MAYOR'S ADDRESS

To the Members of the City Council:

I have the honor to present for your consideration a brief summary of the work done during the past year by the City Government. I have drawn up with some care a statement of the financial condition of the City of Waterville at the close of our fiscal year. In drawing up this statement it has been my intention to place the financial condition of the City before the taxpayers, if possible, in a concise and readily comprehensive form. This statement shows the financial condition of the City as it actually is.

It has always appeared to me that each administration should assume responsibility for all contracts to which it has committed the City, for all expenditures necessary to replace equipment destroyed by fire, and for all bills contracted during its tenure of office. All such items are properly chargeable, and to make an Auditor's Report of any value they should be included. No business house would think for a moment of contracting for the delivery of goods and actually receive the goods without including the price therefor among its liabilities.

The following is a statement of the financial condition of the City of Waterville as of February 10th, the close of the present fiscal year:

The item of \$27,287.44 carried among our liabilities represents the net cost figured on the basis of insurance necessary to replace the High School Building in as good condition as before the recent fire. The same is true with regard to the \$2,314.02 necessary to replace the contents of this building. The balances due on State and County Taxes are self-explanatory and since the drawing up of this statement, have been paid. \$4,800.00, which we have charged for the new motor fire apparatus, should most certainly be included among our liabilities, as we have received the goods and have not as yet paid for them. This statement sets forth all contracts to which the City is committed, all expenditures necessary to replace equipment, and there are no further commitments outstanding, save, of course, the current expenses for the present month which are properly chargeable to the ensuing year.

In drawing up the statement for the year 1913-14 I have very properly charged back, as liabilities of that year, three items viz., the Fire Alarm System, the Hanaford School and various sewer, sidewalk, and street building carried forward during that year. These items were, of course, credited as accomplishments of the year 1913-14 and they should properly be charged as liabilities of that year.

The actual net debt of the City of Waterville at the end of the year 1913-14 was \$417,437.88; at the end of the present year the net debt

is \$425,458.55, an increase in the net debt, chargeable to this administration, of \$8,020.67. For this increase we have to show permanent improvements to the value of \$25,458.57 viz., a section of the Hayden Brook Sewer, extending from North Street under the coal yard of G. S. Flood Co. to the railroad tracks near Sanger Ave., at a cost of \$6,822.02; the grading of the High School grounds at a cost of \$2,843.34; the construction of new sidewalks to the value of \$2,951.15; new sewers to the approximate value of \$3,000.00; the construction of a section of State Aid Highway at a cost of \$5,042.06; the addition to the Fire Department of a motor driver combination chemical costing \$4,800.00.

There seems to be no reason why the present tax rate of twenty-three mills should not be maintained during the ensuing year and there is even a possibility that it might be slightly reduced as there are no heavy expenditures devolving upon the next administration.

I shall not presume to make any suggestions for the guidance of the administration of next year except in one matter. I should recommend during the ensuing year the application of every available dollar from the City's income to the building of permanent highways within the City. Our present system of gravel construction does not adequately meet our requirements. Any water-bound road surface will go to pieces rapidly in the presence of a considerable amount of moisture and under heavy traffic. We must adopt in the near future some different system of construction. It is going to cost us heavily but will amply repay in decreased cost of up-keep. I have refrained from designating any section of State Aid Highway to be constructed during the ensuing year as every available dollar should be used in correcting conditions within the City Proper.

I wish to thank the members of the present City Government for their hearty coöperation and assure them that I look back upon the pleasant relations of the past year with no little satisfaction.

Board of Health Report

WATERVILLE, MAINE, February 9, 1915.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council, Waterville, Maine:

GENTLEMEN:—The Board of Health begs to submit its report for the year ending February 9, 1915.

Contagious diseases have been reported as follows:

Scarlet Fever, number of cases.....	3
Diphtheria, number of cases.....	37

The year has been characterized by a comparatively small amount of sickness in our city. Diphtheria having been the most prevalent, and this disease has prevailed chiefly among the school children, during the period when schools have been in session.

About the usual number of nuisances have been reported, the greater part of which have been abated. The Board of Health has found, upon investigation, that many of these complaints have been due to ill feeling between neighbors and in many cases we have deemed it advisable not to interfere as these cases seem to work out much better if let alone.

The crying need of this city is for a new health code which shall clearly define nuisances and any other deviation from sanitary methods of living and prescribed penalties to meet these conditions. Such a code is now in the process of construction and will soon be adopted, thereby making it much easier for the Board of Health to carry on its work and producing a corresponding improvement in sanitary conditions in the city.

For a long time it has been felt among the plumbers of the city as well as others more or less concerned, that the existing plumbing code should be revised to meet modern conditions, consequently the plumbing inspector, Mr. Pollard, under the direction of the Board of Health, has formulated an entire new plumbing code, which will be presented for your approval at an early meeting. We trust that this will make

it much easier to settle many controversies and make the work of the inspector of plumbing and plumbers much more easily carried on.

The question which has caused for many years the greatest amount of trouble for the Board of Health has been that of meat and market inspection, consequently the Health Department has adopted a set of regulations known as the Meat Code, a copy of which is herewith presented, which we believe, as completely as it is at present possible to do so, covers the whole field of meat and market inspection. Although from certain quarters, these regulations, since their adoption, have caused some criticism, we take pleasure in announcing that the farmers and butchers of the city and surrounding towns are complying with the requirements of the regulations in a very satisfactory manner, and we believe that after the system is thoroughly organized that it will result in bringing to our city a clean and sanitary supply of domestic meats.

The Board of Health adopted these regulations not with a feeling of animosity, but with a desire to establish a standard under which all producers of domestic meats, who bring their products to our city for sale may do so with the assurance that this regulation will place their products in equal competition with products shipped from other parts of the country.

To those of our citizens who have hesitated to buy domestic meats through fear that they were not inspected, we are now able to give the assurance that they can buy all domestic meat products and feel perfectly safe that they are free from disease. We recommend that the citizens promote the production of domestic meats by increasing the demand for them in this city. Following is the copy of the Meat Code.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

KNOWN AS THE MEAT CODE.

Regulating slaughter houses and meat markets; providing for the inspection of meats, meat food products, and fixing the charges therefore.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES.

Section 1. The walls and all exposed surfaces on the inside of slaughter houses must be washed or scraped as often as may be necessary to keep the premises clean and in proper sanitary condition. Painted walls must be repainted at least once a year; and the walls not painted must be calcimined or whitewashed at least once every three months.

