## MAYOR'S ADDRESS

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*Gentlemen of the City Council:*

I desire to present to you a brief summary of the work of the year, together with some suggestions concerning the immediate future which may be of value to our successors.

Following out the policy which we outlined a year ago, we have continued to make such permanent improvements as the needs of the city seemed to demand, in so far as we have been able to do so.

Early in the year we completed the Central Fire Station, expending upon the building and lot about \$5000. We have laid out some \$2000 in connection with the City Hall and the Armory building; paved Main street from the railroad crossing down to the corner of North street, at an expense of about \$6000; built Hayden Brook sewer up to a point some forty feet beyond Gilman street, at a cost of over \$6000; built almost a mile of state road, costing \$6400, of which the state paid \$2975; and completed and furnished the new High School building, expending in this latter connection about \$50,000.

Besides these more important matters we have invested nearly \$2000 in new sewers and have put in about \$1000 worth of new concrete sidewalks on our business streets.

These various items of permanent improvement cost the city a total of approximately \$75,000.

Had we attempted to pay for them all in one year our tax rate would have been 30 mills on the dollar. All of these things were needed. It was out of the question to pay for them by direct taxation in one year. We did pay one-third of the amount out of our current revenue. The balance of \$50,000 we financed by increasing the bonded debt of the city \$20,000, which amount must be paid in 1933, and by carrying \$30,000 additional current indebtedness.

During the past two years this city has invested \$125,000 in permanent improvements. It has increased its net debt about \$70,000. We have paid in cash during that time on these matters \$55,000. We have, at the same time, slightly decreased our tax rate. It would seem as though this was a business record which should appeal to our taxpayers.



Every department in the city has made a record for economy and good management. An examination of the report of the street department will surprise those who so readily criticise that with which they are unfamiliar, both as to the amount of work done and the cost of the work; the poor department could not have been handled better; the fire department has been as carefully conducted as has any private business in the city; the police department has been placed on a basis which shows a saving of about \$1000 annually as compared with the old fee system; the school board has faithfully and efficiently attended to its duties; the collection of taxes has been promptly and thoroughly attended to; no just criticism can be made of the work of any of our city officials.

Some extraordinary expenses were obliged to be incurred other than those for permanent improvements. Among other things the city expended in elections last year between \$3500 and \$4000. Next year the expense under this head should not exceed \$700 or \$800. The money thus saved can be put to at least as useful a purpose as holding an extra election on an average of once in three months.

In speaking of the work accomplished during this and the preceding year I do not mean to be boastful, least of all do I take credit for myself for it. A mayor is only one city official, a cog in the wheel, that is all. The members of the city government, the members of the school board, serving all of you without pay, the heads of departments and minor officials, working for moderate salaries, are the men who do the real work and should be credited with the results. But I am not recalling your work to your minds simply for the purpose of praising you. We are not members of a mutual admiration society. I speak of it because, too often, the business side of a city administration is forgotten and personalities instead of results made the basis of support or opposition.

Next year there is work for some one to do. No great expenditures like those for the High School building or the Central Fire Station confront the incoming administration, but there are matters of importance which must be undertaken and carried through if the city is to continue to progress.

A new and thoroughly equipped fire alarm system has become a necessity. By the report of your committee such a system will cost \$8000. If that amount is needed for this purpose it should be appropriated. Hayden Brook sewer should be extended at least as far as North street. Our sidewalks are not in good shape. They should be generally repaired and on certain streets entirely rebuilt. Certain sections of the city are sadly in need of better sewerage facilities. These should be provided. The state road is now complete from the Fairfield line to Post Office Square. The next section, according to the plans of the State Highway Commissioner, runs through Elm street to Western



avenue. The state will assist in the expense of building this section. It should be a permanent, first class job. The new High School lot must be graded. Some measures should be taken to get rid of the great number of unnecessary poles which encumber our streets and in some instances almost block them up.

All of these things *must* be done. There are some other things which *ought* to be done. Among the chief of these is the arranging in some way for a playground for our boys and young men. We spend so much time in formulating statutes and city by-laws forbidding our young people doing things that we are quite apt to forget that they must do something. Not all of them can have access to the college or academy athletic fields. There ought to be some place where they can go and enjoy outdoor play, and it is a matter which might well attract the attention of a city government acting in co-operation with such organizations as the Young Men's Christian Association.

