, 188 by gift. The large number of gifts was due to the generosity of the Waterville Woman's Club. The books were divided into the following classes:

## REPORT OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE

The Book committee takes pleasure in reporting a larger number of books added during the year than in any other year of regular library work. The last number on the Accession Book for 1910-11 was 9822; for 1911-12, it is 10,618. If this were a net gain there would be more reason for congratulation but the rapid and destructive wear upon the more popular books makes it necessary frequently to replace them or to allow them to drop out of the catalogue. A considerable sum of money is needed at once for the rebinding or replacing of books.

Effort has been made to meet the actual demands and needs of the patrons of the library in the classes of books that have been added. A large and somewhat costly assortment of books on railroads, their management and service is among these. A series of books on Vocations is proving valuable and an encyclopedia in 24 volumes for the children brings to them a vast store of information in a very interesting way. Several important art books have been procured. A few new books have been placed in the Reference room and effort has been made to meet the ever-enlarging demands upon this department as well as the funds available will allow.

The proportion of fiction purchased has been larger than is recommended by the best library authorities but as the most of the books presented to the library are non-fiction, the classified lists appear to give to such books an undue prominence.

The committee has expended for books \$588.45 and for rebinding books, \$24.50. Books to the value of about \$50 have been purchased that did not arrive in season for the treasurer's report and these will reduce the small balance in his hands.

The Waterville Woman's club has continued its very important benefactions during the year. It has given to the Reference room the splendid Dictionary of Music and Musicians by Grove, in four volumes and the new Rand & McNally Atlas while every department of the library has been enriched by important and well selected volumes. The club has expended in their purchase \$171.62.

Grateful mention should be made of the gifts of individuals that have increased the value of the library and have considerably lengthened the roll of books added during the year.

From Boston book auctions and from special sales, a large number of books have been secured at nominal prices, to the great advantage of the library. The French department has been enlarged but the increasing use of the books calls for the providing of many more in that language.



In order to make the resources of the several libraries in Waterville more available for special study and research, the committee suggests the advisability of forming an association of the libraries in Waterville namely, Colby College, Waterville Historical Society, Coburn Institute and the Waterville Public Library. Lists of reference books, also authorities and important additions in history, science and biography could be exchanged, and a card of introduction from any librarian in the association would entitle the bearer to the privileges of any library under the regulations of that library.

The large number of worn out books, principally in the Children's department that must be replaced; the increase in the number of patrons and the greater demands made upon it for purposes of study and research make it very desirable to secure an increased appropriation for new books and binding for the coming year.

*To the Trustees of the Waterville Public Library:*

We submit for your consideration the results of our examination of the financial transactions of the Library as shown by the Treasurer's report for the year ending January 31st, 1912.

We find the total receipts for the year to be \$3,185.63 which with the balance brought forward from previous year (\$9.59) made an available total \$3,195.22.

The checks and other vouchers of the Treasurer show a total expenditure for the year of \$2,930.13, all of which vouchers we have examined and found to be in order and correct, and the books in balance. The cash in hand is evidenced by a certificate of deposit of the Ticonic National bank.

The Alice Getchell fund of five hundred dollars is on deposit with the Waterville Savings bank and is represented at this examination by a book of deposit.

The needs and usefulness of the Waterville Public Library are always great, must be so in the very nature of the work it undertakes to accomplish. There should be no less money provided for the current year, and we recommend the same apportionment of expense, and that the city be asked to provide not less than three thousand dollars.

## CATCH BASIN AND MANHOLES

Began the year on catch basins by cleaning them all out from one end of the city to the other. New one on Canabas avenue, one on Park street, one on Elm street, one on Maple street, one on Gold street, and one on the corner of Gray and Summer streets. Manhole on Merchants Row, one on High street. Also built over several other catch basins and manholes in different parts of the city. Besides cleaning out Hayden Brook, beginning at the mouth of Hayden Brook sewer and cutting bushes and cleaning the banks of the filth to Drummond avenue.