Section 2. That where the floors or other parts of slaughter houses, or any part of the equipment thereof, are so old or in such condition that they cannot be readily made sanitary, they shall be removed and replaced by suitable material, or otherwise put in condition acceptable to the Board of Health and Meat Inspector.

Section 3. That all trucks, trays, and other receptacles, all chutes, platforms, racks, tables, knives, saws, cleavers, and all other tools, utensils and machinery used in moving, handling, cutting, chopping, mixing, canning or other process shall be thoroughly cleaned daily when in use.

Section 4. That all rooms where animals are killed, or where meat is handled, displayed or kept for any length of time, must be completely screened and all doors, windows, and other openings properly protected against flies.

Section 5. That all aprons, overalls, and other outer clothing of employees who handle meat in contact with such clothing, shall be made of material that is readily cleaned and made sanitary and shall be cleaned daily, when in use, or oftener if necessary. Employees who handle meat or meat food products shall be required to keep their hands clean.

Section 6. That all offal and refuse must be removed from slaughter houses on the day of the slaughtering and disposed of in a sanitary way.

Section 7. That all pens and enclosures in connection with any slaughter house must be kept in a sanitary condition, and no hogs or other animals shall be kept within one hundred and fifty feet of any slaughter house.

Section 8. That every new building erected for slaughtering purposes shall have floors of cement or concrete or asphalt, with proper declines for all rooms where carcasses are handled. The walls of the slaughtering rooms shall be of cement, concrete or asphalt for a height of at least five feet, above which point wood or any suitable material may be used. Suitable gutters shall be provided for carrying all blood,

water, and waste matter to a proper place of deposit, and all buildings for slaughtering shall be built under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Meat Inspector and Board of Health.

Section 9. That no person or persons shall sell or offer for sale in this city any meat intended for human consumption, whether slaughtered within such district or elsewhere, unless the same had first been inspected and approved by the meat inspector or assistant inspector or Board of Health of the City of Waterville, except meats, bearing the inspection stamp of the United States department of agriculture.

Section 10. That carts or vehicles in which meat or meat food products or fish are transported, peddled or delivered, shall be so constructed as to protect the meat from contamination by flies, dust or other extraneous matter; they must be washed daily and maintained in a sanitary and cleanly condition.

Section 11. That meat, whether entire carcasses, quarters or cuts thereof, shall not be conveyed through the streets, by teams or otherwise, unless properly wrapped or otherwise protected from contamination, and such covering shall be kept clean and sanitary.

Section 12. That no carcasses of hogs, cattle, calves, or sheep, shall be permitted to enter the City by express or freight or transported overland in any manner, unless thoroughly wrapped with clean paper or cloth and covered with clean burlap or a similar material, unless such imported meat, or meat food products are contained in a refrigerator car or such conveyance that can be sealed and kept fly and dust proof.

Section 13. That no person shall sell or offer for sale, any part of an animal carcass slaughtered when not in good health, or any decaying or unwholesome animal matter, or any article in which there has been used to any extent whatever, any such meat or meat food products with intent that the same may be used as animal food.

Section 14. That no keeper of a meat market or dealer in meats to be sold within the City limits shall keep in any meat market any refrigerator or ice box unless the same shall be lined with lead or some proper substance so as to be tight, and unless the same be provided with a pipe of lead, zinc, or copper leading therefrom to the proper waste pipe. No meat shall be hung wholly or partly within any street, lane, alley or sidewalk within the City limits, nor shall any blood, dirty water or other substance from such meat be allowed to run or fall over any such street, lane, alley or sidewalk.

Section 15. That no cattle, sheep or swine shall be killed for human food within the limits of the City of Waterville, while such cattle, sheep or swine are in a diseased, overheated, feverish or exhausted condition. No calf, or any part thereof which shall be less than four weeks old; and no lamb or any part thereof which shall be less than eight weeks old, shall be killed for human food, or shall be kept or offered for sale.

Section 16. That it shall be the duty of every inspector or other officer of the Board of Health when any cattle, pigs or lambs shall be found in a diseased, overheated, feverish or exhausted condition, or when any calves, pigs, or lambs shall be found within the ages respectively named in the preceding section of this code and said animal or any part of them shall be intended to be used for human food, to immediately attach to any such diseased, overheated, feverish, exhausted or under aged animals, or to the pen or stall in which any such animal may be confined, a label or tag on which shall be written or printed the words, "Quarantined by the Board of Health, Waterville, Maine," such inspector or other officer shall immediately report such quarantine at the office of the Board of Health, that proper action may be taken relative thereto.

Section 17. That no person or persons, corporation or corporations other than an inspector or other officer of the Board of Health, or a State officer empowered to do so by the Laws of the State of Maine, shall destroy, deface, conceal, interfere with or remove any label or tag so attached to any animal, stall or pen. No person or persons, corporation or corporations shall remove any animal as aforesaid quarantined, or kill any such animal in the City of Waterville, except in the presence of an Inspector of this Board, or use the same for human food, or hold, or expose for sale or sell any such animal without the permission of this Board. No person or persons, corporation or corporations shall interfere with or prevent any inspector or other officer of this Board in performing the duties imposed by this section.

Section 18. That no person operating a slaughter house, or who sells meats, shall use any drug upon the same for the purpose of preserving it, or for any other purpose; but such preservatives as salt, sugar, vinegar, pure spices, and wood or corn cob smoke may be used.

Section 19. That it shall be unlawful for any person to alter, imitate or counterfeit the marks of inspection used by the inspector or do anything for the purpose of evading the provisions of these regulations.

Section 20. That no carcass, or any part thereof, of any slaughtered cattle, calf, sheep, goat or swine slaughtered within the City proper shall be branded or otherwise marked for identification by the inspector of meats, or by his assistant until it has been carefully inspected and passed for food. The viscera, head, tongue, tail and caul of each and every cattle, calf, sheep, goat, or swine slaughtered within the city proper, when the inspector is not present, shall be kept together and wholly separate from similar parts of any other carcass.

Section 21. That it shall be the duty of every person knowing of any fish, meat, fowls or vegetables being bought, sold or offered or held for sale in Waterville, as human food which is not sound, healthy or wholesome, to forthwith report such facts and the particulars relating thereto to the Board of Health or to any one of its officers or inspectors.