These are the main things which appeal to me at present as likely to engross the attention of an incoming administration, excepting, of course, the matter of finance, which is always important and always with us.

A year ago I believed that at this time we could safely recommend reducing our tax rate to 20 mills. That is not feasible. At that time we planned to only finish and furnish a portion of the High School building, intending to expend \$20,000 or thereabouts in so doing. This was not deemed wise and we have expended \$50,000 in completing the entire plant. Because of this it will be impossible to make so great a reduction in the tax rate as was planned. But it should be reduced.

The effort should be kept up to bring our rate to 20 mills. A low tax rate is one of the best advertisements a city can have. It is entirely feasible to make next year's rate 22 mills instead of 23 mills as at present and  $23\frac{1}{2}$  as for many years prior to 1912.

Such a rate will give us a total income from property and poll taxes, together with miscellaneous income, of \$177,000.

The balance, together with what can be saved in the different departments should be applied to reducing current loans.

While it might be necessary to change this schedule somewhat in details, it will serve as a practical basis in making appropriations for next year. It is based on the needs of each department as they appear at the present time and may prove of considerable value to our successors.

I cannot close the year's work without a personal word of thanks to you gentlemen who have treated me so courteously during the year and who have relieved me of much of the work to which I should have given my personal attention. Our relations have been most pleasant and singularly devoid of disagreeable incidents. Nor can I refrain from again expressing my admiration for the city which we have been serving. Waterville is destined to grow in population and wealth, and as it grows larger and richer will be able to accomplish, as a municipality, more, each year, for its citizens, but the future must have good indeed in store for it and for all of us who live within its borders, if it can grow more beautiful, more enterprising and more hospitable.

It stands at the forefront today in all that makes a community worth living in. Its people are united in a patriotic desire to make it all that a city ought to be. No matter in what other respects they differ in opinion they all love and believe in their city. It has a past to be proud of, a future filled with hope. It is for us in the present to do all that we can to be worthy of that past and to do our part toward making the future what it ought to be.

## City Solicitor's Report

---

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

The claim of Hanson, Webber & Dunham for their right of way which is covered by the Armory has never been adjusted. An agreement was reached with them by which they were to deed to the City their present right of way and accept therefor a deed of a right of way between the Armory and City Hall. But the heirs of Hall C. Burleigh also have a right of way over the same land and they are not willing to exchange it for one between the Armory and City Hall. As the right of way of the heirs of Hall C. Burleigh can be extinguished by opening a court at the rear of the buildings on the East side of Main street through to Temple street and they thereby made liable, by the warrantee deed of Hall C. Burleigh of the land where the Armory is located, which makes no mention of the right of way at that time owned by Hanson, Webber & Dunham, to answer for any damages which Hanson, Webber & Dunham may recover, it does not seem wise to settle the claim of Hanson, Webber & Dunham unless that of the heirs of Hall C. Burleigh can be settled at the same time.

The action of the City against Elias Catel, et als., on a penal bond was settled by the payment of ten dollars to the City.

C. H. Nelson has an action for five hundred dollars against the City pending in the Superior Court for injuries caused by an alleged defect in the highway.

I have brought two actions against the town of Castine for pauper supplies. In one case the defendant town failed to deny the pauper within the statutory period.

## Board of Health Report

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Government of Waterville:*

GENTLEMEN:—The Board of Health begs leave to submit the following report for the year ending January 31, 1913.

Contagious diseases have been reported as follows:

Measles .....	27
Diphtheria .....	12
Scarlatina .....	14
Typhoid fever .....	11

Nuisances have been reported to the number of 55, practically all of which have been abated.

For a long time there has been complaint made by citizens in certain sections of the city, against the prevalence of butchering. This practice has given much trouble and annoyance to the Board of Health, especially during the summer months. After much consideration and work, it was decided to regulate this practice as far as possible. The following ordinances were submitted to the City Government and adopted in due form.

The following is a copy of the order as it received passage at the January meeting of the government and which is now in force:

No person shall slaughter or butcher any cattle or domestic animals, fowl excepted, in that part of Waterville embraced within the following bounds, except as provided by law, unless permission be given in writing by a member of the Board of Health:

Beginning at the point where the Fairfield and Waterville line touches the Kennebec River, thence running westerly along said Waterville and Fairfield line to Drummond Ave., thence southerly along said Drummond Ave., to Webb Ave., thence westerly along said Webb Ave., to Main St., thence from the junction of said Webb Ave. and Main St., in a straight line to the dwelling house of Josiah W. Morrell on Western Ave., thence in a straight line to the junction of the Oakland road and Cool St., thence in a straight line to the Chase dam across the



Messalonskee stream, thence in a straight line in the direction of the residence of Benjamin F. Chaffee in Winslow to the Kennebec River, thence by the Kennebec River to the point of beginning.