## TURMPIKED STREETS AND ROADS

After careful deliberation on the needs of the various streets and roads we turnpiked the following: Sturtevant street, Drummond avenue, Eastern avenue, Webb road, Upper Main street from crotch of Ridge road to Mountain View Farm, Main street from North to Hillside avenue, College avenue to line, Columbus avenue, Harold street, Greenwood street, Myrtle street, Highwood street, Campbell street, Oakland road from Nelson's to line, from oil tank on North street to Marston's bridge, Mountain road, River road. Also scraped mud off Water street from Boshan's store to Factory Hill and hauled it away.

## GRAVELED STREETS

There was a total of two thousand, seven hundred forty-seven (2,747) loads of gravel taken from the different pits during the past year. Besides there being numerous loads of gravel and filling taken from the city pit.

A large portion of this amount of gravel was used on the new gravel sidewalks, and the rest was used on the following streets: Bridge, Lockwood, Winter, Silver, Water, the whole length of Cool street, Chaplin street from railroad crossing to Ticonic street. Also graveled parts of several other streets.

## BRIDGES AND CULVERTS

There were numerous culverts and bridges repaired this year. Two culverts on Mason road, one on College avenue, two on Upper Main street, double planking on Emerson Stream bridge, two culverts on Boutelle avenue, with iron pipe, culvert on High street, built over bridge on High street and the one at the corner of High street and Drummond avenue, built culvert on Gilman street, two on Rangeway, and two on second Rangeway, two culverts on Burleigh street, new



plank on Brook street bridge, two culverts on Webb road. Repaired Cedar bridge, 23 ft., 8 inch pipe for driveway at Upper Main street, one 27 ft. 8 inch pipe on Greenwood street, 23 ft. 8 inch pipe on Appleton street. Spout 18 ft. long on Gilman street, five spouts on Prospect street, built over two culverts on Drummond avenue, built over bridge on Drummond avenue over Spring brook, built three culverts on River road, one on Eight Rod road, seven planked driveways on Main street. Also two wide planked driveways on Main street, seven planked spouts on Boutelle avenue, large culvert built of sleepers and timber, also one small culvert on Marston road. Also built fences around all the culverts on this road. On Eastern avenue, two new planked driveways, and eight long plank spouts. Nine planked spouts on Water street, two on Summer street, two 6 inch iron pipes on Silver street. Repaired iron rail on Ticonic bridge. Repaired the rail on Gilman street, around to Middle street, with a new post in corner.

### TICONIC BRIDGE

There was no special appropriation for the bridge, the contract being done by Mr. C. H. Fitzgerald under the direction of the street commissioner. The thoroughfare was planked, and the sidewalks were double planked with timber underneath.

## Public Schools

---

WATERVILLE, MAINE, February 1, 1912.

*To His Honor, the Mayor, the City Council, and the Citizens of Waterville:*

The following paragraphs will give you a brief report of the work which has been done in the public schools of Waterville during the fiscal year just ended. By vote of the Board of Education, I am preparing a much more elaborate report of the year's work than is possible to be inserted here, embracing as it will numerous tables of important comparative statistics and certain important recommendations for the consideration of the incoming board, the same to be printed and ready for general distribution the latter part of the present month.

### GENERAL SURVEY OF THE YEAR

From whatever standpoint the year's work in our public schools may be viewed it appears to have been unusually successful. There have been no serious interruptions of the work from any cause whatsoever, while pupils, teachers, school officials and citizens generally have seemed to coöperate heartily in an effort to promote progress in the schools. Happily, too, there has been no hostile spirit shown in recent months by the press of the city toward any of the school officials, and this fact has made it possible for those having authority to exercise it in ways which have proved most beneficial. That the year has been a successful one in so many respects and that a real step forward has been made is not to be construed to mean that we are yet within the circle of the ideal. We have simply made a near-approach.