Section 22. That every Veterinary Surgeon who is called to examine or attend professionally any animal within this city which has or is suspected of, having glanders, or farcy, or pleuro-pneumonia, hydrophobia, tuberculosis, or any other dangerous or communicable disease shall report in writing to the Board of Health, within twenty-four hours after his first visit to the location of such animal, the name and address of the owner thereof and the nature of the disease.

Section 23. That no diseased horse, cattle, swine, sheep, dog or cat, or any other animal, and no animal which has been exposed to any disease which is contagious or infectious among animals shall be brought into or driven, or carried through, or exposed in any street, alley or public place in this city except by an officer of the State of Maine, having power to do so.

Section 24. That no person or persons, corporation or corporations shall keep, or allow to be kept, in any dwelling house or in any part thereof, any horse, cattle, swine, goats or fowls.

Section 25. That all toilet rooms, urinal, and dressing rooms shall be entirely separated from compartments in which carcasses are dressed or meat food products are cured, stored, packed, handled, prepared or sold. They shall be sufficient in number, ample in size and fitted with modern lavatory accommodations including toilet paper, soap, running water and towels. They shall be properly lighted, ventilated, and shall be so located that odors from said toilet rooms, catch basins, casing departments, tank rooms, hide cellars and other rooms, and apartments in which are generated foul and noxious odors do not penetrate butchering rooms, meat rooms, provision rooms, vegetable rooms, or other compartments in which carcasses are dressed or meat food products are cured, stored, packed, handled or sold. All rooms or compartments shall be provided with cuspidors, which employees must use if they expectorate.

Section 26. That butchers who dress diseased carcasses shall cleanse their hands of all grease, then immerse them in a prescribed disinfectant, and rinse them in clear water, before engaging again in dressing or handling healthy carcasses. All butcher's implements used in dressing diseased carcasses shall be cleansed of all grease, then sterilized either in boiling water or by immersion in a prescribed disinfectant, and rinsed in clear water, before being used in dressing healthy carcasses. Facilities for such cleansing and disinfection, approved by the Meat Inspector, shall be provided by the establishment. Separate trucks and other vehicles shall be furnished for handling diseased carcasses and parts. Following the slaughter of an animal infected with an infectious disease, a stop shall be made until the implements have been cleansed and disinfected, unless duplicate instruments are provided.

Section 27. That all live stock proposed for slaughtering, for sale in the City of Waterville (slaughtered within the city proper) shall be

inspected before and after such slaughter, by the Meat Inspector or Board of Health. If said Meat Inspector or Board of Health shall find upon said inspection that any cattle, sheep, etc., are unfit for food purposes, they shall reject the same. Said animals that are rejected shall be removed from the city or used for purposes other than food.

Section 28. That any farmer or other person without the city proper desiring to sell beef, mutton or pork on the streets of this city, must, before slaughtering the same, without the city proper, have it inspected by two reputable citizens, who shall certify that the animal or animals slaughtered were sound and in good health, according to their best knowledge and belief. And such certificate shall be presented to the Meat Inspector and O K'd by him before such beef, mutton or pork is offered for sale.

Section 29. That no person or persons, corporation or corporations shall expose for sale in the city of Waterville, any diseased, emaciated, tainted, or putrid meat or provisions, which from these or other cause may be deemed unwholesome; and the Meat Inspector or the Board of Health, having knowledge of such a fact may forthwith condemn all such meat and provisions.

Section 30. That the charges for the inspection of meats shall be as follows:

Beef, per head	\$.25
Calves, per head15
Sheep and Lambs, per head.....	.15
Fish, per hundred20
Hogs, per head20

Section 31. That no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall bring or cause to be brought into or kept or offered for sale in any public or private market in this city any meat or any dead animal, the flesh of which is intended to be used for human food, until such meat or such dead animal shall have been fully and properly cooled and until all blood shall have ceased dripping therefrom, and unless they have strictly complied with the provisions of this code. No blown, plaited, raised, stuffed, putrid, impure, or unhealthy meat or fish, bird or fowl shall be held, bought or sold or offered for sale for human food in any place in this city.

Section 32. That all meat condemned in the City of Waterville by any inspector of this Board shall be rendered unfit for human food by slashing the condemned meat, and by saturating the same with kerosene or other chemical compound. Any inspector of this board is hereby empowered to condemn any tainted or unwholesome meat found in this city. Any inspector is hereby authorized to enter any building, structure or premises in this city to inspect and examine any meat contained therein.

Section 33. That every owner, lessee or occupier of a slaughter house in this city shall at all reasonable times, afford free access to every part of such premises to the Board of Health, Meat Inspector, or to any committee or member of this board, or its authorized agent, for the purpose of inspecting such premises.

Section 34. That no hog, pig or pigs shall be kept within the city proper between the first day of June and the first day of October.

Section 35. That meat markets, fish markets, and butcher shops or stalls shall be completely screened and protected against flies. Floors shall be thoroughly scrubbed once each week; scraps of meat, offal, bones and other refuse organic matter shall not be left exposed to the atmosphere of the room, but must be kept in a closed receptacle which must be emptied daily. Meat for sale must not be kept exposed to the air, except in such quantities as are needed for daily use, but shall be kept in adequate refrigerators or ice chests. All tainted meats shall be removed from the premises at once. The fixtures, rooms, premises must be maintained in a thoroughly sanitary condition.

Section 36. That all meats exposed for sale shall be protected by screens or other suitable arrangements, from contamination by flies, dust, and from promiscuous handling by customers, and it shall not be hung or exposed outside. Rooms or compartments in which meat or meat food products are prepared, cured, stored, packed or otherwise handled, shall be properly lighted and ventilated, and shall be so located that odors from toilet rooms, catch basins, tank rooms, hide cellars or other unsanitary places, do not penetrate them. All rooms or compartments shall be provided with cuspidors, which employee shall be required to use, if they expectorate. Where meat food products are prepared for market, such as sausages, lard, pickled pork and like products, a separate room, properly ventilated, lighted, and supplied with running water, shall be provided for this purpose exclusively, with exception that sausage may be ground in the market proper, under suitable conditions.

Section 37. That all persons operating grocery and produce stores and maintaining a department therein for the sale of fresh meats, shall be required to separate such meat department from other parts of said store, by means of a partition constructed of wood, glass or screen or such material that will keep out flies and other insects, and the general public to be excluded from all meat rooms.

Section 38. That all refrigerators must be scrubbed and scoured once a week and kept in a sanitary condition at all times.