In accordance with this ordinance each member of the Board of Health is provided with blanks and permits are issued to any responsible party who wishes to do butchering for a limited time only. At present, it is impossible to say how this regulation will work out but thus far it seems to be satisfactory.

Much complaint has been made against the dumping of rubbish promiscuously about the city, especially along the line of the Hayden Brook sewer on Winter street, the West street bridge, Gilman and Middle streets. Thus far it has been impossible to control this practice as city truckmen are doing this during the night, and it is impossible to find out who they are.

As this best means of controlling this at present, we would suggest that suitable fences be erected around these places which can be done at slight expense to the city, thereby saving much annoyance to the citizens living in these localities and possible sickness.

## Engineer's Report

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WATERVILLE, MAINE, Feb. 13, 1913.

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit a report of the work done in this department for the past year, during my term of office.

### SEWERS.

Common street, 74 ft. of 8-inch sewer, 1 man-hole.

Hayden Brook Sewer. A section of Hayden Brook sewer was built without line, grade or inspection from this department.

### STATE ROAD.

A survey, plan and profile was made for the section of State road along College Avenue from the end of the road as built in 1911 to the Fairfield line, a distance of 5200 feet. The construction was done without line or grade from this department.

### MAIN STREET PAVING.

Line and grade was given for paving Main street from North street to the Maine Central Railroad crossing, a section 660 feet in length, 48 ft. in width, containing 3520 sq. yds. The inspection of this was done under the inspection and superintendent of the street commissioner.

### NEW SIDEWALKS.

Main Street. Line and grade was given for granolithic walk on the easterly side of Main street and the following quantities represent the amount of work done by Charles H. Barton: Granolithic walk laid 297.3 sq. yds.; curb re-set, 278 lin. ft.; curb re-cut, 129 lin. ft.



Silver Street. Line and grade was given for new sidewalks on the northerly side of Silver street and the following quantities were done by Chas. H. Barton: Granolithic work laid, 111.2 sq. yds; curb re-set, 73.5 lin. ft.; curb recut, 101 lin ft.

Lockwood Street. The north and easterly line of Lockwood street was re-located and a line and grade given for a section of granolithic walk 101.55 ft. in length. This work was done and paid for by Henry Barney, the city paying for concrete curbing which was necessary on account of extra depth of curb being needed.

Pleasant Street. A survey was made for a sidewalk on the westerly side of Pleasant street extending from Gilman street to the northerly line of the Sacred Heart Church property.

In addition to the above line and grade was given for ganolithic work as laid out by my predecessor around the Central Fire Station and Waterville Motor Co.'s garage. This work necessitated the construction of a new catch basin in the rear of the Fire Station for the drainage of the wash stand and the changing of the sewer connection.

I would like to call the attention of the citizens and tax payers to the fact that the amounts of money which appear in the City Reports as having been paid to the City Engineer, include all expense, such as pay for assistance, office materials and other incidentals, which items are no small percentage of the whole amount. With this in mind you will understand that only a portion of these amounts represents pay for the City Engineer's time.

We are gaining each year on the number of monuments which mark street corners and angles and I hope to see the time in the not distant future when every street corner and angle will be distinctly marked by a permanent monument which shall be plainly visible to anyone having occasion to use the same.

## Free Public Library

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WATERVILLE, ME., Jan. 31, 1913.

*To the Honorable, the Mayor and the City Council:*

The Trustees of the Public Library beg leave to submit their report for the year ending with this date.

The work of the Library has been maintained at the usual high standard and in some respects the records of past years have been surpassed. The Library staff has remained the same. Miss Mary Helen Caswell as Librarian and Miss Jennie M. Smith as assistant Librarian, have rendered the same careful, intelligent, courteous and helpful attention to the wants of the patrons of the Library which has characterized their work in the past and which makes it of increasing value. Philip Brown still wears the laurel of an efficient janitor and caretaker, and has saved the city many dollars by his resourcefulness.

The circulation will be found remarkably large for a city of the size and conditions of Waterville. The character of the books drawn shows that the Library is rendering a large aid to the practical as well as the literary side of life.