### THE FINANCES

Your attention is first called to the financial statement given in connection with this report. The members of the Board of Education are the stewards of a large share of the funds of the municipality and to them the citizens rightly look for a wise expenditure of those



funds. At the opening of the last fiscal year a committee of the board waited upon your committee on appropriations and stated the sum needed to carry this department through the year. Under the existing financial condition of the city it did not seem expedient to appropriate the sum asked for, and neither did it seem expedient to the committee of the board to cut the school year to thirty-four weeks, as suggested, in order to make a saving of dollars to the city. As indicative of the care exercised by the Board in figuring the expenses of the last year it is interesting to note that the board, by prudent ordering of school supplies and careful examination of bills submitted, has kept within the appropriation asked for by nearly four hundred dollars.

During the past year the finance committee of the board, together with the superintendent, has met in regular session once each month to examine and approve the bills submitted to the department. Every bill thus presented for payment has been carefully inquired into before approval and whenever such bills have seemed exorbitant they have been held up for further consideration or scaled down. The same wise system of bookkeeping and of giving duplicate orders for supplies has been followed as in the previous year with the result that at any time it has been possible to ascertain the exact financial standing of the department. All orders for supplies have issued through the superintendent's office, and once each month the bills covering these orders have been called in so that from month to month the books have been practically cleaned up.

The following figures will prove of interest: For the year 1910-1911, the total expense of the public schools was \$45,045.24; for the year 1911-1912, the total expense was \$44,685.30. It therefore cost less by \$359.94 to run the department during the past year than in the year previous. A glance at the financial statement will show an overdraft in the High school account of \$657.16, and an overdraft in the common schools account of \$335.45, or a total overdraft of \$992.61. As explained above, this overdraft was occasioned by an insufficient appropriation. In addition to a loss in appropriation from the city, the state appropriated some \$500.00 less than was estimated to be due the city from the school fund and mill tax. The total resources for the High school were less this year by \$617.23, and for the common schools, by \$1,096.57. These facts will make clear that the overdrafts have not been caused by any extravagance in the use of the funds of the school department. The fact that our schools have cost less the past year by several hundred dollars, when as a matter of course the cost might well be expected to be increased over previous years, speaks well for those who have had to do with the management of this department of the city's business.

### THE TEACHING STAFF

A word may well be said in this brief report concerning the teaching staff. Two years ago attention was directed pretty largely to the work of the pupils of the school in an effort to study their needs, their proficiency, and their relationship to their teachers. As a result of this attention many helpful changes were made and adopted and these in turn have brought about much more conscientious work and the laying of a more secure foundation for their future educational training. During the past year, attention has been directed more largely to the work of the teachers, their needs, their proficiency, and their relationship to the pupils. They have been encouraged to take a livelier interest in those placed under their charge and to look upon them not as a mass but rather as individuals each with equipment, environment, training, and needs peculiar to itself. An effort has also been made to discover the really poor teachers, first by a study of their qualifications, largely through conferences with school principals, and second, by a study of the work of the pupils as they advance and a careful inspection of the ranks given. Such a study is bound to bring about most helpful conferences and at the same time determine with fairer accuracy what shall be the wages of the teachers and whether or not it is the part of wisdom to retain their services longer. Emphasis has



frequently been placed upon the need of constant training, the idea being that the municipality expects the best possible instruction by the best trained teachers. The adoption of the eligibility requirements by the board has done much to improve the standard of teaching. No teacher has been employed during the past year as a regular member of the teaching staff who has not had a college, normal school, or equivalent training. By reason of the uncertainty of the effect of the opening of the new parochial school it was deemed unwise by the board to engage more teachers than might possibly be needed for the year, and accordingly a number of substitutes were pressed into service. Inasmuch as the opening of the new school did not greatly affect the enrollment of the public schools, it was found necessary to continue a number of these substitutes on the regular staff. Their employment has given rise to the belief that the eligibility rule is of no consequence. Such of course is not the fact.

Several important meetings of the teachers have been held during the past year, and these, together with the frequent meetings of the principals, have tended to emphasize the common aims as well as the importance of the work with which, as teachers, they find themselves connected. In the success of these meetings and in all work that has from time to time been mapped out for them to do, the teachers have shown a splendid spirit of co-operation.