Section 39. That persons affected with tuberculosis or any other communicable disease shall not be employed in any of the departments or establishments where carcasses are dressed, meats handled, or meat food products prepared, or provisions of any kind sold. Any employee suspected of being so affected shall be reported by the meat inspector

to the manager of the establishment and to the Board of Health. Butchers who dress carcasses are prohibited from holding in their mouth skewers to be used in such dressing.

INSPECTION OF MEATS.

Section 40. That the Board of Health shall appoint an inspector who shall be a graduate of a regular Veterinary College, having power to confer degrees in veterinary science who shall pass a satisfactory examination excepting from examination one who has had one year or more experience as a meat inspector, to carry on the provisions of this Chapter. Provided that if more than one inspector shall be required to carry out the provisions of these regulations, the same shall be appointed by the Board of Health. Until the appointment of such inspector, the Board of Health shall be inspector ex-officio.

Section 41. That meat slaughtered without the city proper under this section, but brought into the city for sale, may be inspected and branded or otherwise marked for identification by the meat inspector, or his assistant, under the following rules, to wit:

(a) Calves must have the lungs, liver, heart, and kidneys held together by natural attachment.

(b) The carcass of cattle must be accompanied by the lungs, liver, heart and kidneys, which latter must be certified by the owner as being those removed from the carcass then undergoing inspection.

(c) Hogs must have the head, lungs, liver, kidneys, and feet held together by natural attachments.

(d) Sheep, lambs, and goats must have the lungs, liver, heart and kidneys held together by natural attachments. The feet and hide of all sheep, lambs, and goats must be removed. All such carcasses shall be brought to such place or places and at such times as the Meat Inspector shall appoint and designate. He shall be notified when such meat is ready for inspection. Meat slaughtered without the city proper under this section, shall be brought to the Square located between City Hall and the Armory, known as the Darrah property, leased by the City of Waterville.

Section 42. That any firm, corporation, person or association, who shall fail to comply with or shall violate any of the provisions of this article (known as the meat code) shall, on conviction be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars in the discretion of the court or magistrate before whom the complaint is made.

Section 43. All ordinances, codes, articles or sections inconsistent with this article, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 44. This meat code is to take effect thirty days after approval.

Engineer's Report

WATERVILLE, MAINE, Feb. 9, 1915,

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit the following as a summary of the work done in my Department for the current year.

SEWERS.

There has been designed and built during the year 2,514.00 feet of sewer (not including Hayden Brook) on the following streets:

Walnut Street. Two hundred and fifty-six feet of 8-inch clay sewer, and one manhole. About 110 feet of old sewer was taken up at this time and replaced at lower grade. This was an expensive piece to build owing to large amount of rock excavation.

Morrill Avenue. Eight hundred and sixty feet of 8-inch clay sewer laid from old manhole to Messalonskee Stream. Three manholes and two catch basins were included in this.

Graylock Road. The sewer on this street was extended from the end of last year's construction by the addition of 175 feet of 8-inch clay pipe and one lantern hole.

Burleigh Street. Extended 118.2 feet north to the "Gilman Line" so-called. One lantern hole added.

West Winter Street. This sewer has given some trouble in the past on account of an angle near the foot of the hill west of Hayden Brook. A manhole was placed at this point and the 12-inch sewer extended directly to Hayden Brook sewer, a distance of 46 feet.

Kimball Street. The private 12-inch sewer crossing Summer street and following the low land west of Summer street, was extended 30.5 feet south, or to the approximate south line of Kimball street. This sewer has previously been built by private parties, and the city has no record of its location, grades or conditions. One hundred and seventy-one feet of 6-inch sewer was laid from this 12-inch sewer westerly along Kimball street.

Fairmount street. Two hundred and ninety-eight and five-tenths feet 8-inch clay sewer, 1 manhole and 1 lanternhole.

Edgemont Avenue. Last year's construction extended easterly 323 feet.

Nash Street. Old sewer extended northerly 148 feet; one manhole built.

Birch Street. Old sewer extended by addition of 50 feet of 8-inch clay pipe.

High Street. Extended westerly from lantern hole near College avenue, 37.8 feet, 8-inch pipe. Pipe turned up for lantern hole. All the above sewers constructed by Street Department.

HAYDEN BROOK SEWER.

The extension of this important piece of work this year, was from the northerly end of the North street culvert to about 15 feet north of the north line of the Maine Central Railroad right of way, a distance of 439.37 feet. This was a bad section to build as it crossed under two coal sheds and trestles of G. S. Flood & Co. and under the tracks of the Maine Central Railroad. The same type of construction was adopted as was used last year, that is, the vitrified segment block.

Bids were advertised for May 1st and the contract awarded to E. P. Witham May 20. Actual work was begun the next day, and the contract work was finished July 23rd. This included the building of 295 feet of 66 inch segment block, four catchbasins, 240 feet of invert in railroad culverts, one large reinforced concrete manhole, cleaning out of culverts, connecting existing lateral sewers, grading, etc.

One of the railroad culverts was completely filled with dirt and rubbish and evidently had not been venting any water for several years. When cleaned out, these culverts were found in such shape that it was decided to repair them more thoroughly than at first deemed necessary. The part of the contract relating to the repair of culverts, was therefore changed, and this work was done on a cost basis. It was also deemed advisable to build a manhole at the north end of the culverts to protect the work and to give a better starting point for future extensions.

In making comparisons on the cost of this piece of construction, it must be remembered that there were two culverts, each 120 feet in length, thus making the actual length of construction 120 feet more than the apparent length. The city also was obliged to pay demurrage on coal, which could not be unloaded into the sheds for several days, and for partitions that we were obliged to put in sheds for protection.

These partitions will be removed in the spring and proper credit should be given for the plank, etc. The total cost of the work was \$6,660.73.

NEW STREETS.

Four new streets have been accepted as follows: Gray Avenue, Russell Street, Graylock Road, and Fairmount Street. Surveys have been made of each, and locations recorded.

STATE AID ROAD.

The section of highway between the "Ridge road" so-called and the Fairfield town line on the road to Fairfield Center, was selected to be repaired as a State Aid Road this season. This section is about 4,500 feet in length, but owing to the smallness of the appropriation, only a portion could be repaired this season. The upper section being the hardest for travel, it was decided to start at the town line and extend the work toward the city.

About 1,780 feet of road was actually rebuilt. A large amount of ledge was removed changing both the alignment and the grade quite materially. About 600 feet of stone base was also placed in the low section. This was an exceptionally expensive piece of work as even the water for the steam plant to operate the drills had to be hauled from the city hydrants. For these reasons the cost was more than the amount appropriated, but the remaining section should be built at a much less cost per lineal foot.