The great need of the Library as emphasized in the report of the Book Committee, is more money for the purchase of books and the upkeep of those already installed.

Despite the large use of the Reading and Reference rooms, it is doubtful if the citizens generally at all realize that the best of the magazines and papers are in the one, and the best of the general reference books in the other, for free use. Many are doing without, what the City has carefully and generously provided for them.

In accord with what has been found advantageous in other cities the Trustees have recently voted that,—

“When any person or organization shall contribute the sum of one thousand dollars for the purchase of books for the Library, either for some special department, or for the general increase of the library, the name of the donor or other name chosen by him or her shall appear



in every book thus purchased, and shall be given to one of the alcoves in the Library. This will enable those interested in the work the Library is doing for the City, to make an important and permanent contribution to its success, and if desired, build up some department in which the donor is personally interested. It will also afford opportunity to provide for self or friend a very valuable and permanent memorial.

Your Trustees commend the above plan to the wealthy people of the City, and ask their investigation. It can readily be shown that the Public Library is rendering an unique and very important service to the City and that those prominent in the City's life can nowhere else have so fitting a memorial.

Smaller gifts also are greatly desired. Your Trustees highly appreciate the gifts made by individuals during the past year, but the number of such gifts is very small in comparison with the number of those who should be interested in the Library and who make use of its facilities.

Arrangements have just been made for coöperation between the Public Library of the City, and the Library of the Waterville Historical Society, the Library of Colby College and the Library of Coburn Classical Institute whereby the splendid resources of all these libraries are made available to any citizen for the purpose of serious study and research. It is a matter of congratulation that the great collections at Colby are thus opened to any person who desires to do serious work or who is conducting some special investigation.

The Trustees would call special attention to the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the Library Building be placed on the same basis as the other buildings owned by the City and used by its Departments, and be maintained directly by the City, viz: that the City should pay for its heating and lighting. This would make possible the use of the whole appropriation for the direct purposes of the Library.

The reports of the Librarian, the Treasurer and the several committees are appended.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

*To the Board of Trustees of the Waterville Public Library:*

I have the honor to submit the sixteenth annual report of the Waterville Public Library for the year ending January 31, 1913.



The year just passed has been marked by no unusual increase in any department of the Library activities. The various lines of work have been carried on much as in former years and no new experiments have been tried. Our aim has been to make the Library attractive both to the reader coming for recreation and for the one coming for more serious work and if possible to let no one go away with his demands unsatisfied.

### LOAN DEPARTMENT.

Although the circulation of books for home use has been slightly less than last year this can not be taken as an absolute index of the Library's usefulness as it is in a measure accounted for by the fact that a much larger number of persons have made use of the books for reference purposes in the Library building instead of taking them home as heretofore. The total number to be loaned was 38,587; they were divided into the following classes:

## REFERENCE ROOM.

Perhaps on no one department of our library work is more stress laid than on the reference work. More and more each year students and borrowers of every class come to this room for help in investigating subjects of study and all possible assistance is cheerfully given them and the habit encouraged. We have tried in every way to co-operate with the teachers in the public schools.

A course of talks is now being given in the High School to the freshman and sophomore classes instructing them in the use of books as tools in their school work and how to obtain the desired material from the library. These talks are being made a regular part of the course in English.

A similar course is being planned for the teachers in the lower grades.

As in years gone by, much work has been done with the various clubs both in our own and neighboring towns and a spirit of mutual helpfulness has been fostered.

We have endeavored to co-operate with the other libraries both in our own and in near by towns and in this way we have obtained many books otherwise unobtainable.

The total number of persons to use the room has been 2206.



## CATALOGING.

The number of books added this year has exceeded even the record-breaking number of last year, the total number to be added being 867. Of this number 714 were added by purchase, 153 by gift. 52 were replacements of books worn out.

## REPORT OF BOOK COMMITTEE.

WATERVILLE, Jan. 30, 1913.

The Book Committee takes pleasure in reporting that the number of books purchased during the year considerably exceeds the average of the annual additions, though it is still far below the number needed to meet the demands and needs of the circulation. The demand for new fiction, the committee has sought to meet by providing nearly all the books that have had the best critical approval.