## HIGH SCHOOL

A report by the principal of the High school will be found in the special report of the school department to be published later. During the past year the High school has been most efficiently managed by the excellent corps of instructors in charge of the school, and this has been done despite the overcrowded condition of the building. A great amount of attention has been given to the work of raising the standard of the school by insisting upon more thorough work and better discipline, and the results have fully justified whatever efforts have been put forth. The several activities of the school have received careful oversight during the past year and a splendid wholesome school spirit has been fostered. It is unfortunate perhaps that a number of the students of the school have given up their course and found commercial employment, but it is important to note that in no instance has the fact of their leaving been due to any fault of the teachers. The causes assigned for leaving school have been numerous and it is hardly necessary to enumerate them here; but whenever it has been due to poor scholarship which has resulted from laziness, the authorities have advanced on the supposition that the school is no place for the boy or girl who refuses to work or who idles away his or her time.



It has seemed to the members of the board that too frequent changes in the principalship of the school is apt to work a distinct injury to the educational work, and because of this belief they entered into a tacit understanding with the present head of the school at the time of engaging his services that he should remain as principal so long as his work should prove satisfactory, and with the further understanding that a yearly increase of salary should be his so long as he should hold his position. The wisdom of such action cannot be gainsaid.

In the special report, certain recommendations in respect to the work done in the High school will be set forth.

### EVENING SCHOOLS

No work in connection with our schools receives so much favorable attention as that of the evening schools conducted for the working boys and girls. It has seemed oftentimes that too large a number of boys and girls were being given age and schooling certificates which permit them to find employment in our mills and to attend the evening schools; but to one at all conversant with the conditions in which these young people find themselves, it becomes surprising that an even greater number are not found with such certificates. Home conditions demand the granting of these certificates, and it is sound wisdom on the part of the board to make possible a fair education for these young people in the maintenance of the evening schools. Both schools for boys and for girls are taught by Colby students, and the progress which the pupils are making is most satisfactory. These schools have been run for the full term of thirty-six weeks and the additional expense occasioned by giving an education to 120 boys and girls will not be begrudged by any of our citizens.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

Gentlemen:—I submit the following report of the work in my department during the past year.

Upon taking the office I found many of the items listed in the 1909 report missing and the apparatus in a state of neglect, due in a large measure to the absence of a suitable place in which the delicate scales and standards could be kept. I have had an old set of drawers repaired and a cabinet made for the large office balance, now the property belonging to this department can be kept under lock and key and the sealer assured of the accuracy of the apparatus when wanted for immediate use.

During the past year I have tested 3752 milk bottles, condemning 528; also 148 large milk cans, 93 scales and 272 weights, all of which were adjusted, if needed, and sealed.

This department is now well equipped and will compare well with other cities of equal size, however I should recommend that a set of liquid test measures be procured, as those we have are light and unreliable and the standards have to be used to secure an accurate test.

A complete list of the apparatus is in the office of the City Treasurer.

### ALIEN LAW.

The repeal of this law took effect July 1, 1911. The State has been relieved of its liability for this class of paupers. A decrease of about \$800.00 in our receipts from the State for the last two quarters of 1911, was the result of this change in the law, and will henceforth call for an increase in the appropriation for support of the poor. Action on our Alien claims for \$3,381.02 has been postponed to the next Legislature.

### CONCLUSION.

I have striven hard to keep within the appropriation and in dispensing this help have tried to deal fairly with the needy and with the taxpayers. That widows with families of small children must be assisted



to some extent is a fact which can not be denied; but, when families consisting largely of adults apply, a firm refusal seems to be the best method to adopt. The cause of destitution in a number of cases can be easily traced to intemperance and immorality, and when it is considered how large a portion of our large towns and cities have but a narrow margin between them and pauperism, it is evident that any efforts which prevent the poor from spending their meagre earnings for that which brings poverty and want on their families should be hailed with delight by all who are desirous of the well being of their fellows.