NEW SIDEWALKS.

The only new granolithic sidewalks built this year are a section in front of the Waterville Steam Laundry on Main street in front of Elks Home, Appleton street and in front of the new Morse Block at the junction of Main street and College Avenue, a total of 130 5-9 square yards. A section of sidewalk on Water street from Grove street to Gold street was also resurfaced.

STREET LINES.

Street lines have been run for various purposes on Brook street, Sanger avenue, Morrill avenue, Walnut street, Kelsey street, High street, Burleigh street, Gilman street, and Percival court.

* * * * *

A radical change was made this year in this department. Instead of appointing the City Engineer to do the work in connection with his private work at his own office, the position was made a salaried one with an office at City Hall, all his time to be devoted to the city's interests.

I found that the city had practically no plans of any of its former work, outside of a few general sketches in note books. Many of these gave no details.

What there were were scattered around in closets, on shelves, tables, in vaults, etc., and no value was placed upon them. I know from inquiry that many of them have been burned as rubbish in the past.

The first thing done, a filing cabinet was purchased and an office established. The drawings that could be found have been indexed and filed in a systematic manner and I hope the same may be continued by my successor.

There were no plans owned by the city showing streets, sewers or anything else, (except in an indefinite manner).

A large scale map has been made of the city showing all accepted streets with all sewers, as far as possible, for the use of the Street Department. Other copies have been furnished for Aldermen's and Council rooms.

Another map of different scale has been prepared for the Fire Department, showing the location of all the hydrants and fire alarm boxes. Also one showing the Fire Alarm System.

The engineer has been always available to help the Street Department when called upon. A complete survey has also been made and plans are being made for the next section of Hayden Brook Sewer.

In conclusion would like to call your attention to the following items which will need attention sooner or later:

Hayden Brook Sewer should be extended as speedily as possible to at least High street. The section for 1915 should extend beyond Main street, if possible, for sanitary reasons.

The sewer on Western avenue and Oakland street, causes trouble every time we have a large amount of surface water. The sewer from the junction of these two streets is not large enough. I would suggest an overflow down Western avenue to the bridge.

The Prospect street sewer should be extended from its present terminus to the Messalonskee stream. This now stops near a dwelling house and is a menace to the neighborhood.

The 12-inch sewer spoken of elsewhere in this report as crossing Kimball street, should be extended south and drain the bog between Silver and Summer streets. A culvert should be rebuilt across Silver street to aid this draining. There was formerly one there but it has become closed.

The sewers on Carrean street and Carey lane are a continual source of trouble to the Street Department and should be fixed at once.

A sum should be appropriated to raise the various manholes, where needed, over the entire city.

A large percentage of these are buried from three inches to three feet below the surface of the street, and the city having no accurate record of their location, when a sewer becomes plugged, it causes a large amount of expense and trouble to find them.

There have been cases this year where it has taken three men from one to two days to find a manhole. We even found one had been paved over.

Front street should be paved from Temple street to Lockwood street as soon as possible.

Ticonic Bridge and the bridge over the Messalonskee Stream at the Pumping Station should be painted the coming summer. Ticonic Bridge has not been painted for about sixteen years, and it is poor economy to allow an iron bridge to go such a length of time without paint. The Pumping Station Bridge has been in use but a few years, but is in very bad shape.

A complete official survey of the city should be made, locating all the street lines, city property, and in the business section the individual property. This may be done on the installment plan distributing it over several years.

I wish to thank you gentlemen, and also Mr. O'Donnell, of the Street Department for your hearty and loyal support the past year.

City Electrician's Report

WATERVILLE, MAINE, Feb. 10, 1915.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit the following as report of this Department for the past year.

During the past year the new Fire Alarm System has been completed and accepted by you. This system is the most up-to-date, and most complete for a city of our size, of any in this state and I think in New England. The system complete has cost us about \$10,000 and should do good service for many years with proper care.

This year has been a notable one in electrical circles because of the commercial development of the gas filled tungsten lamp.

We have been lucky in having substituted this type of lamp for the old arc lamps formerly owned by the city and operated under contract by the Central Maine Power Company. Owing to the less cost of operation of this type of lamp, the Power Company is now operating at the same cost to the city, 100-600 c. p. 6.6 amp. lamps of this type in the place of the 88 old arc lamps. They certainly give a better illumination than the arcs, and think both the city and the Power Company made a good exchange.

The old arc lamps are now stored by the Street Dept. and the writer has been trying to sell them. There is also in use by the Central Maine Power Co. about 9.7 miles of No. 6 line wire between this city and Oakland that belongs to the City.

There has been considerable controversy over additional lighting on several of the streets during the last season. It is the writer's opinion that the 250 c. p. gas filled lamps properly spaced gives a better illumination than the so-called ornamental clusters, and would recommend that type be adopted.

There has been considerable controversy also with the Kennebec Farm and City Telephone Company regarding pole rights.

There are already too many poles along many of the city streets. The old city poles are past their usefulness in many cases, but I do

not think the City should allow them removed without getting some return.

The Public Utilities law gives that body the right to grant to one Company the use of another Company's poles, and to establish the rental for same. Under this condition only one pole line is needed on a street, and I would suggest that before more pole rights are granted for a second line on a street, that the Commission be asked to investigate.

A rate has been established whereby the Kennebec Company can use the city poles by proper payment.

The old auxiliary fire alarm system which has been in use here for many years in connection with the Gamewell System, should be rebuilt or discarded. This is used by the firemen to ring a bell in their individual residences. In the condition it is in at present, it is a fire hazard to every building it enters. It is not reliable and therefore useless.

If you think it is still needed, have it all rebuilt and put in reliable shape.

The police signal system is in worse condition than the auxiliary fire system, if that is possible. This is an old watchman's clock arrangement, and on a wet night is positively dangerous to operate.

Some sort of a telephonic system should be installed so that an officer can be in communication with Headquarters at any time. Such an outfit would probably cost about \$2,000 all installed.

There have been several new ordinances passed this year, which, if properly enforced, will tend to lessen the danger from wires in our city.

I would earnestly recommend that gas lights be installed in the City Building, along the corridors, stairway landings, and in the opera house where necessary for public safety.

The electric service as now installed is as reliable as can be made under the existing conditions, and under normal conditions should give no trouble.

The Underwriter's rules require that such places shall have at least two separate sources of lighting supply.