Several new works have been placed in the Reference Room, notable among which is the newly revised Century Dictionary and Cyclopedia. The Reference Room will deserve a large expenditure of money during the next year. The most of the Cyclopedias have been in use for ten years. The publishers recognize the fact that a cyclopedia becomes out of date in ten years and are issuing new editions. These new editions should be supplied and though the expense is large, it is warranted by the large and constant use of the reference books for serious study. The old edition of the Century Dictionary Atlas and Cyclopedia, has been placed in the new High School building where it will be in constant use.

As the more popular books are in constant circulation, they are soon worn out and must be discarded or rebound or re-placed. This involves a large expense which must be met if the Library is kept up to the standard. The sum set aside by the trustees for this purpose, \$125 must be regarded as a fixed charge.

The Book Committee gratefully acknowledge the splendid gifts of the Waterville Woman's Club, without its assistance we could not have made the excellent showing in books added during the year. Several individuals have made gifts which are greatly appreciated. It would be a great advantage to the people of the City if very many more would contribute either books or the money for their purchase.

The books requested by the patrons of the Library, the Committee has in nearly all instances been able to secure. Special attention has been given to the requests of teachers in the public schools.

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**REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.**

WATERVILLE, MAINE, February 3, 1913.

*To the Trustees of Waterville Public Library:*

The Finance Committee of the Waterville Public Library beg leave to say that they have examined the accounts, books and vouchers of the Treasurer as well as the financial transactions connected therewith, for the fiscal year ending January 31st, 1913, and find as follows:

The total receipts for the year are \$3,152.12, which together with cash on hand February 1st, 1912, amounting to \$265.09, makes a grand total of \$3,417.21.

Checks and vouchers of the Treasurer, which we have examined and checked, show a total expenditure of \$3,304.40 which with the cash on hand Jan. 31, 1913, amounting to \$112.81, shows his account in balance.

The Trust fund of the Library amounting to \$500.00 is represented by a book of deposit of the Waterville Savings Bank in the hands of the President.

Your Finance Committee find that the cost of maintenance for the past year has materially increased because of the added price of both fuel and lights. It is manifestly impossible to maintain the Library without these two very important commodities neither is it possible to materially lessen these items of expense.

The City can well afford to relieve the Library of this burden, and the Committee earnestly suggests that the City government be requested to take upon itself this essential annual expenditure.



It is very evident to those who are in position to know, that there is a rapidly growing use for this very important department of the City of Waterville. The Committee and the Trustees have ever been mindful of this and have felt the necessity of larger appropriations; but because of other and increasing demands, to which the City Government has felt obliged to listen, the claims of this Institution have not perhaps been sufficiently urged.

The Committee believes that to maintain the Library anywhere near its rightful position, a vigorous demand should be made that its necessities receive the kind of attention which will produce results.

Relieved of the cost of fuel and lights, there would be in the neighborhood of \$600.00 which would materially enhance its book-purchasing power, thus adding to its importance and usefulness. The Committee would also urge that the Trustees consider seriously at this time the fact, that both the Librarian and assistant are not adequately compensated and suggest that some action be taken looking toward a substantial increase.

## Streets and Sewers

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Waterville:*

I herewith submit for your consideration my report for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1913, on Streets, Sewers, Sidewalks and State Road. I wish to call your attention to the financial table showing the receipts and expenditures of the various departments and the summaries of the labor performed on the various streets and highways.

The necessary improvements have been many. There has been a number of permanent improvements this year, such as building 5,100 ft. on the State Road, 664 ft. on the Hayden Brook sewer, and paving Main St. from North St. to R. R. crossing. You will please find in this report a brief summary of the work done in the various department. I have used my best endeavor to superintend the work coming under my jurisdiction, and using the strictest economy to keep within my appropriations. The necessary improvements have been many, and I have done my best to have them done in as permanent a manner as possible.

There was a total of five thousand seven hundred eighty-three (\$5783) loads of gravel used this year. Part of which was used on new sidewalks, part on the streets which are named here, and numerous other streets and sidewalks which had minor repairs.

There were a lot of repairs made to the Marston road this year. Starting at the point of the hill, just beyond Dr. Bunker's farm, it was cut down a foot and over. Filling from Mrs. Davis' to the bridge from 8 inches to 6 ft. deep, taking the sag out of the road and making a true grade to the bridge. The road was also ditched. One-half of the bridge being in Waterville it was wharfed up with sleepers. The fence on each side was newly built. On the end of the bridge the road was filled from 3 to 5 feet deep. The culvert was built at the same time. Beginning at Mr. Stetson's on the same road cutting down a pitch in the road and filling from the flat below the old school house to lower side of hill beyond Mr. Stanley's on Western Ave., using over four thousand (4000) loads of gravel in all improvements, it costing about \$2,000.00.