To the Overseers, for the ever ready and valuable advice, and to all city officials for their courteous assistance, I desire to offer my sincere thanks. Appreciation is also due to charitable organizations and individuals whose generosity have helped people to maintain themselves who would otherwise have called on this department for aid.

The apparatus consists of one steam fire engine, one two-horse hook and ladder truck, one two-horse hose wagon, three one-horse hose



wagons, four hose pungs, two one-horse supply sleds, two one-horse dump carts, one rubbish rack, one four-wheeled hand reel, one two-wheeled hand reel, two 50 foot extension ladders, not carried on the truck, one deluge set, etc.

Also there has been purchased an excellent 55 foot trussed extension ladder, one 40-foot straight trussed ladder, one 30-foot trussed roof ladder, two Boston play pipes, and the fire steamer has been overhauled and other minor improvements made.

### HORSES.

There are seven horses in the department all of which are in use by the Fire Department. There are several horses which will have to be replaced in the near future as they are fast going by their days of usefulness.

### HOSE.

There has been added to the department this year 500 feet of new hose purchased of the American LaFrance Fire Engine Co., of Elmira, N. Y., and there should be added this year at least 1000 feet more.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

In closing this report I am pleased to say that we have accomplished this year what we have been hammering after for the past ten years, and I have only one regret which I shall mention here. Had the City Governments, under which I have served, listened to me we should have had the present new central fire station located on the lot now occupied by the Waterville Motor Company. I feel assured that the public would have been better pleased, the expense would have been less and the accommodations some better than under the conditions which now prevail. But dropping the matter here, I wish to thank all of those who have assisted in any manner in getting the results we now have, and I want to personally say right here that these results have been brought about by no other than our present honored Mayor William R. Pattangall.

I wish to state that the overdraft in this department this year has been caused by the changing over from the old station and having to board the department horses and to rent quarters for the apparatus; also by repairs made on the steamer, the buying of new ladders and the assistance given to Bangor.



In conclusion, I wish to state that the department has responded to 92 alarms for this year and that the damage accruing from the same has been larger than usual.

The first serious fire was the Darrah-Stewart on Feb. 4th, which caused a total loss of upwards of \$20,000.

The next fire occurred March 11th, in the dormitory at Colby College, causing a loss of \$7,000.

On Sunday, April 30th, at 5.28 P. M., we received a telegram from the city of Bangor, asking for all possible assistance. I responded with the steamer No. 1 and hose No. 2 cart loaded with hose and 40 men. We rendered all possible assistance and did not arrive home until May 1st, at 9 A. M., a very tired company, but the experience gained in witnessing such a fire occurs but once in a lifetime with an ordinary fireman.

The next serious fire happened on Dec. 26th, at 6.30 P. M., at the Wardwell-Emery Company's store, causing a total loss from fire and water damage of about \$90,000.

The origin of all the above fires in the city are booked under the cause unknown, and I wish to say that, with one exception, fighting them effectively and properly was the hardest proposition in my experience since I have been connected with the fire department.

While the department has been criticised in regard to the methods used in the subduing of these fires, I personally feel confident that with the facilities at hand they were well handled and that the adjacent property was very carefully protected.

The experience gained by the members of the department in coping with these fires will be of great assistance in the future.

I trust this department may in the future secure from the public more cordial support in carrying out the city's building code relative to the construction of buildings and equipping the same with suitable fire escapes and in taking care of chimneys and the storage of explosives, particularly gasoline.

After having been so generously treated by the city and under the present condition of municipal finances, the fire department can hardly expect more than is absolutely necessary at present, but there is a pressing need to which I wish to call attention at this time, and this is the addition of a combination chemical truck to the equipment at the Central Station. This would mean an additional horse for Hose 2, but the truck would be so efficient in handling such a large class of fires, I believe a better investment could hardly be made, and hope that such a truck may be purchased at the first opportunity.