Some of the privately owned show houses in the city have already installed such lights, and it does not seem as though the city can afford to take any chances of a stampede in case the lights should accidentally be out for a short time.

Free Public Library

To the Honorable, the Mayor and the City Council:

The Trustees to whom you committed the management and care of the Public Library for the year 1914-1915 have attended to their duties and beg leave to report.

As will be seen in the reports of the Standing Committees which are appended, every department of the work of the Library shows progress and healthy development. More books have been bought, more have been used; more periodicals have been supplied in the Reading Room, and more readers have used them; more reference work has been done, than in any previous work year of the Library's history.

As an educational institution the Library has furnished the standard works that record the world's history and achievement and also the books of its latest discoveries and progress. These resources have been largely used by students from the College and all the schools even down to the lower grades. It is a source of satisfaction that some who have not had the advantages offered by the schools of higher culture, are finding here the means of a very practical education. Special Reading Courses are being arranged for those who desire to secure a comprehensive view of some department of knowledge. The outstanding events in the history of the Library during the year have been the retirement of Miss Caswell from the office of Librarian, and the death of the Janitor, Philip H. Brown. At the regular autumn meeting of the Board of Library Trustees the following resolutions were adopted as stating the appreciation on the part of the Trustees of the services rendered by these officials.

Whereas, Miss Mary H. Caswell who has served the Waterville public library as its librarian for a term of seven years, has now presented her resignation of that office, therefore be it

Resolved, That the board of trustees learns with regret of the approaching retirement of Miss Caswell from the position she has so ably filled, and very reluctantly accepts her resignation, to take effect December 1st, next. And be it further

Resolved, That the board desires to place on record its appreciation—and that of its members individually of the efficient, conscientious and

courteous manner in which her duties have been performed. Miss Caswell was well equipped by nature and training for the office which she has so well filled, and it is noteworthy that in her relations with library officials, and with the general public—always so exacting—there has been a remarkable absence of criticism. She now turns over to her successor, the administration of the library, with a policy well defined, and with its routine well systematized. The reading public of this city is indebted to Miss Caswell in ways that may not always have been apparent, the effects of which, however, will continue long after her retirement.

Resolved, That this action be spread upon the minutes of the board of trustees, be given to the press, and be communicated to Miss Caswell, as evidence of the esteem in which she is held by her associates.

Resolved, That we extend to the family of Mr. Brown our sincere sympathy and that we send to them and spread upon the records of the library this expression of our appreciation, our sorrow and our sympathy.

At the same meeting the Trustees unanimously elected to the office of Librarian, Miss Jennie M. Smith.

Miss Smith is a native of Waterville, a daughter of Prof. Samuel K. Smith, long the head of the Department of English in Colby College. She is a graduate of Colby, and for several years has been efficient and popular Associate Librarian of the Library. Her election assures that the resources of the Library will be made fully available, its needs fairly presented to the Trustees, and its patrons young and old receive fair and courteous treatment.

Miss Leola P. Adams was unanimously elected Assistant Librarian. Miss Adams is well prepared for her work, and has proved her fitness and popularity by her service as substitute during the vacations of Miss Caswell.

The Trustees congratulate themselves and the patrons of the Library generally on the securing of Mr. Frank W. Noble to take the place left vacant by the death of Philip H. Brown.

Your Trustees would call attention to the suggestion of the Librarian that the extension work begun by the deposit of certain books at the Railroad Y. M. C. A. building, may be increased to the profit of the citizens who live at a distance from the central library; and also to the need of building up certain practical departments.

Your Trustees gratefully bear testimony to the liberal policy of the City Council in providing for the needs of the Library in the past. So fully convinced are they of the value and the public demand for the work of the Library that they earnestly hope that the recommendations of the Finance Committee that has carefully gone over the needs of the work may be accepted as the basis of the appropriations for the coming year.

Grateful acknowledgement is made of the gifts that have come to the Library during the year as mentioned in the Librarian's report. Dr. F. C. Thayer again leads in the number of books contributed, 27 volumes. The Getchell bequest is affording large help in the Art Department. The Trustees would again call attention to the opportunity, by gifts or bequests to the Library, to confer a permanent benefit upon the City.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

To the Board of Trustees of the Waterville Public Library:

I have the honor to submit the eighteenth annual report of the Waterville Public Library for the year ending January 31, 1915.

The principal events of the year have been the withdrawal of Miss Caswell from the librarianship of the library, by resignation, and the

removal of Mr. Brown from the janitorship, through his death, which occurred in October. The choice of Miss Leola B. Adams as assistant librarian and of Mr. F. W. Noble as janitor at the meeting in November appears to have been most happy, as both are capable, efficient and willing workers, and it is a great pleasure to coöperate with such.

The library was represented at the Annual Maine Library Association meeting held at Portland in connection with the Teachers' Convention, by Miss Caswell, the librarian, and the assistant, Miss Caswell having served for the last two years as secretary of the Association.

In October one of the District meetings arranged by the Maine Library Commission was held in this building with Mrs. Belle Holcombe Johnson, library visitor for the Connecticut Literary Commission, in charge.

The year's work at the library has been carried on along the same lines as in former years, the reference work and assistance to schools being accorded an important place in the regular routine.

ACCESSIONS.

The number of books added to the library this year is 857; 778 by purchase and 79 by gift. Of these 178 were replacements.

Among the more noteworthy additions which have been purchased this year are the Encyclopedia Britannica and a new edition of the New International Encyclopedia, which is coming to this library in installments as published. A new edition of Harper's Encyclopedia of United States History has also been placed on the shelves in the reference room. Riley's complete Works and Justin Windsor's Narrative and Critical History of America are other valuable accessions, also the series "The Art Galleries of Europe" in twelve volumes.

There have been no additions to the list of French books for some time and several of those which we had are worn out and taken from the shelves, so that the number left is very small. Some new books both of fiction and of non-fiction would be much appreciated, and would without doubt increase the number of borrowers from our French population. Also certain other departments, as agriculture, mechanics and engineering, need very much to be built up.

CIRCULATION.

The total circulation for the year was 39,461, a gain of 2,430 over last year.

At the request of the Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association, a number of books were sent to the building to remain on deposit for a time for the use of the men there. They have been appreciated. The titles are changed from time to time as the previous ones have been read. It would seem that the system of deposit stations might be extended so as to include some of the country districts which are at such a distance from the center of the town as practically to preclude visits to the library except at long intervals.

REGISTRATIONS.