Main St. was paved this year from North St. to R. R. crossing, although the money didn't come out of the street appropriation, the work was done under the direction of the street commissioner. Main St. was graveled from R. R. crossing to Boutelle Ave. The sidewalk on the east side was graveled from North St. to R. R. crossing.



Upper Main St. was turnpiked from Ridge road to the Terry Farm.

Spruce St. was graveled and the sidewalks were also graveled part of the way. Quite a lot of new graveled sidewalk was built on Drummond Ave. The bridge on Drummond Ave. was newly planked and all new timber, with fences built on both sides. There was gravel used in the run to hoist the street so as to turn the water from the road. Eastern Ave. was graveled the entire length. Also graveled the sidewalk. New gravel sidewalk built from Eastern Ave. to College Ave. May St. was graveled between Oak and High Sts. Oakland road has been turnpiked and ditched from Baldic's to Oakland line, and there were three hundred (300) loads of gravel used. The entire length of Heath St. was graveled and also a new gravel sidewalk. Bartlett St. was graveled the whole length. Burleigh St. being graveled from a little below Heath St. to Mr. Atwood's house. Also from Mr. Thurston's to Mr. Jepson's line where the street was made fifteen feet wide. The side was also graveled the same distance. A gravel sidewalk from the new High school to West St. From West to Middle St. North St. the sidewalk was graveled from Pleasant St. to Middle St.

Besides the gravel sidewalks there has been granolithic-walks laid on Silver St., on Main St. from Luques store down and from the Empire Rink to Mr. Hussey's line.

There were a lot of culverts and bridges repaired, some of which are two culverts built over and planked on the Mason road, two newly planked water spouts, 40 ft. long, out by Mr. J. J. Pray's farm; seven water spouts on Eastern Ave; two on Burleigh St. Down on the River road the stone culvert in front of the church was made over and newly planked. One planked on the Cross road by Mr. Trafton's.

The pile bridge on Gilman St. was newly planked and was reenforced with new timber. Five water spouts on Boutelle Ave., four on upper Main St., five on Drummond Ave. Plank culvert on Eight Rod road. The iron bridge at the lower end of Silver St. was newly planked.

The culvert at the junction of Grove and Silver Sts. was all built over new, and a new culvert on High St.

There was a new sewer built on Common St., with one man hole, one catch basin on Burleigh St., one on College Ave., one on Gold St. There were nine man holes which had to be built over and hoisted up. Eleven catch basins built over and hoisted. The sewers in most all parts of the city being cleaned out, among some, were, the largest part of them on the Plains, on Morrill Ave., the northern part of the city, and Hayden Brook sewer, and they are in a better condition than they have been for a long time, in regard to the sand, etc., being cleaned out of them. Besides there were a lot of roots taken out.

There was oil used on some of the streets this year. College Ave. from Walnut St. down to Main St., Main St. from North St. down to



the foot of Lockwood hill, and Common, Bridge and Lockwood Sts. The work was done under the direction of the street commissioner, and the oil proved very successful for what there was used. It would be a great saving to the streets if it was used every year.

## Public Schools

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WATERVILLE, MAINE, February 1, 1913.

*To His Honor, the Mayor, the City Council, and the Citizens of Waterville:*

I have the honor of hereby presenting to you my first annual report as superintendent of the schools of the City of Waterville.

Taking up the duties of this office less than five months ago, I shall confine myself to a brief statement of the receipts and expenditures in the school department for the year, of the steps that have been taken during these five months toward the advancement and improvement of the schools of our city, and of the plans and recommendations for further improvement.

A comparison of the common school expenses of this year with those of last year shows an increase of \$1427.96. This increase occurs in the following items, teachers' salaries, \$677.34; text-books and supplies, \$252.46; janitors' wages, \$297.64; fuel, \$1163.09; cleaning, \$73.39, and conveying, \$20. The other items show a decrease.

Slightly higher wages have been paid this year, made necessary by the increased cost of living. This accounts for the increase in the amounts paid for teachers' salaries, janitors' wages, cleaning and conveying. The increase in the cost of fuel is accounted for by the higher cost of coal and the extreme cold weather of last winter. The extra amount paid for text-books and supplies is, I believe, a wise expenditure as it is surely false economy to provide laborers with poor and insufficient tools.