The number of new registrations during the year was 661. The recommendation of Mr. Perkins, Superintendent of Schools to the pupils to make use of the library resulted in a good number of new borrowers from among the school children, also the lists of books furnished the

different grades brought many eager young inquirers for the suggested titles.

READING ROOM.

The number of persons to use the reading room through the year was 8,786.

REFERENCE ROOM.

The reference room has received two important additions, as already stated, in the Encyclopedia Britannica and the new edition of the New International Encyclopedia.

The number to use the reference room was 1966.

The usual reference works with schools has been done both in town and to some extent in adjacent towns, especially in connection with the interscholastic debates carried on in the state, also with women's clubs of some nearby towns.

Much of our most valuable reference work with all classes of workers is done with old magazines through the Reader's Guide, and it is getting to be a serious question as to where to keep all these on file so that they may be readily secured when special numbers are called for. It would relieve the situation somewhat if some more sets could be bound. They would also be much better preserved.

The state reports have been received as usual and also some government reports.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Carl C. Jones, the library has received a large number of valuable senate documents on the subject of banking.

To the Board of Trustees, Waterville Public Library:

The Book Committee has used the funds placed in its hands in carrying forward the accepted policy of building up a library of permanent usefulness and satisfaction to all the people of the City. It is reason for congratulation that our Librarians have shown special skill and patience in bringing the full resources of the Library to the aid of all who inquire.

The Reference Department has been greatly strengthened by the purchase at a very favorable bargain of the latest edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica; the new edition of the International Cyclopedia; Harper's Cyclopedia of the United States History, new books on machinery, etc.

The Art Department has been enriched by the purchase of the important set in twelve sumptuous volumes of "The Art Galleries of Europe."

The European War has caused inquiry for books on European history and conditions which your Committee has met by liberal purchases.

The best in current fiction has been placed promptly upon the shelves in amount somewhat in excess of what library standards indicate but not at all in excess of the demand.

Your Committee would endorse and urge the recommendations of the Librarian as to the binding of magazines needed for reference work and the purchase of books for the French Department.

A very large number of books have been purchased for replacements or additions to the Juvenile Department, and there remains the demand for more.

855 books have been added to the Library during the year at an expense of \$900.90.

Your Committee still urge the provision of at least \$1,200 yearly for the purchase of books.

Report of Street Commissioner

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Waterville:

In submitting my report on streets, sewers, sidewalks, state aid highway, street sprinkling, trimming trees and brown tail moths, for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31st, 1915, for your consideration I wish to call your attention to the receipts and expenditures of the different departments. There have been many necessary improvements made, also a number of permanent improvements such as 2,514 ft. new sewer laid; 439.37 ft. of Hayden Brook Sewer; 1,700 ft. of State Aid Highway; 22 ft. wide, Water street grade lowered ten inches, and repaired from Redington street to King street. This work has been done under the inspection of Engineer E. W. Crawford. I have given my entire time and personal attention to this work and have used the strictest economy consistent to good work. I have endeavored to have the work done in as permanent a manner and at as small a cost as possible.

Three heavy storms early in season necessitated and incurred a large expense. The removing of snow and ice costing close to \$7,000.00 for the year.

By being deprived of the services of Peter Rheaume, who has been in the department for twenty-five years, and whose services have always been very valuable to the Street Commissioner, has made the entire supervision fall to my care. All bills against the several departments for the year are included in this report to the best of my knowledge. The summaries of the work are shown in the following report:

Streets which were repaired with gravel were: Highwood street, Spruce street, Ash street, College avenue, Sanger avenue, Brook street, Toward street, Alden street, Chaplin street, Upper Main street, High street, Western avenue, Edgemont avenue, and a number of others received slight repairs. It has been almost impossible to keep streets in shape this year on account of work by the Gas Company and Water District. The digging up of streets by these companies has made a large amount of work for the street department and of very little showing or benefit. I expect all of the trenches to settle when frost comes out and it will be necessary to go all over work again. Streets that were graveled were Libby court, Carey lane, Bushey lane, Carrean street, Moore street, Pine street, and Lower Water street. There were 4,512 loads of gravel used this year.

The following are the streets and roads turn-piked and repaired with road machine: County road from North street bridge to Oakland road, First Rangeway from Western avenue to Oakland road, Oakland road from Silver street to line, River road, Webb road, Trafton road, Mitchell road, Shorey road, Sturtevant road, Eight Rod road, Mountain

road to Fairfield line, Drummond avenue, Webb avenue, entire length, Russell street, entire length, Collins street, Campbell street, College avenue, Gilman street, Silver street, Pleasant street, North street, King street, Center street, Summer street, Park street, Front street, School street.

The new gravel sidewalks this year were on High street from Main street to Mr. Stevens' house, Brook street (south side) from Main to Ticonic street, Seavey street (north side) from College avenue, 300 ft., Silver street from Gold to Kimball street, Russell street, the entire length, Colonial street, about 200 ft., Kelsey street (south side) from the residence of Mr. Pomerleau to Ticonic street, Burleigh street south from West Winter street, extended 100 ft., Pine street (west side) from Carrean street to Grove street, Autumn street from Sherwin to Redington street.

Kennebec street sidewalk from Silver street south, about 200 ft. covered with crushed rock also Main street from the junction of College avenue to Elmwood hotel.

The following are the culverts repaired: Ridge road, used 30 ft. 24-in. pipe. Replanked Drummond avenue and High street culvert, one on the River road, one on Trafton road, one on High street, one on Front and Leighton streets, one on Wentworth court, one on Webb avenue and one on Drummond avenue.

There were built this year: Nine iron pipe driveways, 31 wooden spout driveways, 70 segment block driveways in different parts of the city.

Have on hand: Corrugated pipe 8, 10, 12, 18-in. sizes purchased this year costing \$320.53, for Country road, Marston road, Eight Rod road, Sturtevant road, Mitchell road and Western avenue, that I did not get in before ground froze, so left it for spring.

Expense on Morrill avenue, Winter street and Graylock road sewers was caused by finding quick sand.

Water street sidewalk was resurfaced with tar concrete from Gray to Grove street. New granolithic sidewalks on Main street in front of the Steam Laundry and the new Morse Block.

The sidewalks which were repaired and regraveled are Allen street, Brook street (north side), Oak street, Spruce street, Seavey street, Cannabas avenue from Seavey street to Collins street, Paris street, West street, north to Morrill avenue, (both sides), North street, Burleigh street, Edgemont avenue, Sanger avenue, Summer street, Chaplin street, West Winter street, Heath street, Western avenue, sidewalk replanked, Morrill avenue, sidewalk (north side) regraveled.