High school expenses show an increase of \$451.14 over last year. The added expenditures occurs as follows: Teachers' salaries, \$254.43; text-books and supplies, \$87.29; janitors' wages, \$23.43; fuel, \$248.83; cleaning, \$27.03, and cartage, \$7.16. The other items show a decrease, that of miscellaneous expenses shrinking from \$182.20 to \$49.04. These increases are accounted for in the same manner as those in the common school department.



True economy in school affairs does not consist in running the schools as cheaply as possible but in providing that they render as effective service as possible with the smallest waste of money and effort. This is the policy of the present school administration.

The most significant event in school affairs in this city for the past year was the completion and occupation of the new high school building. By the opening of this beautiful, commodious and thoroughly modern building, the problem of accommodations for the increasing high school population of our city, a problem which has been pressing for solution for many years, has been solved. It must indeed be gratifying to the people of this city that they can point with pride instead of apologies to their high school building. With this building, a strong corps of teachers, and the equipment which this city has given evidence of a willingness to furnish, our high school should become second to none in the State in the point of the efficiency of its service to the people's needs.

An extra teacher has already been engaged for the high school to assist in the commercial department. New typewriters have been purchased and commercial desks installed in the new building, thus bringing this department into efficient condition.

A new course was added to our school system by the introduction of domestic science on Jan. 6, 1913. A room was fitted up in the basement of the high school building and furnished through the generosity of the Woman's Club of Waterville. Our equipment for this course is probably the equal of that of any city or town in the State. An instructor who was thoroughly trained at Simmons College was engaged and is at present teaching the girls of the high school and ninth grade in cooking and those of the seventh and eighth grades in sewing.

The removal of the high school pupils to the new building enabled us to relieve somewhat the crowded condition of the three grammar buildings by transferring the pupils of the ninth grades to the Pleasant street building. Several of our buildings, however, are still too crowded and several of the teachers have still too many pupils to enable the latter to accomplish all that they ought.

An important step in the improvement of the grading of our schools has been taken in the establishment of the system of semi-annual promotions. By this system pupils are promoted twice a year instead of once a year, and if a child does not pass into the next grade he goes over for a second time not the work of an entire year, but of a half year.

The course is rendered still more flexible in grades one and two by the division of each school into small classes, divided according to ability and advancement, and by allowing each division to advance as fast as its ability will permit, and by promoting its members whenever



they have accomplished the required work. I am confident that these changes will enable the majority of pupils to complete the common school course in eight years instead of nine.

In the conviction that pupils can progress faster and more satisfactorily if they follow a course of study based upon the order of subjects in the authorized text-books, the teachers have been instructed to follow in general not the printed course of study but the order of subjects in the text-books, supplemented by instructions from the superintendent.

All modern courses in reading are based upon a definite system of phonetic drill. A large amount of work and study along this line has been done to bring the teaching of reading in our schools to its proper efficiency.

A change has been made in the recesses and hereafter all recesses, whenever possible, will be outdoor recesses.

The evening school sessions have been increased in length to one and a half hours. College students have been hired for the men's and boys' division and lady day-school teachers for the girls' division.

An attempt is being made to place the discipline in all rooms upon the sound basis of teaching the pupils to have too much respect for themselves and their parents to do that which is detrimental to the school and to their schoolmates.

Earnest and persistent efforts have been made to have every child of school age attend some school regularly. The work of our truant officer, Mr. Peter Murphy, is to be commended for its faithfulness and efficiency.

Medical inspection in our schools, begun last year, has been continued. It is planned before the close of the school year to have a physical record of every pupil, secured by personal examination and recorded on cards kept at the office. It is hoped by this means to accomplish something definite and of real value in building up and maintaining the physical health of our school children.

## RECOMMENDATIONS AND PLANS.

First. The city has taken a forward step in the establishment of a course in domestic science. This advance should be completed by the introduction of a course in manual training. The equipment for such a course would cost at the start about \$500 and the State will reimburse the city for two-thirds of the salary of the instructor.

Second. Some means should be taken to relieve the crowded condition of Myrtle Street and North Grammar schools. This can be done in the best way by erecting a new school building on Upper Main



Street. A temporary relief could be obtained by adding a second story to the Brook Street school.

Third. Every city of the size of Waterville should maintain an ungraded school. This school should be taught by one of our best teachers, should contain not more than fifteen pupils at any one time, and its purpose should be to give special instruction to those pupils who are far behind in their grade pupils of like age and to receive pupils who come from other schools and do not fit into any grade and by drilling these pupils upon the subjects in which they are lacking enable them to do grade work to advantage. One of these schools could be established at the Pleasant Street school.

Fourth. In order that medical inspection may accomplish its best results, work needs to be done in following up the cases needing attention and by visiting the homes secure for the children the treatment and care needed. This could best be accomplished by a school nurse.

Fifth. A re-organization of the evening school is planned that this work may be of more value to those who take it and that more may take advantage of the opportunity of these schools.

Sixth. A reading circle is being started for the encouragement of professional reading and study on the part of the teachers.

Seventh. The adoption of the National System of Office and School records is recommended, thus making our records uniform with those of the leading cities of the United States. This renders educational statistics more accurate and valuable and makes possible an intelligent study of many school problems.

Eighth. The Board of Education has already voted that the school census shall hereafter be kept in a permanent form that it may be more useful and reliable than heretofore.

Ninth. The subjects of playgrounds for the children of our public schools is receiving increased attention throughout our nation. It is hoped that Waterville will not be behind in this needed reform.

Tenth. Some provision must be made whereby the salaries of our teachers may be increased the coming year. The general upward trend of the salaries of teachers in other cities must be met by this city if we are to retain the services of the efficient teachers whom we must have in order to maintain the efficiency of our schools.

We acknowledge with gratefulness the gift of a new flag for the high school by the ladies of the G. A. R., of the equipment for domestic science by the Woman's Club, and of the two charts for the Domestic Science room by Mrs. F. C. Boothby of Portland.



In conclusion I wish to ask for your continued interest in our public schools. Every one who is connected with public school work admits that our public schools are far from perfect and every just criticism of them, made with a constructive purpose, will be gratefully received.

### FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The system this year has worked along by spells on an average with past years and it gives me great pleasure to write in this report that at the City Government meeting held on the 4th day of Feb., 1913, the City Government contracted with the Gamewell Fire Alarm and Telegraph Company of New York, for practically an entire new equipment at a cost of \$7800, and I am led to believe that when this equipment which is to be furnished by the above company is installed that the City of Waterville will have one of the best automatic fire alarm systems in New England.

### IMPROVEMENTS.

Improvements this year consist of the grading, concreting and paving of the ground around the Central Fire Station and the driveway and the building of a retaining wall and making a suitable walk to the side entrance of the Central Fire Station, also the painting of the stable in the rear of the Central Station and the buying of the necessary articles to keep the department up in as an efficient condition as the pecuniary circumstances will allow.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

In closing this report I am pleased to say that our new Central Fire Station has been a great pleasure to the members of the department and to the citizens of the city without exception. The department this year



has taken care successfully of all alarms that have been turned in and I have heard very little criticism offered by anyone in regard to its work.

Now I am to offer some recommendations which I personally believe should be adopted as soon as possible, keeping in view, however, the fact that this department of the city has been most generously treated in the last year or so, and with the outlay that is to come for the new fire alarm it may seem to some that this department should get along for some time without any more expense of an extraordinary nature, but during the next year there must be added one to two thousand feet of new hose, one pair of horses to replace the hook and ladder horses and there should also be added a combination chemical truck. This would mean an additional horse, as this piece of apparatus would need two horses. This combination chemical truck should be purchased this year at all hazards as the condition of Hose No. 2 truck is such that it is hardly safe for the men to ride in responding to an alarm and has been in service so long that it is useless to expend money on it for repairs, and I trust that the new city government will take this matter up and purchase a new truck early this season.

I also feel justified in saying that the officers of this department are not receiving as much as they should for their services. Their duties have increased to such an extent that it requires much more time now than in former years, and I am convinced that any fair committee upon investigation will agree with me in regard to this.

I wish to call the public's attention and solicit their support in carrying out the city's building code relative to the construction of buildings and equipping the same with suitable fire escapes and in taking care of chimneys in their homes and the storage of explosives, particularly gasoline.

After having been so generously treated by the present city government in regard to the new fire alarm and under the present conditions of municipal finances the fire department can hardly expect more than is absolutely necessary and I have not offered any of the above recommendations without the consideration and being sure that they were absolutely necessary.

Thanking all who have contributed pictures and other presents to the department during the past year, and soliciting their cordial support in the future, I remain,