The street sprinkling was turned over to the street department in May and there were four tank cars of oil 36,877 gals. put on the following streets: Main, Silver, Elm, Pleasant, Chaplain, North, Center, Getchell, Temple, Common and College avenue. There was an oil distributor purchased at a cost of \$600.00. The preparing streets and distributing the four cars of oil cost close to \$400.00, besides the rent of stand pipes.

Ticonic Bridge was repaired early in the year, and replanked in October the entire length and is in good condition. Repairs have been made on Gilman street bridge, but it should be rebuilt, it is in very poor condition. The other bridges are in fair condition, some will need to be replanked soon. West street bridge I have closed to traffic as it is unsafe. I have filled the gully and now have street 15 ft. wide at top for traffic in place of this bridge. The dirt removed from streets should be dumped here and keep widening street until it is full width. This can be done with little cost to City and will not require a great deal of time to do it. The street cleaning of two years has practically filled this gully, there has been some filling from old City pit and some gravel used but only a small amount. The shade trees on a number of streets were in a great many cases in a dangerous condition, and I have removed a number of trees that were not safe; also removed all decayed branches on others on a number of streets. The work should be carried further and given more attention as there are still a great number of trees and dead branches that are not safe, and that are a nuisance to the public.

The work of cleaning city trees of brown tail moths was turned over to me to finish. This work when taken by me was in a very complicated condition and I found the territory which had been gone over, had to be again, on account of doing part of trees on a street and leaving others. I finished the work and think covered all of the city streets in a thorough manner.

The work of grading High School lot was under supervision of Mr. R. Bowker and it required a large amount of filling and gravel, the sidewalk on Gilman and West streets are included in work, the West street sidewalk over 400 lds. of material the filling and coarse gravel being taken from old pit in all about 1,700 loads of loam, clay and gravel were used.

In concluding this report I would like to make a few recommendations. I again advise the rebuilding of Gilman street bridge, with iron or steel and concrete abutments. That Silver street from Main street to Silver place be rebuilt with crushed stone and Silver place south be graveled. That Front street be paved from Lockwood street to Temple street, there is a lot of heavy trucking on this street and it surely needs to be paved.

One other recommendation that the expense of removing rubbish be taken care of in some other way than out of the street appropriation as it uses up nearly \$1,000.00 street money, and not a penny's benefit to the department.

APPARATUS.

The apparatus consists of one steam fire engine, one two-horse hook and ladder truck, one auto combination and chemical, one two-horse hose and chemical wagon, one two-horse wagon three one-horse hose wagons, rubbish rack, one hand reel, one 50 foot extension ladder not carried on truck, one 40 foot ladder not carried on truck, one deluge set, and other small equipment.

HORSES.

There are six horses in the department, all of which are in use, three having been purchased during the year, one pair which is now in service on Hose Company No. 2, known as Buster and Nellie; one in Hose Company No. 4, known as Horace; three having been sold in the month of January, 1915, Bess, formerly of Hose Company No. 4; Kit and Nancy of Hose No. 1; Maude of Hose No. 2 in May.

The Department this year has had more sickness among its horses than for the past ten years combined and the expense therefrom has been large, but with the disposal or exchange of the pair now hauling the hook and ladder truck, it would seem as if there would be much less trouble in this Department in the near future.

HOSE.

There has been added this year one thousand feet of hose, purchased of the Boston Woven and Rubber Hose Co. at sixty-seven cents per foot, and I would recommend the purchase of two thousand feet this season.

HOUSES.

Repairs have been made on Hose House No. 4, consisting of a new plank under floor and a board upper floor and numerous minor improvements, in the other stations which were necessary.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The fire alarm system is composed of what is known as the Gamwell circuits and the Auxiliary circuits, and the Gamwell circuit, which was installed during the year of 1913, has not failed during this year, but has given a perfect alarm on every occasion and has never been out of service during the entire year.

The Auxiliary or Tapper circuit, as it is at the present time, is very unsatisfactory and it seems to me this circuit ought to be continued and put in first class shape, so that it would be of benefit to those who rely upon it for an alarm.

The success of the alarm system, which has been in charge of the City Electrician, who is able to give it his personal care, has largely been due to his efficient work, and I would heartily recommend that this arrangement be continued.

IMPROVEMENTS.

Improvements this year consist of the purchase of one two-horse combination chemical and hose wagon, one thousand feet of 2 1-2 inch hose, three horses, one sixty-horse power combination hose and chemical

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The losses from fire have been far less this past year than for many years previous and the reason for this is due to the coöperation of the public with this department in the matter of keeping their places free from an accumulation of rubbish and other waste material which is always a fire menace at the best. We have endeavored to carry out, as far as possible, a system of fire inspection and the same has certainly had results in the small losses which have occurred during the past year.

Now I feel that citizens who are not especially pleased because of the purchase of this new piece of motor apparatus will, in due time be convinced that it was the best investment that was ever made for the fire department and I wish to say now that your committee on Fire Department this year have labored long and hard for the best improvements for this Department and I personally wish at this time to extend to such committee, his Honor, the Mayor, and the members of the City Council my heartiest appreciation for their efforts and generosity, and I trust that the coöperation of the public with this Department may be greater in the future than it has in the past, as by this coöperation many disagreeable things may be overcome, and places and chances for fires to start be eliminated. This Department stands ready at any and all times

to give careful inspection to any and all places which may be reported and its members are always alert to prevent fires from starting and after they have started, to subdue them as soon as possible, and they cheerfully solicit the coöperation of the public that the above ends may be accomplished.

Auditor's Report

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Waterville:

I herewith submit my report as Auditor for the year ending January 31, 1914.

In submitting this report, I would respectfully call your attention to the advisability of installing in the immediate future, a modern system of accounting which would enable your auditor to present to your board and to the public, a comprehensive statement from month to month by which the cost of running your various departments might be properly classified and from which comparative statements may be taken from time to time.

The present system has been used since Waterville became a city in 1888 and while undoubtedly satisfactory at that time when the annual expenditures were far less than at present is now extremely unsatisfactory, and while your auditor's report as published each month shows a correct statement of receipts and expenditures, I am convinced that to the great majority of taxpayers it conveys no information.

Modern municipal accounting has attracted much attention during the past few years and a system by which each succeeding city government could obtain a comparative statement of earning and expenditures in detail would be highly instructive and extremely valuable in many ways.
